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

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

## Editorial

At this season of the year the attention of fraternity men generally is centered upon the subject of rushing. Rules in different institutions vary. But no matter when the actual season of "rushing" takes place

the new men are objects of much discussion and speculation.

The present rigid scholarship requirements of most colleges should have, and we believe are having, a wholesome effect upon the selection of men who are to be rushed. Little thought used to be given to whether a freshman would amount to anything in college, or for that matter after he got out in the world. It seemed of more importance to have him "fit in" to the particular group and be a congenial spirit.

It has been discovered that many of these congenial spirits can no longer make the grade. They drag the chapter scholarship down and oftentimes leave with unpaid bills and records of general worthlessness. So the selection of men cannot be too carefully made; not on a basis of appearance and good fellowship but upon a basis of record and sub-

stantiality.

Phi Delta Theta must maintain its position among the leaders in the college world and it can only do so by choosing the proper personnel to carry on in the active chapters.

We have all returned to our duties this fall with a desire to make our chapters and alumni clubs better than ever. Some years ago, when he was General Secretary of Beta Theta Pi, Dr. Francis W. Shepardson defined a good chapter of his fraternity and we are printing it here that it may serve as a measure of efficiency and give our own chapters a mark at which to shoot:

A Good Chapter of Beta Theta Pi:

I—Recognizes that it is not a local organization but a branch of a long established national fraternity having definite aims and purposes, and that its own charter was granted primarily to give added strength to the parent body.

2—Recognizes that the aims and purposes of the fraternity have precedence over any purely local customs or desires, and that loyalty to the fraternity is the first

prerequisite to enduring chapter development and success.

3—Strives through its individual members to exalt those aims and to fulfill those purposes, magnifying constantly the importance of individual accomplishment as a necessary accompaniment to group achievement.

4-Cherishes the sentiment of the fraternity through its songs and through faith-

ful adherence to its ritual interpreted with dignity on occasion of initiation.



5—Seeks to encourage its members in every way in unity of spirit and endeavor, tries to elevate standards of scholarship, aims to develop strong ties of human friendship among its members, manifests loyalty to the institution in which it is located, and gives hearty support to the faculty in measures which look toward the improvement of individual character.

6—Tries through its local administration to respond promptly and efficiently to the demands made upon it by the officials of the fraternity, insisting upon efficiency

in such administration.

7—Bars intoxicating liquor and gambling from its chapter house and does not tolerate, on the part of its individual members, open violation of the laws of the

fraternity or plain transgressions of the spirit of Beta Theta Pi,

8—Keeps its chapter house and grounds in good condition, regulates life in the house by such sensible laws as to make it as nearly as possible a real college home, and trains its members to respect the rights of one another as well as the obligations toward neighbors in a college community.

9-Pays its debts promptly and trains its members to regular and systematic habits

in personal financial matters as a fundamental factor in chapter prosperity.

10—Joins in every movement for better relationships among fraternity men in its institution, championing the local interfraternity conference as a desirable help toward comity and wider college friendship, always putting the larger interests of the institution ahead of the narrow and selfish demands of temporary chapter advantage.

II—Remembers that it is an institution designed to exist for many years and whose future success will largely be due to the reputation and character it sustains

at any one time.

12—Teaches its individual members to understand that each has distinct responsibility and that each must maintain his character as one of its worthy members.

#### A Perfect Record

California Alpha scored 100% with the General Fraternity for 1925-26. The Chapter Reporter had a letter in every issue of the Scroll and sent promptly all dues and required reports to the Central Office. The Treasurer submitted copies of his monthly reports as required by the Code and the Historian sent in all Biographical blanks and the Report for the Harvard Trophy. The chapter stood well toward the top of the campus among general fraternities in scholarship.

Such in brief is the record. It doesn't require much time to set it down, but it required good house organization and care-taking officers to attain it. Several other chapters were close competitors, but in every other case some one officer failed and the record was marred. California

Alpha alone came clear.

What other chapters will join the 100% rank for 1926-27?

In the meantime, we of the Central Office thank and congratulate California Alpha.



#### KANSAS ALPHA WINS HARVARD TROPHY

#### Report of the Harvard Trophy Award Committee

To The Honorable The General Council of Phi Delta Theta, Greetings:

Your committee appointed to make the award of the Harvard Trophy has attempted to the best of its ability to give a fair and impartial judgment on the reports sent in by the individual chapters, it has considered each report in detail, has weighed with deliberation all the points provided by the rules of the Harvard Alumni Club and now begs permission to make the following report:

It is a pleasure for your committee to announce that Kansas Alpha attained the highest number of points and is entitled to the possession of the Harvard Trophy Cup for the coming year.

Your committee wishes to congratulate Kansas Alpha on their splendid report as they stood first among twenty four fraternities in scholarship and have in all activities a well balanced chapter.

For the second place your committee wishes to congratulate California Beta, who likewise stood first in scholarship among the twenty four fraternities on their campus and showed exceptional strength in all activities so that they were only a very few points behind Kansas Alpha.

Your committee takes pleasure in awarding the third place to Pennsylvania Delta who, but for their standing in scholarship, would have been a close contender for first or second honors.

Your committee feels that from the fine showing of so many chapters that it is right that the first ten should be named in the order of their ranking and in all cases that they should be congratulated on their reports. Excluding the first three named above

the following chapters are named in the order of the standing of the individual chapter: Washington Beta, Illinois Delta, California Gamma, Pennsylvania Kappa, Florida Alpha, Ohio Epsilon, South Dakota Alpha.

There were thirty six chapters sent in reports and in all cases the committee wishes to congratulate them and at this place would recommend that in the coming years every chapter be urged to make this report. It does not seem probable to your committee that all those that failed to report could have come under the ruling that no chapter is eligible if it is in the low quarter on its campus in scholastic standing. If this should be the reason your committee would urge some drastic measures by your body to bring about a higher average of scholarship among our chapters.

Your committee feels, however, that this is not the case and therefore makes the above recommendation that each chapter be required to make this report so that all chapters will have an opportunity for winning the cup and that such opportunity is not lacking because of the negligence of the chapter officers to send in the report.

Your committee wishes especially, to mention the following chapters for ranking first in scholarship on their individual campuses:

Kansas Alpha, California Beta, Indiana Delta, Ohio Beta, Pennsylvania Iota, Georgia Beta.

Of the remaining chapters to make this report, six chapters stood in the first quarter in scholarship, fifteen in the second quarter and eight in the third quarter.

Your committee further recommends for your serious consideration that an additional requirement be added to the report as made for this award; namely, That each chapter be



graded on the completeness of their reports filed in the Central Office and that the committee of award be supplied with this report from the Central Office at the time of making the award. That under the term "reports" should be considered the financial standing of each chapter with the General Office. Your committee in making this recommendation feels that the internal or-

ganization and affairs of each chapter is as vital to their welfare as their external activities.

# C. C. YOUNG, California, '92, FOR GOVERNOR OF CALIFORNIA

T THE primary election August 31, Clement Calhoun Young, California, '92, won the nomination on the Republican ticket for governor of California over F. W. Richardson, the present incumbent. He is now lieutenant governor and previous to his ascension to that office was for years a member of the state legislature.

Brother Young was born fifty-seven years ago of old New England stock dating back to the American Revolution. Educated in the elementary schools of Butte County, California and in the high schools of Santa Rosa and San José he was graduated from the University of California in 1892.

He joined California Alpha in the second year of its reëstablishment in 1886 and helped to build it up through his loyalty and devotion in those struggling years.

Brother Young was head of the English department in the Lowell High School, San Francisco for nearly fourteen years. During this period he wrote, with a collaborator, a text book on English now in general use in the high schools of California.

He was married in 1902 to Lyla J. Vincent, Stanford, '03, and has two daughters, Barbara age sixteen, and Lucy, age twelve.

In 1906 he resigned from his school position to engage in business in Berkeley and San Francisco. He is vice president of Mason-McDuffie Co., real estate development and vice president of the Berkeley Guarantee Building and Loan Association.

Brother Young entered politics in 1908 when he was elected assemblyman from Berkeley. He was reëlected in 1910, 1912, 1914 and 1916 and was made Speaker of the Assembly for the sessions of 1913, 1915, 1917, the only Speaker in the history of the state to serve as long as six He was a delegate to the Republican National Convention in 1912, and Presidential Elector in 1920, becoming chairman of the California group that cast the state's votes for Harding and Coolidge. Elected lieutenant governor in 1918 and reëlected in 1922 by the largest vote ever polled in California for that office, he is the only lieutenant governor to have served as long as eight years.

Brother Young always has been interested in the welfare of California Alpha and in his busy political life finds time to renew his pledges in  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  and keep in touch with active affairs of the chapter. He has been a most loyal and devoted son of the

University of California and has been a powerful asset in its growth and prosperity. He is associated in the Mason McDuffie Co. with Duncan McDuffie, California Alpha, '99; Perry T. Tompkins, California Alpha, '92; and Elmer I. Rowell, California Alpha, '97.

It is interesting to note that during the state wide agitation some years ago against the fraternity system, Brother Young, as presiding officer of the State Legislature, was largely responsible for the defeat of a bill forbidding fraternities in the University of California.

#### A VISIT TO OLD MIAMI

 $\mathbf{E}^{\mathrm{VER}}$  SINCE I have known about  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  I have had a desire to go to Oxford, Ohio and spend some time browsing about the town and the campus of old Miami University. The opportunity to do so never seemed to present itself but when it was decided by the General Council to move the Fraternity headquarters back to the place of its birth, I determined to delay my trip no longer. There were some matters about the new catalogue which I wanted to consult Brothers Priest and Ball about so early one morning I dropped off the train in Oxford where I was met by Brother Priest.

A walk of about two blocks brought us to the double house, one half of which is being used as the fraternity office and living quarters for Brothers Priest and Ball. The other half of the house is the home of Karl Zwick, *Miami*, '00, who has been of great assistance since the return of the headquarters to Oxford. He will be remembered as a former Fraternity librarian.

The house is particularly well adapted to the purpose for which it is being used. The first floor contains a hall and four good size office rooms with plenty of light and plenty of fling space. The second floor has a bath room and three nice rooms, two of which are being used by Brothers Priest and Ball for living quarters.

They are nicely furnished. In fact the comfort and completeness of the whole place quite surprised me.

The Miami campus is but a few minutes walk and if you continue through it, you come to the Memorial Chapter House of Ohio Alpha. Just across the street is the very pleasant tea room where Brothers Priest and Ball take their meals, and excellent meals they are. As we passed through the campus we saw some workmen chiseling the letters BENTON HALL out of stone on one of the buildings. This, of course, is named for Dr. Guy Potter Benton, Ohio Wesleyan, '86, Past P. G. C., who gave Miami its greatest impetus during his years as president. A little farther on we came to the old North Dormitory, in a room of which Robert Morrison and his colleagues met together on that December night in 1848 and founded  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ . The dignified tablet which marks the room was easily seen and read as we passed.

When President Brewer was in Oxford some weeks ago he made the suggestion that the Fraternity attempt to secure the perpetual use of this room and have a Phikeia lodged in it each year. Another suggestion has been made that Ohio Alpha hold its pledging ceremony each year in the room and that it be refurnished in the style of the period of 1848.



In returning to the office from lunch we walked straight down High Street, which skirts the campus, to the village square where we stopped at the post office for the mail. My attention was called to an interesting old building fronting on the square which mounts these letters in stone "K of  $\Delta$  K E." It is evident that the Miami chapter of  $\Delta$  K E once had its hall in this building. We also saw the old corner

of Oxford, as I had had the popular idea that it is tucked away off the beaten trail. It is on the main line of the Cincinnati, Indianapolis and Western, a subsidiary of the B. & O. This line offers through sleeping car service to Chicago connecting with the Monon at Indianapolis, a ride of but two hours. Cincinnati is its other terminal but a short distance away and at Hamilton the Pennsylvania and

drug store building, the upper part of which is famous in  $\Sigma$  X history.

In the afternoon Brother Zwick kindly called with his car and took me over a fine paved road through a beautiful rolling country to Hamilton, which is fourteen miles. The lovely Miami River is flanked here by the massive paper mills of the Champion and Beckett Companies.

One of the things which impressed me particularly was the accessibility B. & O. are available while at Middletown one has access to the Big Four. Bus lines will carry you to any of these points.

If you have the same yearning I had, a visit to Oxford and Old Miami will leave you with the idea that the Fraternity has done the right thing to return its headquarters there. And if you are sentimentally inclined you will not be disappointed in the college or the community. It is charming.



# PENNSYLVANIA BETA HOLDS FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

FTER fifty years of cruising on the sea of fraternalism in  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ , Pennsylvania Beta sighted her first golden gleam from the lighthouse of chronological achievement. On April 22-24 the fiftieth anniversary of the second Phi Delt chapter of Pennsylvania was celebrated.

Since 1875 there has been initiated into the chapter 334 men of whom approximately eighty-five have passed into the Chapter Grand. Of this number there have been four college presidents and men of every noble profession.

It is undoubtedly true that the Fraternity locally has undergone trying conditions and adverse circumstances in her youth on the Gettysburg campus, but today, through the splendid efforts and undying support of the faithful alumni, she stands four-square beside her sister organizations in endeavoring to promote to the fullest extent those principles of comradeship and manhood that have ever been her dearest qualities.

In a little room of the Central Hotel on November 7, 1875, six men were initiated into the mysteries of  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ . On the following morning they proudly wore upon their waistcoats the badge of the finest fraternity "Catcalls" and unrein existence. stricted slurs emanated from the other groups on the campus, but with typical Phi modesty the charter brothers disregarded these epithets and devoted their entire energies to building up a chapter of which they might be proud. The men initiated were: J. C. Jacoby, '76; O. F. Melchoir, '76; A. Bell, '76; C. J. Reddig, '77; S. E. Smith, '76; H. M. Lantz, '78. Three of these founders are yet living: Brother Reverend J. C. Jacoby, a minister of the Gospel at Holyoke, Colorado, who traveled the entire distance of 2,400 miles to pay his respects to the celebration. On Thursday evening he gave a lecture in the College Y.M.C.A. auditorium, where he was greeted by former classmates and professors. His delightful old age and gentle manner made him at once the object of much attention, admiration, and love from the entire assembly. Reverend Albert Bell of York, Pennsylvania, also a clergyman, was present and added a touch of college days in '76. keen wit and overflowing loyalty made his presence a monument of joy for those in attendance. Reverend Melchoir of Springtown, Pennsylvania, was unable to attend because of physical incapacity.

Approximately sixty Phis attended the crowning event of the celebration-the anniversary banquet held in the chapter house. Brother George H. Kain, '97, a prominent lawyer of York, acted as toastmaster. was furnished by a number of the active chapter brothers. Stunts of a fun-provoking nature were executed intermittently. As for the speeches of the evening, it is enough to say that all had words of wisdom and eloquence and real advice. Most striking to the senses was the fact that representative speeches were given by men from each decade from 1875 to 1926. As one of the admirable patriarchs stated, "old age is a liar; we're twenty tonight." To hear the older men relating stories of the college days twenty-five and fifty years ago was a pleasure as interesting as un-Those who spoke were the Reverend Jacoby, '76; Brother John W. Elliot, Province President, who



gave a scholarly and intellectual address which may not be easily forgotten; Reverend Bell, '77; Dean Hoffman, assistant Province President; Brother M. L. Holloway, '84; Brother E. O. Keen, '92; Brother Dr. John E. Meisenhelder, '97; Brother P. B. Dunbar, '04; Brother Roy Phillippy, '15; Brother M. E. Gladfelter, '25; Brother C. Robert Kase, '26, chapter president. The evening closed with a model formal initiation of Phikeia Wolfinger, '29.

Saturday afternoon witnessed an informal faculty reception. White carnations were distributed, refreshments were served, and all enjoyed chats and reminiscences upon the days gone by and the days to come. The majority of the faculty were present, including Dr. Hanson, President of the college, and Dean Bikle. On Saturday evening the guests were entertained at a theater party. Sunday found the honorable guests returning to their homes and by evening all was history. History that each loyal Pennsylvania Beta Phi will record in his annals of events.

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# NORTH CAROLINA ALPHA REVIVED AT DUKE UNIVERSITY

On THE twenty-first of last May, after a lapse of nearly half a century, the fame of  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  was again lighted on the altar of North Carolina Alpha at Duke University. The charter had been restored to the institution through the local organization known as  $E A \Sigma$ , the members of which were initiated the two preceding evenings by members of North Carolina Beta, at Chapel Hill, twelve miles away.

The original charter was granted in 1878 to a group of petitioners headed

by George M. Bulla, of High Point, North Carolina. At this time Trinity College (recently become Duke University) was a small school, with some two hundred matriculates, under the control of the Southern Methodist Church. It was located five miles from High Point, and formed the nucleus of a village of about three hundred population. There was only one large building, which contained the class rooms, chapel, offices, and literary society halls. There was no library, no gymnasium, and no dorm-



itory facilities. At the time of the establishment of the chapter of  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ , there were already in the institution chapters of X  $\Phi$ , established 1871; A T  $\Omega$ , 1872; and K  $\Sigma$ , 1873.

The original North Carolina Alpha enjoyed only a brief existence. series of political intrigues and maneuverings, in which all four fraternities seem equally implicated, brought about in 1879 a crisis which resulted in the disbanding of all chapters. These political activities centered around literary society affairs; for in those days of the flourishing of Southern post-bellum spread-eagle oratory the center of interest in college life was the debating hall. After a period of active political maneuvers, which aroused strong anti-fraternity feeling. the chapters, with some pressure from the faculty, voluntarily agreed not to initiate any new men after the year 1878-79, and thus all the charters were automatically abandoned.

An interesting interlude in the history of the chapter is the fact that in the session of 1891-92,  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  was unsuccessfully petitioned by the group which later became the founders of

the revived K  $\Sigma$  chapter.

In the fall of 1924, a group of men from the sophomore and junior classes who had been closely associated during the past year decided to ally themselves into a more formal and closely-knit organization. result of their efforts was the announcement, in December, of the formation of a local fraternity under the name of E A  $\Sigma$ . Immediately after the founding, this group entered into communication with the  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ headquarters, the correspondence which finally resulted in its receiving the revived charter. With the helpful co-operation and advice of the neighboring Beta chapter, and the two Phis on the Duke faculty, Dr. E. D. Soper, Dean of the School of Religion, and Dr. Frank C. Brown, head of the English Department and Comptroller of the University, the

group was enlarged and strengthened by the addition of new members, and was able to compete in its rushing on equal terms with the chapters of national fraternities.

The charter was granted last May, by a vote of the province and the general fraternity. On the evenings of the nineteenth and twentieth, the Duke men were initiated by members of the Beta chapter at their house at the University of North Carolina. On the afternoon of the twenty-first, the ritual of the re-establishment of a chapter was performed at Duke, and the charter delivered to the new chapter. Brother Henry K. Urion presided at this ceremony, with Brother A. R. Priest acting as Warden.

That night a banquet and dance were held in the Washington Duke Hotel. Speeches were made by Brothers Soper and Brown, of the Duke faculty, Dr. W. H. Wannamaker, dean of the University, Brother Priest, Brother George Ragsdale, province president, Brother Fred Coxe, former president of the fraternity, and Brother Urion of the General Council.

In addition to  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ , there are at Duke University chapters of A T  $\Omega$ , K  $\Sigma$ , K A (southern),  $\Pi$  K A,  $\Sigma$   $\Phi$  E,  $\Sigma$  X,  $\Pi$  K  $\Theta$ ,  $\Delta$   $\Sigma$   $\Phi$ , X T, and  $\Lambda$  X A. Local groups are presenting petitions to  $\Phi$  K  $\Psi$  and  $\Delta$  T  $\Delta$ . The women's fraternities are represented by chapters of A  $\Delta$   $\Pi$ , K  $\Delta$ , and Z T A.

THE NINTH Edition of the Catalogue of Phi Delta Theta is ready delivery.

Through many months, when the cold winter wind from the Detroit rivers made one's trousers seem insignificant—through the hot summer months in Oxford when the same trousers persisted in taking all the varnish off the chairs—the entire force has looked forward to the time when the above statement would be one of fact.

Little did anyone think when the General Council, at a meeting in January of 1925, asked to have a new catalogue published that it would not be completed and the final copy into the hands of the printer until September 1, 1926—the day that the last of it was mailed to Brother George Banta at Menasha. But that day has passed and the editors now look back over that period of gathering the material, of shaping it for the Palladium copy, of making thousands of corrections and of proof reading and final checking with somewhat the same feeling as of one who has passed through a long seige of sickness and after he is well again, remembers only the beautiful flowers that were sent him, the friends that came to see him, and has that sense of well-being that it is all over.

For that the editors are thankful and now that they are "up and around", they wish to convey to all those who have been with them thru the "seige", their heartfelt thanks for the splendid co-operation that they received every step of the way from the active chapters, alumni clubs, the hundreds of alumni and even friends of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  who have helped to give to the Fraternity the best catalogue that it has been possible to make.

It would be a real pleasure to take a little extra time and space to "gossip" about the many details connected with this work, to give the name of this chapter and that chapter that had such good records of their alumni and that responded to the requests of the editors for information, of this alumnus and that alumnus who sent in information of new addresses, degrees, honors, and gave freely of his time to help in this work—many, many things could be told of such co-opera-Then, to make our "gossip" complete, it would be just human to tell, confidentially, you know, of those chapters that failed to help or respond in any way, and even of some alumni clubs and individuals that failed to acknowledge the requests for information, lists, etc., but, then, that would be too much pleasure, and on the whole even those few instances were straightened out by alumni of the delinquent chapters or friends who gave such information as they could. Of a couple of chapters that failed to send in any rosters at all, of three or four others that made a copy of the old catalogue and gave no help whatever, the editors want to thank their alumni for their very great help in making, in most instances, a roster that is fairly complete and accurate. It makes one wonder if those chapters are going to turn out the type of alumni that came to the rescue. alumni of those chapters might well wonder, too, and with a visit back to their chapter get some first-hand information.

It has been eight years since the Eighth Edition of the Catalogue was published. It was published at a time when a great many of the alumni and active men were in the Service. When they returned they scattered in many places, chapter rosters had been

allowed to get much out-of-date and it has been necessary to build the Edition from the "ground floor." The first step necessary and the original place for getting the information was naturally from the chapter rosters of the individual chap-A request was sent to each chapter for their roster in the early spring of 1925. These rosters were in many instances immediately compiled and in many more instances repeated requests had to be sent so that their long delay (some of them not arriving until December, 1925, and some of them not at all) resulted in retarding many months the publishing of the catalogue.

As soon as the rosters began coming in, personal information blanks were sent to each of their alumni, many of which were answered, many were ignored, and a few were returned because of incorrect addres-It was found that the rosters were, as a whole, so incomplete that some other method would be necessary to get the catalogue information anything like accurate. The idea of publishing the entire list of chapter rosters in the February Palladium with the last information that was available was decided upon, altho it meant much additional expense and two printings of the catalogue. was, nevertheless, a happy thought and the return and response that the editors received from that source was indeed gratifying and made possible a catalogue that is as complete and as accurate as possible. It can be readily seen the value of this method when the editors received over twenty thousand corrections to the original lists. The chapters had gradually got busy on their rosters, alumni had become interested, and in many instances, the entire rosters of chapters were known to be complete and correct at the time the material went to the printers.

Practically all corrections from this source were in and completed by the first of July of this year and were returned for the final printing. Then came the making of the alphabetical list and the geographical list. Each member had been recorded on an individual card and arranged alphabetically with his chapter, year, and address. From this list was made the alphabetical list and the geographical list, the latter being made by an entire rearrangement of the cards so as to get the names alphabetically under the respective cities and towns, the towns alphabetically under the states, and the states and foreign countries in alphabetical order. Each time checking and cross-checking were necessary and for the geographical list alone it took eight people six weeks to arrange, copy, and check. In every instance, the proof was read in whole before it was sent to the printer and when the final proof was submitted, the entire book was proofread in detail.

Such are a few high spots in the moulding and the making which have taken the entire time of the office for the last eighteen months; and here it might be well to add the appreciation of the editors to those who have worked with them in the office for their untiring efforts and willingness to give of their time and energy.

The completed catalogue stands as a beautiful work of the printer's art—all credit being due to the Banta Publishing Company, and the splendid co-operation of Brother George Banta, Sr. and Brother George Banta, Jr. in their advice, their selection of materials and, in all, the whole make-up of the book itself.

Bound in a beautiful blue buckram lettered in gold, clear readable type on a semi-bible paper of the finest quality, compact in form and size so that it is a usable book either on the desk or in the traveling bag, the editors recommend it to you with pardonable pride.

The features of the book are complete. The first section contains the index, statistics, names of prominent men, names of the officers of the fra-

ternity down to date, dates of the chartering of chapters, etc., along with a short, interesting history of  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ . The second section contains the chapter rosters, arranged in alphabetical order by states and chapters. Each roster is arranged by years giving the names of the members-living and deceased — degrees, affiliations, honors, businesses, addresses-both business and residence as far as was The third section contains a complete alphabetical list of the membership of the fraternity, giving the chapter and year with affiliations, so that with ease one may turn to the proper place for the information of the member. The fourth section contains the geographical list. The names are arranged alphabetically under the towns and cities, the cities are alphabetically under the states, provinces, and countries, and the states, provinces, and foreign countries are arranged alphabetically. Following this list is an alphabetical list of the members whose addresses are unknown, giving their class and year; then this list is followed by a list of the "Deceased" members. Thus, in the last three sections of the catalogue each member is listed in three ways so that he may be found from

any sort of information that one may have concerning him.

The effects of the new catalogue are already apparent, in that the chapters have been aroused to the necessity of keeping up their individual rosters and, it is hoped, that the alumni have been encouraged to keep in more active touch with their chapters and with the Central Office, the Central Office has been greatly aided in its work by the accumulation of new addresses, in its personal touch with many alumni who have drifted away, and in the realization that there must be in the Central Office a complete card index system, other than the many they have already, to be used as a basic list that will contain complete information about every member. If the results to be obtained alumni clubs locating members, new alumni clubs being organized by being able to know where members are in their respective cities, old friends renewing their friendships, personally or by letter. and the whole spirit of the fraternity revived in many who have drifted away—if all this is accomplished, the labor and money that have been expended will seem trivial in comparison to the results obtained and the editors will be humbly thankful.

#### THE FRATERNITY FLAG

**C** ECTION 211 of the Code: "Fraternity Flag. The flag of the Fraternity consists of three perpendicular bars of equal width; the outer bars of blue and the inner bar of white material; each of the outer bars charged with three white five pointed stars: and the middle bar charged with the letters " $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ " in blue; the stars

and letters being arranged vertically; the hoist of the flag on the staff being two-thirds of the fly; the staff having a spear-shaped head, the head, cord and tassels being silvered."

Section 212 of the Code: "Fraternity Banner. The Fraternity banner has the form of an equilateral triangle and bears across the body the word "Miami" over the figures "1848"; above the left "\$\Phi\$"; below "\$\Delta\$" and above the right "\$\Phi\$". The body is of blue material, the lettering in gold; the standard, if one is used, bar, cord, and tassels being silvered. The banner for each chapter is similar except that for "Miami" and "1848" are substituted the name or initials of the institution at which the chapter is established and the year when the chapter was chartered."

It is unfortunate, from the point of view of the chronicler, that Phi Delta Theta's insignia could not have sprung, Athena-like, from the inspired mind of some member of the Fraternity. But, as is the case with most worthwhile things, many of the institutions of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  were of slow and sometimes painful evolution. Among these might be classed our insignia, including the flag, and banners.

It was a matter of about a decade and a half from the first adoption of a banner to the present standardization of flag and banners as described above. The man who was the principal contributor to this development was Walter Benjamin Palmer, that Phi whose name "led all the rest" in so many phases of our Fraternity's growth. Although  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  has pioneered in numerous ways, we can not claim the first fraternity flag, that having been adopted by  $\Theta$   $\Delta$  X in 1869, antedating our first flag by twenty years.

A very logical preliminary to the development of any flags, banners or pennants was the adoption of Fraternity colors in 1871. The Miami chapter chose the familiar white and blue on April 16 of that year, and on the motion of Ohio Alpha's delegate to the National Convention at Indianapolis a month later, they were adopted as the colors of the Fraternity on May 12, 1871. As they are employed now, indoor use specifies a light blue or truer azure, while for outdoor use, due to the effects of the weather, a darker blue is permissible and even desirable.

The way was now paved for the development of this branch of the Fraternity's insignia but nothing followed for nine years, although the Athens Convention of 1873 did adopt certain emblems: a shield, anchor, two stars, etc.

In the epochal Indianapolis convention of 1880, attention was given to banners as well as to government. It was here that the master hands of Walter Palmer and George Banta. Sr. first prominently appeared. Farreaching governmental changes were adopted, largely at the instance Brother Banta, who became the first head of the reorganized society: a new ritual-principally Brother Palmer's work-provided for two ban-Of conventionalized shield shape, one consisted, to use the words of Palmer in describing them, of a "wreath surrounding the Greek letters  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  in the middle, with the figures '1848' below, and the Greek words Eis aner oudeis aner above. The other was a wreath surrounding the title of the chapter in the middle, with the year of the chapter's establishment below, and the Greek letters ' $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ ' above; the staffs of both banners bearing spear-shaped heads." This was the first use of the Greek phrase which in 1889 became the open motto of the Fraternity.

Most of the rest of that decade was devoted to the expansion and other problems, little being said at conventions of banners, and nothing of flags. The first  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  pennant, however, saw the light of day at the Richmond convention in the fall of 1882. It was a parallelogram, half blue and half white, the white bearing the letters ' $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ ' in blue." This pennant was suspended from a rope stretched across a Richmond street during the convention.

Again in 1884 a large pennant was suspended across Union street in Nashville during the National Convention. This time the pennant was triangular, white with a blue border, "1848" in the center, and the Greek



letters in the upper left, lower, and upper right corners. The pennant was very similar to a banner—of Palmer's designing—which appeared as a part of the Scroll cover design while he was editor in 1884.

The Bloomington (Illinois) convention of 1889 saw the birth of Phi Delta Theta's first flag, as well as the adoption of changes in the banners. The latter were much the same as that displayed on the Scroll cover of 1884. They were of blue material with silver lettering and fringe. The chapter banner was to be of the same shape, color, and material, but to have the name of the state across the top, the date of the chapter's establishment in the center, and the chapter's Greek-letter below.

The flag of 1889, very simple in conception, consisted only of a blue field with "three white five-pointed stars, arranged triangularly, one above and two below."

The ritual, which had been adopted "on probation" in 1889, came up for consideration and revision at the Atlanta convention in 1891. flag design was submitted by Palmer, the Fraternity's Betsy Ross, which consisted of "three horizontal bars. the middle of white and the two outer of blue, each of the latter bearing three white five-pointed stars, making six stars." Before adoption, a blue " $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ " was added to the white center bar, even though this was not quite consistent with formal heraldry. The six memorial stars were here first used as a Fraternity emblem. The banners were unchanged from those of two years earlier.

Emergence of the flag into its present form can be seen fairly definitely in the action of the Atlanta convention in 1891. The ultimate step though, did not come until the second succeeding convention, that at Philadelphia in 1896. Here the bars were changed to their present vertical arrangement, with the stars and the Greek letters being kept on the blue and the white bars respectively. The Fraternity banner remained much the

same: above "1848" was added "Miami." The chapter banners were similar except that for "Miami" and "1848" were to be substituted the name of college and date of charter.

Thus the evolution of Phi Delta Theta's flag and banners. The question of future change might occur. This is doubtful. It will have been thirty years next month (November) since any change has been made. Preceding that, a period of about half this length had seen the origin and development of these insignia. During the last few decades other problems have engaged our attention; we find the flag and banners satisfactory; so, unless under the stress of unforeseen circumstances, further change is improbable.

Possibly the most famous individual flag of the Fraternity was one just fifty years younger than the parent chapter. It was made by a Columbus, Ohio, firm and displayed in the convention hall during the Semi-Centennial convention held at Columbus in November 1898. By decision of the convention it was purchased by the Fraternity to be preserved by the Fraternity Librarian. During Miami diamond anniversary University's celebration in June 1889 this flag decorated a Phi reception and ball held June 13.

The following year at the famous Louisville convention, the Louisville Hotel flew from its flagstaff the same semi-centennial flag, as it was now called, and two years later it again decorated a convention hall (New York, November, 1902).

A novel and appropriate use of the flag was made by the then P. G. C., H. H. Ward, in 1901. Flags were offered as prizes to the chapters in each province which presented at the Province Conventions the best papers on the 1901 Alumni Day topic, "The Better Care of Our Alumni." In the two provinces contesting, flags were won by Wisconsin Alpha and Ohio Eta. The latter chapter won the "grand prix," a bust of Pallas.

#### STANFORD SWIMMER TAKES HONORS



## DEMARCHUS CLARITON BROWN, SCHOLAR AND GENTLEMAN

THE name of Demarchus Clariton Brown, Butler, '79, formerly professor of Greek and acting president of Butler University, has been enshrined upon the scroll of the Chapter Grand. He died August 22, 1926, after a lingering illness, at St. Francis Hospital in Indianapolis. At the

time of his death, and for twenty-four years preceding, he was director at the Indiana state library. His was a notable career of scholarly attainment. News dispatches upon his death in unanimity refer to Brother Brown as the perfect exemplification of the venerable phrase "a scholar and a gentleman." Truly, none came to know him but to love him.

Surviving Brother Brown are his wife, Mrs. Jessie Christian Brown;

one son, Philip Brown, Butler, '22; and his brother Hilton U. Brown, Butler, '80, past president of the General Council, whose name with that of his beloved brother is inseparably linked with every progress of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ .

linked with every progress of  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ . Demarchus C. Brown was born in Indianapolis on June 24, 1857. His early education was received in the Indianapolis public schools and later in old Northwestern Christian University, now Butler University, from which he was graduated in 1879 and received his master's degree in 1880. While in the university he served as a tutor in Greek. He traveled extensively abroad and spent much time in study and research at the University of Tubingen, Germany, in Paris,. London, Berlin, Munich, Athens and Rome. In 1884 he became professor of Greek and secretary of the board of directors at Butler University in which capacity he remained until his appointment to the post of state librarian in 1906. For two years he was acting president of the university. He was a recognized authority on criminology and served as a member of the Indiana state board of Charities twenty-eight years. Brother Brown published translations from Lucian and a translation of Freudenthal's American Criminology. was one of the charter members of the. Downey Avenue Christian Church in Indianapolis and for forty-five years served on its board of elders.

While in college Brother Brown was one of the greatest athletes of his day and no chronology of his life would be complete without reference to his activities in youth and continued interest throughout his well-rounded life. Baseball was the game of games in his day among the colleges and he

was a varsity participant in every encounter. His batting "eye" and marvelous throwing "arm" threw fear into every opposing nine. His deeds of valor are still recounted and retold by the youngest Phikeias of his chapter. In later years he never

missed a football or baseball contest participated in by his Alma Mater. He frequently visited with the Butler chapter and among all her many actives and alumni he was happily and lovingly titled "symposiarch" of Indiana Gamma.



### MONTANA PHI IS TRACK STAR

A YOUNG man from the wilds of Montana has set the whole Pacific athletic world talking. This young man is Brother Arnold Gil-

lette of Lewiston, Montana, and at the recent Pacific Coast Conference Track Meet held at Palo Alto, California, he broke two conference records in one afternoon. His two new records are in the mile and two-mile runs which he set at 4 minutes 21 7/10 seconds and 9 minutes 30 4/10 seconds respectively. This tied Gillette for individual honors with Bud Houser of U. S. C. and earned him the new nickname of "Powder River" Gillette. The wonder of it all is that Gillette had only one hour of rest between his two races and trailed the other men in each event only to come from behind at the finish and beat a field of reputable runners.

To quote the San Francisco Examiner: "Gillette proved a surprising exponent of gameness, a veritable demon of a runner, when he won both the mile and the two-mile races over the greatest field seen in a Pacific Coast meet. He first jumped into prominence in the third lap of the mile race, when he came from behind to pass Swobeda of California, who was then leading and sped onward to finish the race in 4 minutes 21 7/10 seconds, clipping some three seconds off the old mark. . . Later Gillette came back and won the two-mile race in 9 minutes 30 4/10 seconds to end his day of record smashing.

"In doing this he let Divine of Washington State set the pace for six laps and a torrid pace it was—so torrid that it killed off all of California's hitherto wonderful eight-lap men before six laps had been passed, Heilman of U.S.C. going in the fourth, Fox of California in the fifth, and Stevens of California in the sixth.

"Divine passed the half-mile mark

in 2 minutes 11 seconds and the mile in 4 minutes 37 seconds—as fast as most runners can accomplish that distance. At this time he was leading by twenty yards, but then the field began to pull up on him and Gillette sneaked past on the seventh lap and began to pull away. He won by some fifty yards, followed by Ramsay of Washington, who beat Divine by three yards. Bell of Oregon Aggies brought up the rear."

It might be added that this was the first time that Brother Gillette ever ran the two-mile in collegiate competition. The mile and half-mile races have heretofore been his events. May 1 at the Seattle relay carnival he was anchor man on the medley relay team for Montana. Running the final three quarters of a mile he won by about fifteen yards. This was a big factor in Montana's setting a new medley relay record of six minutes 25 6/10 seconds. Last spring Gillette went to the Stagg meet at Chicago and took third in the mile run passing

thirteen men in his final sprint. He will undoubtedly make the trip to Chicago again this year and should win more glory for his Alma Mater and himself.

This is Gillette's junior year in college and his second year of varsity track. He made his letter both years as well as his numerals in his freshman year. His major is Art where he shows an extraordinary bit of ability. He is also assistant instructor in the art department. College honors accorded to Brother Gillette are: Silent Sentinel, the highest honorary in school, Bear Paw, a sophomore honorary, Junior Delegate to the Central Board. He was recently elected to  $\Delta \Phi \Delta$ , art honorary. In his sophomore year he was given the Scheuch scholarship for all around leadership in college and the alumni of the chapter presented him with the Herbert Vitt memorial badge for being the outstanding sophomore in the chapter.

#### PHIS IN THE OHIO TRACK CONFERENCE

THE Big-Six Conference had its origin in 1902, its objective being the promotion of clean athletics and the drafting of rules and regulations governing intercollegiate sports. The six colleges which founded the conference are: Case School of Applied Science, Oberlin College, Ohio State University, Western Reserve University, Ohio Wesleyan University, and Kenyon College. The Ohio Conference, though often called the "Big-Six Conference," has steadily expanded until it now includes twenty-two schools of higher learning. At seven of these institutions  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  has established flourishing chapters.

The purpose of this article, however, is to tell just how many honors

the Phis of Ohio captured in the conference track meet held at Oberlin, on the twenty-ninth of May, 1926. Ohio State is not entered in this meet, it being such a large institution that competition is too great for the other schools. Fifteen Phis received letters from their respective schools during the past track season. Three of the track teams were piloted by Phis. Brother Smith was captain of the University Brother team. Stoakes captained the Denison team, and Brother Weil led the Miami team to victory. Brother Paul Smith was manager of the team at Ohio Univer-


Perhaps, the most unusual events at the meet were the high and low

hurdles. First, second, and third places in the high hurdles were won by Phis, each representing a different school. The same trio took first, second, and third places in the low hurdles. Brother Riddle of Miami was the first to reach the tape in the low hurdles, in 24.7 seconds, Brother Ellis of Ohio Wesleyan coming in second and Brother Cain of Case third. In the high hurdles, Brother Ellis won

880-yard run. The old record for this race was broken and a new record of 1 minute and 56.6 seconds hangs in its place.

In the high jump, Brother Byrns of Case out-jumped his competitors and established a new record of 6 feet and 1 5/16 inches for the conference. Brother Ellis of Ohio Wesleyan was tied with two others for third place in this event.

