Scholastic Success A Matter of Approach

How does one become a better student? The successful student is not necessarily a genius (though of course it helps), but is most probably a person very much like yourself. What sets him apart scholastically from other students are his level of motivation, his study techniques, and his time management skills.

A self-directed learner is a highly motivated student who seeks out knowledge for its own sake. Many students fall far short of this ideal, however. Again it centers around the issue of motivation. If your academic performance is poor, you may want to ask yourself "Why did I decide to attend college? How do I feel about education and learning? What do I personally want to gain from college? Who or what are my greatest influences?"

Motivation

Motivation is a highly individual academic success factor. Because it is so personal, no one can "give" it to you. It comes from attending to what is going on inside you, and attempting to implement that which you feel you want and need. Take some time to think about your desires and to formulate your goals, and you will be well on the way to increasing your motivation level.

The second factor which sets the successful student apart from others consists of the study techniques he uses regularly. Study skills can be taught, unlike motivation, so the bulk of this article will be devoted to sharing the study skills implemented by many successful students. Study skills improvement is achievable, and it begins with a personal evaluation of your present skills and needs. Your individual preferences and tendencies will influence the tips you select to try. Incorporate into your study routine only what works for you, and you will see significant improve-

ment as you proceed with your academic career.

Note-Taking

Practice the 5Rs of note-taking:

1. **Record**—Take notes. Make it easier by dating the notes, writing legibly, using your own words and personal abbreviations, and copying all blackboard and overhead information.
2. **Reduce**—Edit your notes by filling in spaces, clarifying, underlining main points, and summarizing the lecture. Leave room for all of this in the margin.
3. **Recite**—Now go back over the notes, testing yourself on the content.
4. **Reflect**—Relate these notes to other assignments and to your background textbook reading.
5. **Review**—Concentrate before the test on the notes you have taken. As in step 3, test yourself on the content.

Classroom Activity

It is important to take good lecture notes, because if you miss crucial points, you can not go back. Before class begins, arrive a few minutes early to review the previous days' notes. To reduce distractions, sit as close to the instructor as possible. Once the lecture begins, it is helpful to:

1. Attend to the lecture—become mentally and physically alert; sit up straight in the chair; focus on the material being presented, do not doodle.
2. Actively listen—concentrate on the *content* of the lecture, not the lecturer. Listen for vocal hints, however, such as "The next three examples . . .", postural cues, for example, does the professor raise his fist while emphasizing a major point? Visual signs, such as blackboard information should also be attended. Lecturers occasionally cram a great deal of pertinent information into the end of the lecture—be ready for this.

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Cey Named Gehrig Winner for 1982

He came close to becoming major league baseball's first fatality in 61 seasons. As it was, he inadvertently became the central figure in the most frightening moment in the history of sports television.

It was in the fifth game of the 1981 World Series in Dodger Stadium. Goose Gossage, the feared fireballing relief ace of the New York Yankees, let fly with one of his trademark pitches. The ball "sailed"—meaning it got away from Gossage—and cracked with a sickening thud against the batting helmet just above Ron Cey's left ear.

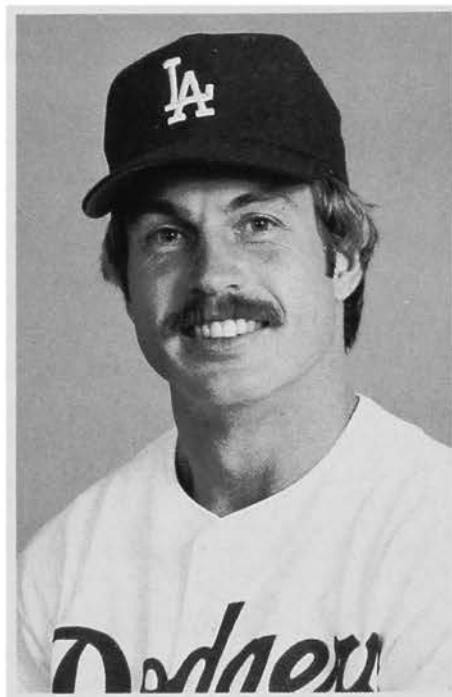
The stocky Dodger third baseman known as Penguin went down as if felled by a bolt of lightning.

Thanks to that batting helmet, Cey escaped serious injury and in a marvelous display of courage was back in the starting lineup for game six 48 hours later in New York. Even though his vision was slightly fuzzy, he delivered two hits including the game winning RBI as the Dodgers captured the Series and Cey earned a share of the MVP award.

That spectacular World Series mishap did not necessarily wrap it up, but it was one of the final factors in earning Brother Ronald Charles Cey (Washington State '70) the Lou Gehrig Memorial Award for 1982.

In becoming the 28th winner of the award in memory of the legendary Yankee Hall of Famer who was a Phi in his undergrad days at Columbia, Cey becomes only the second member of the fraternity to do so. The very first award in 1955 went to Alvin Dark (LSU '45), then a member of the New York Giants.

He is also the first unanimous choice of the 12-man nominating committee since the author took over as chairman in 1970.



"Naturally, this is a great honor," the stocky slugger said when advised of the vote. "I've been present at the awarding of the Gehrig plaque to three people I've known and highly respect, two of them ex-teammates.

"When I was asked to be in the presentation ceremony when Don Sutton was given the award in Dodger Stadium, I had never given any thought to eventually winning it myself. But the following year when we (the Dodgers) were in St. Louis when it went to Lou Brock, I began to think a little more about it."

Cey was in New York last January to be honored by the New York Baseball Writers for his World Series heroics when the 1981 award was presented to Tommy John, the former Dodger who went to the Yankees and subsequently the California Angels.

"When you look at the roster of former winners, knowing many of them are in the Hall of Fame, it puts a man in very distinguished company," Cey added, summing up his feelings.

Cey, who completed his 10th year as the Dodger third baseman

in 1982, has impressive career statistics (200-plus home runs and 800-plus RBI's) but he has been even better than that under the pressure of post-season play.

The Gossage beaming was not Cey's first injury due to being hit by a rival pitcher in 1981. Tom Griffin of the Giants fractured the largest bone in his left wrist on Sept. 6, 1981 and Dr. Frank Jobe, the noted baseball orthopedic surgeon, advised Cey it would take six weeks for him to shed the original cast when he treated the fracture.

"Three weeks later he told me I was making medical history and that I might have a shot at being in the playoffs," Cey said.

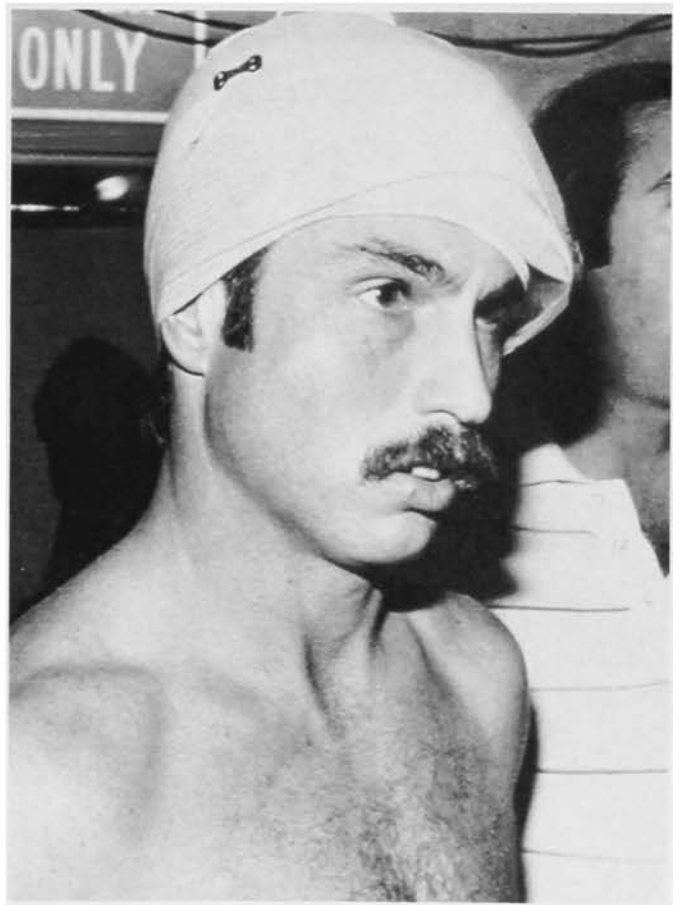
With the season extended a week because of the mini-playoffs created by the strike, Cey indeed made it back for the playoffs and wearing a cast designed to protect the left wrist and forearm, was in the lineup when the Dodgers took on the Montreal Expos in the National League championship series.

On the first ground ball hit his way, Cey handled it cleanly and whipped it to shortstop Bill Russell who turned it into a double play. His first trip to the plate produced a run-scoring double.

The heroics against the Expos were not his first in post-season play. Back in 1974 when the Dodgers took on the Pittsburgh Pirates in the NL playoff, his home run, two doubles and a single provided the firepower needed for a 5-1 victory in the second game.

As for his finest day in regular season play, there is no doubt. On Memorial Day, May 30, 1976, the Dodgers faced the Reds in a doubleheader in Riverfront Stadium, where the Big Red Machine regularly terrorized rival pitching.

The Penguin went on the rampage, ripping five straight hits in the opener and adding a sixth in the second game. But the three outs the Reds recorded against him were line drives—stinging line drives.

There wasn't a bloop, a flare or a seeing-eye single in the lot of them.

"Those were the hardest consecutive nine hit balls I've ever seen off the bat of one man," said Walter Alston, the longtime Dodger manager.

Cey acquired his nickname from the way he appears to waddle on his short legs.

"It goes way back," he says of his nickname linking him with the Antarctic bird. "When Tommy Lasorda (the current Dodger manager) heard about it when he managed me in the minors, he really took it up and I've been the Penguin ever since."

A three-sport star at Mount Tacoma High School in Tacoma, Wash., he was drafted by the New York Mets in June of 1966 in the second summer free agent draft. But he opted instead for an athletic grant to Washington State.

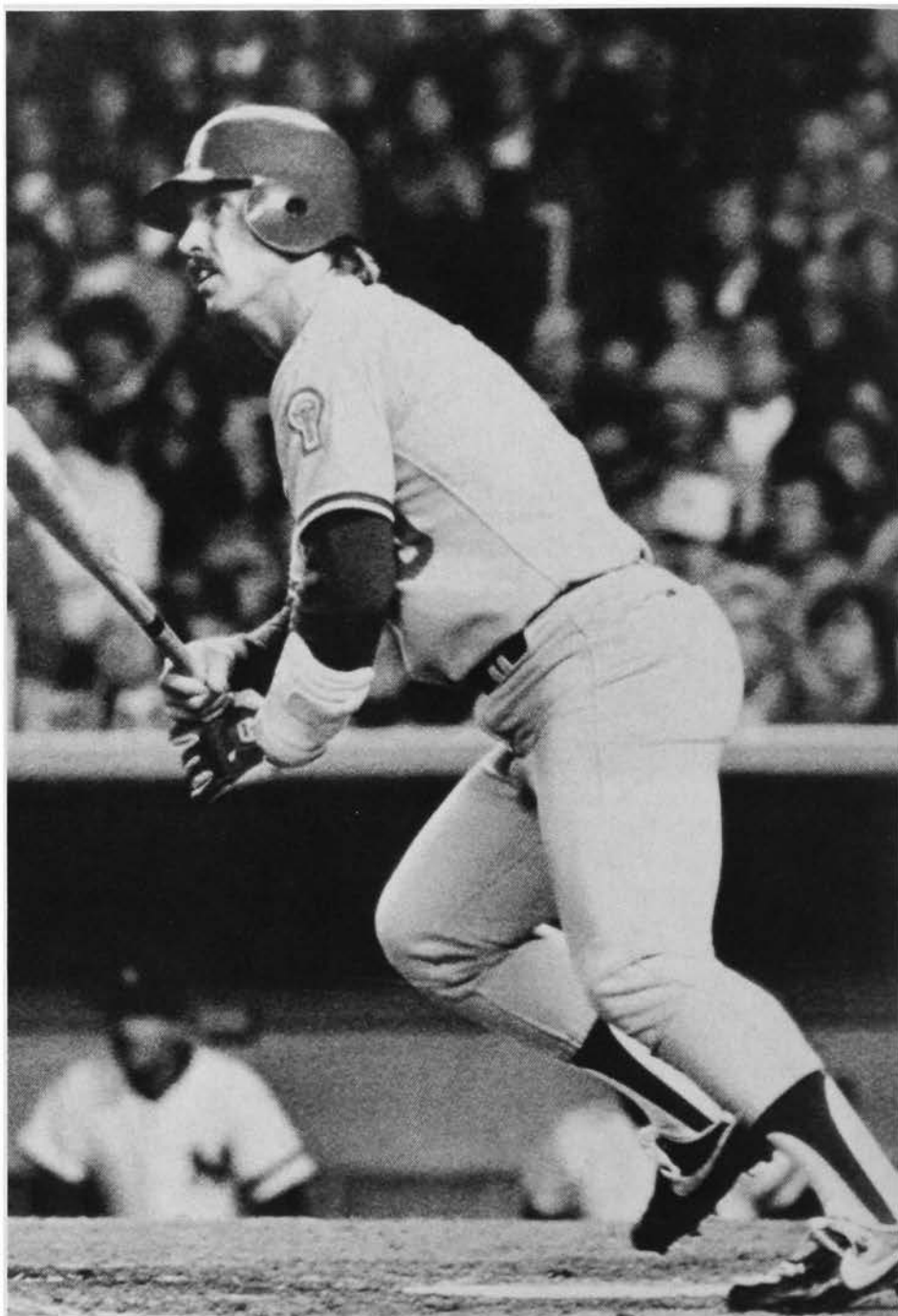
He had been a running back in football and a guard in basketball, despite his stocky torso not being an ideal physical structure for any of the three sports. But he's always been a shade faster than he looks and his strength is obvious.

When the Dodgers drafted him in the summer of 1968, he did turn pro and he started his climb up through the farm system, third base had been a chronic problem spot for the club even before it moved from Brooklyn to the West Coast.

When Cey became the regular third baseman in 1973, he joined Steve Garvey, Davey Lopes and Bill Russell in a Dodger infield that played together for nine straight seasons before Lopes went to the Oakland A's this past season.

He played his first major league game in September of 1971, having been called up to the Dodgers after enjoying a superb season at Spokane in the Pacific Coast League, hitting .328 and posting 32 home runs and 128 RBI's—a lofty total for a minor league season which is five weeks shorter than the majors.

In his early years he was notorious for his fast starts in April, leading Jim Murray, the famed Los

Angeles Times sports columnist, to dwell on his April hot streaks. Wrote Murray: "If I were Ronald Charles Cey, I would not waste April going after curveballs. I would take myself immediately to Monte Cristo, the nearest baccarat table, any high stakes poker game or the stock market."

But those days are obviously past because Cey has come through

in October when the stakes are much higher than in April.

Cey and his wife Fran, son Daniel and daughter Amanda reside in Woodland Hills, one of the hundreds of Los Angeles suburban communities.

Presentation of the award has not been scheduled but will take place during the 1983 season. ■

Wabash Mascot Tradition Continues

When Major General Earl L. Johnson, USAF, Ret., (Wabash '38) of Orlando, Florida, visited his alma mater in Crawfordsville in November of 1982, he experienced a 'bash homecoming' in addition to the \$3/4 million renovated chapter house. But, there was something decidedly lacking in the spanking new chapter house.

What did the chapter have back in the 30's that it did not have now? The physical structure has never been better; the actives had rebounded with a large, quality pledge class after a poor brush in '80 when the chapter house was under reconstruction; the college had loaned \$70,000 for new furnishings. What could possibly be missing? He suddenly realized—man's best friend!

General Johnson remembered one of his duties as a pledge almost half a century earlier. "One of my duties as a Phikeia was to feed and care for the house mascot—a St. Bernard called 'Old Ben'." Johnson was inspired to complement the "new" chapter house with a "new" mascot. While the chapter had never been without a "house dog," the St. Bernard tradition was one which the current actives welcomed enthusiastically.

Johnson returned to Orlando and contacted Weiss Acre Kennels, a recognized breeder of champion St. Bernards. He obtained a "pick of the litter" pup which was whelped in early December. The pup, an AKC registered pedigree (whose sire is a national champion), arrived in Crawfordsville in mid March and was duly dubbed "The General," in honor of the man who rekindled an old tradition.

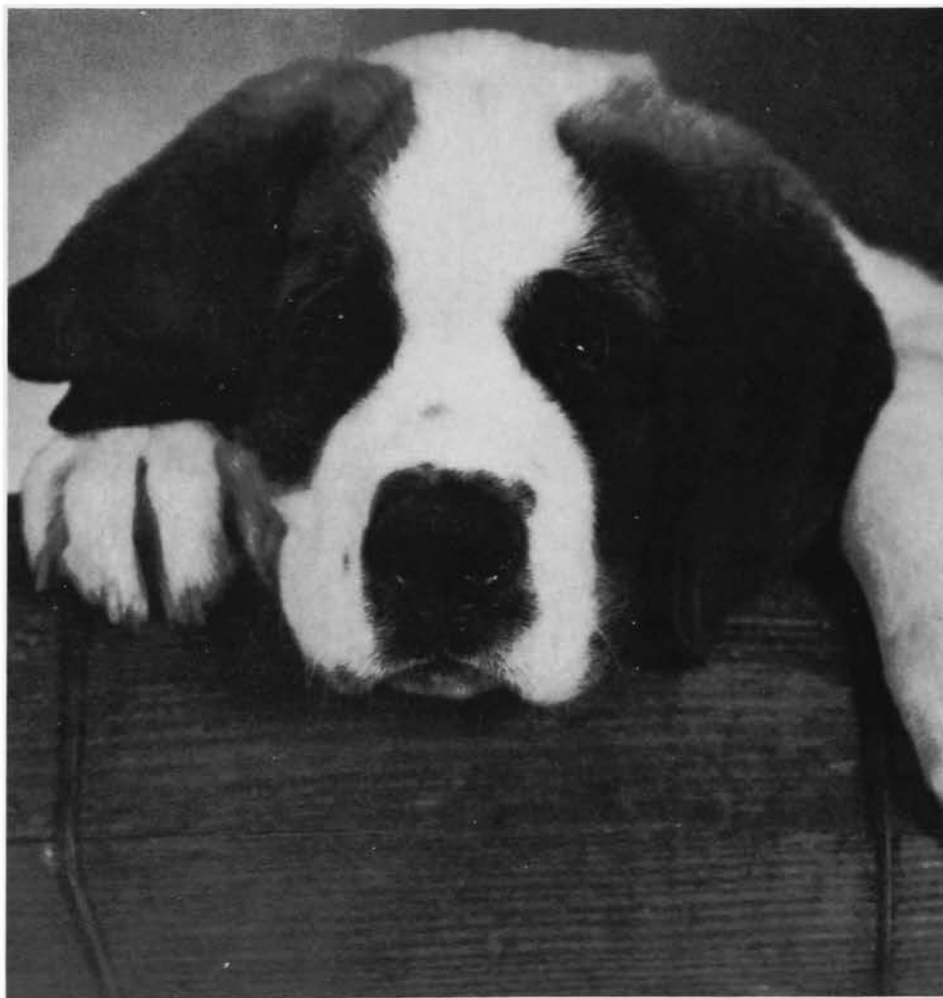
"General" fit right in at the new chapter house and was immediately spoiled by the actives (and every secretary and faculty wife on campus). He had plenty of company, too: three active's dogs and the cook's dog were in residence

when he arrived. The entire chapter took part in quickly housetraining General. Everyone learned to look before they took a step, and to turn on the lights at night before venturing down a dark hallway. It was also necessary to keep an eye on the rapidly growing pup during dances and exchanges, for like all Wabash men, General tended to sniff out the keg. He also quickly learned that if one could dodge the feet on the dance floor, there was plenty of spilt beer to lap up.

Jealousy grew almost as rapidly as the pup when General, in the eyes of the fairer sex, entered the "cute" stage. When sororities spent the night at the Liberal Arts college for men, actives were frequently surprised to find that their special co-ed preferred to curl up with General.

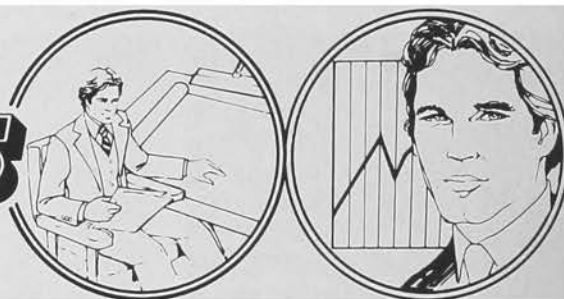

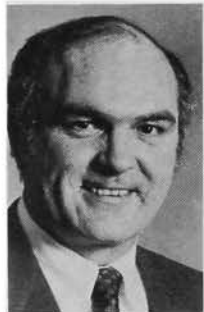

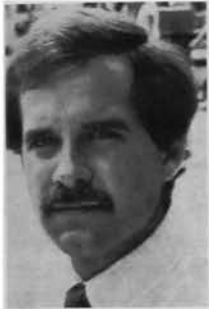

Phis Enable Wabash to Receive \$1,000 Award

Phillip Morris Incorporated has awarded \$1,000 to the undergraduate committee from Wabash College for its second place winning entry in the Thirteenth Annual Phillip Morris Marketing/Communications Competition for students.