Brother Weil ran on the Miami relay team which came in second, Brother Barth helped Denison's team to place fourth, and Brother Kemble aided Case's outfit in placing fifth. A total of forty-four points was scored by Phis, just six points under the score made by Miami in winning the meet. This is a record of which no other fraternity can boast.

Brother Ellis was the high point man for the Ohio Wesleyan team and Brother Barth scored the most points for the Denison team.


In the future meets of the Ohio Conference,  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  hopes to maintain at least, if not better, its standing for the past year.

he fails to field a ball or smack out a clean hit. Always a heavy hitter, Illman is boosting an already fine average in his work of the present season.



## SOLDIER, SCIENTIST, AUTHOR AND EDITOR

VERSATILITY is the word that best befits the achievements of Colonel C. de Forest Chandler, Case, '07, of Washington, D. C., who has won fame on the field of battle as well as in the field of letters.

Brother Chandler was a pioneer in American aviation, being one of the earliest pilots in heavier-than-air craft. He was also one of the army's first "balloonatics," a field in which he soon became an authority. During the World War Brother Chandler was the commanding officer of the first Army Aviation School at College Park, Maryland, and later was ap-

pointed chief of the Balloon Section for the American Expeditionary Forces in France. In this capacity

he was in active command of all the United States Army lighter-than-air craft in the war, including observation balloons, free balloons, and dirigibles. His arduous duties in France so impaired his health that Colonel Chandler was placed on the retired list although he is still a comparatively young man.

Since his retirement from the Army Brother Chandler has devoted himself to literary pursuits and his articles have appeared in several of our leading magazines. He is author of a new book entitled Balloon and Airship Gases, co-author with Ralph H. Upson, America's premier free-balloon pilot, in a new work, Free and Captive Balloons, and editor-in-chief of the Ronald Aeronautic Library, the first comprehensive, organized library of practical aeronautics in any language. Brother Chandler is recognized as a leading authority in the field of aeronautics.

"It was in 1903 that Merrill James Haldeman was graduated from Dickinson College. Never heard of Dickinson College? Why, it's in Carlisle, Pa., that's where it is. Well, Jim liked the frat boys so well, he decided to keep right on being one, so he went into the fraternity jewelry business and before long most of the college lads in the country knew him. On many a campus they still tell stories of the wild nights they used to have in the Phi Beta Kappa house when Jimmie struck town. One night at New Haven—but you ask Mr. Haldeman about it. It should be passed that he is a bachelor, lives at the D. A. C., buys Rembrandt prints and insists that he is in the real estate business."

Perhaps no Dickinsonian is better known by other college graduates the nation over than "Jimmie." For several years after he was given his diploma he roamed the entire country as a fraternity jewelry salesman. His real estate firm in Detroit is one of the most prominent in that city.

Another clipping about another interesting alumnus. This one from the Wall Street *Journal* about Rollin C. Bortle, *Pennsylvania*, '05.



But to many a small firm endeavoring to make its way in the bond game, B has stood for Bortle. And here he is, Rollin C. Bortle—as Major sees him. This isn't Major's first attack on him either, for The Coupon, the little publication for the members of the Bond Club of New York, carried a sketch of

him three years ago. Maybe that's the reason Major spent the next couple of summers in California. But his art has

improved since then.

Mr. Bortle was born several years ago in Columbus, Ohio. History doesn't record how he put in the time until manhood, but in 1905 the University of Pennsylvania turned him loose to the despair of the Mask and Wig Club, for didn't he shake a mean foot on the boards as its dancing girl and leading lady?

The Philadelphia office of the bond house of N. W. Halsey & Co. was his first post-graduate job. That firm's ab-

#### Major MacDill Gets Into Print



Judge George D. Murray, California '77

The old guard of California Alpha is passing. On May 10 Superior Judge George D. Murray, California, '77 dropped dead at the door of his chambers in the court house at Eureka, California, a few minutes after he had adjourned a trial for the day.

Brother Murray suffered a stroke several years ago and for many months was confined to his home and for many months more was unable to resume his seat on the bench, but for the past year he had returned to the bench and was thought to be almost fully recovered physically, for mentally he had not been afflicted. It is believed that the strain of two lengthy trials of late was too much for his nervous system, weakened by his long illness.

He was a native son, having been born in Arcata, California, September 5, 1855. He received his A.B. degree at the University of California in 1877 and then taught school for a period before entering the Hastings Law College at San Francisco from whence he graduated in 1884.

Taking up the practice of his profession in Eureka he served one term as district attorney of the county and, in 1909 was elected Superior Judge which position he has held ever since.

The Eureka Standard paid Brother Murray the following tribute:

Possessed of a kindly nature, devoid of attributes that make for harshness, blessed with a sterling integrity, an able lawyer, a just judge whose sense of justice was the guiding star of his life, Judge George D. Murray was one of the noblest men whose life added to the

moral and intellectual worth of this community. In private life he was considerate and humane; ever solicitous of the feelings and frailties of others; he avoided offense, even to the humblest.

On the bench he was the soul of honor. Gifted with a judicial mind freed from bias or prejudice, he looked only to the rights of litigants. In the court over which he presided the law was administered with regard to the highest ideals. Poverty and wealth had equal opportunities; personal rancor never marred his decisions nor animosity blighted his judgment.

His life so supported by meritorious deeds, receiving as it did the unstinted esteem and respect of everyone who knew him as a proud heritage to the men and women of California where he contributed his wealth of head and heart for the betterment of all the best features of our ethical civilization.

Lieutenant Harvey Thomas Ray, Iowa, '17

Harvey Thomas Ray, Iowa, '17, first lieutenant in the reserve flying corps, was killed in an airplane accident near Junction City, Kansas, July 5, 1926. With Lieutenant Edward Steinhauer of Kansas City as passenger, Brother Ray was flying near Marshall Field at Fort Riley when his J.-N.-S. plane crashed to the ground. His neck was broken while Lieutenant Steinhauer suffered a broken jaw and other injuries.

Each summer since the close of the World War Brother Ray had reported for duty and several weeks training as a reserve aviation officer. The fatal flight was his first one of this year's camp.

He was born in Des Moines, Iowa, February 12, 1893 and had lived there all his life. His academic work was done at the University of Iowa where he was made a Phi by Iowa Beta. He entered the Drake University Law School but his graduation was cut short in the spring of 1917 when, with barely two months' work to be finished, he volunteered for service in the signal corps of the Army.

Dissatisfied with a period of inactivity while waiting to be called

into the signal corps Brother Ray applied for transfer to the aviation service. This was granted and he proceeded to Urbana, Illinois, where he received his basic ground training. His first flying was done at Waco, Texas, where he received his commission as a second lieutenant.

Brother Ray received the keenest disappointment of his life when after waiting several weeks in New York and Hampton Roads to be sent to France he was selected as an aviation instructor and assigned to several southern flying fields.

He was admitted to the bar in 1917, just prior to his enlistment. At the close of the war he served one term as assistant reading clerk in the Iowa state senate and then formed a law partnership with Charles T. Snyder.

Brother Ray was married in 1918 to Josephine Hunter, daughter of Mayor Hunter of Des Moines. His widow survives, as well as his father, two brothers and two sisters.

Burial took place in Des Moines.

Claude N. Bennett, Emory, '88

The death of Claude N. Bennett, Emory, '88, which occurred June 13, 1926, removed one of the most loyal Phis in the city of Washington. A chapter mate of the late Walter B. Palmer, he was one of his intimate friends and associates, Brother Bennett and his mother standing up with Brother Palmer at the time of his marriage.

Death came after a three weeks' illness of bronchial pneumonia at his residence in the Brighton Hotel in Washington. He was born in Thomson, Georgia, November 29, 1866 and alternating work with school attendance was graduated from Emory in 1888 and there became a member of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ .

Starting his career as a writer at an early age, Brother Bennett served on the staff of the Atlanta Journal from 1888 to 1891 and was Washington Correspondent for that newspaper from 1891 until he became secretary to Secretary of the Interior Hoke Smith in 1893. Later he was appointed by President Cleveland to serve on special missions in connection with Indian affairs in the West. He resigned in 1897 to establish the Congressional Information Bureau, to keep clients throughout the United States and abroad advised on national affairs and to represent them in Washington in any desired capacity.

Brother Bennett had served as vice president of the Lee Highway As-



sociation for the District of Columbia and as national treasurer of that organization. He also was long active in the Southern Society of Washington, being president from 1913 to 1915. In addition, he was a member of the Washington Society of Fine Arts, the National Speech Association, the District of Columbia Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, the University Club, being one of the charter members; the National Press Club, the Arts Club of Washington, the Washington Readers' Club, and the Reform Club of New York City.

In the fraternity, Brother Bennett has always been active in the affairs of the Washington Alumni Club. He took a prominent part in the national convention of 1906.

Funeral services were conducted in Washington and burial took place at his old home in Thomson, Georgia.

A recent death in Atlanta again calls attention to the proportion of distinguished men produced by our early and defunct chapters.

May 8, 1871,  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  chartered the pioneer chapter in Georgia at Oglethorpe University. Because of the closing of the doors of Oglethorpe in the fall of 1872 our chapter suspended, but in its career of slightly more than one year, thirteen men had been made Phis and it had also been the means of establishing chapters at Georgia, Emory, and Mercer.

So it happened that although Oglethorpe suspended, the work of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  carried on. Practically every one of the thirteen initiates of old Georgia Alpha attained prominence and contributed to the honors of the Fraternity. When the pages of the 1926 catalogue were made up, only two of the thirteen were recorded as living: Professor Benjamin Palmer Gaillard, Professor of Physics and Geology in the North Georgia Agricultural Col-

lege, Delonega, Georgia, and Judge Harry Maurrelle Reid, Judge of the City Court of Atlanta, Georgia.

And now Judge Reid is gone. His death occurred Thursday morning, September 9, 1926 in Atlanta. His burial took place Saturday, September 11 at 2:30 P. M. and was in charge of the Atlanta Bar Association. All courts of Atlanta and Fulton County were adjourned through Friday and Saturday. Speaking editorially, the Atlanta Constitution paid Judge Reid the following tribute:

The judiciary lost one of its most venerable and distinguished members when Judge Harry M. Reid, presiding judge of the Atlanta City court for more than a quarter of a century, died. He enjoyed close, loyal friendships among members of the bar, and perhaps no judge was ever more deeply and earnestly loved by those who practiced in his court. He was a great jurist in his profound knowledge of the law. He was always fair. His high integrity personally and his unimpeachable honor professionally made him outstanding as a judge in this city and state.

The state had no better judge than he and no finer type of man ever lived.

Truly our elder brothers have set us high standards.

Harry Vance Swope, Hanover, '89

A member of a Phi family who rose to fame as an artist, Harry Vance Swope, Hanover, '89, died in New York City August 10, 1926. He had been in declining health for six months.

Brother Swope was born in Crotherville, Indiana and was about fifty-seven years old. After his graduation at Hanover College in 1889 he went to Europe to study art and music. He remained there about twelve years and returned to New York, where he maintained his studio. Some of his most valuable canvases are scenes along the Maine coast, where he had a summer home.

Dr. Charles F. Canedy, Williams, '96

Dr. Charles F. Canedy, practicing physician in Greenfield, Massachusetts died at the Franklin Hospital in that city on May 4, 1925, from acute appendicitis. He was a member of the medical staff of the hospital, the Massachusetts Medical Association, the American Medical Association. He was married in August 1924 to Mildred E. Apt of Colraine, Massachusetts.

Brother Canedy was born in Shelburne Falls in 1877, the son of a doctor. He was prepared for college at Arms Academy, entering Williams at the age of fifteen. He was graduated from Harvard Medical School in 1900 and served one year as an interne in the New Haven hospital, taking up practice in Greenfield the following year. He was a captain in the Medical Corps of the U. S. Army.

Thomas H. Morrison, Williams, '00

Thomas H. Morrison, well-known attorney of Smethport, Pennsylvania, committed suicide on December 14, 1925, by shooting himself as he sat at his office desk. He had been a resident of Smethport all his life. After graduation from Williams he studied law and was admitted to the bar in Pennsylvania. At the death of his father, Judge T. A. Morrison, he inherited the elder Morrison's office and one of the finest law libraries in the state. It is believed that Brother Morrison's despondency was caused by financial worries and the death of his only son a short time before. He is survived by his wife and one sister, Mrs. May Morrison Bell of Baltimore.



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



## Editorial

The thoughts of all Phis at this time are on Montreal and the Thirty Seventh General Convention which will be held there December 28-30.

We hope that all active chapter men particularly are giving serious consideration to the problems confronting the fraternity at this convention. We have attended conventions when we were doubtful if the fraternity was getting value received for the money invested, and the Montreal meeting is going to be particularly expensive because of its geographical location. So it behooves us to accomplish all we can to justify it.

One of the best methods to insure a profitable convention is to send the right sort of delegates. Too much care cannot be taken in the selection of your representative. We know of a fraternity whose last convention active chapter delegates included more than 50% chapter presidents and the leaders felt that they never had had so much intelligent cooperation from the undergraduates. Don't send a man for his appearance, because he is a football player or because he is a good mixer. Don't send him to reward him. Send the best man you have who can enter into the deliberations of the convention, offer ideas of value, be faithful in committee work and most of all bring back to the rest of you what the convention did. The program will include discussions on many subjects of the greatest value to all active chapters.

We hope for a large alumni attendance so that we may have the counsel and advice of the older men but we must confess that it is difficult to urge men with families to leave their homes in the midst of the holiday season. We want them though, and believe that the more who attend the more successful will be the convention.

By this time every reader of The Scroll knows that Phi Delta Theta has recently published a new catalogue. The work on the book has so occupied our minds that it is impossible to keep mention of it out of our publications and official correspondence even had we wanted to do so. But the volume is such a monumental one in every way that we do not see how any loyal Phi can get along without it.



After reading Brother Ball's article in the October Scroll, the figures presented impressed us so much that we turned to Brother Palmer's History of Phi Delta Theta and read with interest the chapter describing the editing and publishing of the first catalogue of the fraternity in 1860. Appropriately enough, Robert Morrison assumed the task of checking and verifying the 292 names that had, up to that time, been signed to the Bond. Fifteen pages sufficed to carry the entire list and the cost of the whole undertaking was under \$50.00.

Contrast the present edition containing 32,092 names with 858 pages. What a record of progress in 66 years! When Father Morrison published his catalogue the Civil War had not yet taken its toll of the pitifully small membership then on Phi Delta Theta's rolls. We can imagine what task

the men faced who built up the fraternity after the war.

We believe that a study of the problems of other days and how they were met will stimulate us to meet present-day problems with greater enthusiasm. The work of issuing the ninth edition of the catalogue has, we believe, been very well done, but in order to finish the job all of the edition of 3,000 copies must be placed in the hands of interested Phis. If you haven't already done your part please send in your order to the Central Office.



A recent letter received by the editor from the reporter of Kansas Alpha, winners of the Howard Trophy for last year contains the following challenge to all other chapters:

"Some day we hope to see you out in this end of the country. Our

bunch has just begun to break records. Watch us and see."

This sort of a spirit is hard to beat. There is something exhilarating about success and accomplishment that stirs a group to further triumphs and we are going to watch closely to see how far the momentum carries Kansas Alpha.

But Kansas isn't so different from other states and other institutions. The same opportunity that Kansas Alpha has exists for our other chapters. Who will accept their challenge and displace them as Harvard Cup winners?

An alumni letter sent out by one of our chapters in a large western university contains this paragraph:

"It was decided at this time to conduct 'scholarship sweepstakes' for the purpose of raising our scholastic standing. For obvious reasons alumni are requested to bring no liquor into the house at any time. Violators of this rule will be publicly announced through the medium of this letter."

This is a splendid example to set for other chapters. It is our opinion that we have no room in Phi Delta Theta for an alumnus who will ignore this request.



## THE CATALOGUE—FIRST EDITION, 1860

(From The History of Phi Delta Theta)

HE first recorded movement toward publishing a catalogue of Φ Δ Θ was made in Kentucky Alpha, the orginator being W. L. Dulaney. The minutes of that chapter for July 25, 1856, show that "On motion of W. L. Dulaney, E. Swain second, it was unanimously agreed to instruct the Secretary to correspond with the Secretary of our Grand Chapter in regard to a catalogue." Dulaney, who was Secretary, wrote, September 1, 1856, to the Grand Chapter, Ohio Alpha, that he was "authorized to inquire whether there has ever been a catalogue of our Society published, and, if not, to inquire what course would be necessary" to bring about in the several chapters an agitation of the question of publishing a catalogue. The minutes of Ohio Alpha for September 11, 1856, say: "The Secretary read a communication from W. L. Dulaney, of Kentucky Alpha, inquiring what would be the proper steps toward getting up a catalogue of the  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  Society, which was received, and a motion passed instructing the Secretary to give necessary instructions and inform them of our cooperation in the matter."

The minutes of Ohio Alpha for October 2, 1856, show that the Convention of 1856 was called "for the purpose of getting up a catalogue and for other important business." minutes of Indiana Beta for November 1, 1856, say: "The subject of publishing a catalogue was taken up; after some discussion, it was agreed to aid in publishing one." The proceedings of the Convention which met at Cincinnati, December 30-31, 1856, say: "The publication of a catalogue was decided impracticable at present, and was referred to the Convention which is to assemble at Danville." The next convention did not

meet at Danville in 1857, as expected, but at Bloomington, 1858. At this convention the publication of a catalogue was discussed, but no action concerning it was taken.

Indiana Alpha, then took up the matter. Its secretary, J. W. Gorwrote to Kentucky man. November 2, 1858: "Having had in view the propriety of collecting together in one book the names of all the members of our Order, knowing that it will be not only useful as a reference, but also that if in the future we should desire to publish a catalogue it could be done without delay, therefore, we respectfully request of you a list of the names of all the members who have been connected with your chapter since its foundation. Give, if you please, their places of residence and professions so far as known."

Gorman wrote, December 6, 1858. to Robert Morrison, Ohio Alpha, '49, that the question of publishing a catalogue had been discussed at some length in Indiana Alpha, which chapter desired not "to get up a common thing," but a catalogue of "beauty and usefulness," and favored having an appropriate engraving as a frontispiece. Gorman thought he had heard Morrison say that he had had some experience in issuing such publications, and requested him to express fully, as soon as convenient, his opinions as to the feasibility of issuing a  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  catalogue, and as to the style and probable cost of such a publication. Gorman said that Kentucky Alpha had written that it considered a catalogue not proper but necessary, and that beyond doubt every chapter, as well as most correspondent members, would freely contribute toward the expenses of publication. The minutes of Indiana

Beta show that, January (date omitted). 1859, "a proposition to publish a catalogue of the Order was submitted, and it was resolved that the Indiana Beta will cooperate in the cause." January 14, 1859, in Indiana Alpha, then the Grand Chapter, the following preamble and resolutions, presented by J. S. Broadwell, were adopted:

Whereas, we consider it not only proper but expedient in the present state of our organization, that a catalogue of the Order should be published by our members, before we allow time and circumstances to separate us so widely from the founders and early members of our organization as to allow the names of brothers in the bond to be forgotten, for want of a fit place to preserve a remembrance of what they once were; therefore,

Resolved, That our secretary be instructed to request the different chapters to consider, at the earliest opportunity, the expediency of publishing a catalogue of the Order, and to transmit the result of their deliberations to "headquarters"

immediately.

Resolved, That the various chapters shall accompany their assent with a complete report of all their attendant and correspondent members, together with such suggestions as they may deem proper to make concerning the style, arrangement and cost of the catalogue.

Resolved, That we consider Mr. Robert Morrison, of the Ohio Alpha, a proper person to superintend the publica-

tion of said catalogue.

J. W. Gorman forwarded these resolutions to Robert Morrison and wrote to him, January 17: "We approve of your suggestions in regard to the arrangement of the names in one long roll." On the same day he wrote to the Secretary of Kentucky Alpha: "We propose, when all the reports in full have been received, to forward all of them to Brother Morrison, and let him prepare the manuscript for the press. It has been proposed by him that the names of all the members be arranged in one large class, to prevent outsiders from suspecting our weakness at any one point." Morrison accepted the position of catalogue editor. He was chosen because he was one of the founders, and was acquainted with many of the early members, because he lived near Louisville, where the printing could be done, and because of having had experience with the details of publishing while editor of a religious paper there.

Little actual work was done on the catalogue during 1859, but in 1860 it was pushed to completion. Broadwell, then secretary of Indiana Alpha, instructed the chapters how to prepare their lists of members, which were to be sent to him. The books and papers of Ohio Alpha, in the possession of Indiana Alpha, were reviewed by him, to get the names of all members of the parent chapter and other suspended chapters. He wrote to Robert Morrison, March 15, that he desired to "forward the work" as much as possible before sending the lists to him, so as not to "impose too much" on him. The following correspondence relates to the matter:

Let us print the first catalogue for ourselves, for our own benefit, and when we know thus, who is who, propagandism can be carried forward in places of importance better far than heretofore. It will encourage each of us to know that we have so many noble brothers, and it will bring about a union of spirit and an esprit de corps among the graduate members, which we so much need.—Robert Morrison, Cedar Creek, Ky., to E. J. Anderson, Centre College, January 23, 1860.

In a letter received yesterday from Brother Anderson, of the Kentucky Alpha, he informs me of your desire that a catalogue should be published before the meeting of the convention next June. I laid this matter before our chapter this afternoon, at our regular meeting, and we resolved to profit by your suggestion. Anderson says they have about \$30 on hand, while we have \$25. What do you think such a catalogue as you contemplate would cost? I think we can easily raise all the necessary funds in a little time, if they are not already on hand.—J. S. Broadwell, secretary Indiana Alpha, to Robert Morrison, Cedar Creek, Ky., January 28, 1860.

There will be no difficulty in raising the highest sum [\$90] named in your



letter as necessary to publish the catalogue, and we can now go on to get it ready. . . . . We want something a little different and mysterious—unintelligible to the uninitiated at least—in the arrangement.—J. S. Broadwell, secretary Indiana Alpha, to Robert Morrison, Cedar Creek, Ky., March 15, 1860.

The great object, so far as I understand it, of our first catalogue is to make it a repository of information for ourselves, so that we may know each other. This would tend greatly to strengthen our bonds, when we have ascertained that so many clever men all around us are our brothers. A second idea is to have something tangible and reliable to show to those we would win, either as members where the Order is planted, or to organize establishments in new places. To these ends we should have a fascimile of the largest, the old badge, neatly engraved as a frontispiece, and the names should have as much information connected therewith as a brief condensed statement would permit. The second catalogue should be the one for outsiders to gaze upon and wonder at. Nevertheless, the first should be "mysterious" to all but the initiated; and in order to do this, perhaps as good a way as any would be to have all the names in alphabetical order, and Phi matters, mostly in Greek characters, annexed to these names.-Robert Morrison, Cedar Creek, Ky., to J. S. Broadwell, Secretary Indiana Alpha. April 2, 1860.

I have been busily engaged in getting the catalogue ready, arranging the names in alphabetical order. There will be about 300 names. We submit the obtaining of a plate of our badge entirely to you.—J. S. Broadwell, Indiana University, to Robert Morrison, Cedar Creek, Ky., May 7, 1860.

I forward to you by express the catalogue manuscript, which would have been sent earlier but for my unavoidable absence from college. I enclose a badge pin and \$55. Please let me know as soon as possible how much more will be necessary and I will forward it immediately. I send this to defray any expense you may be under right away. The catalogue contains all the names I have been able to resurrect from all the numerous papers to which I had access, and which I overlooked very carefully. Some of the members of the Ohio Alpha you will probably know more of than I; of these I have

left the residences, etc., blank. I designated the chapters Ky. α Ohio β, etc., as you suggested in a letter written to Gorman some time ago. The abbreviations and mysterious part have been left to you, as having more knowledge and judgment than we would be likely to have. Is it imposing too much on your good nature? Any assistance we can render will be given most cheerfully and willingly, as we feel that we are putting you to too much trouble, but as one of the fathers of an organization of which it is our desire that you should be proud, we are anxious that the work should be done under your eye.—J. S. Broadwell, Indiana University, to Robert Morrison, Cedar Creek, Ky., May 30, 1860.

The names you mentioned in your letter do not occur in any of the papers of the Ohio Alpha. Parts of the regular list and minutes have been lost, and I inserted in the catalogue list only such names and information as could be gathered from looking over the various reports, letters, etc., belonging to that college. I am glad that you remember those names, that our catalogue may be as full and complete as possible. We have just chartered a Delta college for this state at Franklin College, under the superintendence of an old correspondent member of this chapter. Not knowing the addresses of those initiated so far, I shall not forward the names of the charter members, who are the only ones of whom I know anything yet. It is not to be regretted that our Order is increasing so rapidly that it is difficult to make out a correct list of the members. only trust that we may flourish and wax stronger, so that a revised catalogue may very soon be necessary.—J. S. Broadwell, Indiana University, to Robert Morrison, Cedar Creek, Ky., June 9, 1860.

The catalogue was completed in time to distribute copies at the convention held at Danville, June 26, when a vote of thanks was tendered Morrison for the care he had bestowed on the work.

The title page: "Catalogue of the  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ . Louisville: Hull and Brother, Printers. 1860." The cover, of cream-colored paper, bears the Greek letters " $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ ," 5% of an inch tall, a woodcut of the badge 11/16 by 15/16 of an inch, and "A  $\Omega \Xi$ ," 3% of an inch tall, within a double rule border.

The pamphlet contains 15 pages, 6 by 9 1/8 inches; type area, 4 1/8 by 67/8. On page 3 are a woodcut of the badge and the words "Sub rosa." Page 4 is blank. On page 5 is a list of "Abbreviations." The catalogue proper begins on page 7 and concludes on page 14. On page 15 is a note from Robert Morrison, requesting all members to forward corrections and additions to him at Cedar Creek (now Ferncreek), Jefferson County, Ky. The names are printed in one long alphabetical roll. Initials only are shown for given names, but occasionally the first given name appears. The name of each member is followed by an asterisk if he were dead (eleven were so marked), then comes the name of his chapter, then two Greek letters denoting the year of his initiation (in many cases lacking), then the abbreviated name of his college (in many cases lacking), the year of his graduation (in many cases lacking), the place of his residence (lacking in thirty-nine cases, an abbreviation for his occupation (in many cases lacking)—all this on one line. No degrees are mentioned except M. D. and D. D. The number of members of each chapter were as follows:


Total twelve chapters, not counting Ohio Beta, the second chapter at Miami, and Tennessee Alpha at Cumberland. Ohio Beta reappears in the fourth edition of the catalogue; in the second, third, fifth, and sixth editions its members are included in Ohio Alpha's list, which is a proper classification, as the members of this anomalous chapter reunited Ohio Alpha after a brief separate existence-from April to November. 1852. None of the editions mention a similar chapter which existed at Centre a few months in 1855, its members being included in Kentucky Alpha's list. Historical research has proven that no charter was ever granted for Tennessee Alpha Cumberland University; the single member credited to it in the first and fourth editions should have been enrolled with Ohio Alpha.

The total membership, as shown by the first edition, was 292. Kentucky Gamma, Georgetown College, chartered January 20, 1857, Franklin Delta, College. Indiana April 28, 1860, chartered omitted. Had they been included, the former would have added five and the latter nine members, making a total of fourteen chapters and 306 members.

The receipt of the publishers, dated July 2, 1860, shows that the cost of printing 1,000 catalogues was \$39; engraving badge and express, \$6; engraving large Greek letters, \$2; total cost \$47.

CALIFORNIA BETA VARSITY LETTER-MEN

### STANFORD ATHLETES STAR TRAVELERS

ACTIVE Phis of California Beta have travelled a total distance of more than 125,000 miles in order to participate in various athletic events since matriculation at Stanford.

Nine varsity letter-men have totalled 110,980 miles and minor sport performers have contributed the rest.

Wally O'Connor, national intercollegiate swimming champion in both 220 and 440, leads with a mileage of 35,600. This includes a jaunt to Europe with the United States Olympic team, four trips East to intercollegiate and other important meets and two journeys to Los Angeles. With the exception of O'Connor's trip to France, all his travelling has been to represent Stanford.

Three varsity baseball players fattened their travelling averages when they accompanied the varsity nine to Japan during the past summer. All of this trio—Tod Oviatt, Bill Clark and Don Garibaldi—have made at least two journeys to Southern California in addition to their Oriental wanderings.

Clarence West, who took second in the high hurdles at the I.C.A.A.A. last spring, has aggregated 7,560 miles

in representing Stanford.

Carl Stevenson, swimming captain, has travelled 11,920 miles. The "Minnow's" trips include one to Annapolis for the Intercollegiates and several up and down the Coast in defense of his various titles. He now holds the Pacific Coast Mile Championship, the Golden Gate title and record (which he established in September, breaking all former records by more than eleven minutes), and the Silver Gate title—plus several lesser honors.

The other leaders include: McHose, basketball—6,600; David, basketball—2,420; Charles, track—2,240; and

Riese, baseball-1,120.

As a member of Le Petit Salon, the French Play Cast. and the Duzer Du Dramatics Society he showed his ability as a linguist as well as a dramaticist. Brother Hartzell was the songster of the college as well as of the fraternity. ## PHI BECOMES PROMINENT IN BUSINESS

HEN a man achieves distinction nowdays how nimble we are to attribute his success to some rare quality of mind or esoteric quirk of personality unattainable to the ordinary man! Seldom do we seek the explanation in common virtues. But this is an account of a Phi who has come to a commanding position in business by sheer common sense and sturdy judgment.

Andrew Wells Robertson, Allegheny, '06, has just recently been elected President of the Philadelphia Company, of Pittsburgh, Pa. The story of his rise in the twenty years since his graduation is not one of unexampled brilliance but one of thoughtful, intelligent work. He exhibited in college the abilities that distinguished him afterward. He entered Allegheny College Preparatory School



in 1902 at the age of twenty-two, and being rather more mature thoughtful than the other boys, soon won their respect. When he entered College the next year, he was elected president of the freshman class. In his sophomore year he won the Philo-Franklin Oratorical Contest and became the Associate Editor of the Literary Magazine. His skill in journalism and public speaking won him the honor of membership in the Quill Club and the presidency of the Oratorical Association in his senior year. For the Chapter he was representative on the Panhellenic Board during his last year, and was president of the Chapter for one term of the same vear.

From his graduation in 1906 until 1908 he was a teacher at Charleroi, Pa. In 1908 he entered the Law School of the University of Pittsburgh, from which he received his degree of Doctor of Laws in 1911. For two years he practised law in Pittsburgh, until 1913, he became, first, the Assistant Trust Officer, then, Trust Officer of the Guaranty, Title and Trust Co. of Pittsburgh. In 1915

he entered the service of the Philadelphia Company as a general attorney and Head of the Legal Department. In 1920 he was made Vice-President in charge of the legal, public relations, and advertising departments, which position he held until he succeeded Mr. A. W. Thompson as President of the company, September 1, The Philadelphia Company is a large holding corporation which owns, holds, or controls most of the public utility companies, such as the Pittsburgh Railways Company, the Duquesne Light Company, and the Equitable Gas Company, in and about Pittsburgh.

Brother Robertson is a member of the University Club, the Duquesne Club, The South Hills Country Club, and the Chamber of Commerce of Pittsburgh. In addition he belongs to various Masonic organizations, and is president of the Western Pennsylvania Branch of the National Council of Safety.

Brother Robertson holds a high place in the regard of both the alumni and the active members of Pennsylvania Delta.



## ROANOKE COMPLETES CAMPAIGN FOR ADDITIONAL ENDOWMENT OF \$500,000

ROANOKE COLLEGE has successfully completed a campaign to raise \$500,000 additional endowment. More than 4,000 separate contributions were received. One hundred and fifty-five members were initiated into the chapter during its life. Col. Jones, above referred to, was one of these brothers, R. M. Calfee, a member of the Board of Trustees of the Walter B. Palmer Foundation Endowment, is another member.

#### THOMAS FOR UNITED STATES SENATOR

T REQUIRED only six speeches in the recent primary campaign for Elmer gain De Pauw, '00, the Democratic nomination for United States Senator for Oklahoma. During most of the campaign, Brother Thomas was at his desk at Washington, quietly serving the Sixth Congressional District as its Representative. To the entreaties of his friends that he return to Oklahoma and wage an aggressive campaign, his reply was: "My duty is plainly in Washington, and I intend to stay here until the session closes."

"The people of Oklahoma know the issues; they know both my opponents and myself—whatever the people do will be final. Nothing I could

do would change matters."

True to his conception of duty, he stayed at his post in Congress until the speaker rapped his desk as the signal for adjournment. Then he returned to find that the people of Oklahoma had been doing his cam-

paigning for him.

Another striking example of Elmer Thomas' hold on the citizens of Oklahoma dates back four years. At that time the Democrats of the State were looking for a Governor. Any number of prominent men were available and "might be persuaded" to run under ordinary circumstances; but all were hesitant about entering the primaries until they learned whether one certain man desired the office. That one man was Elmer Thomas, who, without the slightest effort or inclination on his part, by the sheer force of popular demand, was made the commanding figure in the race for the governor-ship.

As a non-partisan journal expressed it:

To those men in the state who have had an interest in the gubernatorial campaign, what Senator Thomas intended to do, what his decision as to his candidacy would be, was a matter of vital importance.

But, with the announcement that the Senator will not be a candidate for Governor, that he will make the race for Congress from the Sixth district, has come a change. The restraint of his personality has been removed, and the field stands clear to those who have been awaiting his final word.

This situation has indicated somewhat the appreciation the state has for Elmer Thomas. It is no usual thing for a man, though an accepted candidate for one office, to be considered the most important factor in the campaign for another


office.

But Elmer Thomas occupies this powerful position in Oklahoma, for the reason that his skill as a legislator, his knowledge of the state government and his unblemished character are known throughout the state.

The fact that the people of the State look so naturally to Elmer Thomas for leadership whenever an important office becomes available, is proof of the statement that he is nothing less than an Oklahoma institution. Furthermore, he is that kind of well-founded, useful, high-minded institution to which the people of this young and growing State are occasioned to point with pride—like a mild climate and bumper crops—as one of the advantages of citizenship within its borders.

Elmer Thomas first moved to Oklahoma in 1900. He was just out of De Pauw University, where he had been initiated into the mysteries of the legal profession and the  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  fraternity—to the principles of both of which he has been faithful ever since. To this able equipment was added the sturdy vigor of an Indiana farm boy, and the resourcefulness of a self-supporting college student.

After a brief stay as a practising attorney in Oklahoma City, where he

disproved the old adage about seven years starvation, he moved to Lawton with the opening of the Kiowa, Apache, and Comanche Strips. There he began to practice law in earnest and to take an ever increasing interest in public affairs. With the coming of statehood in 1907, he was elected to the State Senate—the beginning of a long and successful legislative career which will probably culminate shortly in his election to the United States Senate—the "most powerful legislative body in the world."

Elmer Thomas served thirteen years in the Oklahoma Senate, including two years as its president pro tem. In the assembly he gave the State such disinterested, efficient service at every important step of its remarkable progress, that there has grown up a well founded, unshakable, state-wide confidence in his integrity and ability.

Following his Senatorship, he has served four years in Congress, where his record has been, likewise, unspectacular, but conspicuous for doing the right thing in the right way.

To quote again:

Thomas' great ability as a legislator is a matter of common knowledge, but the outstanding thing about his work as a legislator in Oklahoma, has been his absolute honesty toward the government and his associate members of the legislature. Elmer Thomas has always told the truth to his colleagues; he has never stooped to a subterfuge in order to gain a point, though such a procedure is customary in legislative circles. No man can point to a single instance when he promised or said one thing and did another during the thirteen years he was a member of the Oklahoma Legislature. The result has been that the people of the Legislature and of the state have come to believe in him as they have in few other men.

Many are the instances which illustrate his well-known honesty. For example, an experience in the State Senate. During the closing days of every legislature there are always a few attempts to "put over" bogus legislation, special grabs on the treasury, and what not, and all bills introduced at

such a late date are ordinarily given the closest scrutiny. At the close of the Fifth Legislature, however, Senator Thomas found it necessary to introduce a bulky road It is startling proof of measure. the esteem in which he was held by his fellow legislators, that the bill was passed without a reading, the Senate accepting his statement as to contents. The House. though he was not a member, repeated the process, waiving its rules, and passing the bill without a read-Experienced observers claim this to be a legislative feat, without a parallel in America.

As Chairman of the Appropriation Committee, Brother Thomas has thoroughly mastered the Oklahoma financial system. In 1914 the State, then impoverished, faced with the necessity of building a new capitol without apparent funds. Senator Thomas took the situation in hand, canvassed every department, utilized a surplus here and a special fund there, collected a large debt which was due the State, and in time had amassed the required amount to guarantee construction. As a result, the magnificent capitol building at Oklahoma City stands now as a monument to his financial ability.

Similar instances without number might be drawn from his remarkable public career, and the building of his private fortune, but space does not permit. So much then for the Elmer Thomas which the public sees.

As Phi Delts in Oklahoma see him, Brother Thomas is, first of all, very much a Phi Delt. He attends the rush functions of Oklahoma Alpha and has proved that his loyalty is deep-seated by bringing up his son, Bill, in the way he should go. Bill is a member of Oklahoma Alpha and is reported to be an efficient campaign manager for his father.

Brother Thomas is fifty years old, stands six feet two, and is straight

as an arrow. He is mild mannered and modest in appearance, but his face is full of the quiet determination which has carried him to such heights.

Oklahoma is fortunate in these days of need for outstanding leadership, in having Elmer Thomas. With his mastery of finance and legislative practise, with four years' experience in Congress, and with the absolute confidence of his State, it is freely predicted that he will become one of the leading statesmen of the nation. There is only one asset, in fact, that we could wish him which he does not already possess—that some political earthquake would make Oklahoma a pivotal state.

#### A FOUNDATION BUILDER

LITTLE do we realize when we go to the family physician for medical treatment the great amount of experimental and original work which has been done in order to make some of the simplest of medical treatment possible. When we realize that modern medicine as it is today has developed in just a little over fifty years, we may see what has been done in the advancement of the science. was given an impetus by the work of Pasteur, Koch, Lister and others and has reached its present development mainly through the work of clinical investigators combined with that of workers in pure science. It is upon a foundation built by the work of these men that practicing physicians are able to diagnose diseases and outline treatment. It is of one of these "foundation builders" or clinical investigators we wish to tell at this time.

Late in September of 1925, a group of three physicians from St. Louis was doubly honored in that they received not only the Leonard Prize, a \$1,000 award of the Roentgen Ray Society, but also the gold medal awarded annually by the American Radiological Society for distinguished research work. This is the first time in history that these awards have been made to the same individuals in the same year. These awards have come as a result of the discovery of a

method which makes possible diagnosis at earlier stages and still more accurate ones of diseases of the gall bladder. Heading this group of men is Dr. Evarts Ambrose Graham, *Chicago*, '05. His associates are Dr. Warren H. Cole, who was formerly resident surgeon of Barnes Hospital, and Dr. Glover H. Copher, who is an instructor in surgery at Washington University Medical School.

Formerly it was possible to diagnose by X-ray methods thirty-seven per cent of the gall bladder cases correctly. By the Graham-Cole-Copher method, it is possible to diagnose correctly about ninety-seven per cent of the cases where its use and administration is thoroughly understood. This process consists of injecting into the veins, tetraiodophenolphthalein or Phenoltetraiodophthalein, bringing about a condition in the gall bladder which makes possible X-ray pictures showing up pathological conditions. Administration by mouth is also done with success. This method has been perfected after a long period of animal experimentation during which toxicity and dosages were determined and adjusted. Combined with this animal experimentation, investigation was made into modes and methods of obtaining the proper chemical substances for this use. After the method was perfected in animals, it was applied to the human, worked equally as well and has revolutionized gall

bladder diagnosis.