The special factor with the Wabash committee is that the team consisted entirely of Phi Delt: Bradley Benbow ('83, Muncie), James A. Dilger, Jr. ('82, Indianapolis), Brian Giles, ('83, Kankakee, Ill.), Richard Huber ('83, Carmel), and David Schrader ('82, Lafayette). In addition, the photographer for the team was Phi Tim Bejin ('83, Carmel). Indiana Beta supported the team wholeheartedly; the chapter went so far as to make a small loan to the committee to cover their photographic and other expenses.

Original interest in the Phillip Morris Competition spawned as a result of several of the committee members off-campus study in the GLCA (Great Lakes College Association, of which Wabash is a member) Philadelphia urban semester. Work on the project formally began in February of 1981, and was submitted in January, 1982. The Wabash Phi entry was entitled "Perfecting 126 Years of Commitment to Quality," and concentrated on "Miller Beers" as a product.

The Miller Brewing Company is an operating company of Phillip Morris Incorporated. Each member of the team concentrated on one specific area of expertise: advertising, accounting, economics, psychology, or marketing. (The chapter supported the team with thorough taste-testing of the product.) Said team member Benbow, who is Indiana Beta chapter president, "We had the top people on campus in each area working on the project, and they all just happened to be Phi Delt."

Each member's contribution to the whole complemented the work of the other. The final report included over 275 pages of written analysis, demo tapes, and graphic and photographic conceptualizations. The Wabash college director of career services called the analysis "one of the most impressive student projects ever compiled at this college."

The Wabash Phi Delt committee was the only liberal arts institution among the 88 schools entered that does not offer an advertising, accounting or marketing major. The team members received no academic credit for their efforts; all work was completed extracurricularly.

One of the many conclusions reached in the study concerned the lack of emphasis on women as potential consumers of "Lite" products. Ironically, Wabash is a private, independent college for men.

The committee members recently visited Phillip Morris corporate headquarters in New York City to meet with top management to discuss their project. They also attended presentations by Phillip Morris management and receptions in their honor.

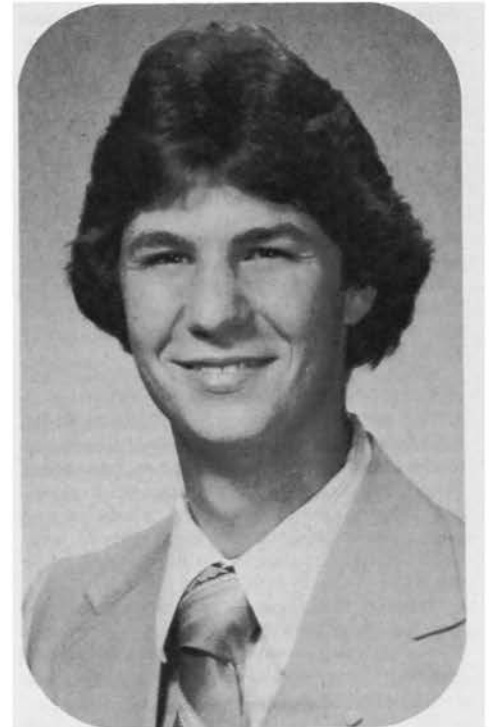

RECENT ADDITIONS TO THE **DAVID D. BANTA** **LIBRARY**



James, J. Allston (Florida State '69), *Attic Light*. Santa Barbara: Capra Press, 1979. 96 pp. Given by author.

In this unflinching portrayal of the war-wounded generation of the 60s the author focuses not on the combat zone itself, but on the far-reaching consequences of war. The protagonist is a young college student who finds himself suddenly making the nightmare transition from a weekend of pig-hunting for sport with his best friend Nathan Lowe, to killing people in the Vietnam countryside. His combat time is cut short by an explosion in which his leg is mangled.

Return to civilian life in the States finds the young veteran psychologically wounded as well—he has lost his rapport with his parents, girl friend, peers, and even with his own earlier ambitions. A midnight visitation by a wraith-like figure is followed by news that Nathan, who was almost like a brother, has been killed in Vietnam. The hero's tale concludes with a sense of his disorientation by the violence of a war that continues to haunt its victims.

A native of the South, **Allston James** has lived in California for the past five years. In 1969 he served in Vietnam. He is currently working on a novel.

Asbury, Esie S. (Cincinnati '18), *Horse Sense And Humor In Kentucky*. Lexington: The Thoroughbred Press, 1981. 270 pp. Given by the author.

This book is an uncommon combination of humorous stories and personal experience. Many of the stories grow out of the experiences of an 85-year lifetime spent in Kentucky, Minnesota, Ohio and Maine. All of these experiences provide the author both a context and a perspective for recording "my observations and philosophy about life in Kentucky."

Mostly, then, this book is about life in Kentucky. It focuses overall on humor related to or arising out of Kentucky ways of life. Although this humor has a rural quality, it appeals as much to the city dweller as to the farmer. Its subjects vary from whiskey, horses and tobacco, to ancestry, religion, music, education, medicine and politics — highlighted by stories about well-known Kentucky writers, politicians and horse breeders.

The variety of these many subjects reveals the broad scope of the author's interest in humor and life in Kentucky and offers readers convincing proof of his conclusion that "Humor is Kentucky's greatest natural resource."

Dr. Asbury, a native of Nicholas County, Kentucky, has been a practicing physician in Cincinnati for over 35 years and, for over 50 years, owner of Forest Retreat, a Thoroughbred breeding farm in Bourbon and Nicholas counties. He is the author of two previous books and numerous articles that have appeared in such diverse publications as the *Filson Club History Quarterly*, *The Thoroughbred Record*, and *The Blood Horse*. **Dr. Asbury** has been an honoree of the Thoroughbred Club of America. He was the first native Kentuckian to be elected to The Jockey Club and was a founding member of the Keeneland Club.

Beckley, Gilbert W. (Ohio University

'29), *The Sampler From Seventy Six*. Ann Arbor: Edwards Brothers, 1975. 152 pp. Given by the author.

The Sampler From Seventy Six recalls life for 200 years, west of the Susquehanna River, from the days before the Revolution to the Bicentennial, with select paintings and drawings by Charley Krone, prominent central Pennsylvania artist.

The pioneer county of "Cumberland" was the gateway to the West, the home of the Scotch-Irish, the seedbed of rebellion, and the mother of counties. "Lowther Manor" took the place of a proposed Indian Manor and this land development on the West Shore in Penns Woods was a realtor's golden dream.

George Washington's visit here in the valley, Jacob Miller Haldeman's Cumberland Forge, and a new town along the Yellow Breeches gives the reader a panorama of yesterday. The author reviews the frontier doctors, dentists, lawyers, and local county office holders; samples the 20th century and lists some pioneers of the mid-1900's; and concludes with New Cumberland's Bicentennial Project and the coming dedication of the Benjamin House-Library-Museum on July 4, 1976.

Lee, J. Deemer (Chicago '27), *Esther's Town*. Ames: Iowa State University Press, 1980. 267 pp. Given by Iowa State University Press.

Remembering all the years with love and humor, editor **Deemer Lee** chronicles the forty-four years he gathered and wrote news—forty-one of them as editor and publisher of his town's newspaper.

He dug into old records, recalled old times, and talked with old-timers. He has illuminated the transition of a town from a pioneer settlement to the busy, active town it is today.

The characters he met along the way are described here as well as the events that make small-town life exciting.

The excitement and fun begin with bootleggers, Chautauqua meetings, and an accomplished arsonist who achieved the impressive box score in less than two months of burning several barns and one feed store with an unsuccessful attempt on the Methodist church.

Scandinavians move in, build crude shelters for the first winter, and add their special characteristics to the town. The Irish arrive and stamp their mark on the whole territory around the lakes.

The circus comes to town and entrances everyone with its ancient pageantry. The railroads come through and add a rowdy element to the population. The depression begins and farmers see 11-cent corn, 108-degree heat, and a twister.

All these events plus adventures of a massive meteorite and haunting river tragedies create the drama and flow of small-town life, story by story, in a fascinating revelation of Americana.

The late **Deemer Lee** was born in Estherville, the *Esther's Town* he describes so well. He lived there his entire life except for a brief period in Des Moines while his father served in the state legislature, and when he attended the University of Chicago. During his student years he was news editor of the *Daily Maroon*, the campus newspaper, and a correspondent and reporter for the *Chicago Tribune*. In 1927 he purchased the weekly *Demo-*

crat in Estherville and changed its name to the *News*. In 1930 his newspaper became the *Estherville Daily News*. He served as editor and publisher from 1927 until his retirement in 1968.

Humann, Paul (Wichita State '61) and **Feodor Pitcairn**, *Cayman Underwater Paradise*. Bryn Athyn, Reef Dwellers Press, 1979. 90 pp. Given by author.

The gin-clear waters of the Caribbean Sea contain some of the world's most interesting and beautiful underwater scenery. Warm and unpolluted, the Caribbean waters enhance the growth of hard-coral reefs. The reefs, in turn, are populated by great multitudes of marine organisms. As a result, there is excellent diving around most Caribbean islands, and the Caribbean has become a scuba diver's mecca.

In the waters surrounding the Cayman Islands the diving is superb. The structure of the reefs offers infinite variety. The abundance and diversity of the marine life is amazing—after making well over 3,000 dives in these waters, I am still finding exciting new creatures that I have never seen before. I have lived and dived in the Caymans for more than six years—a memorable and richly rewarding experience. It is my hope that this book, in some small way, relates my experiences, and my impressions of this underwater wonderland.—**Paul Humann**

Hyman, Harold M., *Lincoln's Reconstruction: Neither Failure Of Vision Nor Visions Of Failure*. Louis A. Warren Lincoln Library and Museum, 1980. 32 pp. Given by **Robert G. McMurtry** (Centre '29).

The Third Annual R. Gerald McMurtry Lecture delivered at Fort Wayne, Indiana on May 8, 1980.

Jackson, John B. (UCLA '27) and **Andrew Hamilton**, *UCLA On The Move*. Los Angeles: The Ward Ritchie Press, 1969. 230 pp. Given by author.

The exciting story of one of America's most dynamic and distinguished universities, told in terms of people and personalities as well as facts and events, *UCLA On The Move* traces its fifty-year history from the days when it was a provincial, two-year teachers college to its present eminence as a "phenomenon of higher education" as *Time* magazine described it. Brimming with human interest and amusing anecdotes, *UCLA On The Move* begins with the World War I luncheon at which Edward A. Dickson and Ernest Carroll Moore first envisioned what has now become UCLA, and details its colorful history under the leadership of Earle R. Hedrick, Clarence A. Dykstra, Raymond B. Allen, Vern O. Knudson and Franklin Murphy, to the present as Charles E. Young begins his term as Chancellor.

Keeney, Claire H. (Oregon '22), *On Stage Tonight*. Evanston: Row, Peterson and Company, 1956. 128 pp. Given by author.

Contrary to what may generally be supposed, the main purpose in publishing a collection of one-act plays such as *On Stage Tonight* is not to make a lot of money for the publisher and the playwright. The satisfaction for this effort hopefully includes the realization of an opportunity to

present to the playreading, playproducing, and playgoing public a number of short dramatic works that are new, perhaps unusual, and—if possible—worthy of their genre. The preparation and publication of even such a small volume as this can help afford greater permanence to the short-play form by putting it into a “hardbound” cover. This in turn should make it more accessible, more readily available, because it can then be listed, indexed, and displayed to greater advantage in libraries, classrooms, and other places where students of the theatre are interested in the one-act play as a literary-dramatic entity. The degree to which any or all of these aims are accomplished will be the measure of success for *On Stage Tonight*.

Also included are several one-act plays entitled: “For The Love Of Mike”, “Begone, Begonia”, “The Widow’s Might”, “Once An Actor”, “Old Skinflint”, “Major Milliron Reports”, “Pity The Poor Fish”, two selections entitled “Make-up Made Easy”

C. H. Keeney was born in Jasper, Oregon, in 1899, and was educated in the public schools of Eugene, Oregon, and at the State University. At the University of Oregon, he majored in Drama and Speech Arts and served as an undergraduate instructor throughout his college career.

Moriarty, Charles P., Jr. (Washington '49), *Adopt Your Way To Inheritance And Gift Tax Savings*. Mercer Island: The Writing Works, Inc., 1980. 144 pp. Given by author.

This book discusses the adoption of an adult as a way of substantially reducing and sometimes avoiding entirely the impact of state inheritance and gift tax laws. As you read it, you will be struck by the absolutely weird relationships sometimes produced by such an adoption—and even more impressed with its potential use for enormous tax savings.

Adoption to achieve inheritance and/or gift tax savings may seem almost preposterous at first blush, but for childless couples or single persons, it can be one of the best ways of avoiding or dramatically reducing such taxes.

Not all states levy inheritance and gift taxes. In those that do, the legalities vary widely from state to state, and many changes are being developed in the wake of the major changes in federal estate and gift tax laws enacted during the past four years. Summaries of the laws of the inheritance and/or gift tax states showing the effects of adoption on their taxes are noted in two complete appendices. Appendix I summarizes the schedules applicable to inheritance taxes in 31 states. Appendix II summarizes the schedules applicable to gift taxes in five states.

Charles P. Moriarty, Jr. is currently managing partner of Moriarty, Mikkelsen, Broz, Wells and Fryer, a Seattle law firm with a broadly based general practice where he has specialized in estate planning and helping his clients avoid the impact of death taxes. It was during the middle 1950s that he began recommending adult adoption as a means to that end.

O'Brien, Robert, *Marriott*. Salt Lake City: Deseret Book Company, 1978. 336 pp. Given by **J. Willard Marriott** (Utah '25).

The business career of **J. Willard Marriott** began on a small family farm in Utah. When he was 13 he paid his brothers and sisters in soda pop to harvest a crop of lettuce that netted the family \$2,000. Fourteen years later he opened a small A&W root beer stand on a busy street in Washington, D.C. Today he heads a multimillion-dollar corporation that includes restaurants, coffee shops, fast-food franchises, family amusement parks, industrial and institutional cafeterias, hotels, in-flight airline food services, and cruise ships.

Marriott, the biography of this remarkable man, is the story of a man who has been equally at home on a mountain sheep range and in the White House; who has combined ambition, drive, and an uncanny sense of business to succeed where many others have failed; but above all, who has remained humble and faithful to his pioneer heritage, his faith in God, and his love for country.

“America didn’t give me a dole when I was broke,” he has said, “but she did give me some valuable assets—freedom and the opportunity to work and the right to worship God in my own way.”

In *Marriott*, author Robert O’Brien captures the man who cares—about his customers, about his employees, about his family, about his church. **J. Willard Marriott’s** unselfish concern for others, in his meteoric rise to fame and success, is evident in every page of this, his life story.

Robert O’Brien, author of *Marriott*, is a former senior editor and presently a roving editor for Reader’s Digest. He has been a newspaper reporter and columnist, free-lance writer, staff writer for *Collier’s* and a writer of *Time-Life* Books.

Rusk, Howard A. (Missouri '23), *A World To Care For*. New York: Random House, 1972. 307 pp. Given by author.

Millions of people throughout the world are physically disabled. For some it is the result of a birth defect; for others, an accident, disease or other unforeseen trauma. Almost every American knows someone with such a problem, and for all it is a troubling, often tragic experience.

This is the story of **Dr. Howard Rusk’s** campaign to alleviate the suffering of these people, to make rehabilitation an accepted and fundamental aspect of medicine. He outlines this crusade and describes, with great insight and compassion, his patients’ struggles to overcome their handicaps. These graphic, profoundly moving life histories confirm his belief that people fighting to regain their self-sufficiency and dignity have a “depth of spirit you and I know little about.”

Patients come to him from all walks of life—from the highest public figures to the humblest worker. Disability is no respecter of race, color or creed; all severely incapacitated men face the same basic problems of rehabilitation, and **Dr. Rusk’s** therapeutic philosophy is to treat the whole man—to solve not only his physical but his emotional, social and psychological problems. The record of his success has proved the soundness of his approach.

Dr. Rusk conceived the philosophy and concept of his program during World War II while directing the Army Air Corps Convalescent and Rehabilitation Services. After the war he gave up an active private practice in Missouri and moved to New York, where he began his battle in “two drab, bare Bellevue wards.” Today the Institute of Rehabilitation Medicine is part of the huge New York University Medical Center complex and serves patients from all over the world. The World Rehabilitation Fund, which **Dr. Rusk** helped to establish, has now trained more than one thousand physicians and rehabilitation specialists from eighty-five countries.

This is a compelling—and at times a highly affecting—account of **Dr. Rusk’s** dramatic accomplishments over the short span of thirty years. It is also a tribute to the extraordinary achievements of the many thousands of disabled. With the proper training and understanding, they have overcome incredible physical disadvantages to become outstanding workers, citizens and members of their communities, proving time and again that it is not the body alone but the spirit that makes a man.

Russell, Albert R. (Mississippi '36). *The First 40 Years*. Memphis: National Cotton

Council, 1980. 237 pp. Given by author.

A complete history of the cotton industry during the past 40 years would recount the work of many organizations—public and private—and the role played by countless dedicated individuals who shaped that history.

This book depicts the major role of one such group from the year 1938 through 1979. Data included have been researched carefully, and the author is confident that his account is factual in every detail.

Tighe, John F. (Syracuse '52), *Smart Moves*. New York: Simon & Schuster, 1981. 64 pp. Given by author.

Can you devote nine minutes a day to staying young?

If so, these *Smart Moves* will help you feel better and look better than you have for years.

They’re for busy Americans who can’t exercise regularly—deskbound executives, white-collar workers who sit in an office all day, mothers who can’t get out of the house.

Smart Moves are quite different from conventional exercises. Properly speaking, they’re not exercises at all. You can fit them into your spare time at home, or into your coffee break at work. You can do them without working up a sweat. You don’t even have to change clothes. Primarily they’re for people who just don’t have time to stay in shape.

They will make you feel better immediately. They will keep you in shape with a minimum of time and effort. They will help you stay young.

John Tighe is a successful advertising and marketing consultant. He originally developed these *Smart Moves* for his personal convenience because, he says, “I was getting old mentally and physically—tense, tired, overweight—and I wanted to stay in shape in the easiest, quickest way possible.”

Yoder, H. S., Jr. (Chicago '42), *Generation Of Basaltic Magma*. Washington: National Academy of Sciences, 1976. 265 pp.

The book is directed to those who would like a comprehensive view of the generation of basaltic magma at the site of origin.

The writer’s purpose was to bring to a focus the many problems amenable to theoretical analysis and experimental investigation.

The reader will gain an impression of the tenuous nature of the evidence on which major concepts about magma in the earth are based.

Edited by **H. S. Yoder, Jr.** (Chicago '42), *The Evolution Of The Igneous Rocks*. Princeton: Princeton University Press, 1979. 588 pp. Given by Editor.

The Evolution Of The Igneous Rocks, by **N. L. Bowen**, appeared in 1928 and had a profound influence on later generations of petrologists. Drawing on his series of lectures at Princeton University in the spring of 1927, **Dr. Bowen** identified, outlined, and applied the principles of physical chemistry relevant to petrological processes. Whereas the major petrochemical questions he discussed are still relevant today, the answers appear to change with time. The purpose of the present volume is to provide an updated view of those questions, in the light of almost fifty years of accumulated observations, using the principles **Bowen** set forth.

In chapters paralleling those in the original book, the contributors review the modern data, expand the theoretical bases, and make new applications to major petrological problems. The fifty years of progress recorded in this volume illustrate the increasing vitality of the field of igneous petrology and the expanding opportunities for research stimulated by **Bowen’s** work.

Community Service Efforts to be Redoubled

In response to a direct appeal from President Reagan, Phi Delta Theta active chapters are asked to redouble their efforts this academic year for their Community Service projects.

The request from President Reagan came at a briefing at the White House attended by the president of the National Interfraternity Conference, David Bland, and 110 other national service organization leaders.

At the meeting, the President first thanked the attendees for being involved in this "task force on private sector initiatives and potential areas of achievement and cooperation by national service leaders."

He went on to say "...I can't think of a group more representative of good citizenship than this gathering today. So when I say, 'Welcome,' it's more than a greeting; it's also an expression of thanks for all the many things that you and your organizations are doing to better this country and to improve the lot of those in need... For the first time in decades, people are starting to realize they have an important role to play and that they can make a difference. I need your help to activate those on the sidelines and to encourage those already involved to keep going... After you leave today, I'm asking you for a renewed commitment. Talk to your boards of directors, your members. Identify and take on a new project and a private sector initiative and put the full resources of your organization behind it. Talk it up at your annual conventions this year. Let others know about what you're accomplishing..."

The NIC Board of Directors and Phi Delta Theta's General Council have both whole-heartedly endorsed the involvement of all fraternities. The General Council has asked specifically that each Phi Delta chapter increase the scope of

their single Community Service Day project or their multiple activities throughout the year.

Last year there were approximately 40,000 man hours contributed by 8,000 undergraduates and a value of over \$200,000 given by the 150 chapters. The undergraduates in many instances were helped by alumni.

Among the recipients of the brother's efforts were the Easter Seal campaign, Multiple Sclerosis, the Muscular Dystrophy Associa-

tion, the Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Society of America and the National ALS Foundation as well as the Special Olympics. The United Way, Heart Fund, March of Dimes, local community organizations and many other deserving causes were also aided.

Phi Delta Theta was the first fraternity to establish a national Community Service Day 27 years ago. The date for single project activity in 1983 is April 9. ■

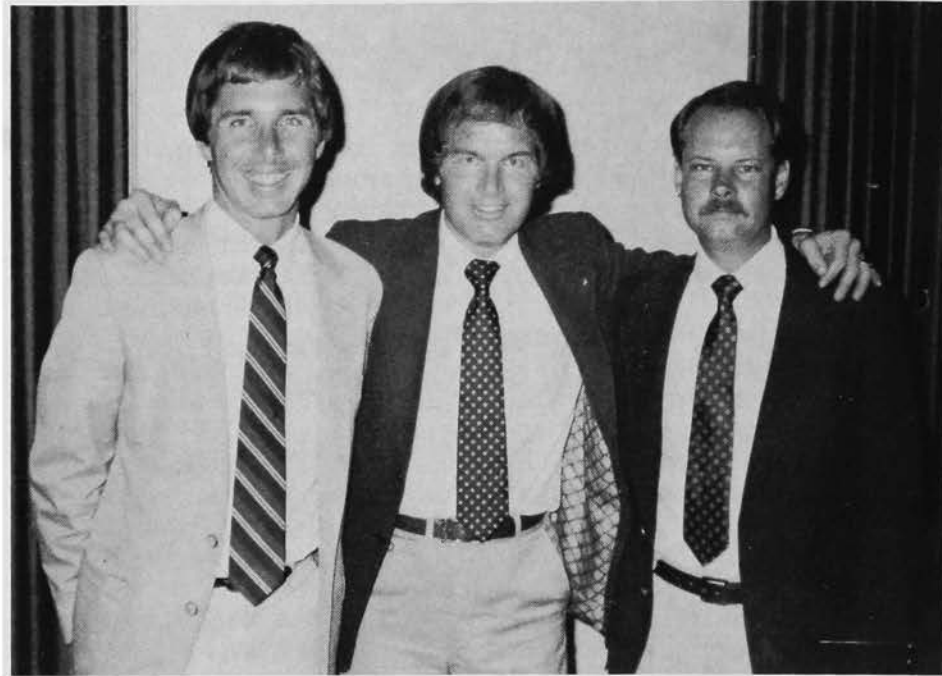

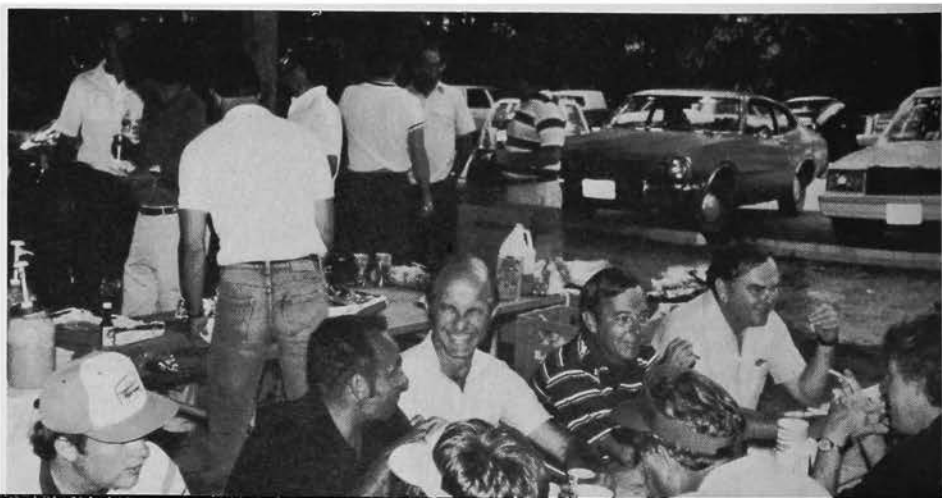

Ingels Named Head of Omicron North

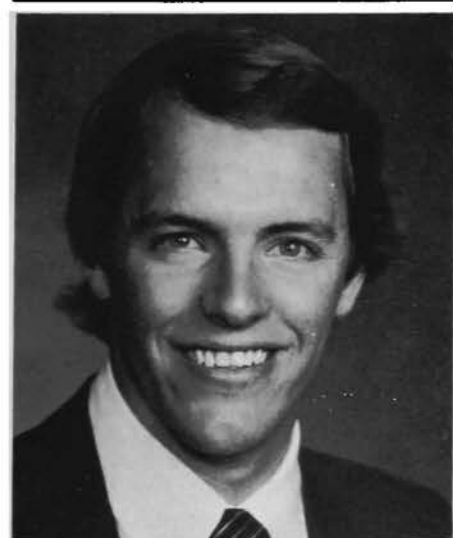

In additional action, the General Council elected to remove the State of Nevada from Omicron North Province and add it to Omega Province because of the increased growth of chapters in Northern California.

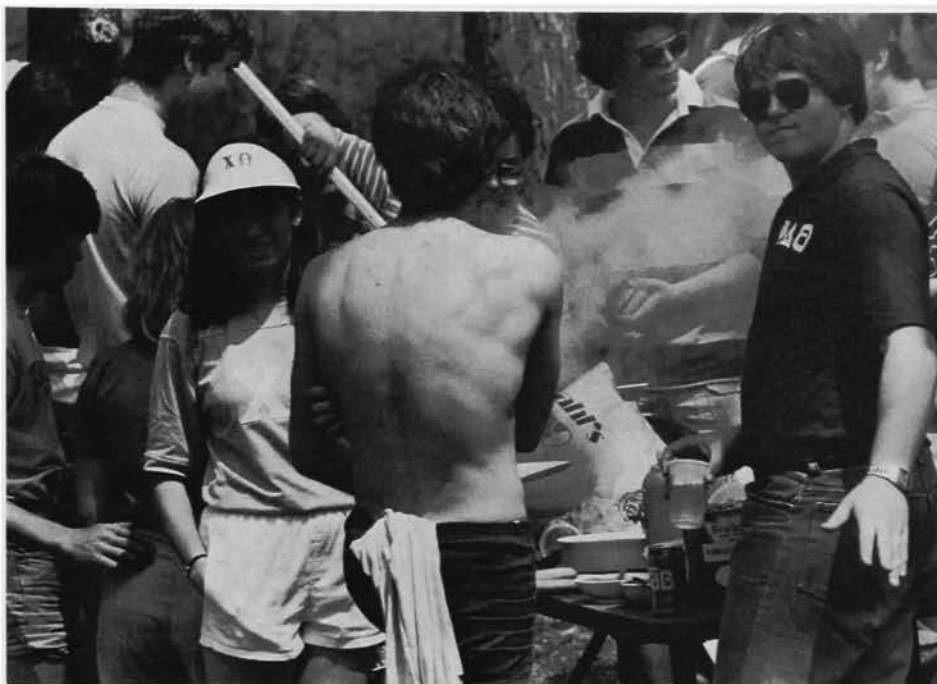

The old council met June 16 while the new one met June 20.

At the first meeting the Council placed the charter at Florida Gamma in escrow pending a full review of the chapter's progress when the Council meets in November. They also made changes in the competition for the Harvard, Founders and Kansas City trophies for 1982-83. Following a recommendation by the awards committee the council voted to divide the awards by the number of fraternities on each campus and the number of members in the respective chapters as well as the enrollment of undergraduate males.

At the second meeting Bob Dinkel was elected treasurer while Tal Bray was named reporter. The new council also named a committee composed of Thomas J. Jeff Carter Chosen As Harmon-Rice Winner

Jeff Carter (Hanover '82), a football and track standout with a 3.56 gpa, edged Rob Doyle (DePauw '82) and Brian Mignano (Stanford '82) in balloting for the 1981-82 Harmon-Rice Trophy.

The initial ballot resulted in a tie and Carter was named the winner on a second ballot. This marked the second time in two years that a tie resulted in the first ballot.

The winner is the all-time Phi Delt Career Reception leader and was a first team *NAIA All-American* wide receiver. He has caught passes for 2,875 yards during his career and has been named *All-Hoosier-Buckeye* conference three times.

This past year he had 64 receptions for 992 yards in nine games. The previous year he had 48 receptions for 995 yards. He was named Hanover's "Most Valuable Player" in football plus being the college's "Athlete of the Year."

Carter has a 3.56 gpa on a 4 point scale and graduated in economics and business with distinction. Initially, he had a Hanover College Scholarship and subsequently was named The J. Graham Brown Scholar. He also was invited to join Mortar Board and Gamma Sigma Pi, a scholastic fraternity.

He was historian and served on the rush committee for three years in his chapter. He was chairman of the senior committee on campus along with being a member of the student recreation board and a member of the movie review board. He was a library assistant in the

Duggan Library his first two years.

In addition to football, he was a sprinter on the track team reaching the conference finals the last two years in the 100 and 200 meters with times of 10.9 and 22.7.

Mignano wound up second in the voting. He is one of Stanford's most outstanding Phi baseball players in recent years. He had eight consecutive victories with a 1.43 ERA before losing to BYU, 3-2. He topped Stanford records with 27 career wins and was an *All-Pac* selection.

He pitched the Cardinals through the Western Regionals and into the NCAA Championship Tournament in Omaha.

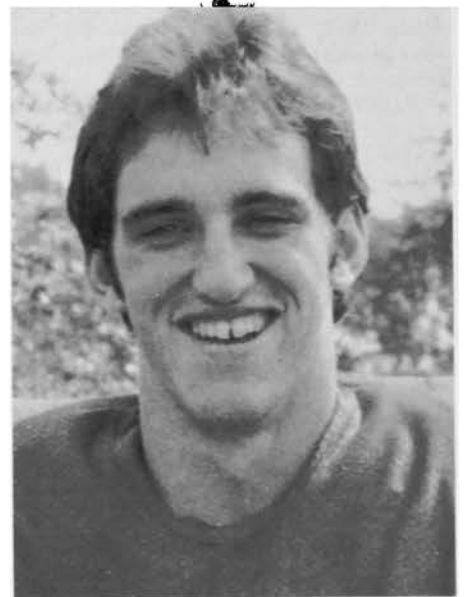
During his senior year he served his chapter as house manager. He had a 3.4 gpa in industrial engineering and has accepted a job with Arthur Anderson and Company in Portland.

Doyle, DePauw's chapter president, finished third for the second consecutive year. He was twice social chairman and head waiter at the chapter house his junior year. He maintained a 3.2 gpa with a double major in political science and English. He was nominated for an NCAA post graduate scholarship and he has been accepted at the Indiana University School of Law.

He was an *All-Phi* first team quarterback both his junior and senior years. He was voted DePauw's "Most Valuable Player" the last three years. He holds seven school football records with a career passing mark of 4,734 yards.

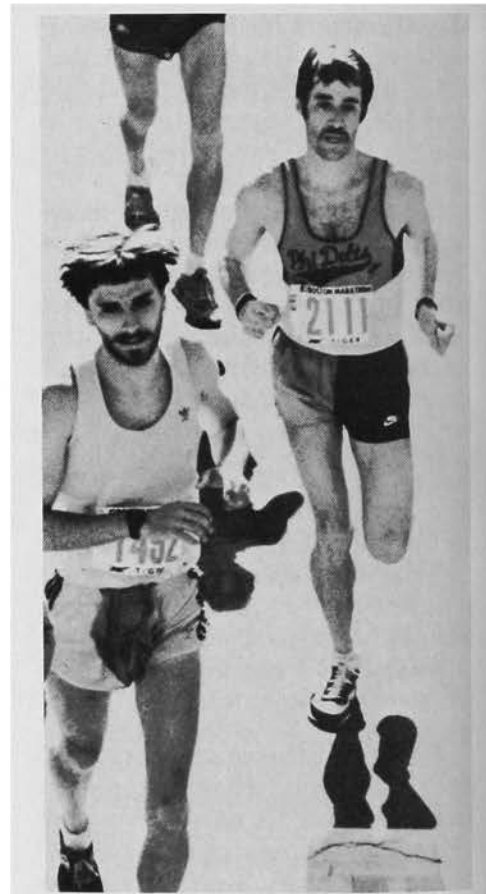

3. Ask questions—if you feel shy about doing so, it helps if you jot down the question beforehand, sit near the front of the room, or ask your question after class. It is helpful to have your questions answered, and it also shows the professor that you are interested in the topic.

Test Taking

Included here are a few hints which may prove helpful if you have trouble taking tests. Undoubtedly the best way to improve your test-ability is to work on your overall study habits by implementing some of the tips suggested throughout the sections of this article. It may help you to remember that a certain degree of anxious arousal is normal and productive before a test. It is only an excess amount of anxiety that becomes interfering and counterproductive.

When taking a test, it might be advantageous for you to:

1. Pace yourself—Note the time you have and adjust yourself by allotting it realistically.
2. Read the directions—Make sure you know what is expected of you.
3. Answer the easiest questions first, then return to the more difficult items.
4. Write neatly, especially on essay tests. The professor will appreciate your consideration.

Study Skills

•Where do you study? Here are some common location errors you may wish to avoid. Do not study:

1. Where others interrupt or you are tempted to start conversations;
2. Near the telephone;
3. With the radio or television playing;
4. Where you tend to take too many breaks;
5. Where you are not used to studying;
6. Where it is either too warm or too cool; and
7. Where the physical arrangements are poor, such as inadequate lighting.

•To maximize your study time, you might choose to study:

1. In a familiar place where you are used to studying;
2. Where it is quiet;
3. Where visual distractions are minimized;
4. Away from a window; and
5. In a clutter-free area.

•How do you study? It is important to develop an industrious mental attitude when you study. To help you do this, you might begin to:

1. Organize and plan your study time—make a list of what you want to accomplish, and use it to identify your study objectives.
2. Plan to work for 50 minute segments, then take a short break.
3. In any case, stop studying when your attention persistently wanders.
4. Reward yourself! After each study session, do something you enjoy, such as listening to music or bicycling.
5. Finish assignments before you stop working. Divide large projects into small subtasks, and complete one before leaving your desk.
6. Set realistic project goals—allow for the required time.
7. Study at regular intervals—make it a part of your normal routine.
8. Vary your study time—begin with the more interesting subjects to help you get into a “studying” frame of mind.
9. Review important material just before sleeping to remember it better.

•Many professors rely heavily on textbook material, especially when it comes to preparing tests. The following steps will help your textbook learning and retention:

1. Overview key ideas before you start to read.
2. Read the material critically.
3. Recall the major points of the chapter, summarizing it to yourself.
4. Reflect on the material by putting the book aside and thinking about it.
5. Review the content, immediately and periodically.

•A common practice with textbook studying is that of underlining. Here are some simple guidelines to help increase your underlining effectiveness:

1. Read the material first before underlining.
2. Go back and underline complete sentences or essential phrases.
3. Underline supporting statements as well as major ideas.
4. Reread underlines to help you grasp the main themes.
5. Prepare an outline of the material if you have the time and feel it will be beneficial to you.

In Closing

Of the three academic success factors previously mentioned, this article has touched briefly upon two, motivation and study techniques. The third factor, time management skills, will be the focus of a subsequent article. The study skill hints presented here are worth trying, because they work. Successful students everywhere will attest to their effectiveness. Try some of the tips, and see what works for you. You may wish to review this article periodically to keep the study suggestions fresh in your mind. Remember that acquiring improved study habits takes time, practice, and a good deal of commitment and self-discipline. *Anyone* with the desire to become a more successful student can do so if he is willing to put forth the necessary effort. ■

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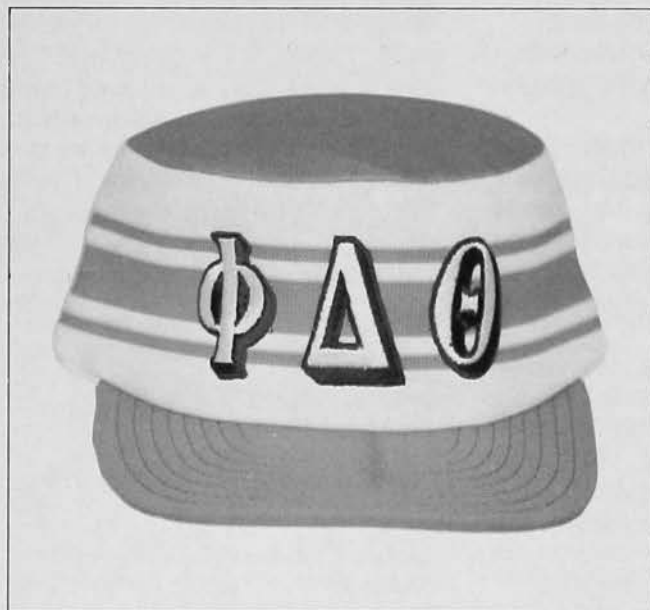

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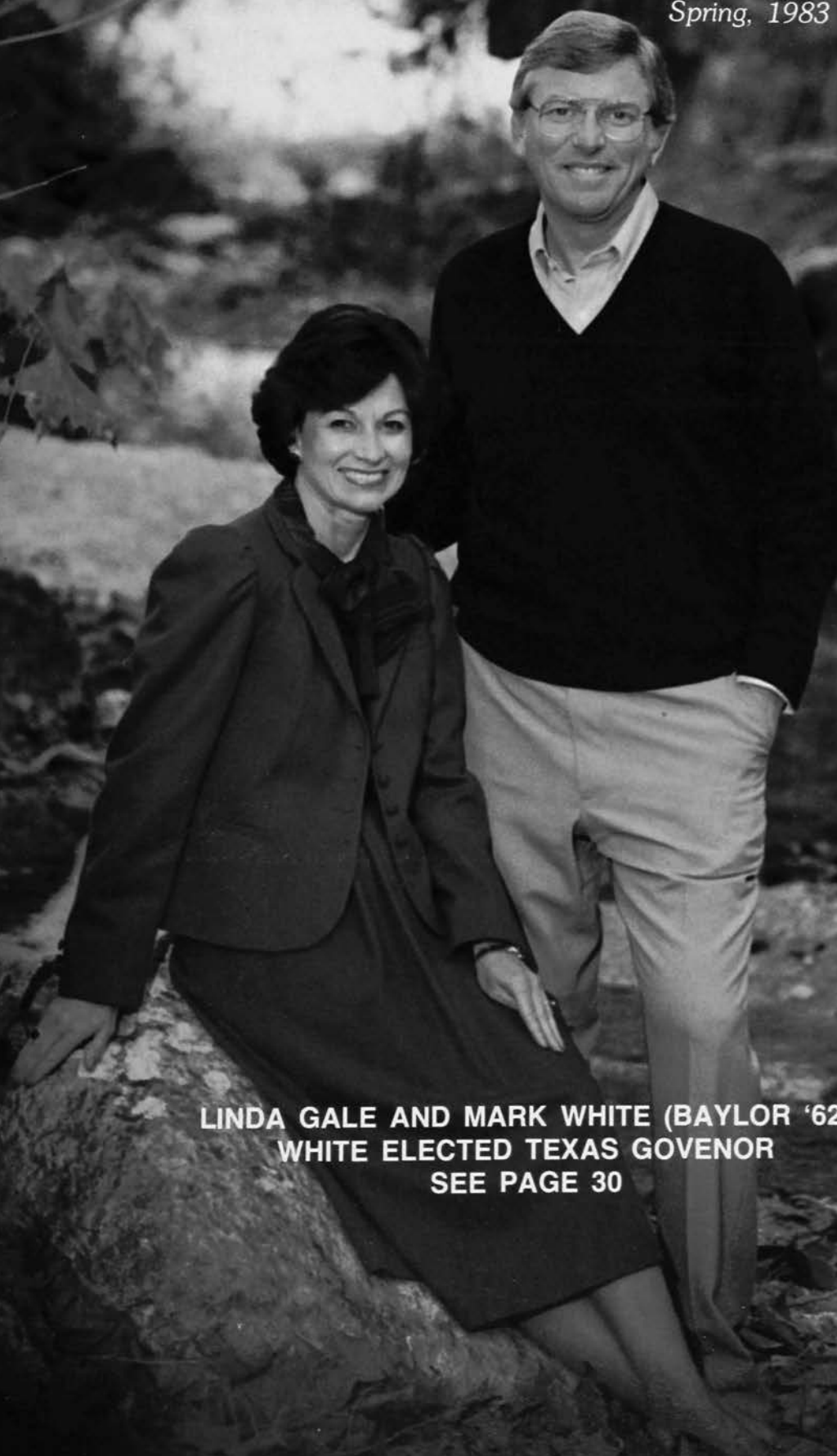

Time Management + Motivation = Success

The skills of effective time management and organization are important components of academic success. Good time management skills, combined with strong motivation and sound study techniques, comprise the formula for high scholastic achievement.

The organization which comes from improved time management will give you a sense of being in

control of your daily life. This sense of control tends to reduce the stress that people feel when their daily activities are chaotic and confused. Practicing good time management techniques will lead to improved academic, social, and personal functioning because it will boost your total effectiveness.

Why Organize?