To quote Dr. Sherwood Moore of Washington University Medical School, who presented this work to the International Congress of Radiologists in London in 1923, "As a radiologist and at the same time one who has had no part in the developing of this brilliant conception, I would like to characterize it as one of the greatest contributions ever made to radiology for these reasons:

it embraces a new principle, that of employing the secretory function of an organ; it promises to increase our knowledge of the biliary tract; and it will bring out pathological conditions, hitherto not reached, into the field of exact diagnosis and better treatment."

Evarts Ambrose Graham was born in Chicago, March 19, 1883, the son of Dr. David W. and Ida Graham. He attended the Chicago schools and took preparatory work at Lewis Inninety-three!

stitute from 1896-1900. He received his A. B. degree at Princeton in 1904 and his M.D. at Rush Medical College in 1907. While at Rush he became a member of Illinois Beta of Φ Δ Θ and of the N D N medical fraternity. It is an interesting fact that out of a class of twelve, four of his class in the fraternity are in the practice of medicine. Besides Dr. Graham, there are Dr. Herman Charles Groman of Hammond, Indiana, Dr. Lee Mathews Ryan, Banning, California, and Dr. Frederick Adolph Speik, Los Angeles, California. Dr. Graham interned at Presbyterian Hospital in Chicago 1907-08, and was fellow, assistant, and instructor in surgery at Rush Medical College from 1908 to 1919. In 1919 he was called to Washington University Medical School in St. Louis, Missouri, to become professor of surgery. Since that time he has also been surgeon in chief at Barnes Hospital and at St. Louis Children's Hospital. the present time he has on his staff Dr. James Barrett Brown; Washington, '21, and Dr. William Gideon Hamm, Georgia, '21. In 1916 he married Dr. Helen Tredway of Dubuque, Iowa, and they have two sons, Evarts, Jr., and David.

To quote from Who's Who in American Medicine (1925) in order to present his accomplishments in the field of experimental medicine: "He showed that the visceral changes which occur in chloroform poisoning are due chiefly to hydrochloric acid liberated from the chloroform molecule: devised a new method of operative treatment of chronic lung suppuration; awarded Samuel D. Gross Prize in Surgery 1920 for work on the effects of open pneumothorax; awarded the gold medal of the Radiological Society for introduction of cholecystography; temporary surgeon in chief at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, Boston, Massachusetts, at the invitation of Dr. Harvey Cushing; established basis for treatment of acute empyema, and made other contributions to the physiology and sur-



gery of the chest; established the importance of the lymphatic route in the pathogenesis of hepatitis and cholecystitis; introduced a substance which permits X-ray visualization of the gall bladder."

Dr. Graham was a major in the medical corps during the World War and was on the staff of the Evacuation Hospital No. 34, A. E. F. During the war, a great many lives were lost due to empyema and the Surgeon General of the Army appointed a commission to make a thorough study of this condition. Previous treatments had been unsatisfactory. He placed Dr. Graham at the head of this commission and it was through his study mainly that the present standard method of treatment was developed.

He has written a large number of articles, chiefly in surgery but also in other medical fields, which have been published in the various medical journals. He is one of the editors of the Archives of Surgery. He is a member of the medical board of the National In 1925 he was Research Council. chairman of the section on surgery of the American Medical Association. Just recently, he has succeeded the late Dr. Albert J. Ochsner, Chicago, as editor of the Year Book of General Surgery, of the Practical Medicine Series. He is a member of the American Surgical Association, the Society of Clinical Surgeons, American Association of Thoracic Surgeons, Societie Internationale de Chirurgie, American Society of Clinical Investigation, Western Surgical Association, and is a Fellow in the American College of Surgeons.

Dr. Graham is known to men in medicine as a skilled surgeon and as an outstanding figure in the field of medical research. He is known to his students not only for these attributes but also as a patient, a brilliant and a sympathetic teacher. The spirit of co-operation which characterizes him in all of his work is shown in a quotation taken from the Weekly Bulletin of the St. Louis Medical Society for April 8, 1926: "I might add that one of the greatest pleasures I have had personally, in this work on the liver and gall bladder which has been going on for ten years, is the co-operation of these men whose names you see here, and also other names which do not happen to be on the program tonight. It would not have been possible at all to have done this work without the co-operation of these men, and any credit that may be accruing to anybody belongs to them more than it does to me."

Dr. Graham has been in Europe this last summer, having been invited by medical associations there to present his work on the liver and gall bladder.



### WILSON BOOKS BY PHI AUTHORS

The outstanding books of the year about the administration of the late President Woodrow Wilson are written or edited by members of  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ .

The first book compiled from the private records of Mr. Wilson has appeared, having been edited by Ray Stannard Baker, Lansing, '89. It will be remembered that Brother Baker was chosen by the late president as his official biographer and was given the custody of all of his own records


and papers.

E. F. Caldwell, Kansas, '87, of Lawrence, died September 15, after being in poor health for two years. He was a founder of the fraternity at the University of Kansas in 1885 and was a graduate of the class of 1887. Brother Caldwell served in the Kansas state legislature in 1894. He was a deputy postmaster in 1889 and was appointed postmaster of the city of Lawrence in 1898. He was formerly engaged in newspaper work in Lawrence.

Brother Caldwell is survived by a daughter, Miss Kate Caldwell, of Lawrence, a brother, Morton Caldwell, of Carlisle, Kansas, and by Mrs. J. B. Power, and son, Douglas, of Seattle, Washington.

The second death was that of Frank Craig, Kansas, '91, of McAlester, Oklahoma, who died July 14 after a brief attack of acute appendicitis. After his graduation from the University of Kansas, in the nineties, Brother Craig became one of the leading figures in Oklahoma Masonic circles. He was sovereign grand inspector of Oklahoma, and he was the head of the two consistory organizations in the state. He was a thirtythird degree Mason.

The most personal loss to Kansas Alpha was the death of R. J. Rowlands, Kansas, '09, September 22, who died at St. Luke's Episcopal hospital in Kansas City, Mo., following an operation for an acute attack of appendicitis. He was a director of the alumni association in Lawrence for many years.

Brother Rowlands spent three years at the University of Kansas, withdrawing in 1912 to assume charge of two college bookstores. Rowlands was known as "Bob" to thousands of students and friends. He was a recent past president of the Lawrence Rotary club.

Elmer Ellsworth Stevenson, Franklin, '83
Franklin College and Indiana Delta lost a strong friend when Elmer Ellsworth Stevenson, Franklin, '83, died September 21, 1926, at the Dr. Crile hospital, in Cleveland, O. Brother Stevenson had gone to Cleveland several weeks before from his home in Indianapolis for treatment and a surgical operation. He had rallied from the operation and was believed to be on the road to recovery when he had a sudden relapse that ended in his death.

Brother Stevenson was born in Rossetta, Ill., in July, 1861. He at-

tended Franklin college, receiving his A. B. degree in 1883, and after studying law in the office of Judge Alexander C. Downey at Rising Sun, Ind., he came to Indianapolis in 1892, where he had since continued in the successful practice of law, specializing in corporation law. In 1893 and 1894 he was a partner with J. W. Fesler, Franklin, '87, the partnership being terminated when Brother Fesler was elected county clerk, and after the conclusion of Brother Fesler's term of office the partnership was resumed and maintained during the vears 1898 and 1899. Since then Brother Stevenson had practiced alone.

Brother Stevenson had always remained keenly interested in Franklin college and for many years had been a member of the board of directors, of which he was vice president at the time of his death. He also served as chairman of the teachers and instruction committee and in 1923 the Almanack, the Franklin yearbook, was dedicated to him as a compliment for the work he had done for the college. He was a member of the Columbia Club and served as president of the Indianapolis Bar Association in 1917 and of the Indiana State Bar Association in 1920.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Sallie W. Stevenson; a son, Thomas D. Stevenson, Wisconsin, '08, a member of the law firm of Miller, Dailey & Thompson of Indianapolis; a brother, Edward Luther Stevenson, Franklin, '81, curator of the Hispanic Society of New York, and a stepdaughter, Mrs. J. C. Okey of Los Angeles, California.

The funeral services were held in Indianapolis where burial took place.

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

The funeral service was a very large one and Brother Hall was buried in Franklin.

Professor Rosser D. Bohannon, Virginia, '76

Professor Rosser D. Bohannon, Virginia, '76, head of the department of Mathematics, Ohio State University, died Sunday morning, June 20, in Columbus, Ohio. Professor Bohannon had been with Ohio State University in the department of Mathematics since 1887.

A short time prior to his death he was given an "Appreciation Dinner" by his friends. On the occasion of this dinner, President Emeritus W. H. Scott of Ohio State University, read a resolution calling Professor Bohannon to Ohio State University 39 years before. The resolution had been written by Rutherford B. Hayes, ex-President of the United States and a member of the Board of Trustees of the University. Brother Bohannon was initiated into  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  at the University of Virginia in the Fall of 1874 as a member of the class of 1876.



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## Editorial

Many alumni clubs, particularly in the larger cities, experience considerable difficulty in retaining the interest of their members and keeping up the attendance at their weekly lunchons. This is due in a large part to the many distractions brought about by modern life. There are Rotary and other service clubs and the noon hour is often used in business to make personal contacts that are impossible at any other time.

Phi Delta Theta has at least one alumni club which is successfully competing with other attractions and distractions by offering a program of such compelling interest that the brothers are afraid to stay away for fear they will miss something. This is Minneapolis and we are glad to present in this number of The Scroll a story by Brother Lurton which describes how they do it.

We have been hearing for some time of the splendid programs which the Minneapolis Club has put on at the Annual Founders' Day Dinner. Now they have taken the regular luncheons out of the ordinary and we think that their officers ought to be congratulated.



Next to rushing, the subject discussed most in fraternity magazines is that of the handling of freshmen and rough house initiations. It is one of those subjects about which there is much talk and apparently little action for the evil persists and it seems to us that there is little progress made in improving the situation.

Our attention was called to the matter by a recent letter from a Phi in the West who seems to feel that the condition is at its worst there. This is what he says:

I have been interested this last vacation in conversation with active members to learn of the amount of rough horse play in initiations by western chapters and have regretted many times that this is true. Also in a few chapters a few upper classmen make personal valets of the freshmen using much time in running personal errands, etc., for them which have no connection with the house at all. I have found a few cases where brutal treatment of freshmen by upper classmen overzealous with the paddle have evidently left permanent dislike for the wielders of the paddle, much to the detriment of promotion of that harmony so strengthening to a chapter. I have often read excerpts from other publications on this very thing and wonder whether some time our boys might not be benefitted by suggesting the harm done by use of these antiquated and boorish prep school customs.



We do not believe that the difficulty lies only in the west for we were told only a few years ago by a past president of the General Council whose chapter is located in another section of the country that his son was subjected to regular sessions of brutal beatings, not because he had done anything, but merely because he was a freshman. He said that he wanted the boy punished when he deserved it but that he was a serious minded lad of deep feelings and that he had lost all of the respect and reverence for Phi Delta Theta which he had spent years inculcating in him.

Professor George Starr Lasher, the editor of the *Rattle* of Theta Chi, expresses himself in a recent number as follows:

One Theta Chi pledge pin is no longer being worn. Four weeks it was in its place on the coat lapel of a keen-minded, clear cut, upstanding young man. He was a chap I knew rather well, and I looked forward to the time when I might call him a brother because he is just the kind of man I like to see wearing the badge of Theta Chi. And if I am any judge of future possibilities, he is the kind of man that some day Theta Chi as a national fraternity would be mighty glad to claim as her own.

Today that pin is back in the possession of the chapter that had voted to place it upon the coat of the chap. And why? Simply because he came to the conclusion, not in a moment of anger but after careful thought, that he had no respect for a chapter that deliberately planned to humiliate its pledges and to abuse them physically because some of the members had decided that "the pledges were altogether too fresh and would have to be paddled on general principles."

When will such asinine practices be abolished from the domain of Theta Chi?

Our idea is that the abolishing of these pernicious customs can only come through individual chapter action. How many chapters of Phi Delta Theta will turn over a new leaf this year and resolve to handle their freshmen in a decent, dignified manner?



Modern football games and homecomings have placed such an entertaining burden upon fraternity chapters in some colleges and universities that the time has come when something has to be done. Stadia which hold from forty to eighty thousand persons attract a large mob of hungry fans. When they are located in small towns where restaurant facilities are limited it is natural for those who have fraternity connections to descend upon the particular house in which they are interested. And they usually have friends or relatives who accompany them in the descent so that house managers are called upon to provide unlimited service for which they ordinarily receive no return.

To meet this situation Michigan Alpha, upon the suggestion of some alumni, has placed a contribution box in its dining room to enable the visitors to help defray the expense of their entertainment. We believe that this is an excellent solution of the problem and that other chapters might very well adopt the same plan.



Besides, there will be the interest attached to a visit to what is probably the most cosmopolitan city on the continent. Nowhere in North America can be found such charm. such romance, such a strange mixture of the old and the new, as in Montreal. Montreal's combination of English-speaking and French-speaking citizens together with the representations of many other races, account for its spirit of cosmopolitanism that makes it distinctive among the cities of the world. It is differentiated from other Canadian, American or Continental centers, being a blend of the attributes of all.

Founded in 1642 by Paul Chomedy de Maisonneuve, Montreal proudly cherishes historical associations and traditions which are knit into the very beginnings of civilization in the New World. From Montreal went forth the intrepid explorers and missionaries, the first to carry the white man's religion and enlightenment to the Indians, and the pioneers who blazed trails through the pathless forests, sailed the uncharted waters of the Great Lakes, and discovered and descended the mighty Mississippi.

Montreal was in truth the cradle of civilization for not only Canada, but

for a great part of what is now the Middle West of the United States. Much of the attraction which Montreal holds for the people of all North America is owing to the links which bind the past of the French Canada with the present of the whole continent. In Montreal you can see the exact site of the house which La Salle occupied during the winter preceding the memorable trip in which he discovered the Mississippi and descended the river nearly to its mouth. You can also see the very mill which he sold to secure money for that ex-Montreal can show you pedition. spots intimately associated with the memory of Champlain and Marquette and Joliet, of Cadillac and Du Luth, whose names live today in the cities which they founded on the American side of the border.

Near Montreal are many famous forts and battle-grounds where the English of the Thirteen Colonies fought the French pioneers of Canada or where later the American Revolutionary forces strove against the combined French and English forces in Canada. The Chateau de Ramezay which was General Montgomery's Headquarters in 1778 during the temporary occupation of Montreal by the American forces, is still standing. It was at this same time

that Benjamin Franklin brought the first printing press to Montreal and founded *The Gazette* which is still the morning paper of Montreal. Montreal forms a background for the history of the United States just as much as it does for the history of Canada.

Montreal is a fascinating blend of antiquity and modernity, for side by side with relics of the days of old area it is rapidly overspreading, is formed by the confluence of the St. Lawrence and the Ottawa rivers. In the center of the island, Mount Royal rears its impressive bulk to a height of more than six hundred feet. The city in its growth has completely encircled this eminence and extends up its picturesque sides until checked by the boundaries of Mount Royal

and building up a common nation. Scenically, Montreal has advantages which are indeed remarkable. The island of the same name upon which the city is situated, and whose whole Park, which preserves the summit and an area of five hundred acres as a people's playground.

Montreal is the metropolis of the Dominion of Canada—its population of nearly one million people making it the largest city in Canada and the fifth largest in North America. It is the chief financial, commercial, industrial and transportation center of the Dominion, being the headquarters of many large financial and commercial

concerns as well as of the world's two largest transportation systems, the Canadian National Railways and the Canadian Pacific Railway. Montreal is the summer terminus of trans-Atlantic passenger and freight traffic and although one thousand miles from the sea, is one of the world's greatest sea-ports. More wheat is shipped from the port of Montreal in one year than from any other port in America.

In Montreal are located McGill University and L' Université de Montréal which are the leading English and French educational centers of Canada. McGill University was founded in 1821 as a result of the generosity of James McGill, a Scotch merchant of the city. The University

embraces the faculties of Medicine, Law, Arts, Science, Commerce and Dentistry and the Departments of Pharmacy, Music and Physical Education. At Ste. Anne de Bellevue, outside Montreal, is located MacDonald College, which is the home of the Faculty of Agriculture and the School for Teachers. McGill numbers among its alumni, many of the leaders in the political, commercial and professional worlds of the Dominion.

Come to Montreal and you will experience the hospitality for which it is famous and in which is blended the gracious courtesy and generosity of old France and the open-handed heartiness of the British.



#### BULLETIN

James Price, Manhattan, Kansas, was elected student president of the Floating University yesterday by a vote of 180, a majority of all the votes cast. Edward Haverstick was second with 127 votes, and David Inglis drew 29 votes.

Emerging from the damp, dark holes of the ship, the Deck C gang rushed to the fresh air and sunshine of the Promenade Deck at the hour of nine yesterday morning and surrounded the polls with cries of "Vive El Haverstick" that would rival the yells at an Irish Free State revolution.

From the shrunken rooms of the far stern where the ship pitches and rocks like a bar of Ivory Soap in a hurricane and room stewards don't speak English came the burly forms of the Price gangsters, rallying around the polls with the enthusiasm of New Yorkers voting for Al Smith.

Quieter, more gently, the Inglis faction drifted up to cast its vote, and then drifted away.

Political leaders settled down to watch. Voting dwindled after the first rush until students were strolling to the polls one at a time. The keepers of the polls looked bored and sleepy as though they were attending 8 o'clock classes. Each additional voter, as he



approached to exercise the right of franchise as given by the Constitution of the United States to all free men and women, either free or married, had to run the gauntlet of glowering eyes, each pair containing a command to vote for such and such a candidate.

By 10 o'clock 130 votes had been cast. At 11:30 the number had increased to 173. The two dinner hours brought additional votes that raised the number above 250. And all the time supporters of each candidate were going around with smiling faces and

confidential manner, beaming joyously.

Women, exercising the prerogative of helping to manage the government, sauntered to the polls with assumed carelessness and scratched their ballots. About one-fourth as many votes were cast by women as by men, which is in proportion to their relative numbers on board.

At the closing of the polls at 5 o'clock yesterday, the votes were counted by a committee composed of students from the temporary council and members of the faculty. Students in the hospital

were allowed to vote by proxy.

such gentlemen come, seeking publicity in the Star.



The Mahan home is at 1651 Carroll Avenue, St. Paul. He is assistant librarian of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals. He was department commander of the Minnesota G. A. R. in 1924-25.



Entering Columbia in 1921 he soon became a star on the Freshman football and baseball teams as well as a popular member of his class. He played varsity football and baseball in his sophomore year and won his letter by stellar performances on the gridiron and diamond.

On leaving Columbia Brother Gehrig held almost every college hitting record in the country, for not only was he the home run king but he was

a remarkable pinch and distance hitter.

His marked success as a "rookie" in the Yankee training camp after a year of seasoning with the Waterbury, Connecticut Club, soon won a permanent position for him as first baseman which he has held ever since. He is popular among the baseball fans and

is considered one of the best infielders in the country. He has been the recipient of thousands of congratulatory letters every year and has become one of "Babe Ruth's" rivals in the home run field. It is expected that he will succeed Ruth as the "King of Swat" when the latter passes out of the big league.

Due to his youth and ability much is expected of him in the next few years, and he has become one of the most promising players in America's


national pastime.



## PHI IS REPRESENTATIVE IN INTERNA-TIONAL JOURNALISTIC EXCHANGE

IN THE first international journalistic exchange on record, Edward K. Thompson, North Dakota, '27, represented North Dakota University as editor-in-chief of the Dakota Daily Student, in an exchange with the

Manitoban, University of Manitoba weekly.

With one assistant, Brother Thompson edited the Nov. 4 issue of the Manitoban, while the Canadians edited the Nov. 2 issue of the Daily Student. Each did all the copy and proof reading, make-up, and writing

of the editorials, while the regular staffs did the reporting.

The exchange attracted nation-wide attention in journalistic fields as it is the first of its kind ever attempted. It is to become a yearly custom at the two institutions. It is designed to promote friendly relations between the two countries through the press.

The University of Manitoba has at the present time chapters of two international fraternities,  $\Delta$  K E and Z  $\Psi$ , according to Brother Thompson. Although the college has over 2,200 students, over half of them live in Winnipeg and it is almost impossible to get them all together as the buildings range up to six miles apart. At the time that the North Dakota editor visited the northern university, there was a fight as to the forming of more Greek letter groups, but it is unlikely that anything will come of it until the university buildings are gathered together on one campus.

The Dakota Daily Student, whose business manager is Robert Serumgard, North Dakota, '27, won first prize in competition with the other newspapers in the North Central Conference at a recent contest.

Brother Thompson is a member of  $\Sigma \Delta X$ , national professional journalistic fraternity, and has been president of the local chapter. Brother Serumgard is a member of  $\Delta \Sigma II$ , national professional commerce fraternity, and attended the last national convention of the latter group. They are both members of Blue Key, national luncheon fraternity, and of the local dramatic society.

He graduated with honor from the Alabama Polytechnic Institute in May, 1924. He died of sleeping sickness on July 31, 1926 in Columbia Hospi-

tal, Milwaukee. He was in the hospital six weeks undergoing several operations to check the course of the disease which was a puzzle to the physicians. He was buried the following Monday in Birmingham, Alabama.

While in college at Auburn, Brother Simpson brought much honor to his chapter and to his school. was a very popular man on the campus, quiet, friendly and with great ability. He was a member of the Spade Honorary Society, one of the highest honors on the campus its members being the ten most popular seniors. He was chosen as class orator and delivered a very good ora-tion at the Class Day Exercises. Among his other college honors were: Glee Club, four years; Glomerata, college year book, Senior year; Interfraternity Council, two years; Manager of class football, Junior year; Intercollegiate Debating team, two years; leader of the Mandolin Club, two years; R. O. T. C., four years being captain during his Senior year.

To the boys in the Chapter who knew "Madame," as he was called, his death came as a severe shock and we will miss him as the years roll by. Memorial services were held in the Chapter room on November 10 and resolutions on his death adopted.

At the time of his death, Brother Simpson was attending the two year training school of the Allis-Chalmers Co. of Milwaukee. His record there was unusually fine and he would have received his certificate and begun active work in the engineering department of that company in September.

Howard L. Gillette, Washington, '08

On October 16, in Spokane, Washington, while undergoing an operation for tumor of the brain, Howard L. Gillette, our beloved Washington Alpha Brother of 1908, passed away on the operating table. A trifle more than a year before, when working on a combine-harvester on his home farm near Lewiston, Idaho, Howard suffered a backward fall head foremost to the ground, from the effects of which he was not thereafter free, and which excited the growth upon the brain, occasioning his death.

Brother Gillette was a wheat farmer practically all his life. He was a graduate of the State Normal School at Cheney, Wash., and taught school a term or two thereafter. In the fall of 1906 he entered the University of Washington with junior standing, graduating in 1908. While in the University, in addition to being a

strong scholastic student, Howard took a lively interest in student activities, participating in debate, football and baseball. He was captain and manager of the first American Collegiate baseball team to invade Japan, which he accompanied to the Orient from the University of Washington the year of his graduation.

Those of us who knew him deeply mourn his loss, and sincerely sympathize with his three young children, his wife and his aged parents who survive him in the family home.

In the prime of life, a little past forty-a scientific farmer commanding the respect of all who knew him in a wide community-Brother Gillette's going was most untimely. He loved his saddlehorse, his dogs, his guns, his partridge covered hills and his game-trailed Idaho mountains. When one has lived and laughed and loved with such a Brother intermittently over two decades after college days—in his home, in the saddle and in the mountains—he finds it hard to dwell upon his death, to comfort those who mourn him or assuage the feeling of irreparable loss.



### Editorial

The eighteenth meeting of the Interfraternity Conference held in New York in November we believe showed more signs of progress than any of its predecessors. Henry R. Johnston, Delta Kappa Epsilon, the chairman for the past year proved himself to be a real leader and the members have reached a point where they are almost ready to give whole hearted cooperation.

The scholarship survey made under the direction of Alvin T. Duerr, Delta Tau Delta, is one of the most constructive jobs the Conference has ever undertaken. Say what you will, competition between the various fraternities is bound to bring about a better result. We are sorry to say that the showing of Phi Delta Theta is apparently not what it should be and it behooves us to buck up and improve the situation next year. Roughly speaking our rating is slightly under the general average for the whole group and two or three of our traditional rivals are above us. The effort on our part to gain a higher place will naturally be made by the others also, so that the net result is bound to be a better scholarship ranking for fraternity men. The survey shows the non fraternity men to be much better students the country over than the Greeks.

Another report of interest to the Conference was that of Dr. Francis W Shepardson, Beta Theta Pi, who has spent most of his time during the past year going from college to college talking to fraternity men and college authorities. He has been stressing the spiritual side of fraternity life and pleading for a return to the ideals responsible for the founding of the Greek-letter movement. There is visual evidence of the fact that his work is bearing fruit and the whole fraternity world owes a debt of gratitude both to Dr. Shepardson himself and to Beta Theta Pi, because his organization has made it possible for him to carry out the plan.

Joseph C. Nate, Sigma Chi, the author of the history of that fraternity, gave an interesting and instructive address in which he pointed out to the present generation the necessity for properly preserving its archives and records. He spoke from experience and told of his difficulties as a historian in digging up the records of the past because of the laxness of the chapters and officers. Incidentally, after the meeting he said that the more he went into it, the more he appreciated the monumental work which our own Walter Palmer did in "The History of Phi Delta Theta."



We of Phi Delta Theta can well be proud of our showing at the Conference. Judge Bayes was the unanimous choice for this year's chairman. Even before the nominating committee met, it was a foregone conclusion, that, because of his unquestioned ability and the record he had made as treasurer that he would be elected. Secretary Priest rose to real heights in his address before the banquet and left no doubt in the minds of anyone as to his place as one of the outstanding men in fraternity work. And the comment everywhere was that the address of Dr. Lewis, president of George Washington University, was one of the finest ever delivered before the Interfraternity Conference.



This is the annual football number of THE SCROLL and it will be noticed that we include this year a review of what our Canadian brothers have been accomplishing in their version of the game.


The selection of all star teams for a fraternity is extremely difficult because we naturally have to pick a number of men who have not achieved sufficient prominence to be noticed by national sport writers. It is necessary to correspond with Phis in different parts of the country, with newspaper men, football coaches and officials and choose the best men possible. We are handicapped, too, by not receiving cooperation from some of the chapter reporters so that if omissions have been made, the fault may not be ours.

We are glad to note that a number of our Phi football players are also strong students or participants in other activities besides athletics. We have always contended that a chapter is not justified in pledging a man just because he is a good football player. That ability is a splendid asset to have both for the man and for the chapter if it is combined with other qualities which go to make an all around student. We are not disturbed therefore when our list fails to disclose many of the big stars of the game.



As we again approach the season of initiation we think of the oft repeated advice to active chapters to keep the ceremony pure and free from nonsense and horseplay. This is a subject upon which fraternities hesitate to legislate but it has been felt that the proper sort of education would bring about improvement.

There is no doubt but what conditions are better. Still, there remain spots in Phi Delta Theta, as well as most other fraternities, where the chapter members have not passed the high school stage mentally. We wonder what they would think if Robert Morrison would return to the flesh for one night and view their base distortion of his beautiful conception.






ROWAN, Ohio State, End

JORY, Colorado College, Tackle




MACKEY, Ohio State, Guard



#### CANADIAN FOOTBALL

N ORDER to clear up an idea that exists in the minds of most of our American brothers that Canadian football is something similar to English rugby and therefore widely different from that played under the American code, I shall endeavor in a few words to explain just how Canadian football is played at the present time.

As is the case in your own game, the rules of Canadian football are always changing, always for the better we hope, so that in the not far distant future a game will be evolved that will satisfy the most severe critics of sport, the public, and at the same time be a game that will be thoroughly enjoyed and enthused over by the players themselves.

The field our game is played on is approximately the same size as that on which American games are played. Twelve men compose a team, the twelfth man acting as an extra half or rover. Otherwise, the team is similar to your own and line up in identical positions on the offensive.

As a result of the non-inclusion of the forward pass and the indiscriminate interference rule, in our code our defense lines up somewhat differently. One yard is the space that separates the two teams when lined up for action. What corresponds to your guards, tackles, and ends, form our first line of defense; and the Quarter, Flying Wing or Rover, Center and one Half-back form our second line of defense, and they stand about one

vard back of the first line. Two Halfbacks remain back about forty yards to receive kicks. The side in possession of the ball must gain ten yards in three consecutive downs; if they fail to do so, the ball goes to the other side at the spot the ball is dead. However, at the end of the second down if the chances are that the team will not make yards, a kick is resorted to. The fact that it is necessary to make ten yards in three downs, necessarily means that when two teams are evenly matched, that one sees what is termed a kicking game, the team with the wind usually kicking on the first When the ball is kicked to down. the opposing halves, the players on the side doing the kicking must give the half-back catching the ball, three yards in which to make the catch. When the ball is caught the Back can do anything he pleases with the ball, run it back if he can or kick a return kick if it happens to be good strategy to do so, or he may pass it to his other half.

Now as the forward pass is not available the other alternative is a lateral pass which halfbacks under our game become very proficient in, and as a result beautiful runs around the ends are navigated. Line plays are similar to your own except that interference is unlimited in your game, whereas in ours interference is permissible by the side in possession for three yards only in advance of the line of scrimmage, which is an imaginary line from touch line to touch line parallel to the goal line, only in this area can players interfere. One other point of difference is the fact that it is an advantage to kick the ball over your opponent's goal line. If the opposing player is caught behind his own goal line one point is scored. The ball is then scrimmaged at the 25 yard line of the side scored against. A touchdown is made in a


similar manner to the American game and five points are scored; a chance to score an additional point is given after a touchdown by means of a drop kick. A drop kick from the field counts three points and is scored in exactly the same way as under the American rules.

If my explanation of the main points of the Canadian game has been clear one can readily see that outside of the forward pass and unrestricted interference the two games differ very little in fundamentals.

The aim of the Rules Commission in Canada has been to devise rules that will produce the maximum passing and kicking with the thought in mind that this department of the game is most worthy of development both from the spectators' as well as the players' point of view.

It might be interesting to readers of THE SCROLL to know that on an imaginary All-Canadian team picked by a well-known Canadian sport writer from prominent players since the war, four Phis were included. Warren Snyder of Toronto, as one of the halfbacks; Jimmy Douglas of Toronto, as one of the middle wings, or tackles; Dud Ross of McGill, as the other middle wing, and Monty Montgomery of McGill as quarterback; Cliff Webber of Toronto, was picked as one of seven spares.

It might also be interesting to know that since the resumption of football at the Canadian Universities after the war, that is since 1919, that Quebec Alpha has furnished six captains to the McGill football team, and Ontario Alpha has furnished three captains of the Toronto football team. At both Toronto and McGill, Phis have played prominent parts on their respective teams and there have been each year anywhere from five to sixteen Phis on both the Toronto and the McGill squads.

### THE EIGHTEENTH INTERFRATERNITY CONFERENCE

THE eighteenth annual session of the Interfraternity Conference was of more than usual interest to members of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  because of the prominent part taken by Phis in the various programs and because of the election of Judge William R. Bayes, Ohio Wesleyan, '01, as chairman for the coming year.

The delegates from  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  besides Judge Bayes were Executive Secretary Arthur R. Priest, *De Pauw*, '91, and George Banta Jr., *Wabash*, '14, who had succeeded his father as a Phi representative when the latter's health would not permit him to attend.

The meetings were held, as usual, at the Hotel Pennsylvania in New York all day Friday and Saturday, November 26 and 27. Henry R. Johnston,  $\Delta$  K E, directed the regular sessions in his capacity as chairman and drew forth a frank and substantial discussion of fraternity and educational problems. His courtesy and graciousness won him the approval and hearty cooperation of everyone.

In all, 272 attended the sessions of the conference. Of this number 165 were delegates or alternates, 10 were educators, 40 were visitors, and 57 were representatives of undergraduate interfraternity councils sent to the conference from all sections of the country.

Brother Priest gave a masterly address on "The Program of the Chapter Visitation Officer from the Viewpoint of the Fraternity Administrator" which was one of the highlights of the program at the annual dinner held in connection with the conference. He held the attention of his listeners in a manner which left no doubt as to their appreciation of his

efforts. At the close of the dinner Don R. Almy,  $\Sigma$  A E, a former chairman of the conference, arose and expressed the disappointment of the conference at the absence of George Banta, Franklin-Indiana, '76, who had been a delegate from  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  to the sessions since their beginning. The following telegram was sent to Brother Banta in Phoenix, Arizona:

"Three hundred fraternity men missed your familiar smiling face and send you their heartfelt fraternal love." Signed, Henry R. Johnston, Chairman.

At the Saturday morning session an address of inspiration was delivered by Dr. William Mather Lewis, Knox, '00, President of George Washington University, on the subject, "Fraternities from the President's Window." He discussed various phases of educational problems with a sympathy, understanding and a keen wit.

Dr. Lewis spoke briefly of the gradual evolution of college officials from teachers to administrators, commenting that one member of his faculty links the president and the deans with the janitors and the charwomen. Dr. Lewis likened college presidents to the men in the signal towers of a railroad, looking out of the window, throwing a switch here and there, signalling to come on, attempting to keep the educational traffic moving.

"There is a weaving in between the university and all its affairs and the fraternity which cannot be neglected if we are to do the proper thing for our students," said Dr. Lewis. For that reason, he said, he saw to it that his door and his window were

always open.

What are some of the problems? First, a definition of what education is, interpreted in terms of the life we are living. Today, he said, we need the stimulus of intellectual greatness; we need culture. Dr. Lewis said he didn't athletics. care so much who sent a boy to college, but that he was interested in the boy keeping up with his work and doing a legitimate job. He held, incidentally, that the college is as much to blame as its alumni in whatever evils exist in college athletics today. Then, the social problem. Dr. Lewis felt that one of our greatest social problems is the too luxurious life of our youth.

"I think," he said, "we can stand in our fraternities for a greater simplicity in the social affairs of the institution. I don't know but that we have gone to too great an extreme in the luxury of our college life. think one of the social problems of a fraternity is that while it is a wonderful thing to be a member, it is a tragedy for the boy who is not in I think the fraternity which is known for its democratic spirit is a wonderful thing on the American campus. That active chapter is on the road to weakness where the men who represent it vote for their own men for positions of honor, rather than for the best man to fill the position."

As to conduct, Dr. Lewis said that he believed thoroughly that the average fraternity today is holding standards which the university or college could not possibly hold for the conduct of its men. He said he knew that the fraternities at George Washington are an element for good which cannot be over-estimated.

"Anyone who is discouraged about the youth of today," he concluded, "knows nothing about what is going on in our colleges and universities. I hope pretty soon we will declare a closed season on this discussion of the youth problem." Brother Banta was made leader of the group discussion held Saturday afternoon on the subject of expansion. It was attended by members of the newer fraternities who are interested in how and where to expand their organizations.

At the dinner and annual meeting of the College Fraternity Editors' Association held Saturday night, Brother Banta represented ΤΗΕ SCROLL and Φ Δ Θ.

In addition to the regular reports of committee chairmen, the Conference was addressed by Dr. Francis W. Shepardson, B \( \Theta \) \( \Pi\), Professor G. M. Stewart of the University of Missouri, Dean Floyd Field of Georgia Tech, Dean Clark of the University of Illinois, and by the Rev. Boyd Edwards, headmaster of Hill School.

The Committee on Scholarship, headed by Alvan E. Duerr,  $\Delta$  T  $\Delta$ , made one of the most important contributions to the Conference. The committee reported on its progress since the last plenary meeting, when its appointment was authorized to make a survey of the scholarship of fraternities at all institutions in the United States and Canada at which fraternities were generally represented.

Mr. Duerr commented first on the interest and generous cooperation offered by deans and registrars. With two exceptions the committee heard at least once from every dean approached and four institutions—Alabama, Duke, New York University and Virginia—for the first time compiled official scholarship reports of their fraternities because they deemed the efforts of the Interfraternity Conference worthy.

The committee found 118 institutions with five or more fraternities. However, reports from them were difficult to tabulate because of a great variety of marking systems. Therefore, the committee found it virtually impossible to interpret fairly the material it received, and the Executive

Committee of the Conference concluded to withhold all findings until such time as they could be harmonized sufficiently to justify the belief that comparisons based on them were fundamentally fair.

Progress toward this end was speedily made. As already reported in this bulletin, the American Association of Collegiate Registrars adopted a uniform ranking plan that can be applied readily to any system of marking.

"The field was now clear for action," commented Mr. Duerr. Important work had been accomplished, not in the compilation of figures but in the establishment of a common ground with college officials.

Now, said Mr. Duerr:

I do not believe that many fraternities are interested in scholarship as a mere academic performance. But they are vitally interested to know that they are bringing into their ranks men who can finish successfully a given job, whether it be in the classroom, on the athletic field, or along executive lines, that their men are developing a power of sustained effort and a capacity for straight thinking, so that they may give some promise of rising above the level of their fellows when they get out into the world. Fraternity men are in theory high minded and serious-purposed; they are not merely aggregations of congenial and socially minded men. Nor are our ideals purely social.

Unless we can be of definite value to our members during their college days in inspiring them to something better than they might achieve unaided, we cannot hope to hold their interest and to command their loyalty in later days when they begin to assess the value of what they got in college.

American ideas of the value and purpose of college training are changing. Colleges are becoming unsympathetically unwilling to keep a man who merely adorns the landscape. Business men are likewise losing interest in paying good salaries to men who have never learned to work, who have no sense of responsibility, and who are unable to think straight.

There is considerable antagonism to fraternities in certain political and college centers. It would seem easy to remove such antagonism by the simple expedient of making fraternity men, more than any other group, stand for something a bit nearer to the legitimate purposes of a college education as viewed by men who evaluate such training from every possible angle.

Looking at the matter purely and simply from our own selfish point of view . . . . it would be foolish for us to ignore the question of scholarship.


What we need is not regulations, or even recommendations, but a better understanding of the purposes of a college education. If we admit that classroom work has any legitimate part in the scheme, then let us do the job as though we meant it. Let us create such a spirit in our chapters and our fraternities that the mental drone cannot survive, that every man will count it as a test of his loyalty to his chapter to perform every task as well as he has it in him to do. Let us prove to the world at large that when college trained men are needed in any emergency, the best will be found in the ranks of our fraternities.

In the discussion that followed, several delegates to the Conference warned against any assumption of duties, claiming that it was primarily the business of college officials to see to it that scholastic standards are maintained.




#### JUDGE STEFFEN COACHED VICTORIOUS CARNEGIE

#### JUDGE BAYES MADE CONFERENCE CHAIRMAN

A S RELATED heretofore, Judge William R. Bayes, Ohio Wesleyan, '01, was elected chairman for the coming year of the Interfraternity Conference at the eighteenth annual session of that body, held in New York, November 26 and 27, 1926.

Judge Bayes became a Phi at Ohio Wesleyan where he received his A.B. degree in 1901. He also made  $\Phi$  B K while at Wesleyan and was one of the student leaders at that institution. He graduated from the Columbia University Law School in 1905, receiving an L.L.B. degree. He is a practicing attorney at 40 Wall St., New York City.

Always taking a keen interest in public affairs, Judge Bayes was a delegate to the New York Constitutional Convention in 1915 and was appointed by the governor of the state in 1921, county judge of Kings County. He served until January 1, 1922.

He is president of the King's Highway Savings Bank, Brooklyn, and president of the Brooklyn National Life Insurance Company. He is a member of the American Bar Association, New York State Bar Association, Brooklyn Bar Association, Brooklyn Bar Association, University Club of Brooklyn, Brooklyn Club, Union League Club of Brooklyn and Brooklyn Chamber of Commerce. He is also president of the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences.

In recent years Judge Bayes has been one of the moving spirits in the Interfraternity Conference. In 1923, as chairman of the committee on expansion of the Interfraternity Conference, he called and presided over the first national convention of local fraternities. In 1925 and 1926 he served as a member of the executive committee and treasurer as well as chairman of the committee on extension.


In presenting the key Brother Davis said he hoped that as a symbol of frankness and openness of college athletics the key would never again be used after the official opening.


In responding to the presentation of the key President Hopkins said,

In architecture the field house is of colonial design to harmonize with the general architectural plan of the College. It is located south of the west wing of Alumni Gymnasium and on the axis of the Memorial Football Field. Though it is directly connected with the gymnasium space has been left between the two buildings for future construction.

The house is also connected to Memorial Field by means of a tunnel leading from the basement quarters, reserved for visiting teams. Dartmouth varsity teams enter the field through a gateway which was placed in the fence facing the doorway of the field house.

The Davis Field House has been designed at every point to insure comfort and convenience for athletic teams visiting Dartmouth and for the Dartmouth varsity teams as well. Ouarters for the teams are located in the basement and on the first floor. both of which are alike in design, with the central feature of each a large lounge room with beamed ceiling and fireplace. Opening from the lounge room are locker, shower, and equipment rooms. On the first floor there is also a fully equipped Medical Room where is kept the x-ray machine, electric bakers, Alpine Lamp and all accessories necessary for the treatment of injuries. An added feature on each floor is a drying room, located between the locker rooms, assuring dry clothing for athletes at all times.

The second floor of the field house is given over to varsity coaches for their headquarters. Directly over the lounge of the lower floor is a lecture room with blackboards.


The third floor contains a dormitory capable of accommodating 40 single beds and in addition, gives ample space for storage rooms.

A system of master clocks controls all the clocks within the building and at the entrance of the tunnel to Memorial Field. They are connected electrically to gongs in the quarters of both teams.

Brother Davis, whose home is The Acres, Lynnefield, Mass., is a real estate and mine owner with offices in Boston. He has since his enrollment at Dartmouth taken the keenest interest in the college and in its athletic plant, and it was due to his generosity that the College was last fall enabled to burn the mortgage then outstanding on the gymnasium. His gift not only marks the interest of an alumnus in the College, but is significant in being the first major gift to Dartmouth from one of the younger alumni.

The pennant in the background is the Dad's Day award, given to the organized group having the most Dads for guests. Kansas Alpha has won this award three years in succession.

#### NEW YORK CLUB MAKES CHANGES

THE New York Fraternity Clubs, an organization of twenty-one leading national college and university Greek Letter societies, officially opened their new quarters on December first in the Fraternity Clubs Building at Madison Avenue and Thirtyeighth Street.

Ray Perkins, whom radio fans remember as a headliner of Station WJZ was master of ceremonies. He sang several songs as well as he kept everybody guessing as to whether his name was Abraham S. Cohn, Carrarra V. Fedora, Thomas Jefferson Washington White, or Ray Perkins. Edward Siep led the Delta Upsilon Glee Club in various college songs: Albert A. Wiederhold, Jacques Romano and a Harlem jazz band added to the cumulative enjoyment of the evening.

More than 750 fraternity men filled the lounge room, now one of the largest and most luxurious in New York, to capacity. The interior decorations are in the Spanish style and in harmony with the rest of the building. The general meeting room, occupying almost 3000 sq. ft. is amply furnished with comfortable divans and deep chairs. Lamps, paintings and tapestries together with copies of the current popular periodicals on the racks add life and color. Great French windows looking out upon 38th Street and Madison Avenue, since they are about ten feet above the sidewalk, give a view almost to Mr. J. P. Morgan's home one block south and an unrestricted north, east and west

The dining room carries a real club atmosphere. Here also are the clubs under their own autonomy—and the excellent food is due to the selection and management of some of their able gourmets. Numbers of Club luncheons and dinners are held here daily.

There are also rooms for the private use of the several clubs and a gymnasium, squash courts and other facilities add the final touch for com-

plete club equipment.

Edward T. T. Williams, President of the Board of Governors, expressed the aim of the Clubs; to foster fraternal fellowship and to afford a University Club of selected college men. This has been the goal of the New York Fraternity Clubs Merger since its inception three years ago, which has not been attained to its full extent until now. It is "a new step in fraternity life, and the first of its form in this country, for cementing general activities, social and athletic, of twenty-one leading fraternities in New York." Under the new plan the

partitions that had heretofore divided the separate clubs have been taken away, and lounge rooms, card rooms, billiard rooms, dining rooms and assembly hall thrown together. The entire second floor, including the new private dining room are under the exclusive control of the New York Fraternity Clubs.

The officers of the Board of Governors are Edward T. T. Williams, President; William N. Compton, Archibald R. Gibbons and Clarence C. Harris, Vice Presidents, and R. DeCosta Greene, Secretary-Treasurer.

## SECRETARY OF THE AMERICAN BAKERS' ASSOCIATION

IN Dr. Louys A. Rumsey the American Bakers' Association has a secretary whom it can claim as one of its scientific sons. He is probably the most scientific secretary of a great national trade organization in the United States. The degrees of bachelor of science, master of science, and doctor of philosophy have

been conferred upon him. He may be claimed as a scientific son of the American Bakers' Association because he was one of the first to receive a grant of a fellowship from the American Institute of Baking after leaders of the association established the institute. Besides, the baking industry inspired him to specialize in the study

of cereal chemistry, which led to his election as secretary of the American Bakers' Association in November, 1925.

That he is serving the baking industry today is due partly, if not largely, to the impression made upon him by a short course for bakers in 1916 at the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Ames, Iowa. Dr. Rumsey was an instructor in the department of chemistry of this college when the short course was held. He had a part in it, and met Mike Zinmaster of Des Moines and many other bakers as well as Dr. Clyde H. Bailey, the noted cereal chemist of the University of His observation at this Minnesota. course convinced him that cereal chemistry offered great possibilities of service, and he decided immediately to specialize in that field with special reference to the baking industry. His previous education had prepared him for such work. More recently his activities fitted him for service in the business side of the baking industry, paving the way for his election as secretary when the American Institute of Baking was reorganized with Dr. H. E. Barnard as president to devote all of his time to Institute work.

When Dr. Barnard assumed the presidency of the institute with the intention of concentrating his energies on its activities, the American Bakers' Association named Dr. Rumsey as its secretary.

Dr. Rumsey was born May 7, 1889, at Stryker, Ohio, a town of about 1,500 residents in the northwestern corner of the state. After his graduation from the local high school he entered Denison University at Gran-

ville, Ohio, where he specialized in chemical and physical science. In the summer of 1912 he received the degree of bachelor of science from Denison. In the following year he returned to same school and in June, 1913, received the degree of master of sci-While engaging in this postgraduate work he assisted in the department of chemistry. The Dayton Engineering Laboratories of Dayton. Ohio, then obtained his services. In the fall of 1913 he was appointed instructor in chemistry at the Iowa College at Ames, and for the next four years taught home economics, food and dairy chemistry. Still eager to develop himself further, he attended two summer school sessions at the University of Chicago, taking advanced courses in atomistics and physico-chemical subjects. tember, 1917, he was appointed assistant professor of chemistry at Denison University. This was followed by war work attachment to the American Institute of Baking, and finally to his present secretaryship.

After training of three months at Fort Sheridan, Illinois, in 1918, he was given a certificate of commission as a second lieutenant in the army and sent back to Denison to teach chemistry. He resigned in 1920 to enter the graduate school of the University of Minnesota. He had been recommended by Dr. C. H. Bailey for a grant of a fellowship by the newly created American Institute of Baking. He and Dr. F. A. Collatz were the first to receive such a grant from the He interested himself in research work in the laboratories of the institute at Minneapolis under the direction of Dr. R. A. Gortner and Dr. Bailey of the Division of Agricultural Biochemistry in the University of Minnesota. In fulfilling the requirements of the degree of doctor of philosophy which he received in January, 1922, from the University of Minnesota, he prepared a thesis on "The Diastatic Enzymes of Wheat Flour and their Relation to Flour

Strength." This was later published in bulletin form by the American Institute of Baking. It was based on work done at the institute's first laboratories at Dunwoody. In his historical address at the 1924 Atlantic City convention of the American Bakers' Association, Dr. S. P. L. Sorenson of the Copenhagen Laboratories, Copenhagen, commented favorably on Dr. Rumsey's research a number of times.

Following the completion of his studies in the University of Minnesota, Dr. Rumsey was elected a research chemist for the American Institute of Baking. He was placed in immediate charge of the reconstruction and refinishing of the building of the Wahl-Henius Institute at Chicago for the occupancy of the American Institute of Baking. After six or eight months he returned to research work in the institute laboratory. His succeeding activities were along trade lines.

Toast investigations were then made by Dr. Rumsey. For six months, with the patience and the thoroughness of the true scientist, he studied toast and toasting devices, pioneering in developing facts which provided the foundation for the national toast campaign that was later inaugurated. In September, 1923, he was loaned to the Wheat Council of the United States as a campaign director, his work being primarily to encourage increased consumption of bread. In March, 1925, when the Wheat Council of the United States was dissolved, he returned to the institute, and, instead of resuming laboratory research, undertook the establishment of a department in merchandising, advertising, and distribution.

Out of this grew the trade promotion conferences of bakers and the advertising exhibit of bakers and other food interests who had been encouraged to link their appeals with bread. The exhibit was made at the Atlantic City convention of the American Bakers' Association in 1924.

eliciting much favorable comment. With his scientific training and his studies in merchandising, he injected into the trade promotion activities of the American Bakers' Association an ideal combination. Their value was recognized by bakers, and his choice as secretary of the association followed when the institute and the association were separated last year.

"The American Bakers' Association," he says, "is now organized in a manner which gives it more latitude than ever to expand its service to the baking industry as a trade association. As a separate entity it is freer to proceed in undertakings which belong to trade associations. Trade promotion projects can be made more definite and personal. In what we do along this line we have, of course, all the resources of the Institute at our command.

"My hope for the association is that it will enlist as members all the bakers of America either as individuals or as groups belonging to local bodies, state or district associations, all working together for common good. It is the dream of farseeing members, a dream in which I share, to see the work of every bakers' association, from the national body to the smallest group,

financed through one set of dues. I need not elaborate on the possibilities of service in the way of trade promotion; the statistics of the baking industry are too well known and tell too convincing a story of what may be done to require any explanation, or comment."

Dr. Rumsey is a member of the  $\Phi$   $\Lambda$   $\Upsilon$ , an honorary chemical fraternity;  $\Sigma$   $\Xi$ , honorary general science society; the American Chemical Society, and other bodies. He is married and has a son nine years old. Immersed in science, he even finds recreation from it. When he goes to his home from the offices of the American Bakers' Association, he delves into the mysteries of radio communication.

The days of spectacular development in the consumption of commercial bread have passed. The members of the American Bakers' Association must now make stronger appeals to add to their business. More study is required. Dr. Rumsey, of a quiet, unassuming and studious nature, is qualified to work with bakers to accomplish for their industry the benefits within the reach of an active national trade association.

This book is called the *Paedagogus* and contains a department of pledge scholarship, etiquette, pledge's attitude toward the fraternity and various subjects of like importance. is space in the manual for the standings of the various pledge examinations and also a place to copy the correct answers to the various questions given. The book would be, on the whole, a very valuable edition to any fraternity chapter as it is the best work of its kind thus far prepared.

The fraternity census for 1926, according to William C. Levere,  $\Sigma$  A E, when compared with the census taken a year ago shows that a new fraternity chapter is born every four and a half days in the United States and one occasionally

in Canada. The appearance of twenty fraternities with less than ten chapters is an interesting phenomena.

The new membership directory of T K E, which appeared in September, carries sixteen pages devoted to a paragraph history of the national organization, an alphabetical list of the names and addresses of the members, including chapter affiliation, and a section devoted to the names of members according to state and city location.

Φ K T provides for the automatic suspension of members who are in arrears in the payment of house bills for more than thirty days. Sigma Nu provides for a similar treatment at the end of a period of sixty days and many fraternities and sororities are following this plan.

 $\Sigma$  X at Bucknell voted to contribute \$1,000 to the endowment fund drive, which has recently been launched at that institution. This gift donated at considerable fraternal sacrifice places  $\Sigma$  X as the first fraternity upon the list of patrons of the university.



Georgia Alpha has recently sustained the loss of one of its most promising and outstanding alumni in the death of Albon W. Reed at his home in Tulsa, Okla.

Brother Reed was the only son of Mr. Thomas W. Reed, Registrar and Treasurer of the University of Georgia, himself a continuously loyal and devoted Phi. He was born in Athens, Ga., August 23, 1894, and received his education in the city schools and the University of Georgia, from which institution he was graduated in 1915 with the degree of Bachelor of Laws.

After graduation he entered upon the practice of his profession in his native city with splendid assurances of success.

When the United States became involved in the world struggle, though married, with a fine sense of patriotic duty he felt the call to arms, promptly enlisted in the first Officers' Training Camp at Ft. McPherson, Ga., May 11, 1917, from which he received the commission of Second Lieutenant. was assigned to the 307th Ammunition Train, 82nd Division, at Camp Gordon and while there was promoted to First Lieutenant. He sailed with that famous division in May, 1918, and participated in all its notable activities Passing through the St. Mihiel offensive, he entered the Argonne, having been promoted to a Captaincy, and served with his division until it was taken out of action October 30th, and was then attached with his ammunition train to the 80th Division and with that division fought on to Sedan.

On his return to civil life, he did not resume his profession, but entered the mercantile field in which he was rapidly and eminently successful.

At the time of his death he occupied a high position of trust and responsibility with the Coca Cola Co., being manager of their plant at Tulsa, Okla.

He was buried in Athens, Ga., with military honors, ceremonies at the grave being conducted by the Allen R. Fleming Post of the American Legion.

Mindful of his lovable personality, his fine qualities of mind and heart, his deep devotion to this fraternity, his splendid services to his country, before its noon, and with a keen sense of its own loss, Georgia Alpha sorrowfully inscribes his name on the scroll of its lamented and unforgotten dead.

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# Hunter Meriwether, Vanderbilt, '83

Clarksville, Tenn., Dec. 2.—Citizens of this section, joined by hundreds of others from numerous Tennessee counties and from other states, will pay last respects to Hunter Meriwether, 65, Montgomery county's outstanding philanthropist, and one of the state's leading citizens, who will be buried in Greenwood cemetery Tuesday afternoon. Funeral services will be conducted from Mericourt, the suburban estate recently donated by Mr. Meriwether to the University of Tennessee for use in an agricultural experiment station. The Rev. George O. Watts, rector of Trinity Episcopal Church, will have charge of the services.

The death of Mr. Meriwether at 3:20 A.M. today resulted from a second stroke of paralysis suffered at 10 o'clock last Friday morning, ten months to the day and hour from the first attack, and culminated a fruitful and active career as lawyer, promoter, farmer, engineer and financier.

Mr. Meriwether's outstanding accomplishment was reclamation work along the banks of the Missouri and Kaw rivers near Kansas City, Mo., the city he adopted for his legal career following his graduation from the law department of Vanderbilt University, when he won the founder's medal. The tract of land comprising the reclaimed territory was the property of Mr. Meriwether's father-in-law, Captain William Wallace Western, of Hopkinsville, Ky. setting back the river banks to their original boundaries, Mr. Meriwether reclaimed for Kansas City several hundred acres of land, which has become some of the most valuable real estate in the community. The task required 25 years and was fraught with many discouraging situations, but the dream of the young lawyer was finally realized.

Mr. Meriwether came to Clarksville about ten years ago, following his retirement from active practice of law, and spent his last years at "Mericourt," where he reverted to his hobby of soil building, and fertilization became his pastime. While experimenting on his small estate he developed a number of new varieties of Lespedeza, a cover crop clover, on which he had written extensively.

Mr. Meriwether's philanthropy had been felt not only by states, counties, municipalities and communities, but by hundreds of individuals by whom his charitable inclinations had been attracted in the hour of need. His latest contribution to community development was the donation of "Mericourt" to the state and his last appearance in a public gathering was at the Harvest Dinner here on November 22, when he and Mrs. Meriwether were thanked by Dr. H. A. Morgan, president of the university, for the gift.

Mr. Meriwether was born in Arkansas, the son of the late Dr. James Hunter Meriwether, physician, and Mrs. Lucy Elder McClure Meriwether. The family had moved to that state from Meriville, their Kentucky home, at the outbreak of the Civil War, the elder Meriwether disagreeing with Kentucky for its failure to join the Southern states. At the close of the war the family moved to Alabama near the present site of Birmingham, and it was there that the elder Meriwether manufactured what was probably the first acid phosphate When the ever made in America. health of the father failed the family returned to "Meriville," where Mr. Meriwether continued his education in the public schools. He entered Vanderbilt in 1878, and due to his lack his promising business career eclipsed of preparation was compelled to take a four-year sub-college course. He won three annual scholarships for excellence in work and upon graduating became a fellow and assistant in mathematics. He pursued this work while completing his three-year law course. It was in Nashville that he met Miss Lucy Underwood Western, a student in Ward's Academy, to whom he was married after he located in Kansas City.

The widow and two children, Mrs. Lee Wright Browning, Ashland, Ky., and Western Meriwether, Knoxville; one sister, Mrs. Lizzie M. Barker, Lakeland, Fla., and two brothers, John W. Meriwether, Guthrie, Ky., and Gilmer Meriwether, Kansas City, survive. Mr. Meriwether was a member of the Christian Church and had served it as a deacon fifteen years. He was also a Royal Arch Mason, a Phi Delta Theta, a fellow of the Journal of the Royal Society of Arts, London, and a member of the Loyal Order of Moose here.

Mr. Meriwether was an extensive property owner, but much of his material gain was dispensed in altruistic work.—Nashville Tennesseean

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Timothy S. Hogan, Ohio, '95

Timothy S. Hogan, Ohio, '95, A.M. '09, LL.D. '15, died of pernicious anemia at his home in Columbus, Ohio, the morning of December 8. From 1911 to 1915, Brother Hogan was Attorney General of the State of Ohio. He was candidate for the United States Senate on the Democratic ticket in 1914. The Republican candidate at that time was Senator Harding, and although Brother Hogan was an extremely popular man throughout the State, he went down to defeat.

Attendants at the Semicentennial Convention in 1898 will recall the magnetic personality of Brother Hogan and will remember his banquet toast and his stimulating presence during the sessions of the convention. His last appearance at a Phi Delt gathering was at the Founders' Day Banquet in Columbus, 1924, when he was on the speakers' program.

Upon the death of Brother Hogan, the *Ohio State Journal* commented editorially as follows:

Everybody called Timothy S. Hogan Tim. He was extraordinarily popular. Perhaps no man in Ohio had more personal friends. These friendships he owed primarily, no doubt, to his own big heart, liberal mind and genial disposition but behind these attractive qualities was sterling character. Mr. Hogan, as attorney general for four years, gave the state conspicuously good service. After his retirement to private life he won a wide reputation as a practicing lawyer, a successful lawyer with an unsullied name.

Though Mr. Hogan's defeat for a seat in the United States senate by the late Warren G. Harding in 1914 was a great disappointment to him, after his two successful campaigns for the attorney generalship, he accepted it with characteristic cheerfulness. Many of his friends thought that his rejection by the voters was due to a consideration which should have no weight in the selection of public servants in this land of boasted religious liberty. If Mr. Hogan thought so too he did not permit the evidence of intolerance to embitter him. He was firm in his own faith but he judged a man by his character and not by his creed. What a difference it might have made in the history of the nation if Mr. Hogan had chanced to be brought up a Methodist or a Baptist! But it makes no difference to him now, or to his great rival of 1914, whose fortune that year was the steppingstone from which he climbed into the proudest place in the gift of a proud people.—Arthur R. Priest

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# Phi Is Executive of Famous Library

Leslie E. Bliss, Colgate, '11, curator of the famous Henry E. Huntington library at San Marino, Cal., since 1920 and for the last year acting librarian, has recently been appointed librarian by the trustees of the institution.

Brother Bliss has been a member of the library staff since it was organized in New York eleven years ago by Dr. George Watson Cole, librarian emeritus who retired a year and a half ago. He was Dr. Cole's assistant for five years while the Huntington Collection was in New York, and upon its removal to California to be housed in the beautiful building on the estate of Mr. Huntington at San Marino he was appointed curator.

The new librarian is one of the best known bibliographers in the United Brother Bliss was born in States. Poland, N. Y., and after graduating from the Newport (N. Y.) High School, entered Colgate University and was graduated with the class of 1911. Two years later he was graduated from the New York State Library School. He became assistant in the legislative section of the New York state library in the latter year and was acting chief when he was selected by Dr. Cole to fill the important post of assistant when the Huntington library staff was formed.

The Henry E. Huntington library, which is second only in importance to the British Museum, has been in the making since 1908, when Mr. Huntington retired from active business affairs to devote his time to the collection of rare books and manuscripts.

In all, the Huntington collection

contains books bought in thirty of the most celebrated library sales during the last quarter of a century. Among these were the Morrow library of Brooklyn, which contained many fine books of the Morschauer collection; the Beverly Chew library, famous for its rare volumes of early English authors: the Devonshire library of early English dramatic literature; the Robert Hoe collection, for which Mr. Huntington is said to have paid \$2,000,000; a portion of the library of Alfred Huth, England's most noted collector; the library of the Duke of containing Devonshire, the Philip Kemble collection of English plays and the library of the Earl of Ellesmere.

The building in which this unrivaled collection of books and manuscripts is housed, was erected seven years ago at a cost which is said to have exceeded \$500,000.

Brother Bliss' wide experience as assistant to Dr. Cole has admirably fitted him to carry on the work begun by the latter in organizing the library.

Brother Bliss resides with his wife and three children in Pasadena. He is the author of many articles contributed to library periodicals besides being a member of  $\Phi$  B K and  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ . He is a member of the American Library Association, the California Library Association and the New York State Library School Association.

# Pierce Is Budding Movie Star





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

# Editorial

We have attended conventions when we felt that the fraternity would have been almost as well off if they had not been held. Many of the delegates didn't know what it was all about and it was difficult to point to any marked achievement.


In our opinion, the Survey Commission definitely "arrived" at Montreal. The committee on Chapters and Charters had the tools with which to work and instead of attempting to pass judgment during a two days' session they were given complete information which the Survey Commission had spent years in assembling. And the convention had complete confidence in the Commission as evidenced by the many expressions of appreciation of its work.

If some of the other important phases of fraternity affairs could be worked on and considered before conventions we believe a more intelligent result would be obtained. A step in this direction was the authorization by the Montreal meeting of a permanent scholarship commissioner. This will give the next convention data and information upon this very vital feature.

The banquet at Montreal was considered highly successful and indeed, the hotel accommodations were all that could be asked. The local committee had worked long and untiringly and the visitors were not hesitant in expressing their approval of its efforts.

The decision to hold the next convention in Nashville was universally satisfactory. Nashville, having the advantage of being centrally located, is one of the greatest points of strength in Phi Delta Theta. We look forward with keen anticipation to the assembling of the Phi Clan there in 1928.

The new President of the General Council, Dr. John J. Tigert, has as a background much that is ideal for a fraternity administrator. His position as United States Commissioner of Education gives him a prestige which is desirable and valuable: he is known to every educator in the country. His duties take him constantly about the entire continent and



his knowledge of institutions and conditions are of great importance to his colleagues both on the General Council and the Survey Commission.

The brother from "south of the Smith and Wesson line" as he expresses it is a native of a section which has been most prominent in Phi Delta Theta. Educated at Vanderbilt University where he was active in athletics and forensics he thus received his degree from one of the foremost institutions in this country. Then as a Rhodes Scholar he had the benefit of three years in England so that it would not be possible to have a better preparation for his life's work.

It is interesting to note that, as President of the Fraternity, Brother Tigert will preside over a convention held in his old home locality. In

other words he will return to Rome at the head of his legions.



A toast to the brides! This was offered at the Montreal Convention banquet to the brides of Secretaries Priest and Ball who were unexpected visitors at that gathering. The Scroll wishes to extend the toast beyond that banquet to the broad realm of Phi Delta Theta and to offer the congratulations of the entire fraternity.



The subject for discussion on Founders' Day this year is "95 Active Chapters and 100 Alumni Clubs each with a Constructive Program." This topic holds interesting possibilities and it is felt that if each unit in Phi Delta Theta will devote itself to the attaining of a definite objective much good to the entire fraternity will result.

The announcement of the subject at this time permits plenty of advance thought and we would suggest that each chapter consider what it needs most to make it more effective and then use the Founders' Day

program to arouse its membership to action.



We want to say "Beg Pardon' for an error in the January Scroll. One report, that of Assistant Secretary Ball, was not read at the convention, but it is such a splendid observation upon the condition of the fraternity


that we especially commend it for your reading.

# THE CONVENTION AS SEEN BY AN UNDERGRADUATE

UR Canadian Phis of Toronto and McGill joined hands and extended a truly fraternal welcome to the delegates as they arrived in Montreal for Phi Delta Theta's thirty-

eighth biennial convention Tuesday, December 28, 1926. The charm of the city with its French and English atmosphere, in a winter setting, was unique, and especially attractive to those of us who had come from the south and the west.

Arriving on scheduled time at 8:15 in the morning, the delegates went immediately to the Windsor Hotel, the convention headquarters, and after registering and obtaining rooms, were ready for the opening session

that began at 10:30. Brother Robert E. Haas, member of the General Council, presided, and the rest of the morning was devoted to the address of welcome from the Canadian Phis, represented by Brother Henry H. Davis of Toronto, and responded to by Brother John J. Tigert of Washington, D.C., who spoke for the visitors from the United States. At noon, the body was divided into small luncheon groups, where all different phases of fraternity conditions and problems were discussed. General business session was resumed at two o'clock, and some of the committees that had been previously appointed were ready to report and make recommendations. It was gratifying to see the dispatch with which these quickly organized committees carried on their meetings and presented their Unfortunately, Brother Robert P. Brewer, President of the General Council, was unable to be at Montreal, and his absence was deeply felt. His comprehensive address, giving a survey of the activities during his administration, was read to the meeting. At four-thirty the session was adjourned, and our hosts took us down to the large dining and dancing salon and presented two hundred of Montreal's most attractive young women for a tea dansant that lasted until seven o'clock.

At eight-thirty more entertainment was offered with a smoker, also given at the hotel. Steins were distributed and soon flowed with English ale. The rafters trembled with the lusty harmony of "A Jolly Crew" and others of our songs. There were vaudeville acts ranging from French-Canadian quartets to dancing girls.

The following morning, Wednesday, session again convened. and continued with officers' and committee reports, such as the committees on Constitution and General Statutes. Chapters and Charters, THE SCROLL Endowment. and the Walter B. Palmer Memorial Fund. As on the previous day, the luncheon forums were held, and the afternoon meeting was given to further reports. The Harvard Alumni Association presented a handsome plaque to Washington Beta at Whitman College as a permanent memento of their having won the Harvard Trophy cup in 1924. The committee on chapters and charters recommended that a charter be granted to the petitioning group,  $\Phi \stackrel{\circ}{\Delta} \Lambda$  from the University of West Virginia, and this recommendation was received and enthusiastically passed upon. The West Virginians showed a splendid record. and their acquisition is regarded with great pride. Brother Henry Urion. Treasurer of the General Council, made a thorough report of the fraternity's financial status, and Brother Arthur R. Priest, General Secretary, gave his report. This is to be published, and it behooves every Phi to read the paper carefully, as much profit can be derived from Brother Priest's intimate knowledge of the fraternity's functioning. Two salient statements of Brother Priest were particularly impressive, and can well serve as beacons for every chapter. Consider them. "Selfishness of a few men may wreck the whole fraternity. Evidence of leadership is shown in faithfulness to obligations."


Wednesday evening the three hundred Phis gathered for the formal banquet, and the evening's program consisted of addresses from Brothers Leslie Frazier, Salt Lake City, Nelson T. Hartson, Washington, D.C., Dean Hoffman, Harrisburg, Pa., and John J. Tigert, Washington, D.C., and introduction of other prominent alumni. Although not active partici-

pants at the banquet, the "Phi Delt Ladies" in attendance were introduced as a group, toasted, and had the privilege of hearing the speakers.

Thursday morning the last day's meeting was opened at 9:30 and the election of the General Council and the President was carried out. Brother John J. Tigert of Washington. D.C., was unanimously chosen as president. The fraternity is indeed fortunate to have such a man as Dr. Tigert at the head, since he has brilliant academic achievement behind him,  $\Phi$  B K, athlete, and Rhodes Scholar, and is prominent in national educational life as Commissioner of Education of the Department of the Interior, in addition to his keen interest and activity in  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ . The four members elected to the general council are George Banta, Jr., Henry K. Urion, Robert E. Haas, and Henry H. Davis.

Thursday's luncheon was general, and at the afternoon meeting the time and place of the next convention were decided. Several cities bid, but Nashville, Tennessee, won first place, presenting invitations that came from the governor of the state and the chief of the Nashville police. This city's central location should augur a large attendance for December, 1928. With final reports and the distribution of rebate certificates and funds to the delegates, the convention came to a close at six o'clock.

Again rises an expression of the convention's sincere regard for the generous hospitality proffered by the Canadian brothers in making what was conceded to be the most successful convention of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  ever held. It is to be hoped that the returning delegates can impart to their chapters the renewed interest that they feel in striving for the fraternity's betterment, as a result of having had contact with their brother students from all parts of the country, and the active, and alert-minded men who are standing at the front as officers and leaders.

### CONVENTION SIDELIGHTS

T THE Convention Banquet the Toast Master welcomed the Phi-Sisters gathered in the gallery, asking them to stand and be greeted. After the long applause, he created some surprise by asking that the two Phi Delt brides stand and receive the homage of the Brothers.

The Inquiring Reporter, scenting a story, hunted up Mrs. Priest and Mrs. Ball. He felt that the curiosity expressed in Convention circles was a good indication that all Phis would be interested in knowing about the new additions to the Executive Staff.

Madge Headley Priest was born in Iowa, educated in Indiana, lived in Illinois, married to settle in Ohio, and is therefore a typical citizen of the Middle West. Travel for professional and war work has made known to her most of the states East of the Mississippi, as well as England and France. She belongs to the breed of pioneer women, always ready to try new things, and deeply interested in the world about them.

Born a Republican in Iowa in 1873, she inclines to vote a straight ticket, but splits it when proper. Graduated from DePauw in 1898, she was a loyal A  $\Phi$ , and active in campus affairs. Her collegiate record formed a basis for changing the DePauw Chapter rules of  $\Phi$  B K, and the honor of membership in that Society has ever since been given to women at that institution.

After ten years of earning good money and spending it to learn about life, the service ideals of DePauw came uppermost, and she entered the School of Civics in New York, graduating in 1910. Since that time, with the exception of war work in France, she has been active in professional work in housing, sanitation and zoning. She has made studies as a basis for health and sanitary ordinances, or for city plans, in most

of the states East of the Mississippi, including living conditions of miners in Pennsylvania, Alabama, and Ohio; a survey in eighteen cities North and South of the effect of the great Negro migration; and work for the passage of the zoning ordinance of Chicago.

From November, 1917, to May, 1919, she did American Red Cross work in France, first for the Bureau of Refugees and Repatriates, where she saw a phase of war work little known. After a year of this service, she took charge of a canteen at the Gare d'Austerlitz in Paris, directing the daily output of twelve to fifteen hundred meals for hungry and often homesick American soldiers.

Mrs. Priest says that there is no conflict in her mind on the much discussed problem of the married professional woman. She knows that home making is as full and fascinating work as anything she could do. When she said "I do," she took up a new profession as an assistant in furthering the work of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ , and says that all Brothers are welcome to come and see her and her husband at their home in Oxford.

The years and the deeds of Mrs. Reuben Ball are shorter than those of the other bride, but she gives promise of an equally busy career. She was born in Denver in 1900, and grew up with the Rockies for a playground, to give her the love of big things and of out of doors. She was the Denver Public educated in Schools and the University of Colorado, graduating with the A.B. degree in 1923. She was an active and loyal member of  $\Pi$  B  $\Phi$ , the sorority which has won fame by its support school for the Tennessee of mountaineers. For campus activities, scholarship and all round development, she was elected to Mortar Board, the senior honor society.

For the past three years, Mrs. Ball has been librarian of the Byers Junior High School of Denver, organizing and building up one of the first libraries of that kind in the city.

Mr. and Mrs. Ball carry on the tradition of close ties between  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  and  $\Pi B \Phi$ . A college statistician looked up the records and found that no less than twelve of Reuben's group

in college married Pi Phis, and makes the claim that the average for the country is sixty per cent. Mrs. Ball says that four engaged girls living in the house with her answered to the Phi Delt whistle.

Mrs. Ball will keep house in Oxford, and told the Inquiring Reporter that all Phi Delts would be welcome for a piece of lemon pie.



# THE NEW PRESIDENT OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL

THE new President of the General Council elected at the Montreal Convention requires little introduction to members of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ . John J. Tigert was first made a member of the Council at the Kansas City Convention in 1922 and rendered a most valuable service in the trying years which followed. His election at Montreal came in recognition of that service and in recognition of his leadership in the field of education.

THE SCROLL hopes to publish soon an article which will be somewhat in the nature of an appreciation of Brother Tigert by one of the distinguished sons of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ . In the meantime we will give a few facts about his career so that the new brothers in the fraternity may know what manner of men are called to its leader-

ship.

Dr. John J. Tigert was appointed United States Commissioner of Education on June 1, 1921, by the late President Harding. He was only thirty-nine years of age when appointed, and is by far the youngest man that has ever held the office. As United States Commissioner of Education, Dr. Tigert is in charge of the education of the natives of Alaska. This is the only administrative educational function of the Commissioner. In the United States education is entirely a matter of state and local control, the function of the United States Bureau of Education, of which Dr. Tigert is head, being purely advisory and informative. The services of the Commissioner, however, are constantly in demand in all sections of the country, and since his appointment Dr. Tigert has visited every state in the Union, and most of the states several times. During this

time he traveled thousands of miles and delivered hundreds of addresses.

Dr. Tigert is a graduate of Vanderbilt University and was the first Rhodes Scholar from Tennessee. He received his M.A. degree from Oxford University, England. He has also received a number of honorary degrees since his appointment as Commissioner of Education. During the World War, Dr. Tigert was engaged in educational work with the American Expeditionary Forces in Scotland, England, France and later with the Army of Occupation in Germany.

Dr. Tigert is chairman of the Federal Council of Citizenship Training and of the Highway Education Board. He is also a member of the Federal Board for Vocational Education, of the Federal Board of Maternity and Infant Hygiene, and of the Board of Trustees of Vanderbilt University. He is vice-president of the National Council of Education, of the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America, and of many other organizations and societies, including  $\Phi$  B K to which he was elected at Vanderbilt.

Dr. Tigert may be described in appearance and manner as typically American. Tall and lean, with a drawl that immediately tells you from what part of the country he came, he wins men to him. He speaks in an interesting and entertaining way all his own and has a fund of good stories always at his command.

 $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  has reached a point where its organization is set to make big strides and Dr. Tigert ought to make an ideal man to lead it during the next two years. He holds the confidence of all.

### FRATERNITY GIFTS EXEMPT

DONORS to chapter house funds and endowments have asked frequently if their gifts might be deducted in making up income tax returns. The following excerpts from the Report of the Law Committee of the Interfraternity Conference are reproduced as answer to the inquiries:

In making up his U. S. Income Tax return for 1922 Albert S. Bard of New York deducted a gift of \$500 he had made to the Alpha Chi Corporation of Chi Psi, the corporation which owns the chapter house of his fraternity at Amherst College. In 1926 the government disallowed the gift and sought to add the amount to the donor's taxable income for 1922.

Thereupon, with the co-operation of the Law Committee of the Interfraternity Conference the donor made up and filed the accompanying protest and brief, with the result that under date of July 26, 1926, the Commissioner of Internal Revenue allows the deduction.

The entire brief and protest and the Treasury Department ruling are now printed as a report from the Law Committee and circulated by the Interfrater-



nity Conference for the benefit of all fraternities.

These papers (1) develop the case for fraternities generally, and (2) also present the case of the particular corporation involved. This Committee recognizes that each fraternity case will be judged on its own merits; but the present papers, covering, as they do, the first successful case fully presented, will be of service to others.

We suggest that persons desiring to refer to this case (in papers filed with the government) do so by referring to the full title, adding the government

file number.

#### BRIEF FOR PROTESTING TAX PAYER

I. The sole question raised by this protest is whether or not a gift made by the taxpayer above named in 1922 to a fraternity corporation, the Alpha Chi Corporation of Chi Psi, is deductible in estimating the taxpayer's taxable income for that year under the Income Tax provisions of the Revenue Act of 1921.

The Revenue Act of 1921, Section 214, paragraph (a) (11), provides that in computing the taxable income there may

be deducted---

"II. Contributions or gifts made within the taxable year to or for the use of . . . (B) any corporation or community chest, fund or foundation, organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary or educational purposes, including posts of the American Legion or the Women's Auxiliary units thereof, . . . no part of the net earnings of which inures to the

benefit of any private stockholder or individual; . . . . "

The Alpha Chi Corporation of Chi Psi is organized under the Charitable and Educational Corporation Law of Massachusetts, and the taxpayer claims that it comes within the above exemption of the Revenue Act of 1921.

Reference is made to the report of the Supervising Internal Revenue Agent at New York, New York, forwarded to this office under date of July 1, 1926, covering an examination of your books of account and records for the years 1022 and 1923.

In said report the contribution of \$500.00 in 1922 to Alpha Chi corporation was disallowed as a deduction.

You are advised that an examination of the records of this office shows that the corporation referred to falls within the meaning of Section 214 (a) (11) of the Revenue Act of 1923\* which provides in part of follows:

"Contributions or gifts made within the taxable year to or for the use of any corporation or community chest, fund or foundation, organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary, or educational purposes, including posts of the American Legion or the Women's Auxiliary units thereof, or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals, no part of the net earnings of which inures to the benefit of any private stockholder or individual."

Your returns are, therefore, accepted as filed.

\*NOTE.—The above letter refers to "Revenue Act of 1923." Obviously the Revenue Act of 1921 is meant. Section 214 (a) (11) is precisely the same in the Revenue Acts of 1921 and 1924. There was no Revenue Act of 1923. Moreover the above case concerned the income of 1922.

### GEORGIA PHI HITS AT MOB MURDER

The following story is reprinted from *The Literary Digest* and concerns Judge Harry D. Reed, *Mercer*, '00:

↑ STUNNING blow against "mob rule" is seen by the editor of the Tifton (Georgia) Gazette and several other Georgia newspapers, polled by telegraph, in the recent sentence to life imprisonment of one Major Brown, leader of a lynching party which forcibly took a white man from the Coffee County jail last August and shot him to Never before, according to the State Attorney-General, has a man received a life sentence for participating in a lynching, nor has one even been tried by a jury and found guilty of a lynching offense in Georgia. Therefore, telegraphs the Moultrie Observer, "Georgia has set a new precedent," and "if we can follow this with other convictions, including instances where white men lynch negroes, we will soon see lynching disappear from the State." Meanwhile, warns the Brunswick News, "the sentence of Judge Harry D. Reed, of the Superior Court, should serve as a warning to those who presume to take the law into their own hands."

"It has long been considered practically impossible," telegraphs another Georgia paper, the Albany Herald, "to convict mob members in Georgia courts, no matter how heinous the crime. But Coffee County has blazed a new trail." By rounding up more than a dozen of the party which lynched Dave Wright for the alleged murder of a white woman, and giving nine of them sentences ranging from four years to life imprisonment, Georgia "has ushered in a new era of law enforcement," notes The Herald, of Fitzgerald, Georgia.