Why might you begin sharpening your organizational skills? Several reasons are listed below, from the more general to the very specific in nature. Persons who successfully manage their time:

1. Systematically implement and achieve their goals;
2. Get better grades;
3. Get more out of class because they are prepared for it;
4. Worry less, and are less prone to undue tension;
5. Have more free time to pursue their own interests;
6. Produce quality work while working fewer hours;
7. Direct their own lives;
8. Have fewer forgotten obligations;
9. Are less confused;
10. Are more relaxed;
11. Have high levels of self-esteem; and
12. Have a good amount of self-confidence.

If even just a few of these time management benefits appeal to you, read on to discover the essential nature and basic strategies involved in organization and time management planning.

The key element of time management and organization is scheduling. Some readers may actually shudder at the thought. To make the concept more palatable, try thinking in terms of time budgeting or interval planning. However you choose to conceptualize it, planful time management techniques are not only useful but some say essential to your becoming a more successful student.

As you begin to think about

budgeting your time, take a few seconds to reflect upon your attitude towards structure and scheduling. It may help to note that no one can create a workable schedule for you except you. No one. You know best how you feel about restrictions, those times you are most alert, and the kinds of activities that need to be included in your life routine on a regular basis. Keep the person in mind that the schedule is designed to benefit as you begin to develop it. That person is **you**.

The primary purpose of time management scheduling is to enable you to accomplish the goals you set for yourself at the time that you decide and for which you plan. Scheduling is a very powerful tool, in that it gives you a sense of control over the things that go on in your life. You become someone who instigates and makes things happen, rather than one who sits passively by and whose life is "happened to." Scheduling allows you to organize your plans and thereby take control of your life.

Essential Guidelines

As you prepare your personal time allotment schedule, keep in mind the following essential guidelines. A beautifully engineered schedule will be virtually useless unless it is;

1. Realistic—You are not a superperson. Do not plan to do everything in one day. If anything, allow *more* time than you feel is necessary for your projects. Think seriously about the current activities that you enjoy and eliminate or reduce only those that you feel you can do without. Be good to yourself.

2. Balanced—For scheduling purposes, activities can be classified into three categories: work, play, and health. A daily routine that includes all three categories allows time for studying (work), socializing (play), and eating (health). Daily schedules which routinely include these kinds of activities will most likely be fol-



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Mark White Elected Texas Governor

On Nov. 2, 1982, Mark White was elected Governor of the State of Texas. In winning that election, Brother White became the number one news story in Texas and received national recognition because he defeated Bill Clements of Dallas, the first Republican Governor to be elected in Texas in more than a century.

Mark White was born in the city of Henderson, Texas on March 17, 1940. He and his family moved to Houston where he attended public schools and was graduated from Lamar University in Waco, Texas, where he received a degree in Business Administration in 1962 and a law degree from the Baylor Law School in 1965.

White was elected Attorney General of Texas and was sworn in that office Jan. 1, 1979 and he has served in that capacity since.

As the state's chief enforcement officer, White co-chairs the Federal-State Law Enforcement Coordinating Committee and is a member of the Governor's Organized Crime Prevention Council.

State and national recognition of Mark White as an attorney came in 1977 when he was elected Lawyer of the Year by the Baylor Law Fraternity, Phi Alpha Delta, and in 1981 he was elected Chairman of the Southern Conference of Attorneys General.

Before White's election as Attorney General, he served as Secretary of State for Texas by appointment of Governor Dolph Briscoe beginning in 1973. During his four years and nine months as Secretary of State he streamlined operations of that office and made his office more responsive to the public.

Mark White was elected President of the National Association of

Secretaries of State in 1977, being the youngest Secretary of State to be elected to the association's highest office. White also served as Treasurer of that association.

Linda Gale White, wife of the new Governor was born in Irving, Texas, a suburb of Dallas, and grew up there. She attended Baylor University in Waco, was a Kappa Kappa Gamma, graduating in 1964 with a degree in Business Administration.

Linda Gale has been a school teacher and a business woman and has been very active in community volunteer work. At St. David's Hospital in Austin, she worked in the new-born infant nursery and spent a good deal of time at the Austin Women's Center helping women who had spent long periods away from the work force to prepare for new jobs. She is also a CPR instructor.

Mrs. White is a member of the Austin Symphony League and an active member of the Austin Junior League.

In the 1970's Linda Gale began an active career in real estate sales, and is an active member of the Texas Association of Realtors and the Austin Board of Realtors.

During both political campaigns for elected office, Linda Gale was an active worker. As chairperson of the political action group, Women's Organization for White, "W.O.W", she traveled across Texas to organize and tell women of the important role they must play in the political process, as well as generate special support for Mark White's gubernatorial campaign.

Mark and Linda Gale were married in 1966 and they have three children, Wells, 12; Andy, 10; and Elizabeth, 8. Up until January 18, 1983 they lived in suburban West Lake Hills, outside of Austin, but the whole family now is in residence at the Governor's Mansion just across from the Texas Capitol Building.

White's election leaves the number of Phi governors at three. George Busbee (Georgia '50), Democrat Governor of Georgia did not run for re-election. The remaining two are John Y. Brown (Kentucky '56), Demo., in Kentucky and William F. Winter (Mississippi '44), Demo., Mississippi.

Dennis W. DeConcini (Arizona '57) an Arizona Democrat, won another six year term to the Senate in the November elections while J. Bennett Johnston (Washington and Lee '54), Demo., Louisiana, and Sam Nunn, Jr. (Georgia Tech '60), Demo., Georgia, were not up for re-election.

There are now nine Phis in the U.

S. Congress, one less than the previous two years. Four will not return. Richard Bolling (Sewanee '37), Demo. from Missouri's 5th district, retired. Pete McCloskey, Jr. (Stanford '51), Rep. from California's 12th, lost in the state's primary in his bid for the Republican nomination to the U.S. Senate. James Collins (SMU '37), Rep. from Texas' 3rd district, lost his bid for the U.S. Senate to Democrat Lloyd Bentson. Albert L. Smith, Jr. (Sewanee-Auburn '53) was defeated in his re-election bid.

This elected for the first time include Jim McNulty (Arizona '50), Demo., 5th district, Arizona; James C. Slattery (Washburn '70),

Demo., 2nd district, Kansas; and James O. Bates (Virginia '55), Demo., 44th district, California.

Those Phis returning to the Congress include Doug Bernard, Jr. (Mercer '43), Demo., 10th district, Georgia; Wyche Fowler (Davidson '62), Demo., 5th district, Georgia; Berkeley Bedell (Iowa '44), Demo., 6th district, Iowa; James Andrew Courter (Colgate '63), Rep., 12th district, New Jersey; Barber B. Conable, Jr. (Cornell '43), Rep., 30th district, New York; and James T. Broyhill (North Carolina '50), Rep., 10th district, North Carolina. ■



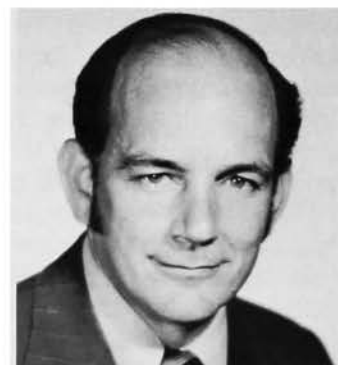

Musgrave Aboard Challenger Flight

Dr. F. Story Musgrave (Syracuse '58), a NASA astronaut for 16 years, is a member of the crew slated to fly the first flight of the space shuttle Challenger. He serves as mission specialist.

He follows in the footsteps of Neil Armstrong (Purdue '55), the first man to step foot on the Moon, July 20, 1969.

Dr. Musgrave was selected as a scientist-astronaut by NASA in August, 1967. He completed astronaut academic training and a year of military flight training and worked on the design and development of the Skylab Program. He was the backup science-pilot for the first Skylab mission, and was a capsule communicator for the second and third Skylab missions.

He was the mission specialist on the first and second Spacelab Mission simulations. Dr. Musgrave participated in the design and development of all Space Shuttle extravehicular activity equipment including spacesuits, life support systems, airlocks and manned maneuvering units.

From 1979 to 1982, he was assigned as a test and verification pilot in the space shuttle avionics integration lab and has continued clinical and scientific training as a part-time surgeon at the Denver General Hospital and as a part-time professor of physiology and biophysics at the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

He served a surgical internship at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington from 1964 to 1965. He continued there as a USAF post-doctoral fellow (1965-1966) working in aerospace medicine and physiology and as a National Heart Institute post-doctoral fellow (1966-1967) teaching and doing research in cardiovascular and exercise physiology.

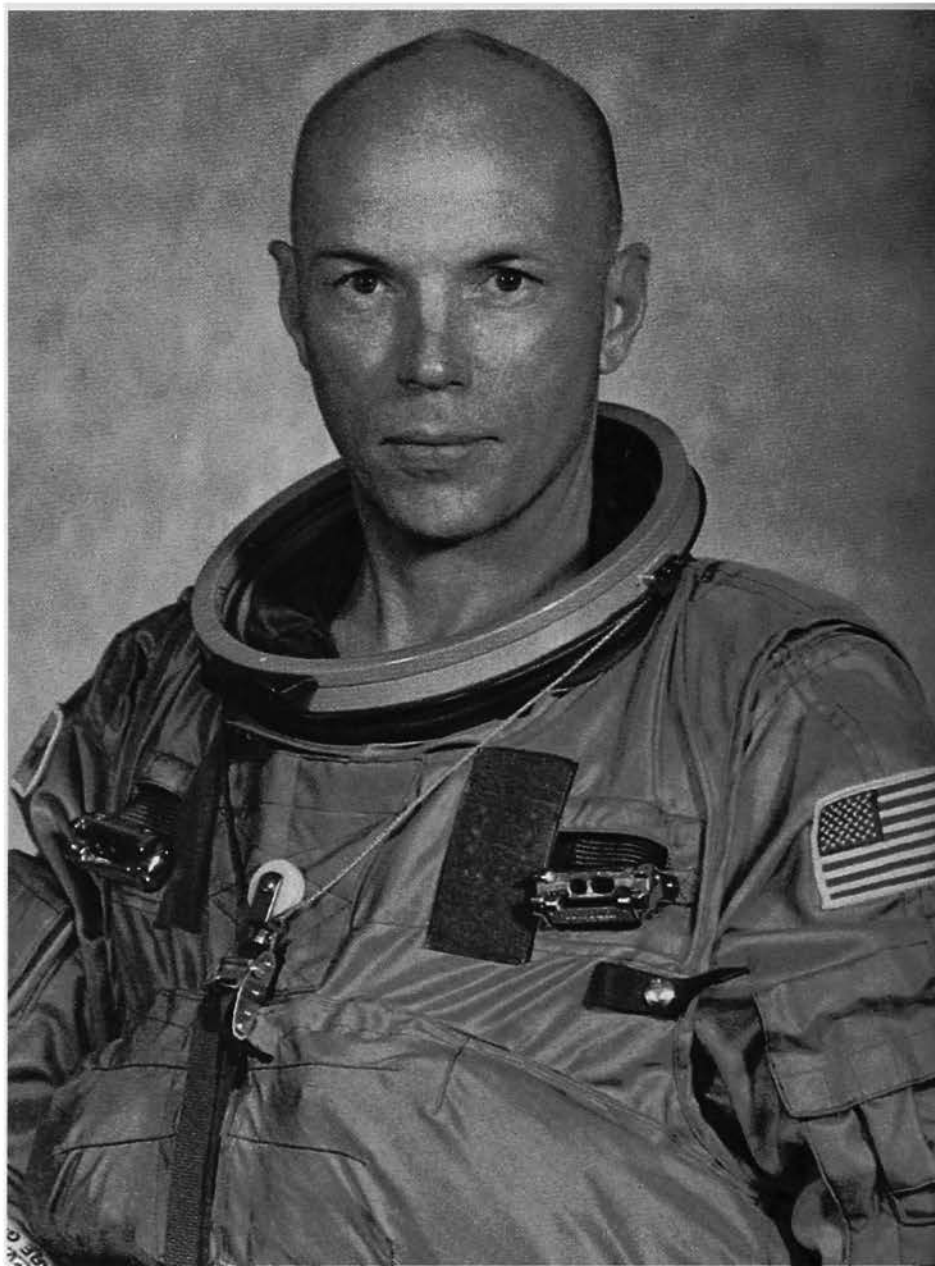
A native of Boston he received a bachelor of science degree in math and statistics from Syracuse in

1958, a master of business administration in operations analysis and computer programming from UCLA in 1959, a bachelor of arts degree in chemistry from Marietta College in 1960, a doctorate in medicine from Columbia in 1964, and a master of science in physiology and biophysics from Kentucky in 1966.

The astronaut first entered military service following graduation from high school in 1953 when he entered the U.S. Marine Corps. He completed training at the U.S. Naval Airman Preparatory School and the U.S. Naval Aviation Electrician and Instrument Technician School in Jacksonville, FL.

Musgrave has flown 110 different types of civilian and military aircraft, logging over 13,200 hours flying time, including 5,500 in jet aircraft, and he holds instructor, instrument instructor, glider instructor, and airline transport ratings.

He has written 33 scientific papers in the areas of aerospace medicine and physiology, temperature regulation, exercise physiology and clinical surgery. An accomplished parachutist, he has made more than 360 free falls—including over 100 experimental free-fall descents involved with the study of human aerodynamics. ■



Noted Phi Delt Journalist Honored

Twenty years have passed since the name George K. Shaffer (Chicago '16) was a regular by-line in *The Scroll* but that name and by-line are still very visible today in the San Fernando Valley of California.

Shaffer, who spent over 18 months in Oxford, Ohio from 1958 through 1960 assembling facts and writing a fraternity history, has spent the past 18 years as a reporter with San Fernando Valley newspapers, principally with the one-time *Valley News*, now owned by the *Chicago Tribune* and retitled

the *Daily News*.

In 1981, the 24 chambers of commerce in the San Fernando Valley portion of the city of Los Angeles—a population of 1,300,000—hosted an unusual banquet and program titled "A Night for George Shaffer."

The affair in the Valley Hilton Hotel in the Encino community of the Valley gathered legislators from Sacramento, city council members, business leaders, fellow journalists and personal friends exceeding 200 to honor Shaffer for 68 years of newspaper reporting.

Chicago Tribune Days

It was pointed out that he is the only known newsman still active in the media who was on the *Chicago Tribune's* editorial force when he joined in October, 1913. He was first utilized as a police reporter on Chicago's South Side. Later, he was assigned the job of assembling World War I's cabled news from the fighting front correspondents in Europe. Then he shifted to the *Tribune's* sports desk and was responsible for the 1919 headlines of the Black Sox baseball scandal.

In May, 1924 the *Tribune* made him its Pacific Coast correspondent, with desks in the *Los Angeles Times* and the *San Francisco Chronicle*. In 1926 he wrote a daily column about Hollywood's motion picture studio activity and film people's personal escapades during the Hollywood headline heydays.

He covered the Los Angeles earthquake of March, 1933, and the Olympic Games of 1932 with sports writer Westbrook Pegler of the *Chicago Tribune* and Paul Gallico of the *New York Daily News*. To add color he brought along a friend of his from his University of Chicago days—the famed Amos Alonzo Stagg.

Shift to the Movies

In 1939 he was asked to join Warner Brothers film studio's publicity department, then getting ready for the popular picture

"Knut Rockne, All American."

One of the young actors who played the famed George Gipp was, of course, President Ronald Reagan. Warner Brothers had given the future president a six-month contract as an actor and had renewed it. Reagan had been a promising sports broadcaster on the radio in Iowa before this and had also played professional baseball. Shaffer interviewed him and wrote Reagan's first biography to be dispersed to writers about movies and to theaters.

Later the Phi Delt historian was hired to become the West Coast correspondent of a new daily in Chicago, *The Sun* (later the *Sun-Times*). He was busy doing "practice" editions for the first issue scheduled to come out the first week in December, 1941 when Japan attacked Pearl Harbor. It was an explosive start.

Back to Reporting

After the war he did newspaper work in the Pacific area serving with both the *Guam Daily News* in 1953 and the *Honolulu Advertiser* in 1962.

Back in California he became owner-editor through periods of the 1950s and 1960s of Southern California weekly papers in Newport Beach, Compton and Toluca Lake. Since then he has been with the *Daily News*.

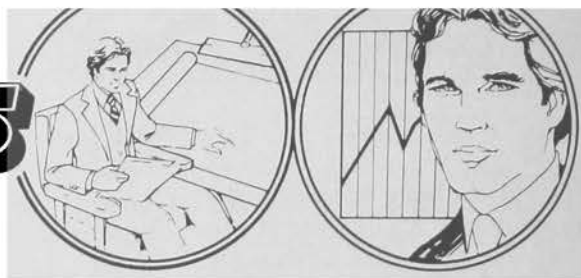
He did regular articles for *The Scroll* in the 1960s called "100 Years Ago in Phi Delta Theta". He had spent those months in Oxford collating versions of Phi Delta Theta's earlier history and put them together into a manuscript of chapters which covered the fraternity's growth and high spots and leadership trends from 1848 until conclusion of World War I and some of the aftermath to the 1920s.

For years his name was a "household" word in the family of Phi Delta Theta. He stills sends clippings and news items to the magazine for publication.

Some traditions never die. ■

Ohio Zeta To Celebrate 100th Anniversary

The Phi Delta Theta Fraternity located at 1942 Iuka Avenue on the Ohio State University campus will celebrate its 100th anniversary this year.

Preparations are already underway at the Chapter House which has been at this location since 1919. It was modernized and enlarged during 1956 and now houses 65 to 70 students serving meals to 110-120 members. The chapter has an annual operating budget over \$200,000 and is managed by the students that are elected by the members each year. Their goal is to provide room and board, and a good social life at a lower cost than living in a school dormitory or an apartment.

The alumni take an active interest in the chapter's operation and assume the responsibility for the

house and property, including mortgage payments, major maintenance, insurance and taxes with income from rent charged to the chapter. The chapter pays all other operating costs and manages the business like any free enterprise.

This business experience has proven beneficial to all the members and is helping them secure employment and or advance in their business careers. To assist and train the members in business fundamentals of organization, budgeting financial control, salesmanship, motivation and leadership, one of this chapter's alumni has written a book on fraternity management called *Instant Executive*. It is now used in fraternities and sororities throughout the United States and Canada.

This fraternity, like many others, conducts philanthropic programs to aid people less fortunate than they. The members are active in the Ugly Bartender Contest benefiting Muscular Dystrophy.

Due to higher energy costs, this chapter like everyone else faces increases in the cost of heating the chapter house. To help cope with this, other operating costs, and to pretty-up the house for the 100th celebration, this chapter and its alumni have recruited one of its alumni to paint a mural on the dining area wall. In addition, original paintings for hanging throughout the public areas of the house have

been donated. Paintings are for sale with proceeds helping to pay some of the chapter's operating expenses. This tireless artist is Robin A. Bell (Ohio State '28) who was a freshman in 1924. While a student of architecture he played varsity football, basketball, and held such fraternity positions as steward, house manager, and treasurer. Brother Bell is a retired executive of the Midland Ross Corporation and resides in Upper Arlington, Ohio. He is also the world renowned author of the best selling book, *Instant Executive*.

Bell says he "will always be grateful to his fraternity for what it did for him." In his college days there were no school grant in aids or athletic scholarships. The fraternities and their alumni provided part time jobs that made it possible for most athletes to attend college. He recalls that the school tuition was \$35.00 per quarter and that room and board cost \$1.00 per day, totaling about \$375.00 for 9 months of schooling.

"The tremendous increase in the cost of higher education and the hundreds of athletic scholarships provided by many schools has gotten out of hand," Bell says, "and current economics may demand a return to the old days." Today, all fraternities have a new role and purpose. They are dedicated in part to the reduction in the costs of attending college. ■

Readers Give Scroll High Marks

Generally high marks were given the Scroll in a readership study recently conducted by the general headquarters staff. A total of 63% of those responding also favored leaving chapter newsletters in the summer tabloid form rather than return them to regular issues of the magazine.

Fifty-three percent of those responding rated the magazine as very good and 42% said it was average. In evaluating the editing in the magazine 54% said it was very good while 40% said it was average. Forty-seven percent rated display as very good and 44% viewed it as average.

A total of 63% favored leaving chapter reports in a summer tabloid supplement while 27% wanted it returned to the magazine.

The survey was designed by the Institute for Communications Research at Texas Tech and was conducted under the direction of Rusty Richardson, director of alumni services. Questionnaires were mailed to 1,523 members selected at random from the computer and a total of 338 (22%) were returned.

Responses contained a good cross-section of both age groups and geographic locations as indicated by Tables 1 and 2.

themselves both as self-employed and professionals which accounts for the fact that the number of responses totaled more than the actual number of surveys returned.

The questionnaire devoted the most emphasis to questions related to the subject matter covered in each issue. Respondants were first asked how often they read the magazine. Sixty-nine percent indicated they read all five issues. Then they were asked if they read a particular section and whether they favored dropping, keeping, modifying or expanding that section.

The subject matter most read ("always read") was alumni news (49%) followed by chapter newsletters (46%), The Phi Crier (news briefs from chapters) (43%), the Chapter Grand (38%), Phis in Sports (33%), Busy Phis (32%), Alumni Club Reports (30%), What's Going on in Phi Delta Theta (28%), feature articles (26%) and the Directory (16%).