The Coffee County case, observes the Augusta *Chronicle*, "is a demonstration of the force and power of public sentiment," and the neighboring *Herald* wires us as follows:

"This is one of the greatest triumphs ever achieved by justice in Georgia. There is never at any time an excuse for lynching. Man has passed far enough along the highway of progress to understand that orderly government is his only

salvation. Since 1889, Georgia has had 433 lynchings; if there should be another, we trust that members of the mob will be given the extreme penalty for murder."

The Douglas Enterprise, in fact, declares that "lynching henceforth is mur-

der in Georgia, and the same laws will cover both." "And, since white and black stand equal before the law, let Georgia also lead in proving that justice in this State is aware of no color line," suggests the editor of the Columbus Enquirer-Sun. The Savannah Press, Valdosta Times, Waycross Journal-Her-

ald, Columbus Ledger, Atlanta Journal, and La Grange Reporter "take off their hats" to Judge Reed and Coffee County officials for their promptness in dealing out justice. Furthermore, maintains The Reporter, "Coffee County's splendid example should be followed elsewhere in

Georgia and the nation."

The Brown-Wright case, which has attracted attention throughout the United States, resulted from the murder of a white woman at Douglas, the county seat of Coffee County. Major Brown. said to be the brother-in-law of Dave Wright's alleged victim, was the leader of the mob which took Wright's life, and is said to have confessed to having killed Wright, while the other eight sentenced by Judge Reed pleaded guilty to the lesser crime of mob violence. When the crime was committed, last August, Judge Reed was summoned from his home in Waycross, and immediately recalled the grand jury, which had been in session. In the next three months, says the Macon News, "the State built up such a case against the defendants that the leader and eight of his associates felt constrained to enter pleas of guilty. Had they not done so, observes The Coffee County Progress, of Douglas, their punishment doubtless would have been much greater. Practically all of the members of the mob which killed Wright, says this county seat paper, were young men who probably did not realize the enormity of the offense. In pronouncing sentence, Judge Reed said, in part:

"Lynching is a menace to the rights and liberties of the American individual, and should be regarded so by every intelligent community. It is as much out of place in our modern civilization as would be the burning of witches.

"When a community makes public the fact that it will bend every effort to apprehend lynchers without loss of time, and mete out punishment to them, there will be few cases of lynching in that

community."

"Coffee County, through its constituted judiciary system, not only has vindicated itself, but the State of Georgia," says the Atlanta Constitution. Incidentally, points out this paper, "the whole State is under obligation to a fearless judge." Georgia and the South gener-

ally, explains the Athens Banner-Herald, "have been greatly misrepresented by sensational and misleading newspaper stories of lynchings. As a matter of fact, we in the South are as strongly in favor of law enforcement as are the people in any other section of the country." "Coffee County has given the North something to think about by dispensing justice, less than three months after the crime, in this case," agrees the Savannah News, and in the Macon Telegraph we are told that—

"Justice won because public sentiment in Coffee County demanded justice; because the better element in Coffee County demanded that the officers of the law bring to accountability the reckless and brutal men who reverted to the savagery of nomad tribes to avenge human

wrongs.

"The dénouement of the Coffee County lynching is indicative of the general awakening of the State. The justice that has come to Brown and his associates of the Douglas mob indicates a new attitude toward lynching. Lynching henceforth is not something to be tolerated and winked at. Lynching is murder, and the laws that cover murder are to cover lynching. With the example of Coffee County before us, it will not be easy to lynch in this State.

"Wright was a white man. It is easier to convict of lynching a white man than it is to convict of lynching a negro, but it has been so difficult to do either heretofore that it has not been done. We must remember this: That justice must be even-handed; that there can be no justice as long as there is discrimination between the high and the low, the rich and the poor. As long as we tolerate lynchings in Georgia, whether the victims be white or black, humble or arrogant, every person in the State, high and low, rich and poor, is a potential victim of a mob. If lynchings are tolerated, any group of men in the State can form themselves into a mob, kill their victim, and go back home with the assurance that there will be no punishment. If we adopt the attitude of Coffee Countythat no lynching shall be tolerated, and that all lynchings must be paid for before the law-we have protected human rights and human life, and the property rights of all."

### PHI POLO CHAMPION IN CHINA

CORNELL SIDNEY FRANK-LIN, Mississippi, '13, has come into great prominence in the Far East as a polo player of the first rank.

He was born in Columbus, Mississippi, April 1, 1892 and became a Phi at "Ole Miss," where he received the degree of B.A. in 1913 and LL.B. in 1914. He served as First Lieutenant, Infantry, during the War; First Judge, First Judicial Circuit, Territory of Hawaii, 1919-1921, and in the general practice of law, Shanghai, China, 1922 to date. Organized and captained first American polo team in Shanghai in summer of 1925; played No. 2, the pivotal position, on the victorious American team in the summer of 1926. The team was undefeated during the season having won the Cunningham cup International handicap trophy, by defeating the British team 141/2 to 11, and Hoyt cup for Volunteer Corps com-petition by defeating the British Light Horse 8 to 5. The team then journeyed north and although handicapped by playing on a field without turf and on ponies that had not fully recovered from a four days' sea voyage defeated the 15th Infantry, U. S. Army team in Tientsin 9 to 1. The season's play was closed when the Shanghai-American Team defeated the Peking Team 4 to 0.

Judge Franklin's pony "Marco Polo," (shown in the accompanying photograph) as the result of his playing during the season, has come to be considered one of the best polo mounts in all of China. Judge Franklin played his first polo at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, while in the Army.

### RHODES SCHOLAR FROM KANSAS

IN CONSIDERATION of leadership, activities, interests, character, and scholarship, the 1927 Rhodes Scholarship for the state of Kansas was awarded to Brewster Morgan, Kansas, '27. The choice was made

from twenty candidates selected by Kansas colleges to represent their respective institutions.

Brother Morgan with thirty-one other students from the United States will enter Oxford in October, 1927. A stipend amounting to \$2,000 a year for three years is provided for each appointee. According to F. B. Bristow, who for many years has been a member of the selection committee in Kansas, Brother Morgan attains to the highest standard of any candidate ever interviewed by the committee.

Brother Morgan's accomplishments during his four years at the University of Kansas are truly remarkable. His scholastic standing won him membership in  $\Phi$  B K in the spring of 1926.

During his Senior year in the University he took part in twelve phases of school activities. He was president of the dramatic club, the chairman and director of the Senior play, and he had a leading part in the school play, The Ticket of Leave Man. In the literary line, he is a member of  $\Sigma$   $\Delta$  X, honorary journalistic fraternity, the literary editor of the Sour Owl, Kansas humorous publication, and the University representative in Harper's undergraduate literary contest.

He was a member of the University Christmas Week committee, Homecoming committee, chairman of the Old Timer's Night committee, and toastmaster at the Gridiron Banquet.

Within a period of a few weeks during his Junior year in the University, Brother Morgan won prominence in three phases of activities: he debated with the Kansas team against Oxford University of England, he managed and coached a dramatic production that was presented in a Lawrence theater for two successive nights, and he had the lead in a University play that won the second national prize at Chicago.

In fraternity activities, Brother Morgan also had a prominent part. He was the Phi Delt delegate in the Panhellenic council and chairman of the rushing committee during his last year in school. He also represented the fraternity in alumni meetings in Kansas City and Topeka where he addressed the organizations. At the

present time, he is taking postgraduate work in the University and acting as an assistant-instructor in the department of history.

Brother Morgan is the son of I. B. Morgan, who is a superintendent of schools in Kansas City, Kansas. His brother, William, is a sophomore in

Brother Morgan's selection for the Rhodes Scholarship marked the second successive time that a Kansas University man has won the honor. Ralph Hower, B  $\Theta$  II, was the candidate from Kansas in 1925.



## PHIS AT MILWAUKEE CONVENTION

OVER three thousand students, representing colleges and universities from over the entire United States attended the National Student conference held at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, December 28 to January 1.

The conference was called and planned by student representatives in councils throughout the country. Its purpose was that of discussing and attempting to solve students' problems, especially in campus life. International fellowship, race relations, imperialism, and a student's attitude toward God were among the many topics discussed.

This was the first conference of its kind ever held in this country. It drew in common assembly representatives of the many different opinions of students from colleges located all over the country. The national character of the meeting made the findings infinitely more valuable.

It was interesting to note that the personnel of the conference included black, red, yellow, and brown peoples. The Orient was well represented as was the colored South. Many points of view converged in discussion which could not but be broadening. There was a general feeling of racial friendliness impelled not by Puritanical duty or conventional obligations, but by actual fraternal spirit. There was a realization of the truths of other philosophies

and the treasures of other cultures, and we judge that the representatives of the entire forty-eight states and forty foreign countries are immensely benefitted by their findings.

Directing the thoughts of the conference were Dr. A. Bruce Curry, Chairman of the conference committee; Dr. Reinhold Niebur of Detroit; Dr. Henry Sloane Coffin, President of the Union Theological Seminary of New York; Dr. G. A. Studdert-Kennedy of London, England; Dr. Howard Thurman of Oberlin, Ohio; Kirby Page of New York; Jerome Davis, professor of Sociology at Yale, and other well known men in scientific and theological fields.

There was a conspicuous lack of cynical faces and sophisticated expressions. The group was sincere, eager, almost avid for knowledge, yet often impractical in its idealism.

The conference as a whole was most scientifically planned and most efficiently were these plans carried out. It was not planned to settle individual problems or local difficulties. It was meant to be a guide for clearer, more forward-looking thinking and a means for encouraging faith in one's brothers and for increasing the understanding of God.


The general feeling created by the five-day session was a realization of our own ignorance and inadequacy. As students from Servia, Russia,

# PHI BETA KAPPA'S SESQUICENTENNIAL

In THIS year of grace 1926, when throughout the Eastern States anniversaries of many historic events of the early Revolutionary period are being celebrated, Phi Beta Kappa, the original Greek letter society, has found time for a unique sesquicentennial celebration. The date of its founding, December 5, 1776, is well known, for it has been mentioned at thousands of Phi Beta Kappa initiations and appears on tens of thousands of Phi Beta Kappa keys.

While this ancient society gradually changed its characteristics so that its place as an honor society has been fully recognized for nearly a century, it has not forgotten to emphasize its original purpose of promoting friendship among students and graduates of our colleges and universities. It has, however, steadily resisted any tendency to base its elections upon friendship, or to segregate its members, as is done in so many college fraternities. Never in all its experience has it seriously considered erecting a chapter house or providing club rooms for its members. In only two of the one hundred and seven colleges and universities, where it has chapters, has it been given rooms for the exclusive use of its These are at Yale and members. Not until 1921 did it secure official headquarters for the officers of the united chapters. Previous to that date the secretaries had provided office space wherever their work happened to be. The change to official headquarters in New York City was made possible by a noted and unsolicited gift of one of its members who, in the seclusion of an invalid's chamber, made this provision for a period of six years.

Now, however, the ancient society has broken a tradition in an abso-

lutely unique way. It has not begun to secure club rooms or chapter houses, but it has erected on the campus of the ancient College of William and Mary a fine structure, in architectural harmony with the buildings already there and in keeping with the plan along which the college is developing, to be a memorial to the founders of Phi Beta Kappa, and of perpetual service to the college.

The idea of this memorial grew out of a chance remark of Dr. John H. Finley, who, visiting the college some years ago, saw its urgent need of an The president of the auditorium. college brought the proposal before the national council in 1919 and was accorded the privilege of making an appeal for funds. Three years later the plan of a memorial building was coupled with an endowment project, and an active canvass for funds was at once begun. By hearty co-operation between the Phi Beta Kappa senate, through its incorporated entity, the Phi Beta Kappa Foundation, and the board of visitors of the college, the work of construction was begun in the fall of 1925 and the building was completed before the opening of the college last September. The auditorium was then furnished, and the Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall was on November 27, 1926, duly dedicated with appropriate exercises in connection with the celebration of the society's 150th anniversary. conservative and deliberate society this is considered a rather remarkable achievement.

#### THE MEMORIAL HALL

The building is located on the main axis of the new campus which extends in a westerly direction from the ancient Main Building of the college that dates from 1697. It is to the left and immediately opposite the library, the two buildings facing each other, though one hundred yards apart.

The main entrance to the Memorial Hall is through a triple arched portico, corresponding in design with the portico of the Main Building. The door in the central arch leads into a spacious and beautiful central hall which is abundantly lighted by windows on either side of the entrance. To the right and left of this central hall are companion rooms. Over the

the ancient inscription: Hilaritas

Sapientiæ et bonæ vitæ proles.
The dimensions of Apollo Room are exactly those of the hall of Revolutionary times. In fact the purpose to make it a part of the memorial structure gave the architect a peculiar problem, and made necessary some unusual features.

The companion room to the right has been named the "Francis Phelps Dodge Memorial Room. It, too, is well lighted and planned to serve many social and recreational pur-

door of the one to the left is the word "APOLLO," indicating that it is a replica of Apollo Hall in Raleigh Tavern, a noted place of assembly that was to the patriots of Virginia what Faneuil Hall was to their compatriots of Massachusetts. Tradition has it that Phi Beta Kappa was organized in the ancient Apollo Room. While this cannot be affirmed, the records make it clear that the early anniversaries of the Alpha society were held there. This new Apollo Room is set apart for the uses of the Alpha chapter and in it many happy meetings will no doubt be held.

Apollo Room is well lighted with three windows on each side, and two at the end, flanking the fireplace and its beautiful mantel, over which is

poses. To the right and left of the doorway are cloak and serving rooms, the latter with an outside entrance.

Passing through the central hall we enter a logia, and see the doors to the auditorium just before us. Turning to the left, we find the stairway to the second floor where are six sleeping rooms, suitably arranged for the use of members of Phi Beta Kappa who have occasion to remain Williamsburg over night. is indeed a unique feature of the structure, in which those who planned it take great satisfaction.


Returning to the main floor we find our left a spacious doorway through which we may pass out of the building by a path between the Apollo Room and the auditorium.

Turning to the right we find three doors leading to the side of the auditorium, the main entrance to which is to the left, and the stage is to the right. On either side and over the vestibule are spacious galleries, seating about 300. There are 700 seats on the main floor, which is level. Folding chairs are provided. On each standard facing the aisles appear the Greek letters, " $\Phi$  B K."

The main entrance to the auditorium is over a spacious porch through three doors into a vestibule

Beta Kappa, duly nominated by their respective chapters, were invited.

The large attendance was an indication of wide interest in the occasion. The party assembled in Richmond where the officers and others were entertained at breakfast at the Virginia Club. The president of the Richmond, Fredericksburg & Potomac Railroad then supplied his private car to transport them to Williamsburg. An interesting and colorful academic procession preceded the exercises. The order was as follows:

under the rear gallery. The room is finely proportioned, is beautifully finished in white and gold; and will serve the needs of the college for regular and special assemblies. In it the sesquicentennial exercises were held on November 27, 1926.

## THE SESQUICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

The plan to make the occasion of nation wide educational significance was well carried out. Each Phi Beta Kappa chapter and association was invited to send a representative, as were many learned societies. Invitations were also sent to the leading honorary, professional, and social fraternities and sororities, to be represented by delegates. In addition many distinguished members of Phi three hundred twentymine!

Delegates of the fraternities and of the learned societies proceeded in the order of the founding of the organizations they represented. The officers of the Phi Beta Kappa Foundation and the officers of the united chapters occupied the platform with

the speakers of the day.

The Programme of the Day, a neat folder of sixteen pages, contained an inclusive outline of the exercises, including lists of delegates and invited guests whose acceptances had been received up to November 22. It also contained a list of the fifty men who are termed the founders. It is understood that this list includes all who were members of the society during the first period of four years. John Heath, the first man on the list, was the moving spirit. With him at the first meeting on December 5, 1776, were Thomas Smith, Richard Booker, Armistead Smith, and John Jones. Four others-John Stuart, Daniel Fitzhugh, Theoderick Fitzhugh, and John Starke—were present on January 5, 1777, when these nine men were "severally initiated." In one respect these nine may be considered the actual founders; and the fortyone others who came into the membership later, as associate founders, under whose guidance the fraternity was developed, its methods formulated, and its purpose to expand by the granting of charters was made its fixed policy. However, the formal disbanding of the Alpha on January 6, 1781, owing to the approach of the British Army, gives to the entire group a real unity, and makes it appropriate to designate them the "fifty founders."

The exercises were in two parts; first, the public assembly in the new Memorial Hall, following the academic procession that began to move promptly at 10:30; and second, the Virginia Dinner in the college refectory at 6:30. The public exercises were presided over by Dr. Charles Franklin Thwing, president of the united chapters, and at the dinner the

toastmaster was Dr. Francis Wayland Shepardson, vice president.

"Ike," as he was known to legions of Phis the country over, was the delegate from his chapter to the biennial convention of 1904, and he was an attendant at all subsequent meetings until the Kansas City Convention, in 1924. Business affairs far distant prevented his presence at the last two conventions. Never the holder of office in the fraternity, his many friendships, interest in fraternity affairs, loyalty and wise counsel to its best interests, made him a respected and familiar figure to many Phis.

Graduating from Dartmouth College in 1906, he was an instructor in public speaking at Cornell University for a year. He then entered the insurance business, finally locating in Boston, where he remained until the outbreak of the World War. An early follower of General Wood, he was commissioned as first lieutenant in the Cavalry before our entry into the war, following his training at the summer Plattsburgh camps. He was an instructor at the first Plattsburgh camp held after our entry into the war.

In August, 1917, shortly after the landing of General Pershing, he arrived in Paris as a casual cavalry officer, presumably to study war developments in cavalry tactics and to return to this country for the continuation of his work as an instructor. Weeks passing without the receipt of orders for duty, he learned that an American officer who could speak French was needed to act as liaison officer in arranging for the billeting of the first American troops shortly expected to arrive. "Ike's" college French had been somewhat revived since his arrival in France, but with more audacity than linguistic accomplishment he secured the assignment to that duty. Hence, as

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the pioneer billeting officer of the A.E.F., he was in charge of billeting the American Army back of the front lines, instructing and commanding zone majors and other officers who outranked him, for the armistice found him only a captain—and his commission as major already issued but cancelled upon the signing of the armistice. He received a citation from General Pershing for meritorius service in that line of duty.

During the last month of the war he saw action as one of two white officers of a Chicago negro regiment brigaded with the French in the Meuse-Argonne offensive, during which service he was awarded the Croix de Guerre.

His explanation of this decoration was that it was a testimonial to his ability to "cuss." The fact of the matter was that at a critical time in the advance his troops abandoned their supply train under shell-fire, thereby blocking the shell-pitted road, and French and negro officers were impotent to direct order from the chaos of the hopelessly congested traffic. Arriving in the midst of the confusion, with characteristic ability and vigor of language he relieved the emergency, in the course of which a distinguished French officer came upon the scene to witness the effect of that variety of eloquent and forceful English which gets immediate action even if not literally understood.

After the war his interest in military affairs continued. Resigning from the American Legion as a protest to its attitude on the bonus question, he became active in the Cavalry Reserve Officers Association, of which he was an official. Within the past two years he successfully completed courses at the cavalry school at Fort Riley, Kansas, and graduated from the staff school at Ft. Leavenworth. At the time of his death he held a commission as Lieutenant-Colonel, with certificate of capacity for Colonel, cavalry, O.R.C.

After the war he entered the importing business in New York City, in the course of which he made a six months' business trip around the world. For the past two years he was general manager of the Louisiana Coast Land Company with headquarters at Abbeville, Louisiana.

Remaining unmarried, his love for children found expression among his nephews and sons of his intimate friends, several of whom were his namesakes. His death left Christmas presents already purchased for a score of children, including his small "caion" neighbors of the Louisiana marshes as well as for others farther distant. He had a rare faculty of making and retaining affectionate and respected friendships. Among Dartmouth men he was one of the bestknown of his generation. His short connection with Cornell University left him with hosts of friends among those of that institution, and while in New York he made his home at the Cornell Club. From his war connections and attendance at the cavalry and staff schools he had many intimates among officers of the regular army. Wherever his path led his death leaves a little niche of a departed friend.

"Ike's" return from France found his voice almost gone and his heart affected as a result of being gassed. After several months on a Texas ranch his health was visibly improved, but his heart affection remained and in the last year became Rather than face invalidism acute. he remained at his work, strenuous at best, with knowledge that by so doing he was shortening his span of life and constantly risking the possibility of a sudden heart attack such as caused his death. He died, however, as he desired, hastened by his labors and stricken at a dinner given in honor of his forty-third birthday.


He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Isaac F. Paul, of Boston, his brother, Richard F. Paul, *Dartmouth*, '11, and sister, Mrs. Henry K. Urion.

"Ike" came from a large and distinguished family of Dartmouth men -father, uncles and brother all being Dartmouth graduates. His regard for his fraternity was exceeded only by his love for his college. Typical of the man, by his will he left his residuary estate, one-half to Dartmouth College and the remainder equally to New Hampshire Alpha of Phi Delta Theta and to his college senior society. To his many friends he left recollections of a sincere and abiding friendship.

Ohio Epsilon mourns the loss of Brother H. Karl Butler, loyal friend and chapter adviser. Brother Butler, who died December 13, 1926, in his forty-sixth year, was a leading figure in the long endeavor of Z A E to secure the restoration of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  at the University of Akron. The realization two years ago of this great hope, to which so much of his life had been

dedicated, gave him a satisfaction beyond that of ordinary men. For Brother Butler, removed by physical incapacity from participation in active business life, lived for his ideals and his friends. A member of a pioneer Akron family, and himself universally esteemed, it was his pleasure to give largely of his fortune and his time to the assistance of others. him his Fraternity had a deeper meaning by very reason of his inability to take an active part in life. Denied the privileges of physical health, he fought valiantly that others might have normal opportunity for the development of mind and body. Comradeship to him was life itself. Thus the Fraternity and the Boy Scout organization, of which he was President for the Akron District, formed his major interests. To these he gave himself unsparingly. perhaps even more in his capacity for friendship did the real man appear. His home was the center to which returning brothers came, his welcome the reward for the long journey. To those of us who knew him best, a light has gone out. We have lost a friend.

Pennsylvania, fell dead while viewing the exhibits of the meeting of the American Scientists in Weightman Hall, University of Pennsylvania, on Thursday morning, December 30. The Rev. Mr. Moore was in his 76th year. He was born in Philadelphia, August 20, 1850.

While at Lafayette, Mr. Moore took an active interest in his work and extra-curriculum activities. was famed as one of the best debaters and orators in college. He stood high in his class scholastically, won the Douglas prize and the junior oratorical prize. He was a member of the  $\Phi \hat{\Delta} \Theta$  fraternity. After being graduated from Lafayette he entered the Methodist ministry and served congregations until when he entered the Presbyterian denomination. Lafavette conferred the degree of Doctor of Divinity on him in 1897.—The Lafavette

Judge C. R. Pence, Indiana, '79

Judge C. R. Pence, *Indiana*, '79, former judge of the circuit court of Jackson County, Missouri, died at Research Hospital, Kansas City, Missouri, January 8, 1927. He had been ill since last June and about three months ago underwent an operation as the result of a gall bladder condition.

Judge Pence was born in Miami County, Indiana, July 3, 1858. He was a graduate of Yale, receiving his A.B. degree in 1879, and was admitted to the bar at Indianapolis, Indiana, in 1882. Upon his admisison to the bar he practiced law in Peru, Indiana, and later was prosecuting attorney of Miami County.

He came to Kansas City in 1889, and shortly after coming here, he became associated in the practice of law with James Scammon and Henry Stubenrauch, the firm being Scammon, Stubenrauch & Pence. He remained with that firm until the fall of 1893, when he formed a partnership with Judge E. E. Porterfield. This partnership continued about eight years when it dissolved and Judge Pence began the practice of his profession alone. He practiced law alone until the fall of 1920, when he was elected on the Republican ticket to the circuit bench.

In the World War Judge Pence was chairman of the legal advisory board of division No. 9 at Kansas City. He was an earnest, close student of the law and had read papers and made addresses pertaining to legal matters before the bar association here and the state bar association.

In a paper read before a meeting of the state bar association at Joplin, Missouri, several years ago, Judge Pence, in pointing out some of the defects of our criminal code, said:

"The defects in our law can be corrected by the legislature without taking away any just right, privilege or immunity of any person charged with crime. Under our judicial system, a person charged with violating the law will be entitled to and will receive a fair and an impartial trial, and no one reasonably can ask for anything else. With the defects of the law corrected, the right of the state, and society which its represents, will receive much needed recognition."

Judge Pence leaves his widow, Mrs. Jean C. Pence, a daughter, Mrs. Katherine Mathews, both of the home; a brother, William Pence, Bunker Hill, Indiana, and a sister, Mrs. Minerva Jones, North Grove, Indiana.

He was well known to Phis in Kansas City as he had been prominent in the activities of the alumni club there.

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# Editorial

In this number of THE SCROLL will be found an illustrated description of the new chapter house of Missouri Beta at Westminster College, Fulton, Missouri. It will be seen that the house is a splendid one; one that would be a credit to any fraternity chapter on the continent.

Of particular interest, however, is the story of the wholehearted campaign which the alumni and active members of Missouri Beta made to properly finance and build the house. Such a story of loyalty and devotion with many instances of genuine sacrifice is exceptional in this day and age and is proof of the kind of men turned out by Westminster and colleges of its type.

While Missouri Beta has at present a large active chapter, the house is so financed that it will not be a burden to a group much smaller should conditions make it desirable to carry fewer men. There are places where this is not the case and we all know that it is a bad condition when a chapter, through financial necessity, is forced to carry a large number on its rolls.

The opening of the new Missouri Beta house precedes by a few weeks the completion of a fine new house on the Washington University campus by Missouri Gamma. We hope to print a descriptive story of it in the next Scroll. Missouri Alpha at the state university has been well housed for some time so that Phi Delta Theta is in an enviable position in the "show me" state.

Before leaving the subject, we should like to say that the fraternity has more or less of an ideal situation in Missouri. An old, well established chapter in a strong state university; a chapter with great traditions and an able body of alumni in an outstanding small college; and a firmly entrenched chapter in a city university which stands high in graduate and professional work.

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The college world is being rocked at this time by a series of under graduate suicides. All occurring in the last two months, the number has now reached thirteen and the situation is so alarming to some that the newspapers are inquiring earnestly for a cause and a remedy.

A prominent minister has attributed it to an increasing spirit of godlessness; an editor to the intensive modern study of psychology and psycho-

analytics; others have mentioned the complexity of modern life and the strain that is thrown upon the shoulders of the inexperienced. There have always been demented souls who look upon suicide as the only way out but there is no denying the connection between the unfortunate occurrences of the last sixty days. In other words, the publicity given to one helps create another.

We have always felt that the age of youth is not as rosy as older people like to picture it. The problems of youth are real and serious and there exists an uncertainty which is cause for much thought and worry. The youth worries about whether he will make good in college; whether he can land the mate of his choice; whether his marriage will be successful; whether he can get a good job and hold it, and a hundred and one other things which at times seem mountainous to him.

It is our duty in Phi Delta Theta to be sympathetic with the youth in our ranks. Active chapter officers should study the characters and problems of the brothers in their charge and help them over the rough places with the spirit which is taught us by the Bond. There is nothing like sympathetic understanding to one who is troubled.



Just as we go to press word comes of the death of William C. Levere, the Eminent Supreme Recorder of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, and editor of *The Record*, the magazine of that fraternity.

"Billie," as he was familiarly known, was one of the most lovable characters in fraternity work. His heart and soul were in the Greek-letter movement and he was one of the earliest men to see the value of proper interfraternity relations. He was possessed of much sentiment and the National Headquarters of Sigma Alpha Epsilon at Evanston are filled with many things, both little and big, which were collected by him because of their connection with some person or thing in the realm of Greekdom.

Long a good friend, we shall mourn his passing as we would one of our own.



Benjamin Harrison, *Miami*, '52, said at a province convention banquet in Indianapolis, March 13, 1896:

I was a member of Phi Delta Theta in its early days at Miami University, at that time probably the greatest educational institution west of the Alleghenies. I well remember my initiation, it was more impressive than a certain inauguration on March 4, 1889. We used to meet in John Knox Boude's room, over his father's store; it was one of those general stores where everything was sold—drygoods, groceries, nails and eggs.

Is the initiation which your chapter conducts impressive enough to bring forth such a statement? Isn't it worth while to leave an impression of this sort with the men you initiate? Rough house in initiations is unmanly, undignified, degrading, uncouth and directly opposed to the principles upon which Phi Delta Theta is founded. If it is a tradition in your chapter it is high time that such tradition be abolished.



It was our distinct privilege to be present at the initiation and initiation banquet given this year by Ohio Alpha. The initiation was conducted in an impressive, orderly manner and the chapter entered whole-heartedly into the ceremony with a most pleasing result.

About seventy brothers, including many alumni who had not returned to the chapter in years, sat down to a sumptuous dinner in the Memorial Chapter House. Past President Macauley, as toastmaster, conducted the program in an interesting, witty manner, and there was a feeling of inspiration which ran through the entire affair.

The locaton of the central office in Oxford and the fact that it is our mother chapter makes us very proud of the achievements of Ohio Alpha. Miami is an ideal fraternity institution, full of tradition and bubbling with atmosphere, and we predict that if the present program is continued, Phi Delta Theta will have a chapter there that can be pointed to all over the continent as a model. Then it will be a shrine in more ways than one.



# MISSOURI BETA'S NEW HOUSE

MISSOURI BETA at Westminster College, Fulton, occupied its new home on January 1. The building had been under construction


since the first of last July.

The new house, with ground and furnishings, represents a very large expenditure and it is a very fine asset to the fraternity. More than this, however, it represents the love—and in many cases the sacrifice—of nearly all the living alumni of the chapter. And its completion and occupancy brings to fruition the dreams of dauntless Phis who, believing in themselves and their fraternity, did that which to the conservative and the skeptical seemed impossible.

Standing at the corner of Westminster Avenue and West Fifth Street in Fulton, and facing the Westminster campus and the sentinel columns of old Westminster Hall, long since burned, the new chapter home occupies the best site in the city for a fraternity house. The ground, formerly owned by the college, was acquired from a sympathetic board of trustees who co-operated most liberally in financing the chapter's building program.

The new Phi house is of modified colonial design, three stories high above basement, and provides a perfect and complete home for thirty men. Plans for the structure were made by Austin H. Welch, an architect of St. Louis, and construction was by W. J. Cochran and Son, contractors of Booneville, Missouri.


On the main floor is a spacious entrance hall, a great living room at the south end, dining room, kitchen, pantry, and matron's quarters. The second and third floors are devoted exclusively to dormitory purposes. In the basement is a chapter meeting room and a large lounge room, both separated by concrete walls from the

furnace, coal storage bins, store-room, trunkroom and servants' lavatory.

There are fifteen bedrooms, each of which has accommodations for two men. Each of these rooms has two closets. Each of the dormitory floors is provided with a bathroom that con-

tains three showers and ample lava-

tory and toilet facilities.

Mat brick and cut stone were used in building the house. The roof is red tile. Hardwood was used for flooring throughout. Though \$5,000 has been spent for furnishings, considerable more will have to be expended before it can be said the house is completely furnished. The furnishings that have been bought, however, comport with the handsome new building, and in the course of a few years it is expected the home will be furnished in a first-class manner to the last detail.

Building of the new house was accomplished through the organization of a Chapter Home Association. A committee of Fulton alumni carried on the actual work of raising the money to finance the undertaking and also superintended the construction. This committee was composed of W. B. Whitlow, former president of Zeta Province, South, P.P.G.C. Elmer C. Henderson, Thomas H. Van Sant and Sam K. Black. They have worked faithfully through a period of many months, and as a result Missouri Beta Chapter has a beautiful

and commodious home that is really its own.

A reception and dance have already been given in the new house, and on February 22 a group of seventeen Phikeias will be initiated in it. The initiation ceremonies will be in charge of Brother John J. Tigert, president of the General Council of the fraternity, who will make a special trip from Washington to Fulton for the occasion.

Missouri Beta has given the national fraternity two presidents of its General Council—Charles F. Lamkin and Elmer C. Henderson. Two sons of Brother Lamkin are members of

the present active chapter.

Here in the city where Missouri Beta is located lies the body of Robert Morrison, one of the founders of the fraternity and the man who wrote its Bond. Brother Morrison in the latter years of his life lived in Fulton and in those years was a veritable godfather to the chapter.

The chapter was chartered in 1880 and altogether has initiated 377 men into the mysteries of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ . The present chapter has 40 members.

where he received his M.D. in '98. In 1900 he accepted a call to Williams as professor of Physiology. position enabled him to continue his academic studies, and the equivalent of two years' work was passed at Williams before the college year 1925-1926, when he was enrolled as a member of the senior class. Being registered as a regular student, he was now eligible to membership in the fraternity. In June, 1926, all three received their A.B.'s. Dr. Howard sat between his two sons at the Commencement exercises and when he rose in answer to his name the assembly broke into loud applause.

Being a physician, professor and senior all at once is a sufficient excuse for non-participation in extracurriculum activities, and consequently Dr. Howard's name does not appear on any of the teams or clubs. However, he was a participant in the World War, in which he saw active service in France. He was commissioned First Lieutenant in the Medical Corps in 1916 and had attained the rank of Major before his discharge in 1919. Following the war

he was recommissioned in the Officers Reserve Corps in which he now ranks as Lieutenant Colonel. At the present time Brother Howard is spending his sabbatical year in New York, where he is engaged in research work at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, Columbia University.

Edgerton was active as a member of the ski team and rifle club while at Williams. He is now studying for an M.D. at the College of Physicians and Surgeons. Paul, who turned his attention while in college to things musical, literary, dramatic and philosophical, has just given up his position on the reportorial board of the Troy Record to continue the study of philosophy at Columbia University.

This article would be incomplete without mention of Mrs. Howard, for to her the chapter is deeply indebted for the hospitality which she has always extended to the brothers. There is no exaggeration in saying that as a chaperon Mrs. Howard has no equal on the Williams campus, and that the excellent repuation enjoyed by Massachusetts Alpha in its houseparty conduct is very largely due to her.

# AN APPRECIATION OF PRESIDENT TIGERT

(President, George Washington University)

Son of Tennessee; distinguished as student, teacher and administrator in education; recipient of academic degrees from three American universities and from Oxford University, England, in the Honor School of Jurisprudence; first Rhodes

scholar from Tennessee; sometime professor in Central College and University of Kentucky and President of Kentucky Wesleyan College; now United States Commissioner of Education; an eminent scholar, an educational statesman, a warm hearted gentleman, a sympathetic and devoted public servant."

Thus spoke the President of Rhode Island State College as he conferred upon Dr. John James Tigert, United States Commissioner of Education, the degree of Doctor of Education.

Back on the campus at Vanderbilt they described him more briefly. When it was the last down and there were four yards to go the rooters demanded that the ball be given to "Faithful John." And according to the records preserved in the athletic archives, the name was well deserved.

John J. Tigert was on the football, basketball, baseball, and track squads at Vanderbilt. He played on the football team during the seasons from 1901 to 1904 and was selected as All Southern Halfback during this time. He was captain of the basketball team in 1903.

His athletic activities would have been the chief interest of the average student, but he was not an average student. He was elected to  $\Phi$  B K, was President of his class in his sophomore year, was honor graduate of the University in 1904 and was selected by the Faculty as commencement orator.

Then he was chosen as Rhodes Scholar from Tennessee. At Oxford he represented Pembroke College in football, cricket, rowing, and tennis.

When first ordered out for rowing at Oxford, instead of appearing in white shorts and white sweater which it was customary for candidates to wear, Tigert appeared in black shorts and wearing a black jersey with a large gold "V."

The captain looked him over in a puzzled way and then, turning to another American student, said, "What does that mean?" The American replied, "That's Vanderbilt." "Oh," said the captain, "he must be very wealthy."

This incident did not deter him from making the team. He won a cup in the boat races at Oxford.

Tigert's athletic interests were not confined to his student days for he



later became athletic director and head coach at the University of Kentucky, developing teams during three years which lost but four games and which defeated some of the strong Western Conference teams. Today he continues his interest in all forms of games, officiating occasionally at football contests, and demonstrating on the courts that he was once a champion tennis player.

In the field of education John J. Tigert's name stands high. He was professor of Philosophy at Central College, Missouri, then President of Kentucky Wesleyan College, then professor of Philosophy and Psychology at the University of Kentucky, going from this position to become United States Commissioner of Education in

1921.

During his teaching days America entered the war and he devoted himself to educational work with the American Expeditionary Forces in France.

Since becoming Commissioner of Education he has demonstrated constructive leadership and sound, progressive ideas in education. He has organized his Bureau on a thoroughgoing basis, has increased the service it renders to the schools of the country, and has been untiring in giving

of himself to worthy educational projects in all parts of the land.

Brother Tigert is in great demand as a speaker, having the ability to present ideas with a philosophy and with a touch of humor which make permanent impressions.

While in the University of Kentucky he did some very interesting work along the line of psychology in advertising which attracted the attention of business men to the fact that the college professor is not always as visionary as they supposed him to be.

Since becoming Commissioner of Education John J. Tigert has had many interesting and notable associations. He was in the party which went with President Harding to Alaska and saw much of the President during that journey which had such a tragic ending.

Brother Tigert needs no introduction to the members of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ . Ever since he joined the Fraternity he has been active in it and in the years out of college he has constantly worked for its highest interests. His ideals of clean sport, sound scholarship and high character have always been reflected in his fraternity associations.

There is no question but that under his leadership the Fraternity will take many forward steps.




### UTAH PHIS PLAY IN HONOLULU

As the ship pulled into the pier a band was playing "Aloha" in an impressive manner and as we stepped on the gang plank representatives of the University of Hawaii, city\_officials, members of the Honolulu Utah Club dropped leis (Hawaiian symbol of welcome) around the necks of every squad member.


Immediately after the ceremonies were completed we went out to Wahiawa, a little town about twenty miles from Honolulu. We were quartered here until the day of the game which was December 18. The

following days in Honolulu we stayed at the Moana Hotel on Waikiki Beach.

Utah defeated Hawaii 17 to 7, this being the first time the home team had ever been defeated by a mainland eleven. Washington, Washington State, Oregon, Oregon Aggies, the San Francisco Olympic Club, Colorado Aggies, and Colorado are among the teams that were forced to bow to

the Deans in previous years.

Speaking of football, the day following the Utah-Hawaii game the Mollili team, champions of the Island of Oahu and the Maui eleven from Hilo on the Island of Hawaii clashed for the inter-island barefoot championship which was won by Oahu 7 to 6 in a spectacular game. The players wore no uniforms whatever and were barefooted, doing all the kicking with their bare feet even to place kicking, punting and kicking off. The boys averaged around thirty-five or forty yards punting and their attempts at placements and drops would compare favorably with any American high school players.

The Utes were guests at all sorts of parties and entertainments some of which were especially unique. A luau, or native feast, was one of the queerest of all the things seen during our stay in the islands. When we arrived at the home of Harold Kay, former University of Utah football player and a member of B  $\Theta$   $\Pi$ , we were taken to the scene of the feast. The table was situated beneath a large palm tree and was heaped with food which included all sorts and varieties of tropical fruits, poi (a substance which looks like paste and tastes worse), baked fish and several other things which are quite impossible to spell. After all of this food had been disposed of, the last course was brought on which consisted of barbecued dog. To finish up, large mugs of okoleau (Hawaiian moonshine) were passed around and the natives drank until it was impossible for them

to get about. A number of the Utah men took part in the luau but drew the line at the barbecued dog. One of the features of the entertainment was a sword dance which was given by a Fiji Islander; the man was truly an artist in his profession.

Through the courtesy of the Hawaiians, sight seeing trips were taken to all parts of the island, Pearl Harbor, the United States Naval Base, and Schofield Barracks.

Knute Rockne, famous coach of Notre Dame, was on the boat with the Utahns coming from San Francisco and also officiated the game. Mr. Rockne told many of his interesting football stories for which he is

well known.

The Utes departed for San Francisco on December 18 aboard the *Maui* and landed on December 28 arriving in Salt Lake on December 29,

# A PHI RADIO PIONEER

THE newly elected president of the National Association of Broadcasters is none other than Earle C. Anthony, California, '03, automobile dealer and radio impresario of Los Angeles, California. The call, "KFI Radio Central Super Station of Earle C. Anthony, Inc., California Packard Distributors," has been heard around the world. KFI is the only American station ever heard in England by rebroadcast and is probably the one station familiar to the majority of music lovers in the western half of the United States and Canada.

Becoming vitally interested in radio broadcast in the early part of 1922, Brother Anthony first went on the air on Easter Sunday, 1922, with a little home-made fifty watt set. Later in 1922 a 500 watt Western Electric set

was installed and KFI became the medium for many wonderful programs and its reputation was made. In January, 1925, a 5000 watt Western Electric set was put into operation and the station became one of the best in the country, there being but three others of equal wattage in the United States at that time. It remains the most powerful broadcast medium in the West, and because of its high wave-length can be tuned in from great distances with little interference.

Brother Anthony's election to the presidency of the National Association of Broadcasters is well deserved and reflects great credit on the Pacific Coast as well as upon himself. Although his station is far from being self-supporting its director may feel well repaid through the appreciation

of thousands of shut-ins, residents of secluded hamlets, mountain canyons, desert settlements and homes of the poor, where otherwise the great enjoyment and inspiration of music

might never be known.

Brother Anthony became connected with his father in the automobile business immediately after leaving the college campus, but spent most of the first five years in writing. Several of his plays were produced in the East which shows that his aspirations along those lines were serious. California Motor Car Company and the Western Motor Car Company, as the organization was known in some if its early stages, had the agency for the Packard motor car in Southern California only. In 1912 the name was changed to Earle C. Anthony, Incorporated, and Brother Anthony took over the reins. The elder Anthony died in 1913, very soon after which the company became the sole Packard distributors for California.

Brother Anthony was born at Washington, Illinois, on December 18, 1880. He attended the public schools there and then came to Los

Angeles in 1890 where he completed a course in the Los Angeles High School. He attended the University of California at Berkeley and was graduated in 1903 with the degree of Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering. He was initiated into  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  in 1899 and has been a close follower of fraternity affairs since.

He married Miss Irene Kelly of Los Angeles in 1908 and has a son fourteen years of age whose sole aspiration at present is to attend the University of California in order to take part in a football game against Stanford. We trust that he shall become as great a credit to  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  as his

father.

Brother Anthony is a member of the California Club of Los Angeles, the Midwick Country Club, the Writers of Hollywood, the Bohemian Club of San Francisco, the Burlingame Country Club, the San Mateo-Burlingame Polo Club, the Detroit Athletic Club, President of Earle C. Anthony, Inc., and a Director of the Pan American Bank of California and the Pacific States Bond and Mortgage Company.

most zealous trustees, distinguished alumni and loyal friends, and Vermont Alpha its most prominent alumnus and one of its most loyal brothers. Death cut off a career that was notable in many ways, but in none so much as in his unselfish devotion and extensive service to his University and Vermont Alpha. He and Brother Moore, *Vermont*, '90, whose untimely death is recorded in the follow-

ing article, were two of the most generous contributors to Vermont Alpha's beautiful new marble home.

· Brother Stewart was born in East Wallingford, Vt., April 25, 1870. He prepared for college at Goddard Seminary at Barre, Vt., entering college in the fall of 1889. He was one of the editors of the Cynic, was prominent in all college activities catcher on the Varsity baseball team for four years, being captain of same his senior year. He has always been recognized as one of the best, if not the best, catcher Vermont ever had, its teams during his college career being among the best in the country. It is worthy of note that as an athlete he was foremost in a group who established ideals of sportsmanship, of clean living, and manly, generous competition, which have persisted to this day at Vermont. He was elected to Φ B K upon his graduation in 1893.

He entered Harvard Law School the fall of 1893, graduating in 1896, receiving the degree of LL.B. formed a law partnership in Worcester, Mass., with George S. Taft, later District Attorney of Worcester County, and Ernest Morgan, Vermont 1891, City Solicitor of Worcester. In January, 1902, he became Assistant Attorney General of Massachusetts, serving under Attorney Generals Knowlton and Herbert Parker, rendering very valuable service for the Commonwealth for nearly three years in trials of important cases growing out of the taking of land for the Metropolitan Water and Sewerage Works. He was a recognized expert in that field and became proficient in complicated valuation cases of various kinds.

three hundred eighty-seven]

In the fall of 1904 he became a partner with Charles F. Choate, Jr., and John L. Hall under the firm name of Choate, Hall & Stewart, and practiced law continuously at Boston until his death, June 18, 1926, from arteriosclerosis. For the last quarter of a century this firm has been recognized as one of the leading law firms in New England.

Brother Stewart was prominent as a corporation lawyer and had been counsel for the Boston & Albany Railroad and the New York Central Railroad, gaining an enviable reputation as legal adviser to utilities—a reputation enhanced by his masterly conduct of the New England Telephone Co.'s rate cases before the Massachusetts and Rhode Island Commissions. The strain of these last two cases undoubtedly hastened his death.

During the World War he was a member of the Red Cross Commission to Switzerland. One of the principal duties of this commission was the care and feeding of and communication with American prisoners of war in German prison camps. Brother Stewart was first deputy and then acting commissioner. He was sent to Rome and London on important missions, and after the Armistice he went to prison camps in southern Germany and arranged for the release of American prisoners. His work with the commission was exceptionally notable.

Brother Stewart was for a time a director of the Boston Chamber of Commerce; he was for many years trustee of the Brookline Public Library; he was also a director of the New England Telephone Co. since 1921; a member of the Alumni Council of the University of Vermont five years, being chairman the last year; was a Trustee of the University of Vermont since 1921, having been elected a permanent trustee in 1920. His alma mater conferred on him the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws in 1920.

He was a growing man. He chose a difficult profession, and year by year by dint of perseverance, fairness and

untiring effort to get at underlying principles and truths, he made his way to its very summit. He first commanded men's confidence, then their love and last he won their unbounded admiration. A member of the New England Telephone Co., writing of him, said: "It was not his great knowledge of the law that made the most profound impression. Neither was it the keenness of his mind as it cut to the heart of a problem, nor the breadth of his vision, nor yet the soundness of his judgment. It was not even his sure grasp of strange technical detail, the rapier-thrust of his cross-examinations, or the convincing clarity of his arguments. These things had our admiration, in fact, compelled it. But as those days of stress slip into the past, the figure that stands out strong and clear against the fading background is less Stewart the advocate, more Stewart the man. Kindly, considerate, comradely, however heavy the hour's responsibility, Ralph Stewart made the least of his associates a friend. And somehow we think that he, himself, would treasure the heartfelt words of one of them: 'We shall not see a better fellow in our day."

To the brothers who knew and associated with him as a student, and loved him for his sterling qualities, his death came with all the poignancy of a personal bereavement. His devotion to  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ , manifested by a never-flagging interest in Vermont Alpha, will be cherished as among the finest traditions of the fraternity. "Ralph," as he was affectionately known by his associates, exemplified the finest ideals of manhood, and of fraternity in the broader sense. had a genius for friendship; he won the unbounded confidence of all with whom he came in contact; and upon that well-merited confidence, as upon a sure corner-stone of his character, he built his career.

Yet after all has been said we realize the strength and beauty of this well-balanced life was best shown in his home and family. On October 25,

1899, he married Mary W. Guilford. of Yonkers, N.Y., who, with four sons, Guilford, Ralph A., Jr., Robert Wallace and Malcolm Chilson, survive him.

Brother Stewart's funeral was held June 21, 1926, from All Saints Episcopal Church, Brookline, Mass., of which he was a member of the vestry. Vermont Alpha was represented by Brothers Thos. C. Cheney, '91, and Roy L. Patrick, '98, intimate friends

of Brother Stewart.

In spite of his active professional career. Brother Stewart gave pleasure to his friends by writing occasional verse of happy quality, two volumes of which have been published. A most fitting close to this sketch is found in his poem, entitled:

To My Sons

When comes my time for sleeping, I ask no kindly tears. Comrades, instead of weeping, Recall the vanished years When we, with kindling faces, And hearts brimful of joy, Lived in the silent places The life for man and boy.

The first faint flush of morning, The voices of the night, The long tramps, comfort scorning, The ruffled grouse in flight; The roaring of the river, The forests cool and vast, The water plants that quiver As light canoes shoot past.

The sharp crack of the rifle, The singing of the reel, The city thoughts we stifle, The joy of life we feel; The camp fire sparks ascending While only nature speaks, The dream of trails unending Beyond the distant peaks.

So when you find me sleeping I ask no loving tears. You have within your keeping Brave thoughts of happy years. With smiling youthful faces Speak of our old-time joy When in the distant places We toiled as man and boy.

Frank L. Moore, Vermont, '00

Frank Leslie Moore, Vermont, '90, of Springfield, Mass., passed away in his sleep at Hotel Belmont, New York City, January 9, 1926. The first intimation of his death was his failure to keep the day's appointment with a number of men prominent in the pulp and paper business, who were stopping at the Belmont. His untimely death came as a great shock to his family

and his host of warm friends throughout the country. Brother Moore was born at Shoreham, Vermont, December 20, 1867. While attending the University of Vermont he was recognized as the best business man in college, and was made business manager of the Cynic, the college weekly, the Ariel, the annual publication, and the varsity baseball team. He made a marked success of all.

Immediately after his graduation Brother Moore entered the employ of the Ticonderoga Pulp and Paper Co., of New York, in a clerical capacity, in the meantime absorbing much valu-

able information about the operations of a paper mill. At the end of three years he went to Watertown, N.Y., with the C. R. Remington Paper Co., remaining with them until their mills were sold to the International Paper Co., who retained Brother Moore as general manager of the Glen Park Mills and later as general superintend-In 1911 he resigned this position to become general manager of Raymondville Paper Co., of Raymondville, N.Y., later becoming treasurer and general manager of the Newton Falls Paper Co. From 1920 to 1924 he traveled throughout the country as an appraiser of mills. 1924 he bought the mills of the Westfield River Paper Co., located at Russell, Mass.

There is hardly a paper manufacturer in the United States who did not know Frank L. Moore, at least by name. From his long association with the American Pulp & Paper Association, of which he was president at one time, and the other associations of paper manufacturers in which he was interested, he had come to have an acquaintance in the paper trade which few men have. He was recognized as an authority on forest matters and on forest conservation. For eight years he was president of the Empire State Forest Products Assoc., and had much to do with framing the standard national forestry bill.

Brother Moore was a director of the Jefferson County National Bank at Watertown and the Pine Waste Products Co. of New York. two years he served as president of the Watertown Chamber of Com-He was a trustee of the House of the Good Samaritan and a member of the Alumni Council of the University of Vermont. He was also a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Watertown, N.Y. Brother Moore was a member of the Watertown Commandery, Knights Templar, of all the bodies of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rites and Media Temple A.A.O.N.M.S. He was potentate of the latter and had represented that organization at each Imperial Council since 1918, when he was first elected potentate to serve three years.

A member of his family wrote the writer of this article, who was in college with Brother Moore three years, editor of the *Cynic* with him and a member of the varsity baseball team which he managed, that he had always lived an absolutely irreproachable life. What finer tribute could be paid one?

He married June 22, 1899, Mabel B. Bachman, of Carthage, N.Y. Mrs. Moore and four children survive, two of whom were associated with their father in the Westfield River Paper Co.

Chemical Co., of Springfield, N.I., which later became the Ætna Artificial Leather Co., of which Mr. Williams was made superintendent. He was married October 11, 1892, to Lena Ferrin, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. C. M. Ferrin, of Essex Junction, Vt., who survives him, as does a daughter, Marion, wife of Dr. G. W. Baker, of New York City. Brother Williams was a 32nd degree Mason and had been an elder in the Presbyterian Church of Stamford for nearly thirty years. "Those who knew Mr. Williams," says the Stamford Advocate, "found in him a true friend, and in his rugged character a reflection of the majestic hills of his native state. A man with a warm and sympathetic heart, a generous spirit, a keen sense of justice and love for honesty and truth, he won the admiration of all with whom he came in contact." No student of his time at Vermont was more popular or better loved than was "Ned" Williams and his death comes with all the poignancy of a personal bereavement to a host of old-time friends.

The Boston Transcript for February 14, 1927, contains the following account of a sterling Phi who has joined the Chapter Grand:

Alfred W. Dickinson of Newton High School died this morning at two o'clock, following an operation at the Newton Hospital. This sad news came as a terrific shock to Boston lovers of sport, for Dickinson, who has been head coach of football and baseball at Newton High since 1909, was one of the best known coaches of schoolboy athletes in Massachusetts, a man revered for his sterling character, his marvelous influence upon his boys and for his positive sportsmanship.

Mr. Dickinson was forty-two years old, a graduate of Somerville High School and Brown University, class of 1907. His death was due to peritonitis, fol-

lowing stomach ulcers. He is survived by a widow, Ethel R. Dickinson, and a son, Alfred W., Jr. The funeral, which will be strictly private, is planned for next Wednesday. On the same day a memorial service for the veteran coach is planned at the Newton High School building.

As a builder of men and as a builder of championship athletic teams, A. W. Dickinson has never been surpassed in local schoolboy annals. Dickinson was known as "Allie." He was the outstanding coach in the Suburban Interscholastic League for the last two years both as to length of service and type of achievement.

### Francis Marion Griffith, Franklin, '74

Funeral services for Brother Francis Marion Griffith, Franklin, '74, were held at the home in Vevay, Indiana, Thursday, February 10, following his death there Tuesday, February 8.

Brother Griffith was one of the early members of Indiana Delta at Franklin College, and succeeded Brother William S. Holman, Franklin, '40, as representative from the Fourth Indiana in the United States House of Representatives in the late '90's. He had formerly been county school superintendent of Switzerland county, county treasurer, state senator, and, as president of that body, succeeded Ira J. Chase as lieutenant governor of Indiana in 1897.

Brother Griffith retired voluntarily from Congress after one term and in 1904 was elected judge of the Fifth judicial circuit and served until October 23, 1921. Since that time, he practiced law in Vevay. Brother Griffith and his wife celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1924. The widow and five children survive. The deceased was 77 years of age at his death.

According to George Ade, in the Magazine of  $\Sigma$  X, no man should be even by implication asked to join a Greek letter society in a good institution until he has had a chance to show that he can stand the gaff of fraternity life and has formed some definite ambitions other than watching electric street lamps at night and until he has been given a sufficient time in which to decide which herd he wishes to run with. He goes on to say that he does not believe that the fraternities can pick out the comers by inspecting a lot of high school kids, that the desirable freshmen cannot be sorted out within two days they have arrived He believes that a great campus. many of the criticisms which are now directed against the chapter houses and the fraternity system in general could be made ineffective if the youngsters were compelled to earn their memberships in the good fra-ternities instead of being taught that they can get in on their neckwear or through the pull of influential alumni. Mr. Ade realizes that this would involve a great deal of difficult work, but believes that it is a mistake to confer the supposedly sacred boon of membership on a lot of boys of pleasing appearance of whom no one knows anything very definite.

Dr. Francis W. Shepardson, esteemed president of B  $\Theta$  II, delivered a speech at the 1926 convention of  $\Phi$   $\Sigma$  K. His comment on a fraternity man contains valuable advice.

I never saw—I do not believe I ever saw—a hundred per cent fraternity man. Most all of them are fifty per cent. If

we could just push that average up to sixty, seventy, eighty, or ninety per cent of the fraternity life that we talk about in our idealism, we should actually change the whole scope of the American college life. Ah yes, we should change the whole character of the thought of the American people of tomorrow. I appeal to you for spirituality in your chapter life, for the finer things that are represented in the motto, the badge, the grip, the song, the group where perhaps not a single word is said. . . . . I am not sure that the American college fraternity is going to endure. I do not know what obstacles there are before it. I do know this: that if every fraternity man would live up to his ideals there would be no complaint on the part of the deans, no questioning on the part of boards of trustees; there would be only satisfaction, and everybody would register the conviction that the college fraternity is one of the most useful institutions ever introduced into American college life.

Some things every chapter should have, according to Bruce McIntosh,  $\Lambda$  X A, are incorporated in the following eleven items:

1. An automatic suspension clause rigidly enforced.

2. A thoroughly planned system of pledge training.

3. A thorough bookkeeping system. (The Universal Accounting System, planned by a certified public accountant especially for Lambda Chi chapters, is inexpensive, simple, comprehensive, flexible, and scientific. Forms may be obtained from the central office.)

4. À definite scholarship policy. (There should be a reasonable scholastic requirement for initiation. There should be a rigid study hour

rule and this should be absolutely enforced. Emphasis should be placed

on freshman guidance.)

5. A definite policy (adopted early in the year before the sophomores become too blood thirsty) governing freshman discipline. (Plan something, anything, which will do away with brutality and vulgarity in rough initiation, so called. The pledge court idea and the assignment of useful tasks about the house are helpful in getting away from crude practices. Don't confuse chapter entertainment, freshman discipline, and initiation. The three things are separate and distinct.)

6. A well organized set of files. (The central office supplies a set of file labels which will aid you in organizing your own system.)

7. A chapter library. (There should be a chapter librarian, and he should be charged with taking good care of

all chapter books.)

8. A good set of ritualistic equipment. (Buy at least a few pieces each year. Don't continue using a

makeshift set.)

9. Greater ritualistic emphasis. (A special degree team is a great help, for members retaining the same parts for several years can be expected to memorize them. See that the traveling secretary reviews the Greek phrases when he calls. Make the ritual a solemn, serious and dramatic performance which will have a lasting effect.)

10. Greater alumni contact. (Send the alumni newsy reports frequently. Elaborate printed periodicals are unnecessary. Inexpensive mimeographed news sheets issued monthly are far better than costly printed booklets issued quarterly or an-

nually )

11. Coöperation with national officers.

 $\Phi \Sigma$  K soon will increase its chapter roll to forty-six, with two chapters having units working under the same charter at branches of the same

university in two different cities. The bicameral chapters are at Union in New York with chapters at the medical college in Albany and the academic department in Schenectady, and at the University of Maryland, with chapters at the professional departments in Baltimore and at the academic department in College Park.

The committee on internal improvements of  $\Theta$  K N has sent out a questionnaire to every chapter in the fraternity. The questions have been sent in the belief that the greatest good will be accomplished if every chapter will contribute its experiences and suggestions.

### A Philosopher's Faith in Youth

In the midst of the flood of cynical criticism of college students and lamentation about the degeneracy of the present generation it is cheering and comforting to get a clear word from a great man who has been for many years in close relation with college students. President William Lowe Bryan of the University of Indiana recently made the following remarks:

Once when I was an undergraduate I received a letter from George William Curtis, a notable man of letters, statesman and journalist. I had written asking for information and telling him of my adherence to a cause of which he was the outstanding leader. In his reply he said: "When a cause has the devotion of young men it is already victorious."

I would exchange all the immediate definite things I desire for Indiana University for the devotion of our undergraduates to the future ideal University which our state should have. Just what it would be they would discover.

It would I think be physically splendid as Athens was splendid, but more than

that.

It would I believe be a source of enlightenment and guidance for a great industrial civilization, but something more than that.

It would be a place "habitable by scholars" and by artists, home of learning, home of beauty, and something more.

It would be a good community of good men and good women—a good world in little—a living answer to the prayer "Thy Kingdom Come."

### Professional College Athletes

One of the most vicious practices of present-day collegiate sports is the maintenance of athletes by fraternity chapters because of perverted senses of college loyalty. Too often large sums of money, sometimes in direct payments, are involved throughout the year; and in some cases we have known chapters to have been on the verge of bankruptcy because of their "liberality."

The practice shows itself in a most pronounced form when a chapter admits into its brotherhood and supports, or contributes largely to the support of, men absolutely uncongenial to the average member of the chapter, men whom most of the brothers would hesitate to introduce into their homes.

On the other hand we can readily countenance a chapter's undergraduates and alumni creating a fund that will enable some worthy member a real man

enable some worthy member, a real man, a leader in the chapter and on the campus, complete his course. If he has athletic ability, well and good, but that qualification must needs be secondary.

The average red-blooded American inherently admires one of athletic skill, but he does not admire the "sponger." Too often the professionalized college athlete is just that, although certainly not every man who has had financial assistance, sometimes only as a loan, is one. We have seen some of the latter type, admirable men, who have worked unselfishly on the athletic field, in their campus activities, and for their chapters to their own financial detriment. We have the greatest respect for them. —Purple, Green, and Gold of Λ X Λ

Among the alumni of the local initiated when Kappa Sigma installed its chapter at North Dakota University were Governor Sorlie, and his son.

The Arch Council of  $\Delta$  T  $\Delta$  in September adopted a resolution that no petitions for charters would be granted before the meeting of the Karnea (National Convention) in September, 1927, and recommends that no charters be granted before the Karnea of 1929. This action

is the more surprising because  $\Delta$  T  $\Delta$  in the last three years has added eight new chapters to its roll, a larger number than any other well established fraternity.

The Arch Council also took stern measures affecting chapters which are falling below standard. Five chapters are placed on probation for two years with the requirement "To maintain a position of definite leadership," failing which, their charters will be withdrawn. Seven other chapters were advised that they must maintain better standards as to scholarship, finances, and general condition or face an investigation leading to probation. One chapter already on probation is given until February, 1927, to meet certain conditions or voluntarily surrender its charter. Still another chapter now on probation on charges involving drinking and general demoralization has been placed under a chapter adviser as dictator.—Rainbow

The following quotation from the Chi Phi Chakett commenting upon the cheapening of fraternity membership by the multiplication of social and socialed honor fraternities will doubtless strike a responsive chord in the bosoms of some:

After all, why should we, members of probably the oldest American college fraternity, care how much the use of Greek letters is vulgarized in lesser institutions? If this multiplication has, indeed, lowered the distinctiveness of our badge in the public eye, we have only to remind ourselves that we did not join our precious fraternity to please the public.

 $\Sigma$  N has adopted a new rule that pledges must make a scholastic average above their college average before they may be initiated. If he fails to do so his pledge is automatically broken. Furthermore, any member who fails to meet this standard is to be suspended.

The universities composing the "Big Ten" conferred over 13,000 degrees at the 1926 commencements. This is 2,000 more degrees than were conferred in 1925.

At Columbia fourteen of the fifteen fraternities taking highest scholastic rank were Jewish fraternities.



Θ E which since its foundation in 1864 has limited its membership to students in engineering has abolished this restriction and become a general fraternity.

K K  $\Gamma$  has offered a handsome cup to be awarded for chapter efficiency under almost identically the conditions governing the award of our Harvard Trophy.

### White, of Kansas, on Education

Four thousand young people are on this campus who believe they want an education. Some of them really desire it; a few will get it. Most of them will get something else. Many will get grades and a knowledge of text books. More than many will get degrees from the various schools. Nearly every one will get some knowledge of the social amenities which is as good a substitute for an education as they can carry. But only a precious few will get an education.

An education is not a lot of assorted information upon various academic subjects. An education is the blessing of the man or woman who has a mind and a heart so trained that he can look at both sides of a proposition; can accept and digest the best available information upon the subject and so can distinguish the true from the false, the real from the sham. Unless a student graduating from college has formed a habit of facing reality, refusing to be deceived by sentimentality and has acquired a trained nose for sensing shams, he is a boor and a dullard no matter how many Phi Beta Kappa keys he jangles; how well he can dance; or how many degrees he tacks after his name.

Books and texts will help the wise; but they only befuddle the fool. If the University of Kansas this year turns into the life of this state four hundred wise young men and women, it will have more than justified the state in its endeavors, and will have surprised delightfully its saner friends! A writer in the Chi Phi Chakett traces to a common origin the X  $\Phi$  Fraternity, and, through the Philadelphian Society, the American Tract Society, the American Bible Society, and the Intercollegiate Young Men's

Christian Association. A society. known as the  $X \Phi$  "Chapel" was organized at Princeton, December 24. 1824. This is the date whose centennial X Φ celebrated two years ago, though the actual connection with the present fraternity and the Princeton society is more or less conjectural. A period of thirty years elapsed between the death of the Princeton society and the establishment of the first chapter of the present  $X \Phi$ . membership of the earlier order are not known to the later organization. It is upon this rather slender connection that  $X \Phi$  bases its claim to be the American fraternity. usually recognized as the first fraternity, whose membership succession is unquestioned, dates from 1825.

The size of an ideal chapter, according to Dr. Francis F. Bradshaw, veteran dean of students at North Carolina, after he had received the views of sixty national officers of fraternities on this subject, is as follows:

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# Editorial

The editor of *The Rainbow* of Delta Tau Delta so well expresses our thoughts in the following editorial that we are giving it to you "as is."

Gentlemen, the Fraternity is compelled to throw the old hat into the ring.

About liquor, it is.

Not about drinking in the chapter houses. We are flatfooted enough about that. Inquire if you are uninformed. But about the alumnus who gets these boys out and drinks with them—most of all about the man, alumnus or active, who feels that he cannot attend a dinner or a conference or a Karnea (convention) without slipping a couple of pints or quarts into his hip pocket or into the suitcase.

This is the sort of thing that cannot be handled delicately. You must either face the situation squarely, or you must let it alone. And to face it squarely is hard. To talk out hurts. But, gentlemen of the alumni, the Fraternity is obliged to be much more vitally concerned about these boys and its own corporate morality than it is about any one of us, or any dozen of us. We must be the first to admit that.

And here is another Karnea (convention) coming.

Twice within the last few months younger members of the Fraternity, when charged with having violated our anti-liquor law, have made the statement, which can hardly be called an excuse, that their first introduction to the Fraternity-at-large was at a gathering where drinking seemed not to be discountenanced and men high in the councils of the Fraternity were setting the pace—that they had unconsciously come to associate drinking with a good fraternity celebration.

What right have we to discipline any younger member for taking his cue from a man to whom we have entrusted the welfare of the Fraternity and upon whom we have heaped Fraternity honors? This is not a personal aspersion. There have been enough cases of this kind in recent years to relieve the statement of any particular identification. To attempt to disguise

the fact would be hypocrisy and dishonesty.

If we older men believe in Delta Tau Delta and want her to stand for something that will be vitally uplifting to the college men of today, are we not honest and unselfish enough to face this issue fairly and squarely? Are we not loyal enough to do for Delta Tau Delta what we expect others to do for her?

Whether or not a man drinks is his own private affair, determined largely by whatever concessions his patriotism and his instinct for obedience to his country's laws may be willing to make to his personal desires. But when a man identifies his drinking with his fraternity, it ceases to be his own private affair; it immediately becomes the business of everyone who is sensitive to



the influence exerted by his fraternity upon its younger members. And when the example of an older man encourages or induces a younger man to something that those most interested in him would deplore, or when he has even slight responsibility for breaking down the idealism of some youngster to whom he has held out the hand of a brother, his performance ceases to be merely a display of sporting disregard of the law; it falls into a category that is not described in any ritualism of brotherhood that we know of.



Phi Delta Theta's prowess in basketball this year we would say is above the average. The Scroll is again fortunate in having the services of Denis H. Grady, De Pauw, '10, for the selection of All-Phi teams and a review of the season. He will be remembered as a former successful coach of Northwestern athletic teams and he is a thorough student of the game.

Brother Grady's article in this number shows the result of considerable labor and thought on his part and we are extremely grateful to him as we know our readers will be. We look forward to the time when his son, who is shown as mascot of the All-Phi teams this year, will be a playing member and repeat some of the records of his illustrious father.

We enjoyed the privilege of appearing with Assistant Secretary Ball on the program of the Minneapolis Alumni Club's celebration of Founders' Day. And it is a real privilege to be entertained in Minneapolis where the Alumni Club functions at a degree of efficiency which closely approaches 100 per cent.

Minnesota Alpha took an active part in the celebration and it is easy to see that the splendid condition of that chapter, year after year, is due in no small measure to the co-operation which it receives from the Alumni Clubs of the Twin Cities. The members of other chapters who live in Minneapolis and St. Paul have in effect, adopted Minnesota Alpha as their own and the example which they set in this regard might well be imitated by alumni in other places.

A very interesting feature of the dinner was the presence of two staunch old Phis of the sixties, S. E. Mahan, *Indiana*, '69, and Alfred M. Shuey, *Miami*, '66. Such brothers as these represent to us the true spirit of Phi Delta Theta.

President Tigert of the General Council addressed the alumni at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, March 14 and New York, March 15 at their Founders' Day banquets. Three active chapters joined in the celebration at Harrisburg. He reports that these banquets were well attended and live affairs.

Brothers J. C. McReynolds and Dwight Davis sent messages to the New York banquet. These letters are printed on the opposite page of this number of The Scroll because in the words of Brother Tigert, "they seemed to me to be quite worth while and have an import which relates to all of the fraternity."

Dear Dr. Tigert:

I regret that official duties will prevent my being present at the Founders' Day Banquet of the New York Phi Delta Theta Alumni Club on March fifteenth. However, it is a pleasure for me to forward the following message in conformity with

your request:

"I regret that press of official business prevents my attendance at the Founders' Day Banquet of Phi Delta Theta tonight. The longer I remain in public life, the greater is my realization of the value of the spirit of fraternalism instilled into the college youth in his most formative period by the ritual and ideals of the Greek-letter societies. The inculcation of the spirit of brotherhood in the college youth is of immeasurable benefit to him in developing that tolerance and stability so essential to success in the world of business and statecraft. While comparatively small in numbers, the members of the college Greek-letter fraternities have held a very unusual proportion of the highest offices in the gift of the people. The Phi Delta Theta badge, for instance, was worn by President Benjamin Harrison, Vice-President Adlai Stevenson, and statesmen, ambassadors, jurists, national legislators, and state executives in numbers too great to mention.

"The patriotism and loyalty to fraternity, college, and nation, instilled into the college fraternity man, has also found expression in the unanimity with which they have answered the call to arms in time of national peril. Need more evidence of this patriotism be presented than to recall that after the Civil War only five active chapters remained on the rolls of Phi Delta Theta, and that the late war saw the depletion of the active membership of practically every chapter in our fraternity? Major General Frederic Funston and Major General Edgar Jadwin, the present Chief of Engineers, are outstanding examples of members of Phi Delta Theta whose patriotic achievements in the military service of the country, in peace and war, have added lustre to the fraternity's history. There is every reason, then, to honor those broad-visioned founders who recognized the value of the spirit of fraternalism as expressed in the organization

"My sincere and fraternal greetings go out to every brother attending your Founders' Day Banquet tonight, and to the thousands of members of the fraternity who, the world over, as undergraduates and alumni, are benefiting from the lessons

of fraternalism and brotherhood indoctrinated by Phi Delta Theta."

Future Phis are now playing on those small town teams, and are moulding characters and learning to play the game in a manly way. Basketball is a great sport for everyone and is taking hold as football did


many years ago.



found at a good game.





### INSTALLATION DANCE



Then the new members of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  and their guests went to the chapter house where the chapter was installed.





### West Virginia University

West Virginia University, the home of the ninety-sixth chapter of Phi Delta Theta installed on March 12, is the state university and a coeducational institution with 2,500 students. It is located at Morgantown, West Virginia, just sixty miles south of Pittsburgh on the Monongahela River.

The institution itself is 133 years old although it has been the state university for only fifty-nine years.

Monongalia Academy was founded at Morgantown in 1814. For fifty-four years the Academy was the leading educational institution in the state. Taking advantage of the national land grant act the state legislature converted the Academy into the state university in 1868.

Since that time the University has progressed until now it is typical of the best in eastern United States higher education. It draws its student body of 2,500, which has increased approximately 100 each year for the past five years, from twenty-one different states and four nations. The

University is composed of the College of Arts and Sciences, College of Law, College of Engineering, College of Agriculture, School of Medicine. School of Pharmacy, and School of Music.

At present the University is still growing. For six years there has not been a time when some new building was not being erected. At present the Chemistry Building and the Woman's Gymnasium are under construction with the state legislature contemplating appropriations for more new buildings.

## West Virginia Alpha

The ascension of West Virginia Alpha, the new  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ 's chapter at West Virginia University from a local group is commensurate to the development of the American college fraternity system. It began as a literary club and gradually developed into a social fraternity worthy of a chapter.

West Virginia Alpha began as "The Virginian," a literary club founded in 1916 by students of exceptionally high scholastic standing. In response to the request that there should be more good national fraternities at West

Virginia "The Virginian" became  $\Phi \Delta \Lambda$  in 1919. The new local was formed with the express purpose of petitioning  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  as its name evidenced.

Ever since 1919  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Lambda$  adhered tenaciously to its purpose of becoming  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  as set forth in its constitution. It presented petitions at conventions in Kansas City, Philadelphia,

Cleveland, and Montreal. It also presented the preliminary petitions at province conventions first in the Beta province and later in the Alpha South district to which it was transferred.

On December 28, 1927, at Montreal the national biennial convention of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  voted unanimously to grant  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Lambda$  a charter and the petitioning came to an end.


quartet. Also representing Ohio Iota as a member of the student government, he completes his activities as one of the end men in this year's minstrel show.

IN THE fall of the year 1879, Tennessee Alpha initiated Stirling Price Gilbert, who is now Justice of the Supreme Court of Georgia. He has been a real Phi every minute since.

In 1884 at Yale University he decided his classmate, Charles K. Holli-

As there was no chapter at Yale, this seemed impossible, but he wrote his chapter and the General Council for permission to take in Mr. Holliday. A few weeks later he received the permission requested and carried on the ceremony single-handed.


Brother Holliday is a member of Tennessee Alpha, although he has never attended Vanderbilt and in fact had never even seen the University until several years after his graduation from college. He is now one of the most prominent citizens of Sacramento, California.

Before this Brother Gilbert had the honor of installing Tennessee Beta at the University of the South.

A few years after leaving college, Brother Gilbert became president of his province and served several terms with enthusiasm. He was Treasurer of the General Council from 1886-1889. At the General Convention at Bloomington, Illinois, after refusing to be nominated for president of the council, he was presented with a handsome jeweled badge in recognition of his valiant service.

Judge Gilbert now resides in Atlanta, and until recently acted as Alumni Adviser for Georgia Delta chapter.

# A FAMOUS CHAPTER—KANSAS ALPHA 1887

(The following article and its accompanying illustration are taken from the University of Kansas "Graduate Magazine" for February, 1927. They were printed under the heading "Do You Remember—The Phi Delts of 1887?")

BOWDOIN College has long talked of her famous class of 1827. But Kansas, too, has produced a number of men all from one class and all from one group who have made a lasting impression in their respective fields.

From the class of 1887 of  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ , which had twenty members, there have come six men listed in Who's Who. They are Vernon Kellogg, William Allen White, Edward C. Franklin, Fred Funston, William S. Frankin, and W. E. Higgins. sides these men, many of the others from the same class have gained prominence in their communities.

William S. Franklin is now professor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. In 1887 he was assistant professor at Kansas University and from 1903 to 1915, a professor at Lehigh. While in school at Kansas University he was a member of  $\Sigma \equiv$ ,

T B  $\Pi$ , and  $\Phi$  B K.

William Allen White needs no introduction to Kansas friends, nor to anyone informed on current topics. He is author of many books and magazine articles, as well as editor of the Emporia Gazette. He is also a trustee of the Rockefeller and Woodrow Wilson foundations.

Vernon Kellogg was professor of entomology at Leland Stanford, Jr., University from 1894 to 1920. He is a member of various American and European scientific societies. He is an officer in the French Legion of Honor, has the honor of commander, Order of the Crown of Belgium, commander, Order of Polonia of Poland, and also has the state Gold Medal from Poland. From 1915 to 1917 he was director of the American Committee of Relief in Belgium. Later he was assistant to the United States food administrator during the war.

He is now permanent secretary and chairman of the educational relations committee of the National Research Council, Washington, D.C.

Edward C. Franklin is now a professor of organic chemistry at Stanford University. For two years he was chief of chemistry of the United States Public Health Service. He is a past president of the American Chemical Society.

Fred Funston, also a member of this class, was a major general in the United States Army and was the ranking officer of the service at the time of his death in 1917.

William E. Higgins at the time of his death was a professor in the law school at the University of Kansas. He spent some time in England, where he was employed by the American Bar Association, as a student of the English judicial system.

F. H. Kellogg has been an attorney in government service in California and is now engaged in the ranch busi-

ness there.

L. D. Henshaw and E. A. Wheeler died shortly after leaving school.

Charles S. McFarland is a sugar

chemist in New Orleans and his work

has attracted wide attention.

George S. Lewis has been European representative of the Mead Cycle Company of Chicago and is now vicepresident of the company.

I. T. Dickerson has been judge of the district court at Edmund, Okla-

homa, for years.

E. L. Glasgow has been retired, a colonel, from the United States Army. He is now an instructor in Virginia.

O. C. Billings is a merchant at Blackwell, Oklahoma. During the war he won recognition as a Y.M.C.A. worker in France. Amos H. Plum is now a capitalist at Emporia.

Schall is county engineer of Ashland county. H. E. Finney was for a time manager of the Armour plant, Fort Worth, Texas. For several years he was engaged in cattle buying in Buenos Aires and is now manager of a large live stock farm in the distant state of Maine.

Dr. J. W. O'Bryon, a dentist, of Lawrence, has been a prominent supporter of the University for years. Julius Liepman is now a merchant at Fort Scott, and is an outstanding citizen there. Dr. J. D. Davis has earned an enviable reputation in Fort Thomas, Kentucky, as a physician.



# CINCINNATI PHI HEADS CONFERENCE

NEW honors were won for Phi Delta Theta on February 19, when Evan Chatfield, Cincinnati, '27, was elected president of the Mid-West Student Conference, at Champaign, Illinois, one of the largest student associations in the country.

Brother Chatfield was the unanimous choice of the delegates from twenty-two universities representing sixteen states throughout the central section of the United States. He

is the vice-president of the University Student Council and has been active in many student affairs. He is now in his fifth year in the six year course in commerce and will serve as President of the Mid-West Conference until the next meeting a year hence.

The general purpose of the Mid-West Student Conference is to bring about co-operation among the students of the colleges represented in intelligent discussion and settlement of many problems of the college world.

The sessions were held in the Union Building of the University of Illinois, on February 17, 18, and 19. Among the men who addressed the Conference were Dean Thomas Arkle Clark and Coach Robert Zuppke of Illinois. Discussions were conducted on the questions of college publications, student unions, freshman problems, and student government. The other officers elected were C. J. Olin of Michigan State College, vice-president, and R. J. Palmer of the University of Colorado, secretary-treasurer.

As president of the organization, Brother Chatfield will be the executive in charge of all preparations for the next Mid-West Student Conference which will be held in Colorado next February.

# MISSOURI GAMMA'S NEW HOUSE

 $\mathbf{D}$  REAMS of every Missouri Gamma man since 1891 came to a gorgeous realization on January 3, when the chapter occupied its first home in its entire history of thirty-six years. The new chapter house is situated on the Washington University campus in Fraternity Row. The  $\Sigma$  A E house stands next door west, while the  $\Theta$   $\Sigma$  home is directly east.

The house is L-shaped, opening south and east. The slope of the ground upon which it is erected gives it three stories at the front, and four full floors in back. The main floor is given over almost entirely to a living room and library which form a dance floor fifty-six feet long. The chaperon's room and a cloak closet com-

plete the floor.