There was no strong mandate to drop anything although those who check "always read" in many instances checked the expand coverage column.

Respondants were asked to comment on the editorial philosophy of the magazine. The questionnaire stated that the editorial philosophy of *The Scroll* was four-fold: (1) To provide readers with information on developments and issues within the Fraternity; (2) To

provide readers with information about the achievements of undergraduates and alumni; (3) To feature prominent alumni and their accomplishments; and (4) To provide readers with educational information about society and higher education.

Ninety-five percent (316) indicated they favored this policy while 1% (3) said they did not. Four percent (14) abstained.

Readers were polled on the policy of including chapter reports in a summer tabloid supplement rather than in a magazine. Sixty-three percent (211) said they thought this was a good policy and 27% (88) disagreed. Ten percent (34) abstained.

Of the 88 who disagreed, 85 favored moving the newsletters back into the regular magazine.

Greek Life Helpful in Job Preparation

Today's job market and graduate programs are becoming very competitive and specialized. As a result, students more than ever need to prepare themselves for the future while they are in school. Historically, fraternities and sororities have provided the leadership positions which enable students to gain that valuable experience which businesses and graduate committees are seeking.

Business executives and graduate committee members have felt that the Greek life does contribute to a student's maturing and becoming more prepared for the "real" world. They feel that students who have involved themselves with the Greek system make good employees and professionals. Discussions with recent graduates who interviewed for jobs or admission to graduate school, reveal some interesting points. The following are typical examples:

A young woman, who was recently accepted by a highly regarded law school, felt that her acceptance was due largely to her sorority participation. She was president of her sorority, active on campus, but had average grades. Her ability to field difficult questions concerning management and leadership to her sorority experience impressed the admission committee. Her analysis of the situations and problems convinced the interviewers that she had the ability to earn a law degree.

The second example is of a young man who graduated with a B.S. degree in marketing. He exemplifies what company recruiters are seeking. A three-point (g.p.a.) student, he had been president and house manager of his fraternity. In addition, he has served as pledge trainer and was involved in fraternity intramurals and philanthropic programs.

This young man was offered 15 jobs from 18 companies with whom he interviewed. The salary opportunities ranged from \$22,000 to \$28,000 a year, for companies involved in heavy machinery manufacturing to hospital supplies marketing. He decided on a company with a medium starting salary because he felt that it offered an excellent training program and had a reputation of being very well managed. This heavy machinery company also had distribution outlets and manufacturing plants worldwide.

The company hired 12 people selected from over 400 applicants across the country. The trainees consisted of: a woman with a master's in mathematics and computers, an accounting master's, two engineering master's, four engineering bachelors, two lawyers, and two marketing bachelors.

Surprised by the number of offers he received, he asked several of the interviewers, what they felt were his best qualifications. They all told him essentially the same

thing, that they were looking for people with management capabilities and potential growth. Experience told them that graduates with above average grades who had been leaders in their fraternities or sororities proved to be active and productive employees in the company. These people take responsibility, develop good customer and employee relations, and have a sound understanding of how a business is operated.

These examples clearly point to the positive benefits of the Greek System, for one does not need work experience to impress companies and graduate committees. Important management leadership experience can be attained through your fraternity or sorority involvement. Be active and participate for your first important job might just depend on it. ■

Idaho Phikeia 'Initiated' After 50 Years

Formal initiation into a fraternity occurs every year. For most Greek living groups being a pledge lasts about six months, from September to February. But for A.E. "Bud" Lewis, the name of "Phikeia" stuck with him for over 50 years until the day of initiation finally occurred.

Lewis, 70, of Boise, Ida., became a member of Phi Delta Theta Oct. 1 after a group of active alumni got together to see if Lewis could file for a "hardship" case and become initiated.

Lewis left the University of Idaho the week before "inspiration week," the week of some special activities before initiation, in 1931 to go to his home in Boise because he had run out of money, both cash and jobs were not to be found.

"I had fully intended to get some money and be back to school by the start of the next semester," said Lewis. "But there were no jobs and my folks could not afford to send me back."

So Lewis stayed in Boise and never did get back to Moscow to go back to school. He found a job working for a mining company and moved around, but resettled in Boise to work for Intermountain Gas Co.

In the 1960's some of his fraternity friends convinced him to join the Boise Alumni Club of Phi Delta Theta. Lewis, at first, refused the offer but later accepted when they convinced him he wouldn't feel out of place.

"I didn't think I should've joined," said Lewis. "After all, I didn't go through the last week and wasn't a member. I didn't think I belonged there."

Nevertheless, Lewis joined and became an official member of the alumni club. He participated freely and was active in all of the group's monthly events.

"After a while it got better," said Lewis. "I had a lot of friends in the club and I enjoyed seeing them. I even began to like the discussions at the meetings."

Lewis' fraternity friends noticed that he was enjoying himself and staying interested at the group's meetings at the Crane Creek Country Club in Boise. They knew the story of Lewis not being

initiated and vowed to do something about it.

So Charles LeMoyne, the club's president, sent a letter to house president John Derr in December, 1981. Derr brought forth the motion to initiate Lewis to the chapter members. It needed a unanimous vote for it to pass. Getting 45 different people to all vote "yes" doesn't happen very often, but the chapter understood Lewis' problem and the motion was passed.

"I wasn't really sure the motion would go through," said Derr. "A unanimous vote doesn't happen very often, but I am glad it did."

Some of the members of the Boise Alumni Club were informed of the chapter's vote and were told to send a letter to the General Council in Oxford, Ohio. The idea was for the Council to pass it, so the formal initiation could occur in March, 1982.

But the alumni club took their time sending the letter. The Council dispersed in June before voting on any measures in order to get ready for the bi-annual convention in July in St. Louis, Mo.

The alumni club, while keeping all of the events from Lewis so he would not be disappointed if it failed, sent the letter to house member Dave Leffel to take to the convention to be read and voted on there. Leffel did and the five members of the General Council voted and passed the motion for Lewis to be initiated.

All the steps had been taken except for the date of which the event could occur. Leffel noticed that Idaho's

homecoming was to be early this year and he mentioned to Derr that the Friday night, Oct. 1 be set for it, so some of the other alumni could witness the event.

Lewis was then informed of the decision to initiate him and drove with his wife and a fraternity brother, Bill Guernsey. They arrived on Friday afternoon, with the formal dinner and initiation to be held in the evening.

"I had been eagerly looking forward to this ever since the club told me about it," said Lewis. "I know they went through a lot of trouble, but I do thank them for it. This is a special time for me and it has been over 50 years in coming."

After the formal dinner Lewis, dressed in a blue three-piece suit that matched the excited look in his blue eyes, went through all the events of being initiated, finally being given bond number 1385, instead of a number near 200, which he would have received in 1931.

"This is the first time this has ever happened, according to my knowledge," stated Tau Province President Bob Woerner. "I've never heard of it being done anywhere else."

Lewis was buzzing with excitement after the meeting was over. He was pleased to have the ordeal over and even gave a donation to the chapter. The Boise Alumni Club took care of his initiation fee and Lewis was grateful to everyone.

"I just want to thank everybody," he said. "This has to be one of the most eventful times of my life. It was 50 years in coming, but it tastes just as sweet to be a member of this great fraternity." ■

GC Handles Appointments

Numerous officer appointments and a new policy regarding ritual highlighted the Nov. 21 meeting of the General Council in St. Louis.

Dick Galloway was reappointed to a six-year term on the Palmer Foundation and Ken Keck was named to a similar term on the Mitchell Fund. George Banta III was also named to a six-year term on the Banta Fund board.

The 1982-83 awards committee will be chaired by Province President Bob Roberts and he will be assisted by fellow province president, Howard Womsley and Jack Braden, with Bob Biggs serving in an ex officio capacity.

The advisory board to the Convention Nominating Committee for the General Council was also appointed. It will be chaired by Province President Bob Fitzpatrick who will be assisted by province presidents Oliver Samuel, Ted Lowrie, Erin Haynes and John Harding.

Reappointed to three-year terms on the Educational Foundation were Lothar Vashoz and Don Mason.

The Council heard a report from its Computer Feasibility Committee composed of Tom Lamkin, Tim Lamkin and Bill Ross. Although a final decision has not been made the Council is going to take a close look at the purchase or lease of its own computer for use at General Headquarters.

The Council adopted the following policy regarding use of the ritual:

Noting that there may be some misunderstanding concerning the secrecy surrounding the Phi Delta Theta ritual, the General Council reaffirmed the position of prior Councils that the ritualistic affairs of the Fraternity are limited to initiated members, except, of course, for those ceremonies which are public in nature and so designated in the ritual book. Non-members, including pledges, are

not permitted to be in attendance at the ritualistic opening and closing of chapter meetings, although such persons could, under extenuating circumstances, be admitted to the meeting after the ritualistic opening, provided they are excused prior to the ritualistic closing.

Bob Bourdette (Washburn '69), assistant dean of student affairs at

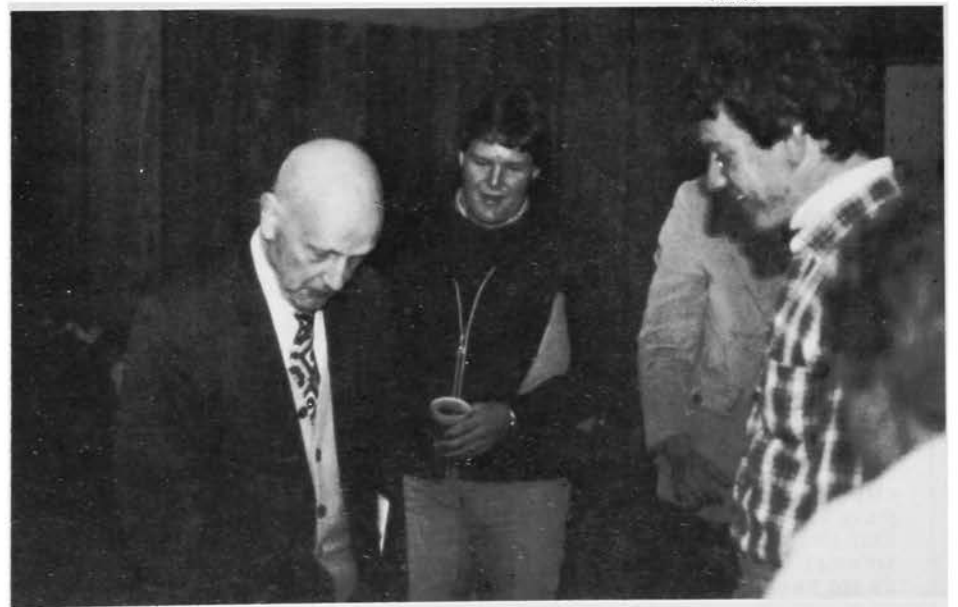


Washburn University, has recently accepted the position of Coordinator of Greek Affairs at Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

Scott Reppert Paces All-Phis

Scott Reppert (Lawrence '83), the most prolific rusher in fraternity history with a career total of 4,442 yards and a three-time Kodak NCAA Division II *All-American*, paces the 1982 *All-Phi* team.

Other top selections include Bob Wallner (Ripon '83), a four-time *All-Midwest* Conference selection and a Kodak *All-American* center this year, and Mike Bos (Puget Sound '83), an AP Little *All-American* wide receiver.

Reppert, featured in *Sports Illustrated* this fall, rushed for over 1,000 yards all four years at Lawrence, surpassing the three 1,000-yard years of Chris Gilbert (Texas '69). It also surpassed the efforts of three other great Phi Delt running backs, Terry Baker (Oregon State '63), Tom Harmon (Michigan '41) and Doak Walker (SMU '50).

Wallner was initially an offensive tackle, but the past two years he has been at center. Bos had 308 reception yards and a career total of 2,311 yards, the third highest in fraternity history.

Southern Methodist, with a 10-0-1 record, led the team's selections with two repeat choices, Lance McIlhenney (SMU '84) and Richard Neely (SMU '83) on the first team and Chris Jackson (SMU '84) on the second team.

McIlhenney was the Southwest Conference's top quarterback and has led the Mustangs to a 23-1-1 record the past two years. This year he had a total offensive production of 1,077 yards. Neely is a defensive tackle and Jackson is a center.

The first team offensive ends were unanimous choices. Pat Schwanke (Lawrence '83), two-time *All-Midwest* Conference tight end who has 591 yards and 54 points this year, and Jeff Syznscak (Ripon '84), a repeat choice with 705 reception yards.

The tackles are paced by Bob Pratt (Northwestern '83), a three-year starter at both guard and tackle, and Adrian Dinwiddie (Ripon '83), an *All-Midwest* Conference choice who supplied blocks for 11 touchdowns at his position. The unanimous offensive guards are repeater Peter Speros (Penn State '83), the offensive captain for the 10-1-0 nationally ranked Sugar Bowl team, and Pat Zakskorn (Washington-Seattle '83), a Huskie starter for three consecutive years and three bowl games.

Completing the offensive backfield is Frank Seurer (Kansas '84), who led the Big 8 in passing with 1,625 yards, including over 200 yards in games against Kentucky, Iowa State, Missouri and TCU.

The defensive linemen, in addition to Neely, are unanimous Tom Bishop (Ashland '83), an *All-Heartland* Conference selection the past two years and the conference's "Defensive Player of the Year"; unanimous Chris Matheus (Lawrence '83), a two-time *All-Midwest* Conference choice; Dave Sheedy (Ripon '83), an *All-Midwest* Conference performer who led his team in tackles plus 20 sacks and a blocked field

goal that beat Lawrence; and Jeff Heyman (Case-Western Reserve '83), a four-year starter who led his team in tackles.

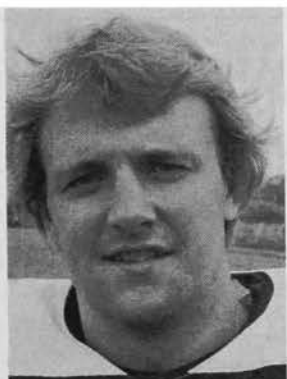

They include unanimous Chris McGary (Butler '83), a second team *All-Heartland* Conference selection; Chris Phelps (Hanover '83), a second team *All-Hoosier-Buckeye* Conference choice; Gene Boyle (Lawrence '83), who had 50 tackles, 4 sacks and a safety; and repeater Mike Nelson (Puget Sound '83), a four-year starter.

The trio of linebackers include repeater Brian Hartman (DePauw '83), a three-year starter with an *All-Midwest* Conference choice with 85 tackles; and Jim Karstens (Northwestern '83), who was outstanding in Wildcat wins over Minnesota and Michigan State.

Ripon, Lawrence Players Dominate

Ripon and Lawrence contributed 13 selections to the All-Phi team while Hanover, with an 8-1 record, supplied four. Ashland, Valparaiso, Butler and Puget Sound contributed on each. These 21 choices are described in the *All-Phi* story.

Again this year the nationally ranked small college powers contributed heavily to the Little *All-Phi* team. The University of California at Davis, with 10-0 season and an NCAA Division II finalist, supplied split end Robert Cuenin ('84) and linebacker Mike McNulty ('84). Wabash, NCAA Division II's fifth ranked team with a 10-0 record, supplied another pair, offensive tackle Scott Lahr ('85) and defensive back Ron Bigler ('85).

NCAA Division III's 15th ranked Ripon, the Midwest Conference champion with an 8-2 mark, placed Greg Morga ('83), an offensive guard who paved the way for Tim White; quarterback Jim Braemer ('84), quarterback who passed for 1,800 yards; and Joey Watkins ('83), a repeat defensive back selection who had four interceptions each of the past two seasons.

Hanover, NAIA Divisions II's 17th ranked team with a 7-2 record, contributed four players. Greg Reynolds ('83), center with a 4 pt. average, was joined by three offensive linemen, John Case ('83), Mike Buchanan ('85) and Bob Wagber ('85).

DePauw, boasting an 8-1 season, supplied a trio of selections. They include John Carter ('85), offensive tackle; Tracy Clifford ('83), quarterback who passed for 1,437 yards and 19 touchdowns; and Fran Lolli ('84), wide receiver who has 510 yards and scored 60 points.

Davidson, with over a dozen Phis on the team, supplied a trio in Bob Miller ('84), fullback; Robbie Thornsberry ('83), defensive captain; and Brian Lowe ('83), offensive tackle. Washington-St. Louis, with 15 Phis on the team, contributed Greg Smith ('83), a linebacker; Keith Gizzi ('85), wide receiver who had 70 yards in receptions against Centre; and repeater Joe Tichota ('83), a defensive lineman.

Gettysburg, with a 7-3 record, placed a quartet of performers. They include Pat Lubin ('83), tight end; Steve Rand ('83), wide receiver; Al Mantz ('83), defensive lineman; Jim Stafford ('84), defensive lineman; and repeater Dave Gretsky ('84), defensive lineman.

Four schools each furnished a pair of choices. Outland Trophy Named For Former Phi Surgeon

The Outland Trophy is named after the late Dr. John H. Outland (Kansas '98), a Kansas City surgeon who died in 1947.

In the mid-1940s, Outland suggested to Bert McGrane then Football Writers Association secretary, that some honor be established to honor interior linemen. Prompted by Outland's suggestion and a donation which financed the early awards, the Football Writers Association took up the cause and established the award in 1946. Since then the Outland Trophy has become college football's Heisman Trophy for linemen.

Outland played tackle for Kansas in 1890s, then went to Pennsylvania as a medical student and played Ivy League football. He was named to the *All-America* team in 1896 as a tackle and made the team as a halfback in 1897, both times from Pennsylvania. Both picks were by the later Walter Camp.

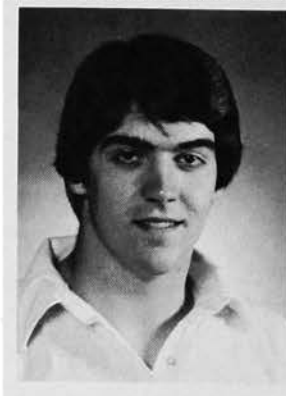

lowed. A well-balanced schedule decreases boredom because it permits a variety of activities. This is probably the key to effective scheduling.

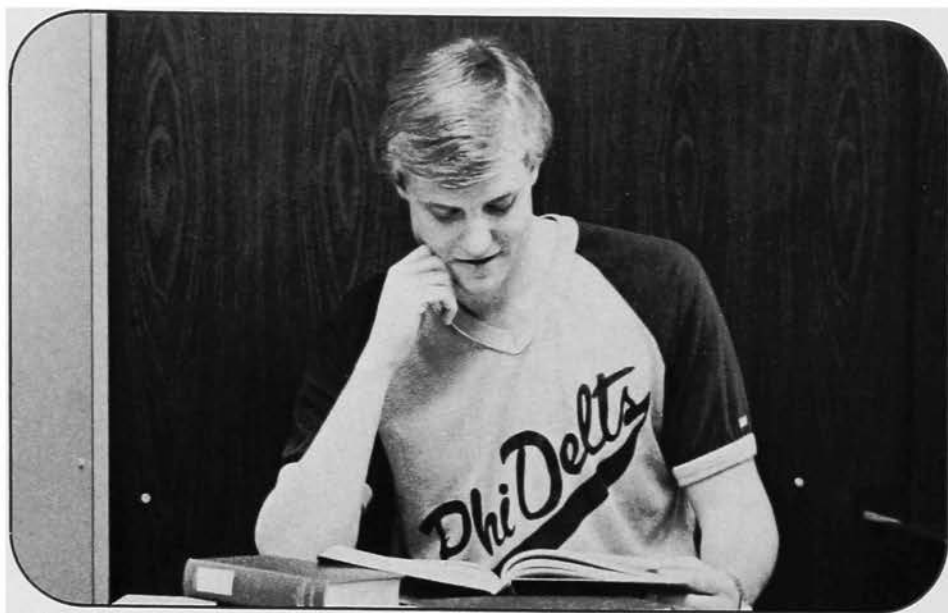
3. Personal—A schedule, in order to be workable and unimposing, must be individually tailored to fit your lifestyle and personality. You need to set your priorities, and include the highest in your planned routine. Be aware of the most productive and work-oriented time of your day, and schedule your studying during those hours. Design your schedule with as much detail as you feel comfortable. If you tend to dislike structure, allow for "free" or unstructured times in your day.

4. Flexible—A rigid schedule is of marginal value to the scheduler. Even the best made plans are subject to last minute upsets and readjustments. Your schedule needs to be somewhat flexible so that you can deal with the unexpected and still maintain control over your activities.

There is a seemingly endless variety of ways with which you might organize your time. It is common to find people adhering to daily, weekly, monthly, and even semester-long schedules. Each type has its merits, and the use of more than one kind of schedule can be advantageous for the implementation of your immediate as well as long term goals.

Allow For Health Activities

When planning your daily routine, allow ample time for health activities such as sleeping, body care, eating and exercise. Schedule your work time during your most alert periods. Successful planners often set time to accomplish two or three goals each day. When developing the schedule, first include your "musts"—assigned classes, set working hours if you are employed, and the like. Next plan the best hours for your time-negotiable work, such as studying, eating and sleeping. A normal day should include play as well as work and health activities so that you main-



tain an interesting activities balance. Reward yourself by taking short breaks between work periods. It is often helpful to schedule a time slot every few days to "catch up." Use this time any way you choose, perhaps to help you get ahead, get back on track, or have some fun.

Effective weekly planners usually begin by noting the due dates for projects and test dates. These are the goals you will be working towards during your allotted study periods. Daily schedules are often designed in accordance with the week's goals. Students will frequently plan more study sessions the day before an important exam, and then as a reward plan more play activities following the test. You may choose to take more time for recreational and social activities on the weekends than during the week. Balance, again, is the key. Decide what it is you need, and give yourself the time to satisfy your needs. Different needs rise to ascendancy at different times. If you feel you need to relax on Saturdays, be sure to study a little while longer at other times during the week.

Monthly or semester schedules may be effectively prepared by compiling the syllabi received for each class. A wall calendar can be used to give you the month's assignments at a glance. First jot down the dates of tests and other

project assignments. Next, generously approximate the amount of time and effort needed for each test and project. At this stage you are working backwards counting the days you feel you should begin studying for the test or researching the paper. Indicate on the calendar the date you choose to begin the appropriate study task. These written reminders are helpful in keeping you on track, because with them it becomes more difficult to forget due dates and consequently to procrastinate. Your weekly plans should be organized in conjunction with your monthly or semester schedule.

A good schedule allows you to see where you are in relation to where you are going. It enables you to visualize your goals at a glance. With this knowledge, your mind is free to concentrate on whatever you are doing to the fullest extent because you need not be concerned with what must be done. Your clarity of purpose will help to eliminate confusion and the stress that is often associated with the feeling that "There are just not enough hours in the day." The organization that results from effective time management allows you to experience the power of accomplishment. Scheduling provides the path and outlines the direction towards the implementation of both long and short term objectives. ■

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

He was a Seattle civic and business leader who served as chapter adviser for Washington Alpha, province president and, finally, a member of the General Council from 1952 to 1956, when he retired due to ill health.

The award is given annually to an alumnus for his contribution to Phi Delta Theta, higher education and community life and honors those alumni who have brought prestige to the fraternity through their activities.

Kennedy is chairman of the board of Oklahoma Gas and Electric Company in Oklahoma City. He joined the company after graduation from Arizona as a clerk in the accounting department. He has served as auditor, treasurer, vice president, executive vice president and president.

He helped establish the Arizona Alpha chapter in 1922 while still an

undergraduate, having transferred from Butler. In 1946, he helped make the Oklahoma Beta chapter at Oklahoma State a reality when he led the campaign drive to establish funding for the chapter.

In the early 1970s the Oklahoma Alpha Chapter at the University of Oklahoma was burdened by an enormous debt. Kennedy immediately stepped in and, with the help of other concerned Phis, helped liquidate the outstanding bills and saved the chapter house.

"We are amazed each time we talk to Brother Kennedy of the stories he tells us about experiences he has encountered with Phis across the country," said Jon M. McGrath, president of Oklahoma Alpha. "He was so proud that his grandson, Phil Kidd III (Kansas '74), had pledged that he rounded up a group of close Phi Delt friends and flew them up to witness the initiation ceremony at Kansas Alpha."

"We have heard him say on many occasions that 'Phi Delta Theta has afforded me many

opportunities, and I just want you boys to share some of the same opportunities I have had,'" concluded McGrath.

Kennedy's service to his country, state and community is noteworthy. He served as Civilian Aide to the Secretary of the Army for the state of Oklahoma from September, 1965 to February, 1972. He was president of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, president of Frontiers of Science Foundation, president of the University of Oklahoma Research Institute and president of the Oklahoma Heritage Association.

He is a former chairman of the Board of Regents for Higher Education in Oklahoma and is the only person to be elected to two terms as director of the Edison Electric Institute. He also served as chairman of the United States National Committee World Energy Conference and was honored by former President Richard Nixon in 1973 as

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Benedict 'Made It' By Himself

"Do you mean, sir, that my father has handicapped me by sending me to Vanderbilt?" asked the college senior.

"As far as this bank is concerned, I'm afraid he has," replied the man in charge of personnel at American National Bank (now First American Bank of Nashville). "Our experience with Vanderbilt graduates has not been good, and it's just our policy not to hire any more."

"But this is the only bank I want to work for," implored the then 20-year-old Andrew Bell Benedict Jr. on that cold day in early 1935.

As it eventually turned out, it was the only bank he'd ever work for—the only job he'd ever have. In June he will have been with First American 47 years.

Had he not persisted and gotten some help from a family friend, however, his name might have been forever linked with one of the other banks in town.

One reason he was dead set on working for that particular institution was because his father, himself a banker for much of his life, had recommended it as the best place for his son to be. Finally the young would-be banker was forced to do something he didn't want to do.

"I compromised myself a little bit and went to see Jim Miller, an old friend of my father's who had worked with him at the Nashville Trust Co.," says Benedict. "I told him I didn't want him to help me after I got in the bank, but that I would certainly appreciate his help in getting in." The next time he applied for the job, he got a more cordial reception, and eventually the bank relented and hired the man who would become its most widely known representative.

Father's Influence

But why didn't he opt for working at the bank where his father, who rose to executive vice president, was employed for 21 years? "I wanted to start out in a bank in which I didn't have any predecessor," he explains. "I wanted to see if I could make it myself."

Actually, by the time Benedict started looking for his first job, his father had been out of banking for eight years, having left Nashville Trust in 1927 when the old Fourth and First National Bank bought the trust company. The elder Benedict bought controlling interest in what was then Ward Belmont School and ran the business affairs of the school until the Depression came along, causing many parents to take their daughters out of finishing schools. "It was a disaster for him financially," his son remembers.

But fortune soon smiled. The banker-turned-college-president happened to be a trustee of Van-

derbilt University (as is Andrew Benedict Jr.), and one day he got a call from the school's chancellor, asking him to come help manage and invest the university's endowment. He was serving as treasurer of Vanderbilt University when he died in 1953.

Still, throughout most of his childhood, much of the talk young Andrew Benedict heard at home concerned banking and bankers. He says he never really considered doing anything else.

He was born in East Nashville on July 6, 1914. The family moved to Curtiswood Lane, near the present governor's residence, in 1918, and Benedict made his home on that property until about two months ago when he moved to a cluster-home development locally.

Vanderbilt Days

Benedict entered Vanderbilt in 1931 and saw much of the Great Depression through the eyes of a college student. Of that time, he says, "It was good for all of us in that everybody was on the same basis. Either you were broke, or you thought you were. Nobody had anything more than anybody else."

At Vanderbilt he was president of Tennessee Alpha as well as president of the sophomore, junior and senior honor societies. He was also president of the junior class, business manager of the campus newspaper and track manager. He graduated in 1935 with a bachelor's degree in economics.

He has been a highly active alumnus and is considered one of the leading Phi Delta supporters among alumni in the Nashville area. "My father-in-law, Clairborne N. Bryan (Vanderbilt '04) and my son, Andrew B. Benedict III (Vanderbilt '64) were both Phis," he said. "I did not attend any Phi Delta Theta conventions as few of us could afford it while we were undergraduates." His support as an alumnus has more than made up for that.



BENEDICT

Through The Ranks

When Benedict went to work for American National, his father gave him some advice. "He said, 'There are two things you don't want to do when you start to work for the bank: Don't ask what your hours are going to be, and don't ask how much money you're going to make.'" He did neither, but after a short while learned that the hours were long and the pay was short—initially \$50 a month.

Starting as a runner, he worked in the transit, bookkeeping and credit departments. He was named assistant cashier in 1941, executive vice president in 1951, president in 1960, chairman of the board in 1969 and senior chairman in October 1979 when Ken Roberts was named chairman and chief executive officer of the bank. Benedict also serves as senior chairman of First American Corp., the bank holding company.

He has had offers to work for other banks, but has never left First American. He says he had several opportunities to relocate to New York. "The one that I really gave some serious thought to was the Chemical Bank," he says. "That was in the mid-40's. But I'm glad I turned it down."

Becoming President

Reflecting on becoming president of the bank in 1960, he says he had "butterflies" for the first six months. The seemingly unflappable banker says the scariest part was sitting in on his first directors' meeting. "See, I didn't become a director of the bank until *two days* before I became president. I had never sat in on a directors' meeting until I became president of the bank."

Benedict has been strongly identified with various professional and civic organizations. His most notable accomplishments along those lines was serving as president of the prestigious Association of Reserve City Bankers. In addition, he is a past president of the Nashville Chapter of the American Institute of Banking and the Tennessee Bankers Association. He has been

very active in the Boy Scouts of America in this area and in freemasonry.

In 1980 he was presented the Award of Merit by the Nashville Junior Chamber of Commerce, presented to "individuals selected by their peers in recognition for outstanding civic leadership and devotion to the improvement and betterment of Nashville." It is significant that the recipient of the award is chosen by a ballot of 300 to 400 Nashville business and civic leaders and receives the honor only if nominated by a majority of the voters. Typically, the senior chairman has been well known by those in leadership positions and around the rest of the country, but has kept a very low profile as far as the general public is concerned.

Mason Activity

One thing that has commanded his interest is the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, Southern Jurisdiction of the United States of America. The Southern Jurisdiction comprises all of the United States except the 15 northeastern states and includes Alaska and Hawaii. Also under the Council's jurisdiction are China, Japan, Panama Canal, Puerto Rico and our Armed Forces in the European Theater.

"We have approximately 650,000 members in the Southern Jurisdiction and the Supreme Council has jurisdiction over the Fourth through the Thirty-third Degrees," he said. "There can be only 33 active Thirty-third Degree Masons in the Southern Jurisdiction. All others are honorary members of The Supreme Council. I have been an active member since 1957 and am presently serving as Grand Treasurer General and head of Scottish Rite Masons in Tennessee."

His power of personal persuasion seems to be the trait that most readily springs to mind when friends and associates are asked about his personality and professional style. "It was really Andrew's asking me to come" that brought him back to Nashville to take over the management of First Ameri-

can, says chairman and CEO Ken Roberts. Former governor Winfield Dunn, a First American board member and former neighbor of Benedict's, says "the most lasting impression you have of him is simply his character." Dunn says he wonders how a man "with his feel for people" has avoided direct political involvement. ("Not my cup of tea," says Benedict.)

While he is no longer engaged in active management of the bank, there is no doubt that his influence is still strongly felt. But even if his counsel and advice were no longer being sought, it appears he'd still take great pleasure in going to his office every day just to absorb the pace of the place and to say a few words to his friends and fellow bankers.

Besides, after spending most of his waking hours at Fourth and Union for 47 years, he probably wouldn't feel comfortable anywhere else.

Questions & Answers

He was asked several questions by *Advantage*, related to his experience and philosophies following a long career in the banking business. First of all, he was asked about his philosophy.

"Well, my predecessors, I think, wanted as many good customers for this bank as we could get. And my philosophy—and it was theirs, too—has always been that all

banks have the same commodity, and we never had an officers' meeting that I didn't get up and say, "Now remember what we're called on to do is just a little bit more than our competition is going to do. We need to do a little bit more *in every instance* than we are called on to do, and that will show the people that we are interested in them as individuals."

"We didn't in any way diminish our interest in corporate business. But we've got a splendid consumer base here in this area. One reason we have been the largest bank here for all these years is because we had more customers. Of course, right now it's hard to make money in the consumer business."

Then he was asked about how he wanted his employees to regard him.

"I never did try to administer by fear, but at the same time I didn't want my employees to be completely informal to me, either. I never tried to make anybody afraid of me, but I wanted them to respect the office."

"I never made any great career of trying to make people love me, I just wanted them to think that I was going to be fair with them and help them when they needed it, and if they had personal trouble to come see me, which nearly all of them did."

"But I don't think I was ever easy on anybody to make them *like me*."

Would you say that you were more conservative than most of your predecessors when it came to making loans?

"No, Parkes Armistead was my immediate predecessor, and he had the best feel about making loans I've ever seen. I wasn't any more conservative than he was; in fact, I may have been more liberal in some instances."

"It's a shocking thing to have people come up to me now and say, 'You know, you made me a loan when I wasn't entitled to it at all,' and I say, 'For goodness sake, don't go around talking about it!'"

Did you make any loans based just on your belief in someone?

"If I didn't know he had his proposition lined up on a sound basis, I just didn't do it, no matter how badly I might want to. The *will to do* won't pay back a loan—by itself. You've got to have the ability, the organization, the capital—you've got to have a lot of things in addition to the will to do it."

"Everybody who comes into this bank to borrow money on a shoestring thinks he's different from everybody else, but he's not. If he hasn't got the other basics lined up, he's not going to make it."

"You do a man a great service many times by turning him down when he's got an unsound proposition. I've always felt that you owe a man a lot more than just a "yes" or "no." You need to either work it out so that it *is* sound, or tell him why it's "no." The mark of a good credit man is to be able to turn a man down and yet retain his good will toward the bank. I have always tried, when I turned a man down, to show him why it was not a sound thing for *him*."

I have heard that when the Junior Chamber wanted to give you its Distinguished Award of Merit back in 1980 that you almost had to be forced to accept it. Why has this low-profile way of doing things been your style?

"How can you explain that? You just know what you like and what's not appealing to you. You don't develop that; you just have it."

"I never have been a retiring soul...but it just never has appealed to me to garner a lot of publicity. It just doesn't appeal to me. I can't say why; it just doesn't."

Is banking a good career to go into these days?

"There's nothing better."

But what will it be like in 20 or 30 years? The environment is changing drastically these days.

"There's no question about that. But nothing is going to replace the commercial bank in the structure of this country. There will be all kinds of competitors, and it's going to change, but Sears, for example, is never going to be able to take the

place of a chartered bank."

Would you want to be a banker in the 21st century? Perhaps I should ask you first what you think the financial community will be like by the beginning of the next century.

"There will be much fewer banks...there will be less distinction, as far as restrictions are concerned, between banks and savings and loans and other entities."

"The banking business has got to get some relief from restrictions that make it possible for Sears and all the others to compete with us. They have no supervision, no restrictions. We are highly restricted. Either they're going to have to come under our umbrella, or we're going to have to have ours removed. It may be that there will be a middle ground we will meet on."

"But if the banks are permitted to have any equality of treatment, as far as the regulations are concerned, then there will be fewer banks, but they'll be strong and sound. It will take generations before Merrill Lynch and Sears and Penney's and Baldwin Piano and all those guys get the finesse that the banks have got."

What would you like to be remembered for?

"That's a hard thing to answer... I would like to be remembered as a person who helped develop this bank...to have made some contribution to the community...and to have been a good family man to my family. ■

Washington State President Shares Concerns

In these days of "belt tightening" there is a growing concern on college campuses that the cost of a college education in the future may prevent a large number of young men and women from pursuing a college degree.

One of these concerned is Dr. Glenn Terrell (Davidson '42), president of Washington State University.

"For over 100 years the American Land-Grant University system had emphasized low-cost education in order that the common man and woman may receive the benefits of postsecondary education in our society," he says. "I see this state of affairs changing in the higher education scene today as trends strengthen to pass the costs on to the users.

"I find this a disturbing trend. I am concerned that this might reduce the accessibility to our colleges and universities for young men and women who are not able to pay the costs."

Dr. Terrell feels that this fact, combined with the reduction in the number of high school graduates in the middle and late 1980s, will undoubtedly reduce enrollments in colleges and universities.

"This not only will threaten the fraternity system (which he strongly supports), but it will also cause many fiscal problems and dislocation problems for colleges and universities throughout the United States," he continues. "I am sure we shall survive this era in American higher education, but effective planning for these possible changes should now be taking place in our colleges and universities. By the 1990s, there should again be an upward enrollment."

He came to Washington State in 1967 from the University of Illinois at Chicago Circle where he was Dean of Faculties. Prior to that he was dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences there. He was a

member of the psychology department at the University of Colorado from 1955 to 1963 and served as chairman from 1957 to 1959.

He began his teaching career at Florida State in the psychology department in 1948 and remained there through 1955. He received his M.S. in Psychology there in 1948.

Born in Tallahassee, Florida in 1920 he received an A.B. in political science from Davidson in 1942 and later received a Ph.D. from Iowa in 1952 and an LL.D. from Davidson in 1969.

He frequently extols the virtues of the Greek system in American higher education. "The system has lasted a long time because it is fundamentally a sound idea," he says.

"The fraternity system permits the students, particularly those in large universities, to reduce the size of the student body, in a very real sense, to the 50 or 60 friends who hold membership in the fraternity.

"I, of course, have had a preference for Phi Delta Theta, but the whole Greek system, I believe, is an asset to Washington State University and to other institutions of higher education. The sense of identification with a relatively small group of peers in a large university instills in the students a strong attachment to the institution and a high motivation to perform well academically. Most young men and women of college age find this a very beneficial experience."

Dr. Terrell is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges and served as president in 1977-78. He is also a member of the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education and the American Council on Education. He is listed in Who's Who in America and American Men of Science. He is a member of the Society of Sigma Xi and a fellow in the American Association for the Advancement of

Science, the American Psychological Association and the Society for Research in Child Development. ■

Phi Orthodontist Leads Active Life

On the wall of his private office hangs an article clipped from the May 2, 1979, *Champaign News-Gazette*. Mounted and then hung there by his wife, Sandy, the headline on the "continued" article gives the key to understanding the spirit at the foundation of his life: "Glad for the chance to serve."

Morgan C. Powell (Illinois '58), a Champaign orthodontist, leads a most active life outside his practice. His installation as president of the Illinois Association of Park Districts in November, 1982, served to focus upon a good number of years of community service activities.

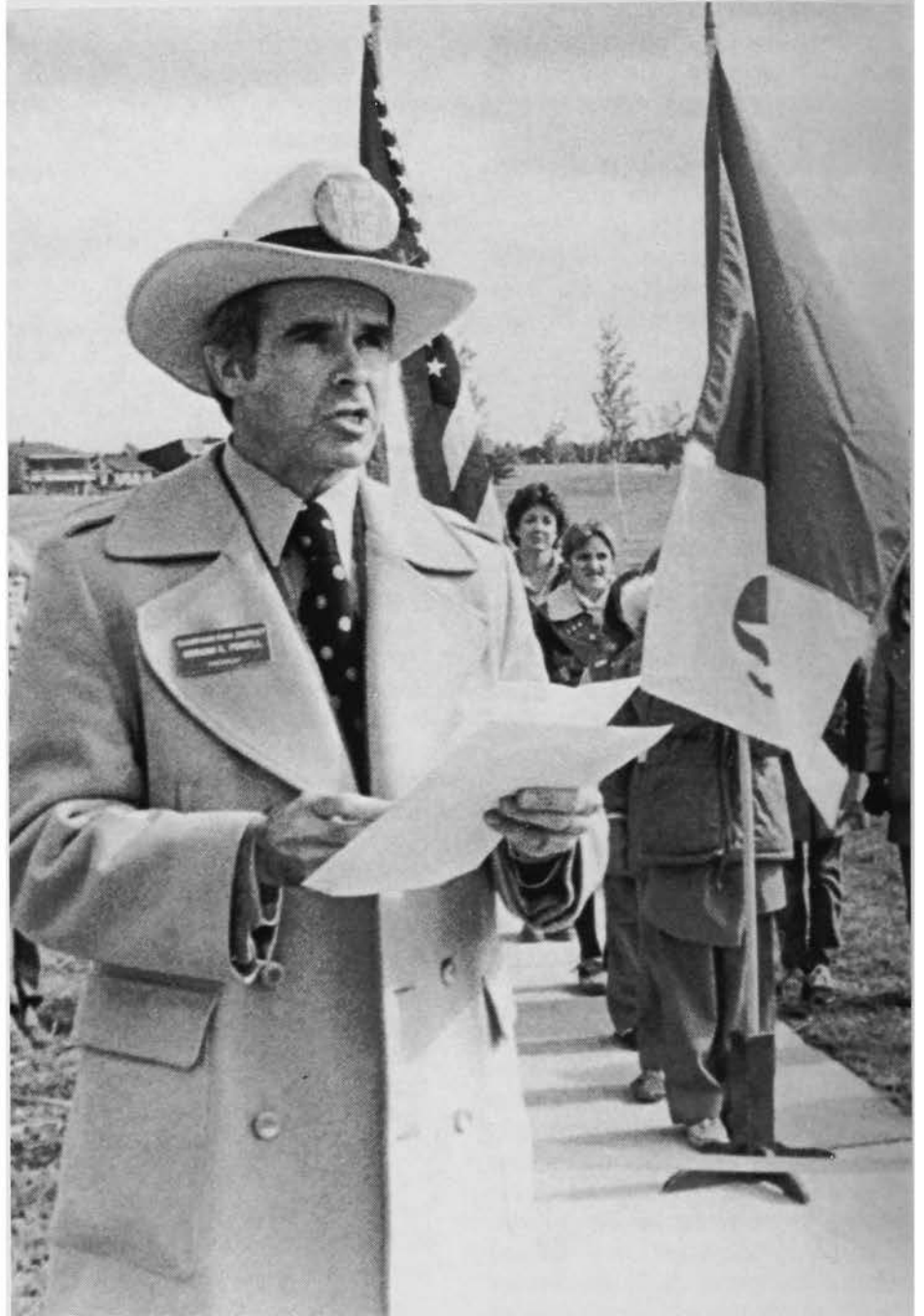
He has served as a commissioner of the Champaign Park District since 1975 and served as its president from 1979-1981. The Champaign Park District won the National Gold Medal in 1979 recognizing Champaign as the best in the nation for park and recreation excellence.