The second floor contains nine study rooms, each shared by two men. A single dormitory provides sleeping quarters for all the residents of the house. The remaining three studies and the dormitory make up the third floor. The large dormitory, which has north, south, east and west exposures, provides sleeping quarters for thirty-six men in double-deck beds. The study rooms, however, are designed for only twenty-four men.


Bathroom accommodations are provided on the second and third floors, and just off the cloak-room of the first floor. Sufficient drinking fountains, lavatories and toilets have been

installed.

The kitchen, dining room, chapter room, and servants' quarters are on the floor which is called the basement, but which is completely above the ground at the back of the building. Two extra large storage closets and a hotel-size electric refrigerator are features of the kitchen. The chapter room is the only room in the house which is completely underground. It extends out under the front terrace.


Ventilation is secured by an areaway and fan outlet system.

The erection of Missouri Gamma's house illustrates a curious legal twist necessary in the establishment of Fra-

ternity Row at Washington. Seven fraternities, besides  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ , have houses in the Row, but not a one owns its own home.  $\Sigma$  A E,  $\Theta$   $\Xi$ ,  $\Sigma$  X,  $\Sigma$  N, K A, T K E and B  $\Theta$  II

are the other residents. The charter of the University prevents the disposition of any of the ground or its use by other interests, conditions which make it necessary for the fraternities to rent the ground and the buildings from the university. fifty-year leases which are now in force demand a payment in advance of \$20,000 by the fraternity, a sum calculated to be half the cost of the house. The balance of the cost is amortized over a period of twenty years. The fraternities are thus provided with a house on a fifty-year lease for the actual cost of the building and the nominal rental of one dollar per year for the ground.

Heat is the least of Missouri Gamma's worries, since the location on the university campus permits a direct connection with the university's hot water heating plant. Light, water and gas are also supplied through university mains.

Although the figure recommended by the Washington University treasurer is decidedly lower, the house and furnishings promise to exceed \$50,000 in cost. The construction is concrete, brick and cut stone throughout. Wall partitions are made of new, patent sound-proof blocks. The entrance hall and stairway are terrazzo, the rest of the first floor is hardwood, and the other floors are concrete. Jamieson and Spearl, St. Louis, designed the building, and the Woerman Construction Company executed the plans.

The hopes, the dreams, the plans, the schemes that make up the history of the house are, in some respects, more interesting than the house itself. They represent the courageous battle of a band of hardy Phis who, even

as the Greeks of old, resolved to see their struggle through to victory.

It was in 1907 that the desire for a chapter house took definite form at Washington. A corporation was formed shortly later which undertook several unsuccessful campaigns. The financial failure of the drives was not so discouraging as the effect on the morale of the alumni. They became convinced that the house would never be a reality, and for a few years progress was virtually impossible. No co-operation whatsoever was forthcoming from the university during the first campaigns.

Finally, Brother Philo Stevenson, '94, head of the alumni office of Washington University, took up the campaign. Assisted by some of the active chapter, led by Brother I. Marshall Thompson, '27, he brought the goal in sight. Early in 1926, the battle appeared won, and the Chapter House Corporation breathed a sigh of relief. Brother Stevenson was president of the house board at the time, and Brother Benedict Farrar, '08, prominent St. Louis architect, was treasurer. The other board members were Brothers E. Glion Curtis, '03; Roy Campbell, '06; Alvin Goodbar, '07; Alfred Kerth, '24; J. Marshall Thompson, '27; Carleton S. Hadley, '25, and Carl Revelle, '28.

Missouri Gamma is justly proud of the task it has completed. Urban universities present double difficulties, but Phi Delt fight and spirit have made Missouri Gamma an outstanding chapter. At present we are especially proud of Brother Dwight F. Davis, Secretary of War. The chapter, installed in 1891 as the first fraternity in Washington, has initiated 308 loyal Phis.

# DR. LEWIS TO GO TO LAFAYETTE

R. WILLIAM MATHER LEW-IS, Knox, '00, resigned as president of George Washington University, March 1, to become president of Lafayette College at Easton, Pennsylvania. Dr. Lewis will go to Lafayette in September, where he will succeed Dr. John H. MacCracken, resigned. In the meantime, he will continue as head of George Washington.

Dr. Lewis was born in Howell, Michigan, March 24, 1878, the son of James and Mary (Coe Farrand) Lewis. He was graduated from Lake Forest College (Illinois) in 1900 with the degree of A.B. He received his A.M. from Illinois College in 1902. In June, 1924, he received the degree of LL.D. from Lake Forest College and in June, 1925, LL.D. from Norwich University.

From 1900 to 1903 he was an instructor at Illinois College. The following three years he acted as instructor at Lake Forest College. From 1906 to 1913, he was headmaster at Lake Forest Academy. The last two years of this period he was president of the Board of Education of Lake Forest, and from 1909 to 1912, he lectured at the McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago.

The years 1913-14 were spent by Brother Lewis in traveling about England, France, and Germany, studying the educational systems of these nations. Upon his return to Lake Forest he was elected mayor of the city and chosen a member of the Board of Review of Lake County.

These duties occupied his time until the entrance of America into the war of 1917. He then came to Washington as the executive secretary of the National Committee of Patriotic Societies, which post he occupied during 1917 to 1919. From 1919 to 1921

he was director of the Savings Division of the United States Treasury Department, handling the sales of war savings stamps and developing a national thrift campaign during the difficult post-war period. In 1921 he became the chief of the Educational Service of the United States Chamber of Commerce. Since 1923 he has been a special lecturer at the Colorado State Teachers' College. In 1923 he was chosen president of Washington University. In 1924 he was made president of the Association of Urban Universities. He is on the executive committee of the American Council of Education.

In addition to serving as mayor of Lake Forest and as president of the Board of Education there, Brother Lewis rendered notable public service in the direction of preparedness movement in Chicago and throughout the Middle West in 1915-16, and as civilian adviser to the Morale Division of the Army in 1918. He is widely known as a lecturer on economic subjects.

Dr. Lewis is a member of the Cosmos, University, and Chevy Chase Clubs of Washington, the Sons of the American Revolution, the Military Order of the Loyal Legion, the Kiwanis Club. He is a trustee of the Georgetown Presbyterian Church.

He is the author of various articles for leading newspapers and the Encyclopedia Brittanica. He was editor of the Liberty Loan Speaker's Handbooks, and wrote The Heritage of a Soldier's Son and The Voices of our Leaders.

On December 6, 1906, he married Ruth Durand at Lake Forest, Illinois. They have one child, Sara Durand Lewis,

# HANOVER CELEBRATES ITS CENTENNIAL

m OST}$  colleges can present a drama of life and growth, struggles and disappointments, triumphs and victories, for it is a poor college indeed-or a young one, certainly-which hasn't developed that personality or soul which has meant so much in the history of American higher education. There are few colleges, though, which can trace that vivid drama through a whole century. Three men could count all of them on their fingers and toes. About a dozen colleges there are which could turn the hands of the clock back to the time when the Declaration of Independence was yet but a glorious dream of the future.

It is no small distinction, however, to be entitled to even a hundred candles on the birthday cake, and a new entry in that select group is Hanover College, one of the pioneers of Middle Western education, nestling on an Indiana hill overlooking the Ohio River, about midway between Cincinnati and Louisville.

On New Year's Day of 1827 the college, then more properly an "academy," opened its doors to admit, for the most part, potential ministers for the young Hoosier commonwealth. For Hanover was essentially a child of the ethical and cultural movements of the time. Its founder, Dr. John Finley Crowe, had foresworn his native Kentucky because of his prohibitionist and abolitionist leanings. The very name, Hanover, first of the local Presbyterian church, then of the college, then of the village, was an importation from New Hampshire, and was adopted in honor of the wife of the local minister, a Dartmouth

Actual college work was begun in 1829. An amended charter was granted in 1832 by the legislature,

definitely establishing a "Hanover College," even over the protests of the president of Indiana College, now Indiana University, that the state would never be able to support more than one institution of higher learning!



This amended charter, too, incidentally, was the first in the history of American education to require industrial training of a college. Hence, resulted Hanover's famous "manual labor system," an experiment which very nearly led the college to a rocky and premature ending. Instruction was given in printing, bookbinding, major and minor cooperage, brickmaking, wagon making, and other trades. Financial necessities required the early abandonment of the attempt, however.


The initial log cabin gave way to a pretentious three-story brick building, the "college edifice," as they called it then, with its much boasted hundred windows. A few years later, 1837, a tornado, perhaps due to the panic of that year, anti-Jacksonians would say, distributed miscellaneous parts of the college building, equipment and library over surrounding sections of Indiana and Kentucky. Later still, the "edifice," now abbreviated to a two-story structure, was converted into the village church, which it still forms; it is the oldest remaining building in the state ever used for school purposes.

That the post-war "youth movement" has had its historic predecessors was concretely demonstrated in the annals of Hanover for 1844. In January of that year the college was moved from Hanover to the neighboring town of Madison, over the protests of its founder and then vice-president, Dr. Crowe, who bought the abandoned college building for

ten dollars and started a private school. A few months later one of the college literary societies, which were not then in the least emasculated, held a debate on the wisdom of the removal of the college. The negative won, and presto!—four A.M. the next morning saw the joint membership of the societies, the society libraries and all their personal effects being transported back to Hanover, where they asked Dr. Crowe to reopen the college. Thus he became "twice the founder of Hanover."

The present college site, on a point overlooking the Ohio, was occupied about the middle of the century. The main building, Classic Hall, was built between 1851 and 1857 and was then the largest brick building west of the Alleghenies. Several other buildings have since been added, one being a memorial library, the gift of the widow of Vice-President Thomas A. Hendricks, *Hanover*, '41.

The college prides itself on being institution in pioneering Hoosier State. Indeed, its trophy room might well boast of a number of ribbons for priority. original theological seminary of the Northwest, founded at Hanover, later became McCormick Seminary of Chi-The first book bindery in Indiana was established as a part of the college manual labor What later became the Herald and Presbyter, for years one of the leading Presbyterian magazines, originated at Hanover. Before the college "found itself" as a liberal arts school, the first law school in Indiana was opened: the first teacher-training work was also done at Hanover.

Dr. John M. Coulter, dean of American botanists, began the journalistic ancestor of the Botanical Gazette at Hanover. Three of the four founders of the Indiana Academy of Science were Hanover men. Indiana's first chemical laboratory work was done at the Presbyterian school.

In other lines, too, the college has led the way. Indiana's first football team gridded at Hanover in the early 80's. The first college Y.M.C.A. building in the world was built by the students at Hanover in 1883. The hilltop school was not the first to admit women, since the coednas weren't officially recognized until 1880, but fraternity and sorority life did develop early.


The Miami Triad was represented early—and unbrokenly, until the vicissitudes of the war caused the death of the  $\Sigma$  X chapter in 1918. B  $\Theta$  II entered Hanover in 1853, existing sub rosa for a number of years.  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  was chartered in 1861, and  $\Phi$   $\Gamma$   $\Delta$ , the other old national, came in 1864.

 $\Delta$   $\Gamma$  enjoyed an ephemeral existence at Hanover just after women were admitted, but the permanent phase of sorority life did not come until later. In 1913 two local sororities which had existed for a number of years were granted charters of  $\Lambda$   $\Delta$   $\Pi$  and  $\Phi$  M.

In 1924 a strong local fraternity became a charter chapter of  $\Theta$  K N. In recent years another local fraternity has been organized, and also a local sorority, so that now Hanover is represented by five fraternities, four national, and by three sororities, two of which are national. A number of honorary or professional groups have also been organized.

Extensive plans have been developed for the celebration of the college centennial in June of this year. A number of speakers of national repute in various fields will be present, and other features of the gala week have also received much care.

Indiana Epsilon was a product of the first wave of expansion in the Middle West. It is the tenth oldest permanent chapter of the Fraternity, having been first chartered on April 6, 1861. It was not then organized, though, since there were too many embryonic soldiers among the student



body of that time to permit organization. A second charter was granted by the Alpha of Indiana on December 14, 1868, and this venerable document, faded and time worn, yet still legible, is still in the possession of the chapter.

Its existence since that time has been continuous, being exceeded in this respect only by Indiana Alpha, Beta and Gamma and Ohio Gamma. The founders, four in number, have all but one become Chapter Grand

initiates.

The chapter has enjoyed the usual ups and downs of competitive fraternity life, although we like to think that it has ordinarily been a little more up than down. For one thing, some present day successful Hoosier politicians confess that they weren't handicapped by experience as Phi undergraduates at Hanover.

A house was purchased by the chapter in 1910. This had to be given up during the war period, but in 1923 the vigorous efforts of the late Brother Howard W. Brydon, Hanover, '24, were successful in ac-

complishing the erection of the present fraternity house. Due to its increased size, the chapter is now working on plans for a new home.

A recent achievement of which Indiana Epsilon thinks with modest pride is its record in leading the whole Fraternity in the sale of catalogs. It was the only chapter to have passed its quota at the time of the Montreal convention and at the present time has a record of thirty-five paid sales, many more than the next highest chapters, several of which have much larger alumni bodies.

Step up, chapters.

The who's who of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  contains its share of Indiana Epsilon men. Included in the list in the Catalog are such men as Charles S. Hatfield, a judge of the United States Court of Customs Appeals; Thomas M. Honan, former attorney-general and Speaker of the House of Indiana; Dr. William Chalmers Covert, the executive secretary of the Board of Christian Education of the Presbyterian Church, and Dr. Amos W. Butler, famous ornithologist and criminologist.




# OHIO EPSILON IS VICTORIOUS

the track squad.



Charles Chase McClaughry, Knox, '85 Charles Chase McClaughry, Knox, '85, nationally known penologist and prison administrator, died suddenly at his home in Lorton, Virginia, November 23, 1926.

Brother McClaughry was born April 7, 1863, at Carthage, Illinois. He was educated in the common schools of St. Louis, Missouri, Monmouth, Illinois, Joliet, Illinois, and the academy of Lake Forest University. He attended Monmouth College and was graduated from Knox with the Class of 1885.

Following his graduation he entered the machine shops of the Illinois Steel

Company at Joliet. After two years there he went with E. R. Brainard and Company of Joliet and two years later was appointed chief engineer and master mechanic at the Illinois state penitentiary. Next he became deputy superintendent of the Allegheny-County, Pennsylvania, workhouse. After making a good record there he resigned to become associated with a steam plant and heater company at Chicago. Later he was appointed deputy superintendent of the Chicago House of Correction. Resigning that position, he accepted the deputyship of the Indiana state prison, and resigned that position to become warden of the Wisconsin state prison in 1899.

A larger income was offered him three years later by the Scully Steel and Iron Company, Chicago, by which firm he was employed until the government made him warden of the federal penitentiary at Atlanta.

In 1911 Brother McClaughry was offered the wardenship of the state reformatory at Anamosa, Iowa, where he served for six years. While there. Brother McClaughry added approximately \$200,000 to the value of the public property of Anamosa by the application of his knowledge of civil and mechanical engineering. He resigned to become warden of the Connecticut state prison. At the latter place Brother McClaughry suffered an injury to his spine in a fall, and was forced to retire until his health was recovered. He was under the care of specialists at the University of Iowa hospital.

In March, 1925, he accepted the Warden's post of the District of Columbia at Cocoquan, Virginia,

Harlan Miller, a brother of Dayton C. Miller, died on the evening of October 19, at his home in Sacramento. He was a graduate of the class of 1904, a member of  $\Sigma$   $\Xi$ , and the  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  fraternity. A widow, one son, three brothers and a sister survive.

Mr. Miller acquired considerable experience in bridge design while with the N.Y.C.R.R. and in 1915 he became a partner and consulting engineer with the firm of Watson, Davis and Miller of Cleveland. He was

sent West to take over the San Francisco office of the firm. He liked California so well he decided to remain and in 1920 he joined the California Highway Commission, being made State Highway Engineer in Since that time he has built an organization that has spent several million dollars in construction of bridges and highways. He did not live to see the consummation of his plans, but he laid the foundation for a construction program, the execution of which will bring credit to the commission and the state.

The HARLAN D. MILLER Bridge will be over 400 feet long with a central arch 234 feet long and 125 feet high, making it one of the spectacular structures of the state highway system. It was chosen as typical of the work of Mr. Miller as head of the Bridge Department.





which is working to gather materials and eventually compile and publish the record of Phi Delta Theta after the publication of Walter B. Palmer's monumental *History of Phi Delta Theta*. This book appeared in 1906.

Last fall we published an article in The Scroll by Russell H. Fitzgibbon, *Hanover*, on the Fraternity Flag. We hope to have soon the story of the Life Subscription Plan in an early number by P. P. G. C. Frank J. R. Mitchell. Brother Mitchell originated the idea of this sort of an endowment fund for a fraternity magazine and it was put into effect by our 1910 convention at Niagara Falls, two years before any other organization adopted it. And we hope to have other historical studies which will record the progress of Phi Delta Theta by the men who have helped to accomplish that progress.

Brother Speer, who is educational director of the Central Y.M.C.A. in Minneapolis would like to enlarge upon his record of historic and interesting badges. Anyone having any material of value should communicate with Brother Speer so that The Scroll may print the additions from time

to time.



After several years of vain attempts, a realignment of the province system of Phi Delta Theta has been accomplished. The purpose of the change is to give us a geographical arrangement which lends itself more readily to a proper administrative scheme. The province system was never intended to group certain chapters together which had common interests, such as being athletic rivals; it was adopted in order that the proper sort of co-operation might be effected with the general fraternity through the medium of a province officer, easy of access to all chapters within his jurisdiction.

Another mighty step in advance is the officers' conference planned for the Middle West this summer. It is hoped to bring together the General Council, the Survey Commission, The Scroll Endowment Trustees, the Palmer Endowment Trustees and all of the province officers for about a three-day session, without any interruption of any sort, to work out some of our problems and learn our jobs better so that we may give more efficient service. It will be in the nature of a school with a carefully arranged program which may include some prominent officers of other fraternities. As an experiment, its results will perhaps be difficult to measure, but it seems to offer a splendid opportunity to bring about a better understanding and a more effective administration of the fraternity's affairs.



When South Carolina repealed the law prohibiting fraternities from its state institutions on March 31, it removed the last legal barrier to college Greek letter societies in the United States. Again has the Interfraternity Conference co-operated to good effect with local fraternity people to do away with a blot on the system.


## OHIO IOTA'S NEW CHAPTER HOUSE

IN 1831 a group of men started a Baptist Theological School which later developed into what is now Denison University. Although the university is now nearly one hundred years old, Ohio Iota is the first fraternity to live in a chapter house created for that purpose.

proximately \$65,000, is Georgian colonial in design, being so constructed as to be in keeping with the general plans of the college buildings.

The location of the house is directly behind the administration building and main campus on one side of a natural horseshoe on which the col-




LIVING ROOM, OHIO IOTA'S NEW HOME

One enters into a large hallway with two rooms branching off at either side while directly in front is a doorway leading to the rear plaza. The room on the left as

which contains the grand piano, the new orthophonic, and is used as a living and music room. In the L which forms one wing along the southern side of the house are located the guest room, the cloak room, and the housemother's room, all of which possess a private lavatory and both


The second floor is given over to study rooms. There are eight of these rooms which house three men each,

with plenty of locker and closet space on the floor for each man. Dormitory system is used in the house. The beds are located on the third floor, which room extends from one end of the building to the other. A large trunk room is also on this floor.

Both the front and back stairs run the entire four floors and are located in different parts of the house, which makes easy access to any part of the building. On the lower floor or baseconnection with the kitchen so as to eliminate loss of time in making unnecessary trips.

The chapter room, den and trophy room are to the left of the stairs as one comes down into the lower floor. A reliable steam heating system is located in the boiler room at the north end of the building. ment one enters a small hallway which leads to the dining-room, located in the wing along the side of the house. It is large enough to contain five tables capable of seating eight at a table. The kitchen is directly off this room and is equally large. Along one side has been built adequate closet space with several large sinks built in.

On the opposite side a new Frigidaire will probably be installed by the time this article is printed. A large butler's pantry and storeroom are in

is being carried on at present to get the grading finished in the front and the rear of the house. When this is done and the landscape artist is given control the looks of the house will be improved 100 per cent.

The manner in which those in charge have carried out their plans has resulted in the creation of a house which possesses efficiency in the utilization of all the floor space without loss of dignity of character or impairing the massive appearance of the building.

## HUNTING BIGHORN WITH A CAMERA

Note: In reprinting this from the "Scientific Monthly" for August, 1926, we do so not only because it is an interesting story by a famous Phi, but because his party on the trip described was made up with one exception of other famous Phis from that illustrious Kansas chapter. Those mentioned are General Frederick Funston, '90; William Allen White, '90; William Suddard Franklin, '87, and Edward Curtis Franklin, '88.

THE Rocky Mountain sheep, or bighorn, is one of the most extraordinary and interesting of American animals. It is not limited to the Rocky Mountains, but varieties of it are found also in the Sierra Nevada and in the mountains of Alaska and Mexico. In earlier years it was a great favorite of big-game hunters but is now protected by game laws.

As a boy interested in natural history I had read all that I could find written about the bighorn. Especially had I soaked up all the stories about its wonderful surefootedness, its marvelous speed over rough rocks, and, most thrilling of all, its alleged habit, when closely pressed, of leaping headfirst over high sheer precipices and landing on its great strong curved horns. Of course, only the males, and the old males at that, have the big horns, so that the ewes and young would not be able to follow the head of the family in this wild leap for liberty. Rather selfish of father, it would seem, to desert the family this way. But he had this good excuse. hunter was really after father and that pair of big horns for a trophy, and was likely to let mother and the kids alone-unless, unfortunately, he was hunting for meat and not glory.

When I got to college and began to study natural history seriously I still remembered the stories about the bighorn, and kept an eye out for a chance to get to Colorado and into the Rockies to see these interesting animals in their rocky fastnesses far up among the great peaks. Also, as I lived in Kansas, which, whatever else

it has in the way of scenery—and that isn't much—has no mountains at all, I wanted to see mountains, high mountains and deep canyons, with great silent forests of spruce and pine and swift clear mountain streams with trout in them. I wanted to camp and climb and see bear and elk and deer—and bighorn.

So five or six of us college mates figured out very carefully what it would cost to spend a summer in the Colorado Rockies. We had to figure carefully, for we were all poor, and our families thought they were doing enough to support us in college without grub-staking us for an expedition after bear and bighorn in Colorado. We decided that we could live chiefly on flapjacks, trout, bear-meat and wild red raspberries, of which menu only the flapjacks would cost us anything. The rest of the food we would find in We would do our the mountains. traveling on foot, after once getting to Colorado, with perhaps a burro or two to help carry our packs. In addition to our guns and trout rods we would take cameras, and I, at least, registered a solemn vow that I should hunt bighorn, if not with a gun, which was prohibited by law, at any rate with a camera. And I may say right now, based on considerable experience, that hunting wild animals with a camera is no less exciting than hunting them with a rifle, and requires not less, but more, skill and persistence.

Our little group of Kansas college freshmen was composed of chaps who had some stuff in them. There was

Fred Funston, who later fought in the Philippines, captured Aguinaldo and became a major-general in the U. S. Army; Herbert Hadley, who became governor of Missouri, and only narrowly missed being nominated for president by the Progressive Republican party in the days of Roosevelt; William Allen White, now a well-known editor, author and publicist; and two brothers, named Franklin, one of whom has become an eminent chemist and the other as eminent a mathematician and physicist. But at the time of our trip after bighorn we were all as green as Kansas corn in a good summer, and perfect tenderfeet as far as camping. climbing mountains and hunting big game were concerned.

But I must get along to the bighorn. We made headquarters camp in a beautiful little, high-level, glacial valley in the Front Range of the Colorado Rockies, and started our climbing by getting to the top of Long's Peak, 14,255 feet in altitude, and one of the highest, most difficult and dangerous of the Colorado peaks. After that we did all the other peaks in the vicinity. It was great sport-and always with the tang in it of a little danger. Funston and I once got caught in a violent snowstorm on top of an especially rough peak. snow changed to sleet while we were out in the middle of a great snowfield which lay at a steep angle on the mountain flank and simply had to be crossed in order to get down to timberline from the summit. The surface of the field became like ice, and we could only move over it by breaking through the crust for each footstep. It was very dangerous going, for once started on a slide we couldn't possibly have stopped until we got to the bottom of the field, which was at least a thousand feet below, and margined by a rampart of rock against which we would have dashed at terrific speed. But we made a special point of not slipping—and didn't!

After we had cleaned up all the nearby mountains, in the course of

which we saw many signs of bighorn -especially their many narrow little trails cut three or four inches deep along the mountain flanks well above timberline, but none of the animals themselves-we learned from an old hunter and trapper, who lived alone in a rough cabin not far from our camp, that while the wild sheep used to be plentiful in the near-by mountains and still were to be found there occasionally, more of them could be found in the high mountain country farther north toward the Wyoming line. So we packed up Billy the Burro to the limit of his capacity to carry things, put the rest of the camping outfit on our own backs and started north. We picked up trails when we could find any, but mostly we just headed north. For much of our way we worked along the flank of the range above timberline, to which we had to come down at night to make our campfire for cooking and keeping warm. We had been told of a long extinct volcanic crater called Specimen Mountain to which the bighorn were reputed to come from long distances away in order to lick on the green and yellow beds in the crater bottom. This was our goal.

On our way we started up a rather small bear and chased it into a hole in a great rock pile. How to get it out? After sitting around the hole for a while, without working out a satisfactory way, Funston finally suggested this interesting plan. He volunteered to crawl into the hole and stir up the bear, which would presumably get angry and chase him out. The rest of us were to stand by the side of the hole and shoot at the second object to come out; the first one Funston fondly expected would be himself. This plan seemed reasonable, but on careful consideration we vetoed it; there seemed to be just a chance that nothing at all might come out of the hole, not even the future capturer of Aguinaldo himself.

Finally we arrived near Specimen Mountain and established camp in a beautiful high level pass only a little

below timberline. This pass was really part of the Continental Divide, for the water which flowed down from one side of it was carried into the North Platte, thence into the Missouri, the Mississippi and finally into the Gulf of Mexico, while the water from the other side, only a hundred yards away, flowed into the Grand River and thence by the Colorado River into the Gulf of Lower Cali-There was plenty of water and firewood, and by scrambling down a thousand feet to the Grand we could get all the trout we could eat. It was a fine camp. We were now ready for bighorn.

Excitement soon came, although at first not from bighorn. One of the boys had left camp with a shotgun soon after we had got things in order, a cooking place fixed up with stones, level places found on which to spread out our bed blankets, and our flapjack flour, sugar and salt under cover of a rubber poncho. The hunter had gone forth to try to find a blue grouse or two for supper. His shotgun shells were loaded with large birdshot. Just at dusk he came back madly running and calling for help.

It seemed that in his wandering he had discovered a little bear cub, and, like the proper tenderfoot that he was, had sent a load of birdshot at it. The cub was not much hurt, but enough to stimulate it to a loud squealing which had brought an angry mother bear to the rescue. There was nothing for the brave hunter to do but to start for camp with all possible speed, which he did, without hesitation and with no glances backward. One sight of mother bear had been enough. was, according to the hunter, probably the largest grizzly bear that had ever existed in the Colorado Rockies! Fortunately for our indiscreet hunter -and for us-mother bear did not follow him to camp, but turned back to her cub.

And now came the bighorn. Literally that. For as we busied ourselves with cooking supper, and further fixing up of camp, we were startled by a

sudden noise and looking up were more startled to see half a dozen bighorn charging down the mountain slope just behind us and directly toward us. They dashed right through our camp, swerving only a few yards to one side as they saw us and our little fire. It was breath-taking.

We found next morning that we had chosen for camp site a spot over which a number of bighorn trails ran from Specimen Mountain on the north down the slope across the little meadow on the pass and up the next mountain of the range to the south. So rarely visited was this region that the bighorn, with all their wariness, were not sufficiently startled by our presence to leave their regular trail by more than a few yards. However, no more such surprising visits occurred.

Next morning we set out and up on reconnaissance and found that above timberline, which was only a few hundred feet higher than our camp, the steep slope of the old volcano was smooth and easy to climb. It led us directly up to the rim which ran evenly and almost completely around the great crater. Thus we could easily walk all around the crater, keeping just low enough below the rim on the outside to prevent any animals within the crater from seeing us. But it was easy for us to see the inside of the whole crater by merely crawling carefully up to the rim, and lifting our heads slowly up high enough for us to peer over the crater's edge.

The inside of the crater presented a remarkable sight. The bottom and walls were composed of old ashes and scoriæ with some cliffs of shining basalt and numerous upstanding castles and pinnacles of braccia or volcanic conglomerate. Some of these stood up fifty or sixty feet from the floor or side walls of the crater and were twenty or thirty feet wide.

As we cautiously looked over the rim we were gratified to see a group of bighorn resting quietly on a sort of basalt platform jutting out from



the crater wall. Two or three were lying down, two or three more were moving slowly about, while on a higher part of the platform was a fine old male with tremendous curved horns, standing rigid and alert, evidently the lookout for the band. We watched them admiringly for a few moments, when unluckily one of us, in trying to change position, pushed over the rim a loose stone which bounded down the inside of the crater.

Like a flash every sheep was on its feet and on the qui vive. Because we kept perfectly motionless, the big lookout could not be sure, for a moment, where we were, but taking his cue from the direction of the bounding stone he started up the precipitous side of the crater away from us, followed closely by all the others. was a beautiful sight; their ease and confidence in swiftly getting over the rough steep going was impressive. In a few moments they were out of the crater, and, heading north along the mountain's upper flanks, they soon disappeared from our view. But we had seen bighorn close at hand, although too far for photographing, and felt that their fright had not been great. They would come back.

After they had gone, and we could stand up and move around the rim and survey the whole of the crater, I worked out a plan which I felt sure would result, if everything went according to plan, in getting some bighorn close-ups.

The plan was very simple and was suggested by the two facts, first, that one could move all around the rim, out of sight, and then come into sight wherever desirable, and second, that the great breccia castles ought to give one sufficient protection from being seen to allow one to work down into the crater, keeping one of these castles between one and any band of sheep that might be anywhere in the crater. Of course the wind would also have to be right—that is, blowing from the bighorn toward the stalker and not from the stalker toward the

bighorn. They have a perfect sense of smell.

So the next day we all went up together again and, on peering over the rim, were wildly excited to see a band of nearly thirty bighorn in the very bottom of the crater. Almost between them and us towered a great breccia castle. The wind was just right to allow me to try to get down the crater wall behind the castle.

I began a hard and wearisome descent of nearly two hours, slowly crawling over sharp bits of basalt, rough blocks of conglomerate and beds of old ashes, keeping always that protecting breccia castle between the animals and me.

I finally got down to the base of the castle. This was as far as I could go. I was within a hundred yards of the band of bighorn, which had all fortunately kept close together. Behind the castle I waved a handkerchief to my carefully watching companions on the rim above, who immediately set off below the rim on the outside to a point just opposite where I had gone down. They were to scatter a little there, and then all to show themselves at once on the rim to frighten the sheep towards me.

It worked. I was ready with camera already pointed to that side of the castle which seemed the most likely to be chosen by the sheep in their flight.

I heard a clattering of hoofs and The noise grew louder. My rocks. companions added violent yells to be sure that I knew the sheep were coming. I did know it. I couldn't help knowing it. I was growing violently excited. I held the camera at a ready And then that magnificent band, led by two superbly-horned old males, dashed around the side of the castle, bearing directly toward me. I thought they would run over me. But They swerved slightly they didn't. and there they were, all lined up, broadside on, only twenty yards away. It was a picture made to order.

But, alas, it was too exciting. I had a bad case of buck fever. My hands jumped as the sheep did. I

couldn't hold the camera still. It was no use. But I did manage to press the bulb.


That negative when developed and printed from yielded a picture of bighorn at close range. But every sheep in it is a blurred something with a dozen legs. No naturalist would recognize the animals on it. He would think they were centipedes. But I recognize them. It is my prize picture.

## MICHIGAN PHI IS DISTINGUISHED


EVERYBODY should be pleased to see other people advancing along the road to success. If it be true that the things of friends should be in common, particularly should it be true of fraternity brothers. Let us then rejoice with our brother, Richard Hardy, Michigan '91, for I read in the recent New York papers that he

has just been elected to one of the high places in American industry.

Brother Hardy has passed through all the stages of development characteristic to the life of a real self-made American.

As a boy in a village of northern Michigan, he was early obliged to go to work in the lumber mills that made up the chief industry of the town. His employment there at the picturesque job of shingle weaving, gave him an insight into the feelings of his fellow workmen that has been reflected in his understanding relations with the many employees in the mills under his later direction.

It gave him a close-up view of industry from the inside. It did not however, take him very long to decide that he did not care for this inside view. He was encouraged by his immediate superior in the mill, an

old Swede, with the promise of financial assistance, and slender as this help seemed likely to be, he purposed to get an education as a first step toward better things.

A short time later saw him in Ann Arbor, where he was at first somewhat at a loss to know just where to begin to get that education. A chance meeting with another youth in a similar predicament, led to what Mr. Hardy has since learned to know as a "conference" concerning the most

likely courses and the best way of fitting themselves into the scheme of things as it was working in the University.

Things went well here when his ready tongue soon found him favor

with everybody.

He early became one of the enthusiastic members of Michigan Alpha and the difficulties with which the young chapter struggled were overcome in no small measure by his persistence and energy.

Four years at the University revealed a moderate ability in athletics, a strong bent for organization and a marked proficiency in English, enabling him to leave with two letters added to his name and a dissyllable that had served as an introduction to the Richard, subtracted.

Once a fellow student had to write a review. After several days of labor, he had all the facts but felt that his introduction lacked in suavity. In this extremity he appealed to Hardy. After a brief glance and a few moments of rapid writing, he arose with, "Here, this is what you want."

The phrases of that introduction made that essay a class room success.

When the editor suggested to me that I write this sketch, I recalled this incident and proposed to Hardy that he write it himself. It is evident that he did not do so.

This skill has never forsaken him. From the time we had mock national conventions in college and he made nominating speeches, to the time he made addresses during the war and talks as mayor of his city, he has delivered many orations full of felicitous expressions and sound sense.

Richard Hardy could have been a poet. The sounding phrases of his favorite authors and of Shakespeare in particular, are a source of never ending joy to him. The imagination which made him see in advance the lofty structure of a cement corporation, would have enabled him to attain a place among our literati, where if he could not shine as a first magnitude luminary, he might arouse such

emulation that "Rivals all would cry with envy frank, 'O, would that I could sling the ink like Hank.' "\*

Now he became a teacher, going to Menominee, Michigan as superintendent of the schools.

His next move was to become salesman for a series of art books for use in the schools. In this occupation he had some opportunity to show the stuff he was made of. On calling upon the board in a large city he was informed that the decision had already been made in favor of another line. This was just the sort of situation that appealed to his imagination. After a day or two of talk he was able to telegraph his house that this particular city would use their books exclusively in the future.

Next he moved to Chattanooga, Tennessee, where he organized the Dixie Portland Cement Company, of which he was president for many years. The amalgamation of this concern with several other companies into the Pennsylvania Dixie Cement Corporation of New York City was in a large measure the result of his unremitting work, and the way he has with him of smoothing over difficulties, especially those of a personal nature. He is now one of the outstanding figures in the cement industry and chairman of the board of directors of this great concern.

I do not, however, wish to stress his success in industry; this is known to all who read the trade journals.

I like better to see him as he is in his non-business hours.

In this age of hurry and business, it is a pleasure to see a man who does not take things too seriously. The humor of things is for him a part of the general scheme. This point of view and a scorn of sham count for most in shaping his attitude to life. He thinks it is not so much the views one holds as the things one does that make for righteousness. He would

be a poor fundamentalist; he is a good philanthropist.

I see him in his home town at Christmas, carrying provisions to the poor and fraternizing tearfully with the butcher at the close of the day over the joy they had in giving help to others.

I see him cheerfully signing checks to pay for the decrepit mules condemned by the humane society, to prevent their going on longer in a life of agony.

I see him reading with satisfaction the good reports of his boys in college, I hesitate to say how many, and filled with knowledge that the help he has been able to give has not been misplaced.

I see him presiding over the dedication of the Richard Hardy School, a magnificent high school given by his corporation to the city in which its mills are located. The man who has imbued the corporation under his charge with the will to spend large sums of money on public buildings has left for himself a monument that will long outlast the structures built.

These are the attitudes in which I like to present my friend to his fraternity brothers in college.

When I first knew him, nearly forty years ago, he was just plain Dick Hardy and I think really that is the title that pleases him most today.

To be formally presented to him now however, reads like the final scene from *Monsieur Beaucaire* or *Clarence*—You know the style.

I have the honor of presenting you to the Hon. Mr. Richard Hardy, Bachelor of Arts, former principal of the Menominee schools, former salesman of the Prang Educational Company, organizer and president of the Dixie Cement Company, philanthropist for whom his fellow townsmen name their public schools, mayor of Chattanooga and chairman of the board of directors of the Pennsylvania Dixie Cement Corporation.



## HEADS WASHINGTON A. P. BUREAU

Note: The following story, taken from the "Indianapolis Star for April 17, 1927, is of particular interest to the editor of The Scroll because he served as cub reporter on "The Bachelor" at Wabash College when Brother Price was editor.

WHEN Byron Price, a farmer boy, became editor of the monthly publication of the Topeka High School of Legrange County, Indiana, he began to find fascination in reading of the romantic and interest-

ing lives of Melville E. Stone and of men notable in the newspaper world.

And then a little later when he had become editor of the Bachelor, the newspaper published at Wabash College, his star was set for a career as a newspaper man. He early determined upon newspaper work as his life profession because it was "interesting."

The ex-editor of the Topeka High School *Index* and ex-editor of the *Bachelor* has now battled his way to a high position in the profession—chief of the Washington bureau of the Associated Press.

Announcement of his promotion was made a few days ago. Mr. Price becomes the head of the largest and most important news bureau maintained by the Associated Press in any city of the world.

Mr. Price traveled fast to attain the place, for he is only thirty-six years old, but it was only through the hardest kind of work that advancement, step by step, came to him. He has earned all he has won. The quality of self-reliance and a willingness to do a full day's work have found reward in his latest premotion.

his latest promotion.

After having attended the rural grade school near his father's farm, and being graduated from the high school of the nearby village of Topeka, Mr. Price, with meager funds, went to Crawfordsville to fight his way through Wabash College. He did not mind the toil that was ahead of him—the drudgery he did before and after school hours to make ends meet—because he had an objective toward which he was working.

Besides carrying on his studies to win an A.B. degree, Mr. Price, during those four years, learned to be a short-order cook, carried out tons of ashes from furnaces, swept acres of floors, carried newspapers, delivered laundry, mastered shorthand by attending night classes and became secretary to the college president during his senior year. All this outside work

—early morning and late night toil—was necessary in order to provide funds for tuition, board and room.

During a part of this time he also managed to do some reporting on the two local Crawfordsville papers and serve as Wabash College correspondent of the *Indianapolis Star*.

And then during his "spare" moments, young Price somehow managed to find time to serve as a member of the Y.M.C.A. cabinet, to act as president of his class in his sophomore year, to devote some activity to his fraternity,  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$ , and in successive years to serve as reporter, managing editor and editor-in-chief of the Bachelor, to be a member of the debating team, and, as a climax, to win the 1910 Indiana state intercollegiate debating contest held in Tomlinson Hall, Indianapolis. He left Wabash College with his diploma in the spring of 1912, and has been so busy since that time with his varied activities that he has not been permitted to return to the campus which has so many memories for him. But when he does finally return he will receive a big reception if only those extending the welcome are the citizens of the town whose furnaces he "shook down," for they are a numerous lot.