The orthodontist is also an adjunct University of Illinois professor of Veterinary Clinical Medicine. UI has a first of its kind dental clinic for animals in which he teaches and guides a residency program for veterinarians who will be competent to do major dental work for animals.

Surprisingly, animals do experience the same problems as humans: cavities, tartar and stain, foul odor and plaque. The school recently made news by doing a root canal on a lion.

Powell, his wife Sandy and their four teenage-and-under children are an athletic family. They have a condominium at Durango in southwest Colorado where they go to ski and to ride in scenic mountain country. Sandy holds a bachelor's degree from Purdue and a master's from UI. She is an ardent runner—a sport in which he indulges "as time permits."

In 1975 Powell made a personal decision to engage in recreation

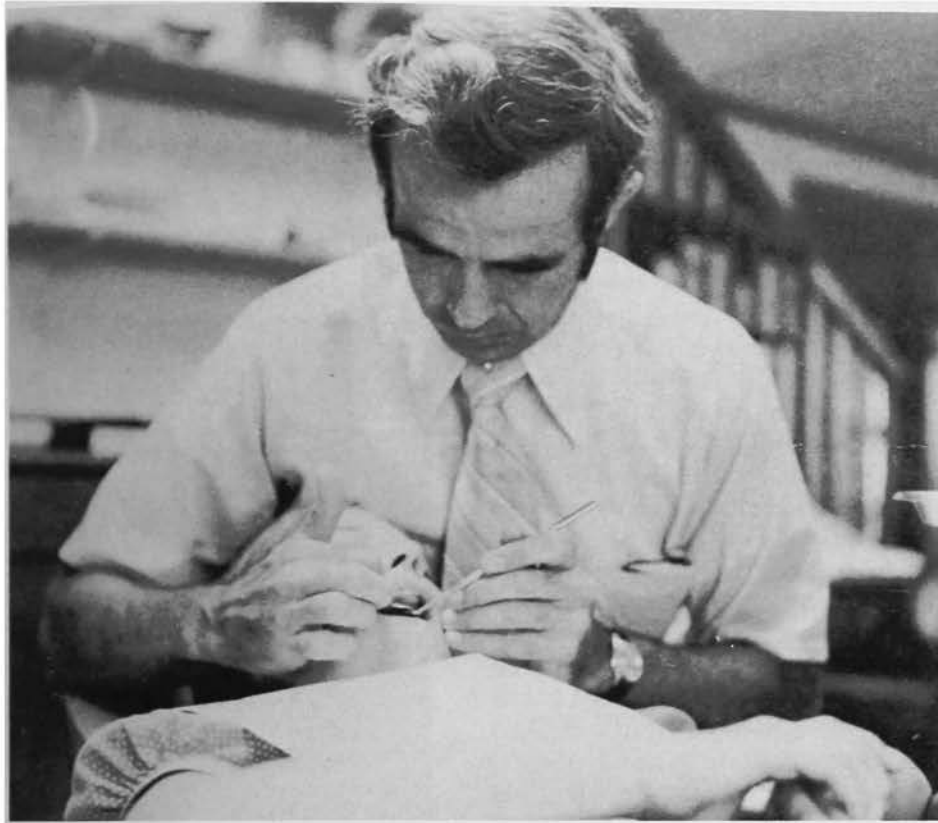


work as an avocation. Pressed to run either for the Unit 4 school board or the park district, he chose the latter and was elected.

He feels that park districts in Illinois need more public awareness and legislative awareness. "Too often park programs are just worthy causes for what they're doing, but the districts do not keep in touch with people or the legisla-

ture to help them achieve more," he said.

He was born in Champaign and attended high school there, winning letters in three sports: football, wrestling and baseball. He gave up sports at UI and concentrated on preparatory studies for the College of Dentistry in Chicago. He received his D.D.S. degree in 1961 and began practice

Illinois made him an honorary "Varsity I" member in 1980 because of his time and work in its athletic association. In the late 1960s he was a key member of a group which developed the Illini Sports Network, through which the Illinois sports programs were made available to television stations throughout the state and beyond.

He just became inactive as a commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve, having served since 1961.

Dr. Powell urges his fellow workers in the Illinois Parks and Recreation program to "get involved." "Use the power vested in you by the voters of your district," he urged. "You have clout and probably don't realize it."

He certainly practices what he preaches. ■

in New Haven, Conn. Returning to Champaign in 1963, he decided to specialize in children's dentistry and orthodontics.

Another sport in which he is involved is golf and this sport may have given him his greatest opportunity. He met Sandy at the Champaign Country Club in 1965 while he was playing golf and they were married Dec. 4 of that year.

Former Hostage Sold on America

Colonel John R. McKone (Kansas State '54) watched the return of American prisoners-of-war from Vietnam in the early 1970s and the release of the hostages from Iran in 1980 with more than just a passing interest. He knew exactly how they felt.

On July 1, 1960, he was the navigator of an RB-47 shot down off the coast of Russia. He and fellow airman Bruce Olmstead were fished out of the sea by a Russian trawler and were held prisoners for seven months. Their plight gripped the attention of all Americans just as the hostage crisis did 20 years later.

The Russians claimed that the American plane was within their 12 mile air-sea territorial limit when it was shot down, but McKone knew full well this was not possible. He calculated that the airplane was never closer than 50 miles to the Kola Peninsula of the Soviet Union.

McKone and Olmstead were the only two survivors of the six-man crew. It is a miracle they were able to survive for seven hours in the 33-degree waters north of the Arctic Circle. They were locked in a closet-sized cell with a 3-inch-thick wooden door that muffled all noise. Sleep was all but impossible as rules prohibited turning away from a 300-watt bulb that hung from the ceiling. They were fed a 500-calorie-a-day diet that caused McKone to lose 50 pounds.

They faced espionage charges which carried a penalty of death by shooting and underwent harsh interrogation in Lubyanka prison by KGB agents headed by Roman Rudenko, the prosecutor general of the Soviet Union.

Both airmen stuck to their story throughout. "We had four faiths: faith in God, faith in country, faith in each other, and faith in our families," stated McKone. "With a good mental attitude the human body can

withstand tremendous beatings."

Their release came very suddenly, only five days after newly elected President John F. Kennedy's inauguration. This caused speculation that the Soviets intended to wait until the end of the 1960 presidential elections to capitalize on as much publicity surrounding the event as possible.

When they returned they were greeted as heroes. Their photos were on the Feb. 3, 1961 cover of *Time* magazine. McKone was honored by a parade in his hometown, Tonganoxie, Kansas. "The greatest honor I have ever received in the service was when the president of the United States walked down to my staff car and opened the door for me when we arrived at Andrews AFB," McKone remembered.

McKone today is commander of Offutt Air Force Base, just south of Omaha, Nebraska. He feels that continued pressure from the American people and the news media was responsible for his release. "They wouldn't let people forget," he said. It wasn't until much later that McKone and Olmstead learned that bags of mail from well-wishers throughout the world had piled up in Russia, undelivered to them.

After his return he earned a master's degree in international relations, specializing in Soviet affairs, from the University of Pittsburgh, and then went through the Air Force Intelligence Officers Course. The Air Force then used his experience and training by assigning him to the Air Force Survival School at Stead AFB, Nev.

He helped develop a very comprehensive program for those who might find themselves a prisoner of war. Later, after the Vietnam prisoners were released, McKone took great satisfaction in hearing from many who thanked him for preparing them for the prison experience.



In reflecting on the event, McKone stated that "I think one of our biggest problems is that we don't understand the Russians. We assume they are like us. That may be true but I can tell you that their leaders aren't. They are tough and aggressive and the only thing they respect is strength.

"We need to learn that we live in a wonderful country, but that we are sometimes our own worst enemies. Instead on constantly complaining the way some people do we need to be positive and emphasize the good things we have done for the world as well as for our own people."

Col. McKone was recognized as Kansas State's top Air Force ROTC cadet in 1954. He was cadet commander of a 1,200 man wing, the second largest in the country. An active Phi Delta, he was also a basketball cheerleader and a member of Arnold Air Society and the Interfraternity Council.

Mrs. McKone, Connie, was also a K-State student and they were married during her junior year.

The McKones remain very positive about their future and the future of their country. "The world's greatest problem and the

greatest we in the United States have is not how to contain communism in the next 20 years, but to find a way to turn the trend toward communism around," he told the *Airman* magazine (July, 1982).

"How do we sell, if you will, democracy and the idea that the individual does have worth, and that the individual does not want to live under the rule of masters in a slave state? If we just tell the truth about democracy and about the free enterprise system, it would do more than anything to sell the idea that our founders had more than 200 years ago."

McNulty Newest Phi Delt In Congress

James F. McNulty (Arizona '50) is the newest Phi Delt Congressman, having been elected in

November to represent Arizona's Fifth Congressional District. He is a Democrat.

Following his election he told the Old Pueblo Kiwanis Club in Tucson that the "good news is that the '82 folks in Congress are young, bright and enthusiastic. The bad news is that they had better be."

He told the group that he expects "hard days ahead" threshing out the problems of unemployment, inflation and a budget deficit that may exceed \$150 billion dollars this year.

He narrowly defeated Republican state senator, Jim Kolbe. He said a strong economic recovery is "not around the corner" and predicted a continued trend of high unemployment.

He said he would support some type of jobs bill, although proposed measures aimed at providing jobs for 300,000 people at a time where 12 million are unemployed are less than adequate. "We must reinstate some confidence in the people," he said. "They have become discouraged, disappointed and disgusted with government."

A budget bill based on a bipartisan fiscal policy would have his support, McNulty said, although the measure probably would cause an enormous amount of work and a never-ending amendment process.

McNulty also said a \$9,100 annual congressional pay raise approved by the House is "totally inappropriate" at a time when so many Americans are jobless. He supported President Reagan's 5-cent-per gallon increase in the federal gasoline tax to pay for repairs on the nation's highways and bridges but is against MX-missile funds because a "country armed to the teeth with a staggering economy" is absurd.

The new congressman was born in Boston and graduated from Boston Latin School. He served in the U.S. Army for a year and a half and after discharge enrolled in Har-

vard. Health problems made it necessary for him to relocate to Tucson where he enrolled in the University of Arizona and graduated with an LLB in 1951.

He is married to the former Jacqueline Boevers who is an Arizona native and also graduated from Arizona in 1951 and received a Master's in political science from Arizona in 1979. They are the parents of three children: Michael, a lawyer who is currently employed as the administrative assistant to Representative Morris K. Udall; Cynthia, who is a biological editor for the Dupont Corporation at the Savannah River Test Station in Aiken, South Carolina; and Amy, a freshman at Bisbee High School.

He has served in various public capacities and served two terms on the Arizona State Board of Education, two terms as a member of the Arizona State Bar Board of Governors, one five-year term as a member of the Arizona State Hospital Board, and three terms as a member of the Arizona State Senate.

He has also been a member of the Arizona Elected Officials Salary Commission. He and his wife have served as directors of the University of Arizona Alumni Association and he has been a director of the University of Arizona Law College Alumni Association since its founding. He has also been a director of the Health Systems Agency of South Arizona since its founding and has served as a director of the Palo Verde Foundation Board of Directors and the Cochise County Hospital Association Board of Directors.

McNulty has practiced law in Bisbee since 1951 with Martin Gentry, who was a member of the Arizona Board of Regents until his entry into the Naval Air Corps in World War II.

McNulty himself was appointed to the Arizona Board of Regents in September, 1980. ■

The attainment of the charter could not have been possible without the help of Lowrie, Eagen and Professor John Hinckley, faculty adviser, as well as the support from General Headquarters.

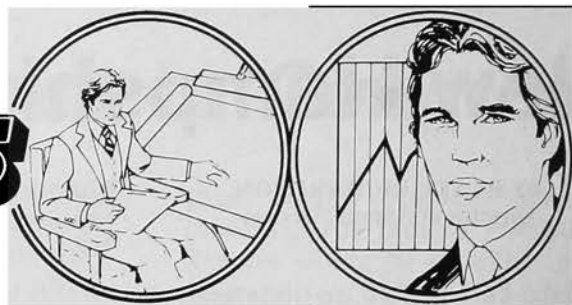

Oregon State Phi Achieves Widespread Fame

If Oregon State had a Distinguished Alumni Award, Harold Scott (Oregon State '24) would be a prime candidate for the honor.

He graduated from Oregon State in 1924 and earned his Master of Science at Kansas State in 1927. He earned his Ph.D. at Illinois in 1938. Along the way he was elected to Alpha Zeta, Gamma Sigma Delta, Phi Kappa Phi and Sigma Xi.

Dr. Scott retired from the Illinois faculty in 1969 and has since suffered three strokes. He is recovering at his home at Lake Havasu City, Arizona.

In 1969 he was awarded the Ralston Purina teaching award of \$1,000. His nomination read: "Dr. Scott is widely recognized for his outstanding contributions to research. Overshadowed by this is his tremendously outstanding ability as a stimulating and successful teacher. Equally adept with both undergraduates and graduates he is regarded as one of the finest teachers on the University of Illi-

nois campus."

Also mentioned was the fact that he is recognized as an international authority on poultry nutrition and the physiology of poultry reproduction. His research resulted in some 120 scientific articles.

The Ralston Purina award completed a clean sweep for Scotty. He

has received every major recognition offered by the Poultry Science Association. In 1954 he received an Award of Merit from the Illinois Poultry Improvement Association and in 1955 he got the American Feed Manufacturers Award from the Nutrition Council.

He was elected a Fellow of Poultry Science in 1957 and received the Borden Award for Nutrition Research in 1963. In 1964 he received the Nutrition Award from Distillers' Feed Research Council. The Ralston award came in 1969. Finally, in 1974, Scotty's portrait was hung in the Poultry Hall of Fame at the National Agricultural Library, Beltsville, Maryland.

He and his wife Elizabeth retired to Lake Havasu in 1969. ■

While at Vanderbilt he was captain of the basketball and football teams between 1915 and 1919. After his graduation he served in the legislature in the House of Representatives in 1923 and 1924. A veteran of both WWI and WWII, he served as president of both the Nashville and Tennessee Bar Associations and as a Tennessee code commissioner. He was the last surviving brother of the seven Adams brothers that were members of Tennessee Alpha. Of the seven brothers, ten sons were born and nine were initiated into Tennessee Alpha and the tenth was initiated into North Carolina Gamma. Among survivors are three Vanderbilt Phi sons, Alfred T. Adams, Jr. '49, John P. Adams '54, and Benjamin S. Adams '56; a Vanderbilt Phi cousin, Samuel H. Howell '46; and two Vanderbilt Phi nephews, Marion S. Adams, Jr. '53 and Howell E. Adams '53.

Officers Meet In South Carolina

"It is amazing how far we have come as a fraternity since I first started working for Phi Delta Theta in 1932 as a bookkeeper."

The speaker was Harry Gerlach (Miami-Ohio '30), member of the Survey Commission from Austin, Texas. The occasion was the conclusion of the recent General Officers Conference at Kiawah Island, South Carolina, Feb. 18-20.

Gerlach was commenting on the high quality of individuals and high degree of expertise represented among the general officers. The meeting included discussions and presentations representing a wide variety of topics and concerns within the fraternity.

"The results more than justify the expense of these conferences," stated Dr. Charles Wicks, General Council president. "The information it gives our new province presidents and general officers plus the inspiration it provides our more experienced volunteers is invaluable."

First Day Meetings

Meetings of the Educational Foundation and the Survey Commission highlighted the first day's activities. Lothar Vasholz, chairman of the Educational Foundation, announced that a new IRS ruling will allow the Foundation much greater latitude in helping pay for educational activities of the fraternity.

Don Mason, a Foundation trustee, also announced that "up to 28 scholarships of \$1,500 each will be given in 1983, not including the Priest Award of \$2,000 and the O'Dell Award of \$1,500 which goes to an Iowa Alpha undergraduate."

It was also announced that a Herbert C. Lovejoy Scholarship to

an eligible Phi from Washington Alpha would be started this year in the amount of \$1,200. This makes it possible for two juniors from Washington Alpha to win scholarships. Eligibility is consistent with the well-established Educational Foundation recognition awards.

T. Glen Cary discussed the fact that the Survey Commission started the Biennium with eight colonies. "Three have been in-

stalled, two will be installed shortly and we still have three active colonies going," he stated. "We are looking for more at this time."

The three installed chapters he spoke of were at New Hampshire College, Oregon Tech and California-Berkeley. The two soon-to-be installed chapters he mentioned are at St. Louis University and Northwood Institute in Michigan.

The Commission approved, and the General Council concurred, establishing colonies at Brown University (a return to an old campus for the fraternity) and the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire. The remaining colony is at the University of Southwestern Louisiana in New Iberia, LA.

At the present time there are 152 chapters and five colonies throughout the United States and Canada.

The Palmer Foundation trustees which will take over the direction of *The Scroll* in the future, also met to discuss their operations as a separate Foundation.

General Officers Meeting

All the general officers met Saturday and completed their deliberations at noon Sunday.

On Saturday morning they heard presentations on the relationship between the province president and the chapter consultant, the role of the chapter adviser and the direction of the Chapter Officer and Adviser Conferences.

In the province president-consultant presentation the point was made that the two are working for the same thing and are not adversaries. It was stressed that the province president should prepare his chapters for a consultant visit by

He now puts his brilliant mind to work to aid ALS patients like himself, and those patients who unfortunately will follow. He is chairman of the Greater Kansas City "Friends of ALSOA which offers support and information to ALS patients and others."

The New Hampshire Beta Colony of Phi Delta Theta was installed on Jan. 15 at New Hampshire College in Manchester, New Hampshire. On Saturday, Jan. 29, Phi Delta Theta returned to the University of California at Berkeley. The California Alpha chapter was originally established in 1873 and in 1978 the charter was suspended because of failing chapter operations. A colony was established shortly thereafter and thanks to the work of dedicated area alumni, the chapter was eventually reinstated.

The time of year, location and format, however, must vary from one geographic region to another based on the needs and attitudes of the chapters in each region.

In the afternoon they heard reports from Bob Dinkel, treasurer of the General Council; Alan Okun, scholarship commissioner and Erin Haynes, Pi Province President. He addressed the problems of alcohol and drugs on college campuses.

Dinkel encouraged officers to use good judgment in spending fraternity dollars but also encouraged them to do a first class job. He presented some guidelines to follow in travel expenses.

Okun emphasized the need to implement good scholarship programs in all chapters in that sound learning was one of the basic principles of the fraternity. He offered a list of suggestions and discussed his efforts to bring a new awareness of scholarship to the fraternity with his program.

Haynes discussed various "horror stories" related to problems with the use of drugs and alcohol in college organizations. He urged province presidents to inform all chapters of their liability in regard

to damages, injury and even death related to the use of alcohol in the chapter house and lodges.

He especially urged chapters to quit letting non-Phi Delt come to their parties with the exception of rushees in that these outside individuals can not often be called to account for damages they do while in the chapter house.

He also related a "scam" in which outsiders attended fraternity parties on a college campus, picked fights so they would be thrown out, and later brought suits against those fraternities.

Concluding Session

In the concluding session on Sunday presentations were made by Brian Dunn, assistant community service chairman, and Rusty Richardson, director of alumni affairs.

Dunn discussed some new directions for the community service projects of the fraternity and Richardson outlined his initial efforts to start new alumni clubs.

The rest of the session consisted of questions and answers from the officers to the General Council regarding a variety of concerns.

Three Underclassmen Pace Cagers

A trio of underclassmen dominate the unanimous first team *All-Phi* basketball selection for 1982-83 and a quartet of underclassmen pace the second team.

The lone repeat first team choice is unanimous Dave Nelson (Washburn '83), who scored 293 points and had 164 rebounds. His career scoring total is 818 points and his career rebounds are 495.

Another unanimous selection is Jon Mansbury (TCU-Ball State '83) moving up from last year's second team. He topped all scorers with 417 points for a 14.9 scoring average plus 250 rebounds. He scored over 20 points in eight games topped by 26 against Eastern Illinois, 23 against powerful Indiana and 23 against Bradley.

A trio of underclassmen are paced by unanimous sophomore Tim Mullen (Virginia '85), a starter the past two seasons with the nationally ranked Cavaliers. He scored 225 points, topped by 23 points in a win over Duke, 16 points against NCAA Champion North Carolina State and 12 points in each of five other

games.

Another sophomore is unanimous Detlef Schrempf (Wash. U.-Seattle '85) center who scored 329 points for an 11.7 average plus 211 rebounds. His top scoring outputs were a pair of 22 point games against UCLA and Oregon State.

Completing the underclassmen is junior Carlos Gilyard (Willamette '84) a Second Team *All-Northwest* Conference selection who tallied 212 points, 124 rebounds and 60 assists.

A quartet of juniors continue the pattern of underclassmen for the honorary Second Team. They are Marshall Coba (Whitman '84), who scored 277 points for a 10.7 average plus 100 rebounds and 61 assists; repeater Howard Cohn (Lawrence '84), who tallied 236 points for an 11.8 average and 133 rebounds topped by 13 in one game; and Mark Mitchell (Hanover '84) who scored 164 points and 124 rebounds with a 17-11 team.