During his first two years at Wabash College, Price's daily schedule included arising before daylight and delivering the local morning paper to one hundred or more homes; firing the furnaces and carrying out the ashes in a half-dozen homes and then sweeping three rooms and a hall in one of the college buildings. All this was done before the first class at the morning session of school. And then in the evening, to get board free, he worked in the Ben-Hur dairy lunch, where he learned to be a ham-andegg cook. Some time during the course of the day he found time to sweep the floor in Otto's jewelry store.

In his junior year he learned shorthand at the night school of the Crawfordsville Business College with a view to becoming secretary, during his senior year, to Dr. George L. Mc-Intosh, then president of the college. He was thus able to drop his janitor job, his laundry and paper routes and other before-daylight activities in favor of letter writing, serving as reporter for the Crawfordsville Journal and the Crawfordsville Review and writing college news for the Indianapolis Star.

He did not participate in college athletics, but those furnace-firing jobs gave him all the physical benefits to be obtained from a gymnasium. He has brawn and muscle today from shaking the clinkers from the furnaces in the homes of Ed Vooris, then mayor of the town, and Dumont Peck and other Crawfordsville residents.

Upon being graduated, Price began casting about for employment. He wanted first of all to repay his father the small amount of money he had been compelled to borrow to finish school. Obtaining a teacher's license he received an appointment to teach English and history in the New Albany (Indiana) High School. But before the term opened he had given up the idea of teaching. During the summer he obtained a position in the Chicago office of the United Press news agency, a short time later being transferred to Omaha, Nebraska.

However, before the end of the year, he had taken employment with the Associated Press, working first in its Atlanta, Georgia, office and then being sent to New Orleans, Louisiana. He came to the Washington bureau first in 1914, remaining here until August, 1915, when he entered the Army to serve in the World War. He received a commission as first lieutenant of infantry at the officers' training school at Fort Myer, Virginia. He went overseas and to the battle front as an officer of the 52nd Pioneer Infantry.

After the war he returned to the Washington bureau of the Associated Press, renewing this employment in May, 1919. He was assigned to the Senate press gallery to "cover" the year's debate on the League of Na-

tions. During that period he accompanied President Wilson on his Western speaking trip in behalf of the League, being with the President as a reporter for the Associated Press, when he suffered his breakdown at Wichita, Kansas. During the Harding campaign he was the Associated Press representative at Marion, Ohio, and, following the election, accompanied President-elect Harding on his trip to the Panama Canal. During the Arms Conference, sponsored by President Harding, Mr. Price had charge of the Associated Press staff of writers. During the last two or three years he has been day editor and news editor in the Washington office. His recent promotion as chief of the bureau followed the retirement of L. C. Probert.

It was the "self-reliance" ideas instilled into him by his father, John

Price, a farmer until his death a little more than a year ago, which gave Byron Price the will to carry forward despite all obstacles. Price, a farmer on the "old home place" and once a member of the Indiana legislature, is a brother. A second brother, Earl Price, is the agricultural agent in Lewis County, Illi-Mrs. R. L. Thompson, of Topeka, Indiana, and Mrs. Willis Leming, of Ligonier, Indiana, are sisters. Mr. Price's teachers, when he was a pupil at the Topeka High School, included Luman K. Babcock, who was later secretary to Governor Hanly and Otis L. Smith, now an assistant attorney general of Michigan.

Mr. Price, whose Washington home is at 4521 Lowell Street, was married in 1920 to Miss Priscilla Alden, a direct descendant of John and Priscilla Alden.

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## RHODES SCHOLAR FROM IDAHO

ALLACE CABLE BROWN, Idaho, '26, will resign his position as assistant city editor of the Lewiston (Idaho) Tribune to enter Exeter College, Oxford University in October of this year. Brother Brown entered the employ of the Tribune as a "cub" last June and, in a few months, was promoted to the "city desk" of that newspaper, where he has since been employed.

Brother Brown was appointed Idaho Rhodes scholar for 1927 from a field of seven candidates late last fall, after he had been out of college since the preceding June.

Perhaps there was no one at Idaho more deserving, as well as being better qualified for this honor, than was Brother Brown. Almost from his freshman year he started on a career of extra-curricular activities, which, at graduation, had taken him to the

top. Few students have been graduated from the University of Idaho who have been given greater positions of trust and responsibility than were given Brother Brown during his four years at Idaho. He was universally accepted by his fellow students as a leader.

Brother Brown will enter Exeter College, probably to study in the honor school of English and literature. English was his major subject at the University of Idaho, and for the most part, his activities were literary. He held membership in various literary societies and fraternities, was editor-in-chief of the Idaho Argonaut, student semi-weekly newspaper, and an associate editor of the Blue Bucket, quarterly literary and humor magazine.

In a scholastic way Brother Brown was the model for the entire chapter.

Almost with every report his average headed the chapter list. He was elected to  $\Phi$  B K, national honorary scholastic fraternity, in the spring of his senior year. In his junior year he was pledged to Silver Lance, senior men's honorary society, which selects its membership from outstanding students who are in the highest division of the class, both in a scholarship and extra-curricular activity. In his senior year he was elected president of

this organization. Brother Brown was a charter member and later president, for two years, of  $\Delta$   $\Sigma$ , honorary journalistic fraternity. As head of this organization he sponsored the first "gridiron banquet" to be given on the Idaho campus. His literary activities for the *Blue Bucket*, won him membership in Winged Helmet, literary and artistic society. He was a member, for four years, of the Eng-

lish Club, and for one year was president of this organization.

He won a position on the staff of the Idaho Argonaut during his freshman year, and served as a reporter. He worked with the paper, in various capacities throughout his four years in college. During his sophomore year he was elected managing editor and served as editor-in-chief during his junior year. He was a member of the board of control and contributed many brilliant articles during his senior year.


Following a year of contributing to the Blue Bucket, Brother Brown was named associate editor, and, as such, handled the editorials for the magazine. In addition he contributed many verses, some of which were given recognition in national magazines and were selected by publishers of one book. In the same year he was humor editor of the Gem of the Mountains, the university annual.

He was the unanimous choice of the Senior class for the presidency for the last semester of the year, and near the close of school in June, he was elected permanent president of the class.

Members of the Rhodes Scholarship examining committee told a reporter for a newspaper following Brother Brown's selection that he had passed the highest type of examination with honors; that he stood outstandingly ahead of the other six candidates.

Appointment as a Rhodes Scholar fulfils an ambition for Brother Brown. Since he left high school he has worked toward that end. With the foundation he has laid for his further study, not only Idaho Alpha, but the entire  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  organization should hear of Brother Brown in future years.

## TO HONOR FRANKLIN AT STANFORD

Note: Here is a story about Edward Curtis Franklin, Kansas, '88, from the Stanford "Illustrated Review" for March, 1927. In addition to Brother Franklin, it refers also to one of his associates in that famous Kansas Alpha chapter of the eighties, Vernon Kellogg, Kansas, '89, secretary of the National Research Council. Brother Franklin's associates at Stanford are engaged in establishing the Franklin Fellowship for chemistry students in recognition of his work there.

FTER twenty-four years of distinguished scientific research and inspired teaching, Professor Edward Curtis Franklin will retire from active university service in the Stanford University department of chemistry at the end of the present academic year. It is with the deepest regret that his students and associates see him go; for, as a "devoted teacher, indefatigable investigator, faithful friend, and an all-round good fellow," he has filled a large place in the University.

Dr. Edwin E. Slosson, author of several popular science books and a former associate of Franklin's at Kansas University, says: "If teaching consists, as it is still commonly held, in pumping information under high pressure into a class full of unwilling brains, Franklin could not be called pre-eminent as a pedagogue. But, if teaching consists, as I believe it should, primarily of leadership and example, of showing the student what research means by doing research in his presence and lending him a helping hand when he is trying to do something for himself, then Franklin is a great teacher."

As dean of the Stanford school of graduate study, Professor Franklin has endeavored consistently to break away from the hindering effect of strict regulations and requirements, and to encourage the graduate student to strike out for himself as long as he is scientifically minded and earnest in the pursuit of his object.

Professor Franklin came to Stanford as associate professor of organic

chemistry in 1903 from Kansas University, where he had been professor of physical chemistry since 1899, on the invitation of his old friend from student days at Kansas, Vernon Kellogg, who was then a member of the Stanford faculty and had been commissioned by the University to secure the chemist's services. In 1906 Franklin was advanced to full professorship, which position he has held ever since.

Doctor Franklin has occupied numerous positions of trust and honor, both state and national. From 1911 to 1913 he was on leave from Stanford as chief of the division of chemistry of the United States Public Health Service. During the war years, 1917-18, he was a member of the advisory board of the United States Bureau of Mines, physical chemist of the United States Bureau of Standards, and consulting chemist to the Ordnance Bureau of the United States Army.

In 1923 he achieved the signal honor of being the first man from a Western university to be elected president of the American Chemical Society. Professor Franklin is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, a member of the National Academy of Science, and the American Philosophical Society.

In 1925 he was awarded the William H. Nichols medal for his article on "Systems of Acids, Bases, and Salts," which was considered by a jury of the American Chemical Society as the finest research paper of the year in the field of chemistry.

Professor Franklin completed his undergraduate work in the university of his native state, Kansas, and, after study at the University of Berlin, received his doctorate under Ira Remsen, now president emeritus of Johns Hopkins University, who first inspired him in his research work. Returning to teach at the University of Kansas, Franklin began his first scientific investigations upon the behavior of liquid ammonia as an electrolytic solvent. This was to open up an entirely new field, known to chemists as the ammonia system of acids, bases and salts, which has become a contribution of the first importance to the chemistry of nitrogen.

In his work, Dr. Franklin was materially aided by two of his outstanding characteristics: his independence of thought and action which enabled him to think things out in his own mind and work them out with his own hands, placing very little dependence on books; and that same courage, love of adventure, and native daring which have made him such an enthusiastic mountaineer. His work has called for great manipulative skill; for it has involved the use in the liquid state of ammonia, a substance which, at ordinary temperatures and pressures, is a gas. Twice he has narrowly escaped blindness or worse by explosions of his liquid air machine; once just after he had promised Vernon Kellogg to come to Stanford, and had taken the latter to his laboratory to show him some recent experiments.

Professor Franklin's discovery that many organic compounds containing nitrogen are electrolytically dissociated in liquid ammonia gave chemists a new view of this type of dissociation which will be of the greatest significance when more is learned of the forces that hold atoms together in molecules, and when the concept of the electron is applied to organic compounds. His study of the metallic derivatives of ammonia also led to the preparation of a series of compounds that increased knowledge of chemical affinity of the nitrogen atom. Dr. James F. Norris, at the pres-

entation of the Nichols medal, said, in summing up the chemist's career: "Franklin has opened up a most productive field which his co-workers and others are now developing. the broadest point of view his work centers around the chemistry of nitrogen, but he has markedly increased our knowledge of ammonia and has developed the theory of electrolytic dissociation by applying it to nonaqueous solutions. The chemist of the future who studies the chemical affinity of the nitrogen atom from the point of view of theories yet to be conceived will find a wealth of compounds of the element first prepared by Franklin which will help in reaching the ultimate solution of his problem."

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## THE BADGE OF PHI DELTA THETA

By A. H. Speer, Wooster, 'OI

THE badge of a Phi is his first means of recognition by the outside world. He is, therefore, vitally interested in it.

The symbolism of its component parts is worthy of note.

There are few badges in the fraternity world whose symbolic parts have been chosen more independently, and have persisted without change for a longer period. These parts are few in number, simple, pure and true to original sources.

The main contour of our badge is a shield—an essential part. On the shield is placed a scroll—another essential part. The eye, always used above the scroll and first used by

 $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ , and the initials of the secret and significant motto are welcome additions, indeed almost necessary addi-

tions, but not essential.

In all the turmoil of evolution of the sacred badge from its inception in the minds of Robert Morrison and James McM. Wilson, in 1848, and the official acceptance of the finished badge by the mother chapter June 26, 1849, till the later nineties, about fifty years, never was the original pin in serious question. Though many pro-

posals of changes were made, involving size, shape, weight, enamel, jewels, sword, chain, never were the four main component parts, mentioned above, in danger of loss, except in the weak attempt, in 1857, of the original Kentucky Alpha chapter to substitute for the badge a monogram design, which plan would have done away with the shield and the scroll—the two most essential parts—and left nothing distinctive for future Phis to love. This abortive attempt was dis-

approved at once by the mother chapter and the proposed change never took place.

Our badge is a composite but not a hodge-podge. It was sanely thought out by mature persons with a distinct purpose in mind. It was perfected clear of historical entanglements.

The badges of the Miami Triad are all quite different. The nearest form to our badge was that of  $\Theta$   $\Delta$  X, founded in Union June 5, 1848, expanding first to the University of Vermont in 1852 and not coming westward till after the Civil War. Morrison and Wilson knew nothing of the  $\Theta$   $\Delta$  X badge when they conceived the symbolic badge of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ .

The scroll is an essential feature of the  $\Delta$  K E badge, which order was

founded in Yale in 1844. Nothing was known of their scroll by our founders by their own statement till that fraternity entered Miami in 1852.

 $\Phi$  K  $\Psi$  started with a monogram and did not adopt the shield till 1852. The eye was adopted by  $\Delta$  T  $\Delta$  in 1860.

The quality of originality is much coveted by men. Morrison and Wilson were free to think, thought freely, and exercised completely the quality of originality in fashioning the badge of  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ .

The great and interesting history of our pin has been told authoritatively by Fathers Morrison and Wilson as originators, and Palmer as historian. This article is not written for the purpose of offering new data, or settling muted points, but to organize and correlate, partly at least,

the data already in hand for the purpose of furnishing the chapters of  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  with a convenient catalog and information guide for use in chapter examinations. For it is the wish and hope that chapters, more and more, may require their initiates to have knowledge of the founders, of their symbolic ideas embodied in the badge, banners, etc., and of the activities and government of the fraternity at large to the end that they may have a reason for the faith that is in them.

The summaries that follow may also be used as a primer of the badge for the rushing committee, and also for old Phis who, in their efforts to help "spike," find they have "lost their

logic."

Let us make history lovers of our initiates at once that twenty years may be gained in their inner fraternity life.

### SOME ORIGINAL BADGES

1849, June 12. Robert Morrison's first and original badge received from Beggs & Smith, Cincinnati, Ohio. Later stolen from his luggage in Cincinnati.

1849, June 26. This badge adopted by the mother chapter as official.

1850, February 2. Robert Morrison received his second badge (slightly smaller in size), ordered to replace badge of June 12, 1849. Lost, not known "how or exactly when."

1849. It seems that other badges were made and one was sent with copy of Bond and Constitution by Robert Morrison to Indiana Alpha upon installation.

1849. Second badge, duplicate of original, paid for and owned by the

chapter.

1852, June 26. The chapter badge mentioned above, worn by Brother J. K. Boude at senior party at home of President W. C. Anderson. This badge eventually lost track of.

1852. Badge made for E. P. Shields of Ohio Beta (Miami's second chapter, which lived only a short time). Brother Shields wore it as usher at

Commencement, Miami, 1853. This is the oldest badge now in existence.

1854. Badge of the Reverend J. C. Miller, *Indiana*, '55, made. "Huge affair."

1855. Badge of Judge D. D. Banta, Franklin, '55, received.

1866. Badge of A. M. Shuey, *Miami*, '66, given to a brother Phi when graduated.

1876. Badge of Judge D. D. Banta, *Indiana*, '55, given to his son, George Banta, *Indiana*, '76. This pin lost by the son.

1926. Badge of George Banta, Sr.,





or engraved on miscellaneous articles of jewelry, except stick pins and alumni buttons. Badge shall not be worn except by members, or mother, wife, daughter, sister, or fiancée. Badge must be worn at all times on left breast over heart. See Code, Article IX.

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# SOUTH CAROLINA LIFTS BAN ON FRATERNITIES

THE last piece of state legislation prohibiting fraternities was expunged from the statute books on March 31 when Governor Richards of South Carolina signed the bill repealing the law passed in 1897 which prohibited Greek-letter fraternities in institutions of higher learning in South-Carolina supported in whole or in part by public funds. There is now no law in any state forbidding fraternities in colleges or universities receiving state aid.

 $\Delta$  Y was the first fraternity to enter the University of South Carolina, which it did in 1850.  $\Delta$  K E followed in 1852 but both of these charters, as well as B  $\Theta$  II, were withdrawn in 1861. When the law was passed in 1897, X Y, K A,  $\Sigma$  A E, A T  $\Omega$ ,  $\Sigma$  N, X  $\Phi$ , K  $\Sigma$ , and II K A were represented on the campus.

 $\Phi$  K  $\Psi$  and  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$ , in addition to the three mentioned above, had withdrawn previous to the enactment of the anti-fraternity law.

It is probable that many chapters will seek to revive their chapters at South Carolina just as soon as the board of trustees of the institution, in accordance with the provisions of the old law, pass necessary resolutions.

 $\Sigma$  A E has already signified its intention of so doing. The original charter was granted in 1882. This was transferred to a group of local alumni in 1897 and later was transferred to the Supreme Council where it now reposes. As the charter was never revoked it will be transferred by vote of the council to a group of undergraduates now being formed at the University. It will be the one hundredth active chapter of  $\Sigma$  A E.

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# THE HISTORY OF PHI GAMMA DELTA





## L. H. Dunlop, '28



## Evans Heads Houston C. of C.

Joe Evans has been elected president of the Houston Chamber of Commerce, came the word to us at Hanover a short time back. Gratifying, yes, but not surprising. For, to those of us here at Hanover who have

been following the career of this son of Indiana Epsilon, who have watched his regular and repeated successes, and who have known the Evans tradition, this was but another step in the civic evolution of a Phi who is now officially a most distinguished citizen of Houston, and, for that mat-

ter, of all the Lone Star State, or even of all the South.

Although Bradstreet rates him now on the top side of a million, not by any stretch of the imagination could we conceive Brother Evans having been born with the traditional silver spoon in his mouth. His father was for sixty years a Presbyterian minister in Kentucky, with all that that implies in the way of financial rewards, or rather lack of them. Even when Brother Evans went to Texas, in 1901, his wealth was to be reckoned negatively; he had thirty-five dollars, but had borrowed fifty.

THE SCROLL doesn't run pages enough to the issue to give us space to record all of Brother Evans' Houstonian achievements. Hence, only the high lights. In 1923 and 1924 he directed the Community Chest campaign, the first time it had been successfully done in the history of Houston. This East Texas metropolis then had a greater percentage of oversubscription than any city of its

From 1918 to 1920 he was president of the Houston Cotton Exchange, and for his work then probably deserves more credit than any other individual for the development of the Port of Houston. A narrow, crooked, little bayou, which in Indiana, he says, "would be called a creek," has been broadened, straightened and deepened, until now Houston is the tenth export port of all the United States, sending out, for example, two and a half million bales of cotton annually. Houston is now the largest cotton market in the world. Brother Evans, himself, as a cotton broker, exports

heavily to all the leading European markets.

He was president of the Texas Cotton Association in 1918. He directed the Houston United War Work Campaign. Sometime vice-president of the Houston Club; a Red Cross organizer; president of the Houston Board of Trade; vice-president of a trust company; director in several clubs, two insurance companies, and a number of business corporations; associate editor of the Auction Bridge Magasine; radio broadcaster in expert bridge matches; member of the New Orleans Cotton Exchange, Liverpool Cotton Exchange, Chicago Board of Trade, etc. There! that's out!

One of Brother Evans' most unique distinctions, though, was in being the recipient in 1925 of the Houston Rotary Club service medal, awarded to that person performing the "most disinterested service to the city" during the year. This honor was in commemoration of his record-breaking Community Chest success.

But there is one thing that Brother Evans hasn't contributed to at all. That is the alumni problem of Phi Delta Theta. If there were a few thousand more like him, we could certainly—or any fraternity, for that matter—substitute another topic for that one at convention discussion group luncheons. His relations with the chapter have been most pleasant and helpful. Very truly is he separated by distance but joined in the bond. That comes, we like to think, from an active undergraduate Phi life—always the best preparation for intelligent and sustained alumni interest.

He was in school for just three years, leaving to enter the Army for a year at the time of our war with Spain. While in college he was president of the Indiana State Oratorical Association, and participated actively in such work. He hasn't forgotten his old college or chapter, either. Just a year or so ago, he established a rotary loan fund at Hanover; he has given liberally to the college and to five hundred ninety-three]

the chapter building fund; has founded an essay prize, and all his letters to the chapter convey his best wishes and offers of help.

Not many hobbies. He has been too busy for that. He is one of the foremost auction bridge experts of the country though, plays a little golf, and confesses to being a DX fan on his radio. If the truth were known, though, his three big hobbies would probably be his wife and two daughters.

They like him down there in Houston, too. Of course, his repeated successes would testify to that, but one newspaper columnist comments on his toastmaking ability in this wise: "Honestly, folks, did you ever see any man handle a crowd better than Joe Evans did last night? Heretofore, Chamber of Commerce spreads have been about as dismal as public misconduct as a means of livelihood, but with Joe handling the gavel, action supplants inaction and oratory becomes an appetizer instead of an opiate."

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# Joseph F. Sartori, Prominent Banker

The new chapter of California Gamma at the University of California, Los Angeles, boasts of one of the country's leading bankers, Joseph F. Sartori, *Cornell College*, '79.

Brother Sartori was born in Cedar Falls, Iowa, on Christmas Day, 1858. He went from the grade schools to Cornell College, Mt. Vernon, Iowa; and from there to the University of Freiburg, Germany, where he laid the foundation of a thorough scholarship. After two years abroad he returned home and was graduated from Cornell College with the Class of 1879. He then went to Ann Arbor and completed the law course at the University of Michigan in 1881. He first practiced law in the office of Leslie M. Shaw, who afterward became Secretary of the Treasury, and who, by the way, invited the young banker,

by that time already established in Los Angeles, to accept the post of Assistant Secretary, the honor of which he declined.

After practicing law for five years, Brother Sartori came to California and helped to establish the First National Bank of Monrovia. Two years later, in 1889, he opened what is now known as the Security Trust and Savings Bank in Los Angeles, the staff consisting of four people besides himself, he being the cashier. Six years later he became its president and has

been at the helm ever since. The fruit of his effort is seen today in magnificent Security system. which, in addition to the head office at Fifth and Spring Streets, includes forty-nine branch offices in various parts of the city and county. The Security is the twentieth bank in size in America. Only six banks in the United States outside of New York City are larger. Its resources total more than a quarter of a billion dollars. It has more than 300,000 de-

positors. The Security Bank Building in Long Beach is one of the finest banking offices in the West, while the Security Buildings in Hollywood and Glendale would grace any downtown Los Angeles corner. The majority of its branches are quartered in buildings of their own, each a distinct architectural addition to the community.

Despite the press of duties as executive head of this colossal institution, Brother Sartori has found time to take an active constructive part in most of the city's development pro-He headed the committee pledged to a civic center in the north end of the city; presided over the business men's body which initiated the plan to construct the Biltmore Hotel; is president of the Subway Terminal Corporation and the Central Business District Association. Through his influence many of the city's finest structures have been financed and built.

For nineteen years Brother Sartori has been a member of the legislative committee of the California Bankers' Association, and, during recent years, has been its chairman. He was president of the Savings Bank Division of the American Bankers' Association in 1914 and for five years was a member of the Currency Commission of that

organization.

When the Los Angeles Country Club was formed twenty-five years ago, Brother Sartori immediately interested himself in its welfare. He has held the presidency of this large and prosperous club, one of the best in the country, for about sixteen years. He is also a member of the California Club, the Jonathan Club, the University Club, the Los Angeles Athletic Club and the Midwick Country Club.

He is a director of the Los Angeles Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco and has been elected president of the Los Angeles Clearing House Association for a second term. In the latter capacity he was in charge of the arrangements made by local bankers for the entertainment of the

5,000 bankers who came here last year from all parts of the United States to attend the fifty-second annual convention of the American Bankers' Association, one of the most successful conventions in the history of that organization.

Brother Sartori had been an honorary member of the local fraternity which is now  $\Phi \Delta \Theta$  on the campus of the University of California, Los Angeles, for a year when the national charter was granted. On February 21, 1925, during the installation, he was initiated in our fraternity at a special ceremony. His interest has remained keen in California Gamma and his assistance has been and still is very valuable to the chapter.

## Capt. H. C. Gray, Idaho, '13, Attempts New Altitude Record

Exhausted by the enervating thinness of the upper air and the gruelling task of unloading two tons of sand ballast in less than two hours, Captain Hawthorne C. Gray, engineering officer at Scott Field, yesterday afternoon became unconscious as his balloon reached an altitude of 27,000 feet and thus failed in his first attempt to break the world's balloon altitude record of 35.433 feet.

He left Scott Field at 1:18 P.M., bundled in heavy flying togs and masked with an Army oxygen helmet and at 3:05 o'clock he landed, fifty miles southeast of the field, near Ashley, Illinois. His balloon was in sight of his home station during most of the flight.

After he had been examined by the post physician last night and pronounced unharmed by his flight, Captain Gray announced he would make another try for the record in about a month, after improvements have been made on his oxygen equipment and some method has been devised to make disposal of ballast less exhausting.

Yesterday was ideal for his first

attempt. There was a light ground wind from the east and the sky was cloudless. Gray's balloon began taking form over the inflating hose at eleven o'clock and at twelve forty-five the basket had been slung beneath the 80,000-cubic foot bag.

Gray, tall, sturdily built, with thin hair, and an easy smile, was surrounded by a group of fellow officers and sightseers as he struggled into his flying togs. Several sweaters, four pairs of heavy socks and, finally, a leather flying suit lined with fur, made up his cold-fighting equipment.

So cumbersome were his togs that he had to lie on his back on the ground while two officers worked his feet into fur-lined flying boots.

The loud speaker on the radio set in the basket was tinkling out a waltz from a St. Louis station as Gray climbed into place and the balloon was "walked" out to the center of the field. A few preliminaries there, and the bag was released. It ascended easily, first to the southwest, then swung north and finally east. For more than an hour it hung in the sky, a tiny silver ball which at times appeared hanging from the pale moon in the east.

"I took three knives with me to cut open ballast bags," Gray said later. "I had 82 sacks of fifty-pounds each and kept up a constant ascent of about 700 feet a minute. There wasn't much wind and I stayed over the field for a long time.

"At 15,000 feet the blades of all three knives were dulled by the heavy canvas of the bags. I was pretty well bundled up and it was hard work to peck at the bags with a dull knife. One time my knife slipped and hit a rope and a whole bag of sand went down."

That sack, falling from 18,000 feet, struck with a terrific thump in front of the home of Lieutenant Colonel John A. Paegelow, Gray's commanding officer. It smashed a hole a foot deep in Col. Poegelow's front yard and showered sand for fifty feet.

"I began using oxygen at 12,000 feet," Gray said. "After 18,000 feet I used it continuously. It was shortly before three o'clock that I began to check on my instruments. I had just noticed that the altimeter was at 27,000 feet when I checked out—became unconscious.

When I came to I was lying on the floor of the bag. The radio was still going. I slapped my legs, which were numb with cold, and finally got on my feet. I was falling rather fast and began to heave over ballast to slow up the descent. Finally the balloon landed in a field and I sat down in the basket to wait for help from the three airplanes that were following me.

"Finally one of them landed. Two farmers had run to the basket and I heard Lieutenant Herbert Baisley shout, 'There's a man in there.' One of the farmers looked in and said, 'He's hurt, I guess,' and the other one said, 'No, he's dead.' Then I opened my eyes and they helped me out."

Lieutenant O. A. Anderson in a *DH-4* had been circling around the balloon during most of the descent and he landed nearby. Then Captain B. F. Giles landed, to take Gray home, and a fourth plane, piloted by Captain H. H. Young, circled overhead. Gray was back at the field in less than an hour.

His instruments are to be calibrated today to determine the exact altitude he reached. Then they will be sent to the Bureau of Standards by Major Albert Bond Lambert, official observer, for verification as to their accuracy. The present balloon altitude record established by the German aëronauts, Suring and Berson, has stood since 1901, and Major Lambert said Gray's was the first serious attempt ever made in this country to break it.

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# Franklin Phi Takes Good Position

The public school system of South Bend, Indiana, was re-enforced January 1, 1927, when Brother R. E. Blackwell, *Franklin*, '24, became editor of publications and director of junior placement service in a civic educational program considered one of the best in Indiana.

Brother Blackwell resigned his position as deputy state superintendent of public instruction with offices in the State House at Indianapolis, to accept the South Bend position. He had been deputy under the state superintendent, Dr. Henry Noble Sherwood, since December, 1924.

In his new capacity, Brother Black-well will have direct supervision of all school publications in South Bend. He will also have charge of employment for approximately 5,000 boys in that city.

The recent honor gained by Brother Blackwell follows many which he achieved while a student in Franklin College and an active member of Indiana Delta. He was editor of the 1923 Almanack, junior yearbook, and was editor-in-chief of the Franklin, college weekly newspaper. For five years he was connected with the Franklin Evening Star as reporter, then city editor, and also corresponded for the Indianapolis Star. He was prominent in student government and activities. He was one of the organizers of the Indiana High School Press Association in 1922.

Brother Blackwell conceived the idea of the newly initiated men's convention to be held with Indiana Delta, April 30 and May 1, 1927, with initiates from all chapters in Epsilon province to attend. The meeting will be the first of its kind ever attempted, and has secured the endorsement of the General Council.

Brother Blackwell, since his graduation, has maintained an active interest in affairs of the fraternity, and has assisted materially in the activities of Indiana Delta.

The new incumbent of the South Bend position was married to Miss Dorothy Dinsmore, Δ Δ Δ, on October 28, 1925. They will reside in South Bend.

After having gone to Ohio University together and then into banking business in Athens twenty years ago, Samuel L. McCune, Ohio, '96, president of the Ohio-Pennsylvania Joint Stock Land Bank, and George De Camp, Ohio, '94, chairman of the board of the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland, are still working shoulder to shoulder, observes the Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Only one floor of the Federal Reserve building in Cleveland now

separates their activities.

"McCune started with the Bank of Athens," reads the article, "De Camp with the First National. McCune was a bank examiner many years and came to Cleveland to join Maynard Murch about thirteen years ago. He was vice-president of the Midland bank when it formed here but left to organize the land bank.

"McCune and De Camp, Strickland Gillilan, the humorist, and James P. Wood, *Ohio*, '02, of Tolles, Hogsett and Ginn, are all alumni of Ohio

University and close friends."

The article was written in connection with the purchase recently, by McCune, of the New York Joint Stock Land Bank. James P. Wood, formerly of Athens, negotiated the purchase. The group which sold out to McCune was headed by Guy Huston, probably the best known figure in land bank affairs in this country.



# Other Fraternities

F. M. Massey, Dean of Men at the University of Tennessee, makes these pertinent remarks about fraternity standards:

I doubt if upper classmen in fraternities realize what a powerful influence they wield over pledges. The average pledge in a fraternity would rather be president of his chapter than president of his university. In the early stages of his life in the fraternity house he looks up to the leader of his chapter as an ideal Back home his parents and his high school teachers have told him what fine scholarly standards he would find at the university. They have told him how hard he would have to study if he measured up to the standards. It is a pretty serious blow to him when in the evenings around the chapter house fireside he hears the minimum requirements rather than a high standard discussed. In other words, the main criticism I have of the fraternity chapter house is that they are doing good work when they might do excellent work. They are being average when they might stand out as real leaders. They are permitting the curse of minimum requirements to destroy their fine ambitions for maximum oppor-

The undertow current in our fraternity seems to harp upon placing chapters in only the larger institutions of learning in the United States. I for one vehemently protest against such a narrow policy. whether it comes from officials or nonofficials in our organization. Such a step would be suicidal. We do not buy the institutions, but real men, no matter if the school is in debt or possessed of an endowment of \$10,000,000. alumni of today are from smaller schools. where you really get collegiate atmosphere from the day you enter until graduation day arrives. Fraternal life is worthwhile, you know all the boys on the campus, associates you will carry through life and to the grave, with whom you will feel that you have always had something in common.

Today at the universities of 2,500 to 6,000 students you don't even know your classmates and sometimes your fraternity brothers.

Our backbone lies in the smaller institutions of learning. Keep that backbone rigid. Let us bear this in mind at the next convention, turning our faces to the sun, and proclaim a policy of forward, not backward. Our hope is the small college and let us build our house upon that stalwart rock.

In his junior year he was named James Manning Scholar and was elected to \$\Phi\$ B K. One of his professors paid "Bob" the high com-pliment of naming him as the most intellectually gifted and the deepest thinker among the student body at Brown in the last twenty-five years.

Dr. Samuel Edward Young, Westminster, '86

The Reverend Dr. S. Edward Young, for the last nineteen years pastor of the Bedford Presbyterian Church, Nostrand Avenue and Dean Street, Brooklyn, died shortly after midnight, March 28, 1927, at his home, 1311 Dean Street.

About ten days ago Dr. Young caught a cold. Pneumonia developed, but it was hoped by his friends that his vigorous constitution would help him to successfully fight the disease. For several days he had seemed to make encouraging progress.

Dr. Young was exceedingly active in the pulpit, in his parish work and in civic movements. For many years he had advocated and practiced greater publicity for church affairs as one method of stimulating interest. Many preachers have followed his example.

His sermons throughout his residence in Brooklyn had attracted attention. A frequent feature consisted of comment on affairs of the day.

"We try to ease our consciences once in a while by making a show of indignation against the flaunted vices," he said on that occasion. "But offenders of the smarter sort know we do not mean it very determinedly, and prepare to go on as soon as the flurry

is over—and it seems to be nearly over now."

Before coming to New York, Dr. Young was pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh for ten years. His methods there attracted considerable attention. During the summers he held open-air meetings, which were attended by thousands. He founded the Sunday School services in Pittsburgh theaters, and other cities followed the example.

Dr. Young's activities in Pittsburgh called forth criticism from part of his congregation. He was charged with using circus methods. He received his call to the Bedford Church while this controversy was at its height, and he accepted it against the protests of many in his congregation.

His experiences in Pittsburgh did not interfere with his work here. He sponsored many movements and was outspoken against what he considered the evils of society. His stand against gambling was perhaps his most pronounced.

Born at Deep Cut, Ohio, on June 6, 1866, the son of the Reverend James and Rosanna Young, Dr. Young attended Westminster College in Missouri. He graduated from Princeton Theological Seminary in 1888 and then studied a year at Union Seminary here. After a five years' pastorate in Asbury Park, New Jersey, he went to the Central Presbyterian Church, Newark, New Jersey. From there he went to Pittsburgh in 1898.

During Dr. Young's Brooklyn pastorate, a new church building was erected and a mortgage of \$55,000 on the property paid. Among his many activities he was perhaps proudest of his work for the men on lightships and in light-houses and life saving stations. In 1892 he appealed successfully before committees in the Senate and House at Washington for higher wages for the life-savers and light-keepers.

In 1898 Dr. Young was appointed by President McKinley as a special chaplain in the military forces sent to Cuba. At the time of his death he



was chaplain of the Fourteenth Regiment, New York National Guard, of

Brooklyn.

He had served on various committees of the Presbyterian denomination, among them the Evangelistic Committee of the General Assembly. He formerly was chaplain of the Actors' Church Alliance of the United States. He was president of the Society for the Prevention of Crime and a member of the Presbyterian College Board, the Clerical Union, the Phi Delta Theta fraternity and several clubs.

In 1893 Dr. Young married Miss Constance Wilburta Paddock of Philadelphia, who survives him. He also leaves a daughter, Miss Alyse Paddock Young, and three sons, the Reverend Lorin Bradford Young, assistant rector of the Church of the Holy Trinity, Montague and Clinton Streets, Brooklyn; S. Edward, Jr., a student at Amherst, and Perry, who is living in Roscoe, New York.

Funeral services were held in the Bedford Presbyterian Church.

# Dr. David Hough Dolley, Randolph-Macon, '97

Dr. David Hough Dolley, fortynine years of age, professor of pathology at St. Louis University School of Medicine, died Monday morning, April 11, 1927, in El Paso, Texas, of a hemorrhage resulting from pulmonary tuberculosis, it was learned yesterday. Funeral services were held at Lebanon, Illinois.

Dr. Dolley, who resided at the Roselle Hotel, 4145 Lindell Boulevard, left St. Louis February 12 on a leave of absence. His condition improved so rapidly in El Paso, according to his brother, Professor J. C. Dolley of McKendree College, Lebanon, that he began to take exercises.

The exercises proved too strenuous and the hemorrhage resulted, Professor Dolley said yesterday. He

arrived in El Paso last Saturday after a hurried trip upon hearing of his brother's serious condition.

Dr. Dolley was born in Lexington, Virginia, July 18, 1878. He was educated at the Randolph-Macon College, and took his master's degree there in 1898. In 1902 he received his degree of doctor of medicine at Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore. He was unmarried.

Dr. Dolley served as resident pathologist at the Charity Hospital. Cleveland, and in the same capacity at the Lakeside Hospital. He was professor of pathology at the University of North Carolina Medical School from 1906 to 1910. For twelve years, from 1910 to 1922, he was professor of pathology at the University Missouri School of Medicine. Since 1922, he has been connected with the St. Louis University School of Medicine as professor of pathology.

Dr. Dolley was the author of many papers on pathology, physiology, and normal and abnormal cytology. He was a member of the American Medical Association, the American Association of Pathologists and Bacteriologists, the American Association of Anatomists, the Society of Experimental Biology and Medicine, and many other scientific organizations.

Dr. Dolley was also a member of the  $\Phi$  B K,  $\Sigma$   $\Xi$ ,  $\Phi$   $\Delta$   $\Theta$  and  $\Phi$  B  $\Pi$  fraternities.

His funeral was attended by large delegations of the faculty and student body of St. Louis University School of Medicine.

Dr. Dolley is survived by his brother, Professor Dolley of McKendree College, and a sister, Mrs. A. B. Massey, of Danville, Kentucky, who is at present traveling in Europe. He is also survived by six nephews.

Death took another alumnus of "Ole Miss" when Carl C. Stingily, Mississippi, '00, suffered a fatal heart at-

tack in his law office in Gulfport, Mississippi. His passing occurred February 25, 1927.

Brother Stingily was born in Pelahatchie, Mississippi, on February 25, 1875, fifty-two years to the day previous to his death. His literary talent found its first opportunity of development when he entered Millsaps College, at Jackson, whence he enrolled at Mississippi College, in Clinton, the scene of his graduation. The Uniof Mississippi next versity Brother Stingily as a student of law. It was here that he became a Phi.

Following the completion of this course, he practiced law at Brandon, near his birthplace, for a number of years, when he moved to Sumner and joined the ranks of the firm of Hays, Stingily & Whitten. While a member of this concern, his star rose and he soon became recognized as one of the foremost attorneys in the Delta.

At the time of his death Brother Stingily was a member of the firm of Gardner, Brown & Stingily, of Gulfport. Although he was a comparative newcomer to the Mississippi Coast, he had made a distinct place for himself and the citizens of the community felt deeply his loss.

He is survived by his wife and five

daughters.

# Joseph Carlos Rich, Mississippi, '80

Joseph C. Rich, Mississippi, '80, died at his home in Mobile, Alabama, March 8, 1927, as a result of a stroke of paralysis which he suffered while attending church in Mobile two days Brother Rich was general counsel for the Gulf, Mobile and Northern Railway, had been a member of the Alabama state legislature and was at one time solicited to become a candidate for governor.

He was born at Stateline, Mississippi, sixty-seven years ago and was the eldest of the Rich children, others of whom attained prominence. mediately after his graduation in law, he went to Mobile and opened offices, and had made that city his home continuously.

He had been general counsel for the Mobile and Öhio Railroad since the beginning, and, for years, occupied the same position with the G. M. & N. He served as president protem of the G. M. & N. before that railroad was taken over by I. B. Tigrett and his associates.

He married Miss Mary Adams, of Mobile, who survives him, as do their two children.