Hobson Recognized

The 1983 All-Phi Basketball Team is dedicated to the greatest contributor to collegiate basketball in our fraternity and at least in the top dozen throughout the nation.

He is 80-year-old Howard A. Hobson (Oregon '26), who was an original member of the *All-Phi* Basketball Board. Brother Hobson's teams won 495 games at Southern Oregon, University of Oregon and Yale. At Oregon he won the first NCAA National Championship in 1939 which was preceded by three conference titles in 1937-38-39. At Yale he won or tied for five Big Three crowns.

His teams pioneered intersectional basketball play and he is the first basketball coach to win major conference titles on both coasts. "Hobby", as he is known, was a four-time Olympic Committee Member, a member of the Rules Committee and Past President of the NCAA Basketball Coaches Association.

I spotted this "Grand Old Man" of collegiate and Phi Delta Theta basketball at the 45th NCAA Championships in Albuquerque with a badge that said, "Lifetime Member of the Basketball Coaches Association". We want to take this opportunity in the *Scroll* to honor a most distinguished contributor to Phi Delta Theta and collegiate basketball.

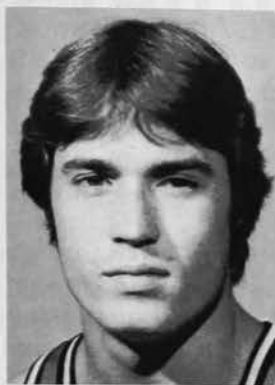

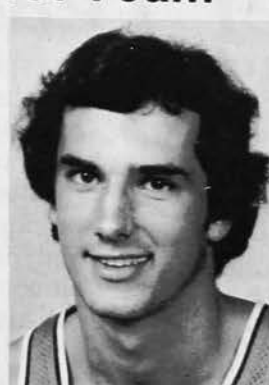

Another Year—Another Record

In round figures, 10,000 Phis contributed a total of \$375,000 during the 1982 fund drive. In truth, however, we failed to break the magic level of 10,000 donors, recording, instead, 9,989. The dollar amount of contributions totaled \$371,132.51, quite close to the \$375,000 figure.

Accompanying statistical information might lead one to believe that the above figures are in error, but this can be explained by pointing out that nearly 2,500 brothers contributed to both the loyalty fund and the education fund. In fact, there are actually four funds when one takes into account a duplicate pair in the Dominion of Canada, where all Canadian currency is deposited.

ters, we live by the adage that "the only gift too small is no gift at all." On the other hand, we also want to

pay special tribute to those persons who have been unusually generous in their contributions during 1982. The Founders Club recognizes those members who have given \$10,000 or more within a period of ten years and, once added to this list, a Phi's name remains permanently.

This year, we welcome Brother **Donald E. Demkee** (Akron '60), president of Sigma South Province, to the Founders Club. His generous contribution will provide an additional scholarship award for a qualified candidate in his province. The second addition is a posthumous award made possible through the generosity of **Mrs. John L. Ott**, who has made a contribution in memory of her husband, who served the Fraternity with distinction as a province president and a trustee of the Educational Foundation.

Similarly, Council Associates are recognized for gifts of \$1,000 or more. Ten such Phis are included on a list accompanying this article and you will note that, in addition to **Don Demkee**, who has advanced to the Founders Club list, the name of **Maurice E. Shaffer** (Dickinson '30) appears. He became a Founders Club member in 1980 and still remains generous in his support of the Fraternity. The other persons whose names appear on this list are rapidly on their way to becoming Founders Club members.

All these gifts, as well as those received from the members of the President's Panel, sixteen in number, have contributed significantly to the record total obtained during 1982. In the list of donors, other levels of giving are recognized by Argent Association (\$250), Sword & Shield Society (\$100), Helmet Society (\$50) and Azure Association (\$25).

Where Does the Money Go?

Money contributed to the Loyalty Fund is retained by the Fraternity for operating expenses. It helps pay for the daily maintenance

costs of the General Headquarters Building, but, more importantly, it assists with the expense of maintaining a crew of chapter consultants who visit chapters on a regular basis throughout the year, making multiple visits to chapters with special problems. It also helps pay the travel costs of the volunteer workers who serve as province presidents and commissioners. With this kind of alumni support, the General Fraternity continues to operate as an efficient organization without the necessity of increasing pledge fees, initiation fees and charges to chapters for the General Convention and miscellaneous supplies. Canadian funds are held for similar purposes and are expended in Canada.

being one of eleven men to found the Frontier of Science Foundation in Oklahoma City. In 1975 he was named one of the most outstanding executives of the year by Financial World magazine and was also named Salesman of the Year (1975) by the Oklahoma City Sales and Marketing Executive Club.

Kennedy received the annual Brotherhood Award from the Oklahoma City chapter of the National Conference of Christians and Jews and was named the Industrialist of the year by the Oklahoma City Press Club in November, 1969. He received the James H. McGraw Award and purse for outstanding utility man in the United States in March, 1971.

Interestingly enough, Kennedy was one of the local committee that nominated Stanley Learned (Kansas '24) for Phi of the Year in 1970. He is described by C. Harold Brand (Northwestern '30) in a nominating letter as "a selfless, unselfish individual who is always promoting and counseling with others to promote their economic, social and cultural backgrounds and advancements."

The Phi of the Year has received five honorary degrees from the following: LLD-Oklahoma City University, LLD-Butler University, LLD-University of Arizona, Doctor of Science-Bethany Nazarene College, and Doctor of Humanities-Oklahoma Christian College.

Kennedy, a Golden Legionnaire, is listed in "Who's Who in America" and serves as a director of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad

Company and Katy Industries. He is a life member of the Oklahoma Symphony Orchestra Board and a past King of Beaux Arts Ball in Oklahoma City.

He was elected to the Oklahoma Hall of Fame in 1966 and is also a member of Beta Gamma Sigma and Omicron Delta Kappa. He has served as Junior Warden and Senior Warden of his church, All Souls Episcopal Church in Oklahoma City.

Born in Rushville, Indiana, he married Gertrude Hacker in 1927. They have one daughter, Mrs. Thomas E. Voegel and three grandchildren.

Schwankee

Kermit Ruhl Schwankee is president of the John R. Daily Co. and Western Montana By-Products, Inc. in Missoula, Montana. He served Montana Alpha as chapter adviser from 1958 to 1969 and has also served on the Housing Corporation.

He is a former president of the Montana Athletic Association (1952) and the Alumni Association (1969). He is active on the board of directors of the Missoula County United Way and the Chamber of Commerce. He is also on the board of St. Patrick's Hospital and Western Federal Savings and Loan Association. He served on the local school board from 1979 to 1982.

Schwankee has been very active in youth baseball serving as president of the Missoula Little Leagues and the Babe Ruth Leagues from 1956-1960. Last year he received a Distinguished Alumni award from Montana. His service to both Phi

"Kermit has always reached out to help the Phi Deltas with their finances, managing the house, and most importantly he has always been active in the rush," stated Davidson.

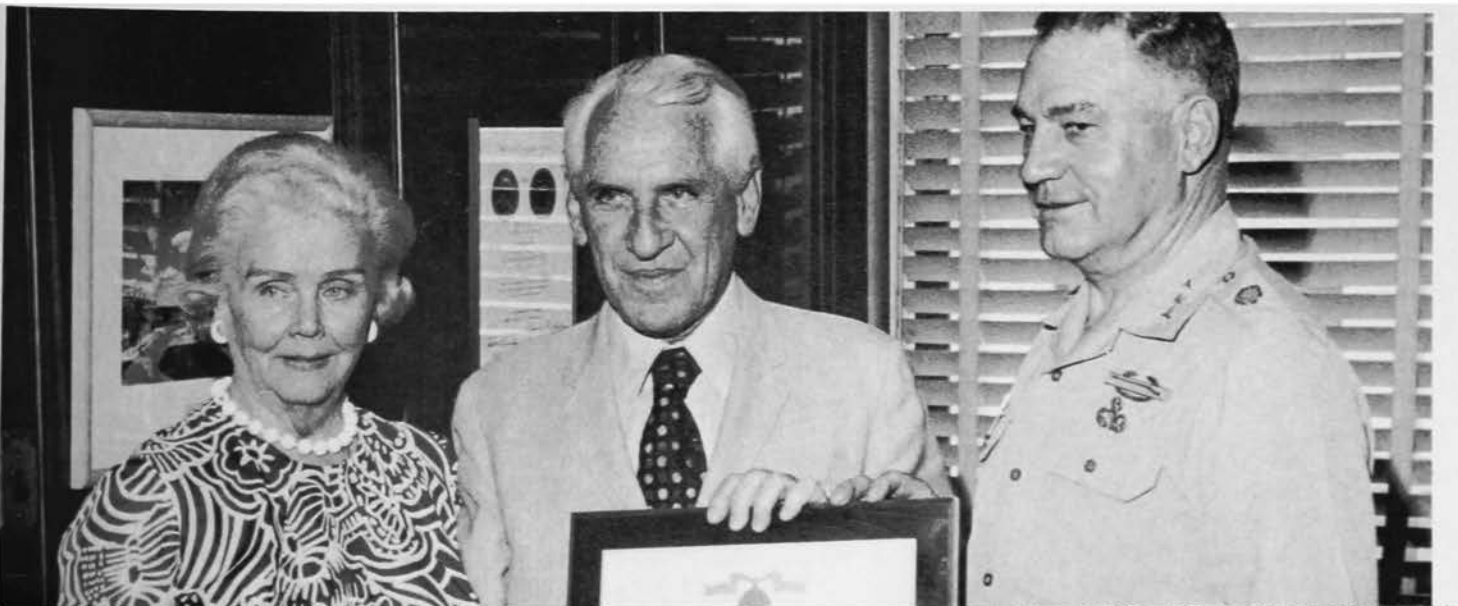

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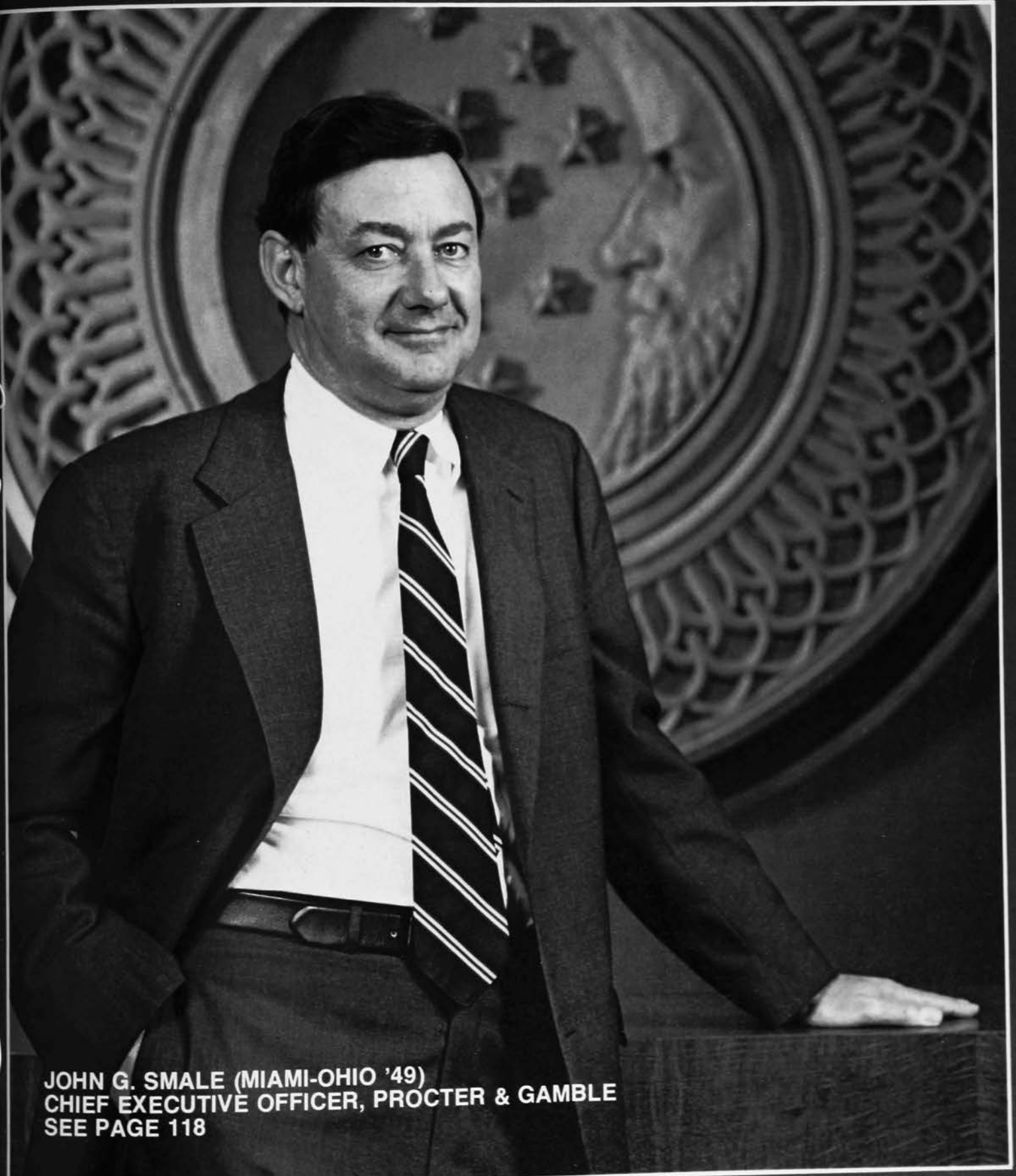

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John Smale Accentuates the Positive

"There's no particular virtue in being a large corporation just for the sake of being large."

Such is the philosophy of John G. Smale (Miami-Ohio'49), who has worked his way up the ladder from an assistant brand manager to chief executive officer for Procter & Gamble.

"Maintaining Procter & Gamble's character is absolutely essential—even superseding the importance of volume and profit growth," he says. "I never had any question in my mind when I was a young man first working at P&G about the character or the moral standards of the people running the business."

"I never had any question about whether or not they were doing the right thing in an ethical sense. I think that's been true in generations before I joined the company, I think it's true now and I think it will be true in generations in the future."

In 1952, after three years in sales and marketing work for Vick Chemical Company and Bio-Research, he answered an ad in *The Chicago Tribune* for brand management positions at P&G. He drove to Cincinnati for an interview and then started as assistant brand manager on Gleem tooth-

paste, which in 1952 was in test market in Indianapolis.

He moved up to brand manager on Gleem in 1954 and became associate advertising manager in 1958. He caught the attention of upper management by his part in persuading the American Dental Association to utter those famous words: "Crest has been shown to be an effective decay preventive denti-

fice that can be of significant value when used in a conscientiously applied program of oral hygiene and regular professional care."

Smale continued to move into positions of greater responsibility in the Toilet Goods Division, and by 1967 had been named Division Vice President. During the 60s the Division launched new brands such as Head & Shoulders shampoo, Scope mouthwash and Pampers disposable diapers which became the company's biggest money-maker.

"Pampers is the kind of product concept that sets our company apart from other consumer goods companies," he said. "Products like Pampers, Crest and Tide don't come along very often, but they show our enormous commitment to research."

Pampers was not successful at first, but Smale and his people stuck with it until it gained consumer acceptance.

In 1968 he became vice president of the Bar Soap and Household Cleaning Products Division. A year later, he assumed the same responsibilities for the packaged soap and detergent business. In 1970, he was elected vice president-group executive in charge of both divisions.

He faced a major challenge during this time and his response sent him on to great heights within the company. The government and environmentalist groups charged in the early 1970s that the use of phosphate in Procter laundry products had turned some of the country's most important fresh water reserves into stagnant backwaters because of phosphate pollution.

Smale met this problem head on. Company research indicated that the charges were unfounded. P&G chose to stop selling its detergents in some areas for a time rather than replace phosphates with inferior-quality ingredients.

"Today there is still no clear evidence that removing phosphates from detergents has any effect on water quality," Smale said. "But, in the intervening years, we have improved our ability to work with lower levels of phosphates."

P&G insiders believe that his approach to this problem marked him as the heir apparent in the company's top job.

In 1972, Smale was elected to the Board of Directors and one year later, he was named executive vice president. He was elected president in 1974 and became chief executive officer on Jan. 5, 1981.



Again, problems faced him when he became chief executive. Rumors had surfaced that Procter & Gamble was Satanist. Under his leadership, a series of libel suits were brought against many of the rumor mongers. It quieted the issue.

The P&G chief executive is only the seventh person to occupy this position since the company incorporated in 1890. He was born in Ontario, Canada and his parents moved to Elmhurst, Illinois during the depression. After a year in the Navy near the end of World War II he enrolled in Miami-Ohio on the GI bill.

Here he pledged and was initiated into Ohio Alpha. "My parents thought it might be a good idea to have a doctor in the family, so I started with pre-med in mind," he said. Later he switched to the College of Business and graduated in 1949.

While at Miami he wrote and published two booklets which helped finance his junior and senior years. The booklets, titled "Party 'Em Up" and "Party 'Em Up Some More," outlined ideas for successful parties. He sold them by direct mail to fraternities and sororities across the country.

Smale takes another strong stance on many federal consumer regulations because of the red tape involved. He believes that actions taken by companies on behalf of consumers are the answer, not federal regulation. Procter & Gamble has long prided itself on maintaining a close relationship with its customers.

Outside the business, Smale feels his most rewarding activities are his volunteer efforts relating to education. He is a member of the board of trustees of Kenyon College and a director of the United Negro College Fund. In addition, he is a Director of the Council for Financial Aid to Education.

He and his wife, Phyllis, live in Hyde Park, a Cincinnati neighborhood. His children, two boys and two girls, are grown and away from home.

"It's pretty tough getting everyone together nowadays; we're all so spread out," he said. He recalled, with pleasure, spending summer vacations when the children were small visiting aunts, uncles and cousins in Canada.

Smale looks with confidence to P&G's future. "Growth is undoubtedly going to come, as it has in the past, importantly from new products," he said. "The bulk of our growth in the next ten years will come from new brands—in the United States and overseas."

When asked what he would like people to think of when they hear the words "Procter & Gamble" he responded: "When you say 'people' I think of consumers, the people who buy our products. In the future I'd like them to think what I hope they think now, 'excellence and value.' The most important thing they can know about us is through our products and their quality." ■

Blackwell Enters Chapter Grand

Phi Delta Theta was saddened on May 19 when word was received that Ray E. Blackwell (Franklin '24) had died in Madison, Wisconsin.

He had moved from Oxford, Ohio, to Madison in the fall of 1980 in order to be closer to his family. Funeral services and burial were held in Lebanon, Indiana, on Monday, May 23.

Ray Blackwell was initiated as Bond No. 425 of the Indiana Delta chapter at Franklin and embarked on what would become a distinguished career in Phi Delta Theta.

He served the fraternity as scholarship commissioner from 1937 to 1942 and served as president of Beta Province from 1947 to 1952. In 1953, he was named alumni secretary and served in that capacity until 1967. In 1966, upon the death of Editor Hayward S. Biggers, he assumed the responsibilities as editor of publications for the fraternity until his retirement in 1967.

He is the author of the book, *Improvement of Fraternity Scholarship*, which has been made available to the chapters of Phi Delta Theta and other fraternities for many years.

He was recognized for his contributions to Phi Delta Theta and the fraternity system not only by his chapter at Franklin but by the fraternity when he was named "Runner-up" for the Raymond L. Gardner "Phi of the Year" award, the recognition given each year to the alumnus who best exemplifies the teachings of the Bond through participation in fraternity affairs, activities in higher education and community service.

He was awarded the Legion of Merit in honor of his distinguished service to the fraternity at the 1982 convention in St. Louis. In making the presentation Bruce Thompson, president of the General Council said, "This brother's love for and devotion to Phi Delta Theta are obvious to all who are in his com-

pany for even a brief period."

He is survived by a daughter and son-in-law, Margaret and Ron Koenig, Madison, Wisconsin; by a son and daughter-in-law, William D. and Marj Blackwell, Piedmont,

California; and by five grandchildren.

Contributions in his memory may be made to the Phi Delta Theta Educational Foundation. ■

Barlow Wins Adviser Recognition

"He has encouraged us to strive for perfection and better ourselves, both as individuals and as a chapter."

That is how one Phi describes this year's winner of the Samuel V. Stone Award, Richard L. Barlow (Emporia State '69), as the outstanding Chapter Adviser of the Year.

Perfection is certainly the goal of Barlow, adviser for the Nebraska Beta chapter at Kearney State College for the past 16 years. During his tenure, the chapter has won several General Headquarters Trophies, two Silver Stars, and a string of five consecutive Gold Stars. Individually, the chapter boasts several Fraternity scholarship winners, including one Arthur R. Priest Award winner.

Dr. Barlow received a Bachelor's degree from Kearney State in 1962 before going on to Kansas University for graduate work in mathematics. After earning his Masters degree in 1964, he worked as an instructor of mathematics at Butler University until returning to Kearney in 1966. It was at Butler where Barlow had his first taste of Phi Delta Theta.

Unlike most chapter advisers, Barlow began his association with the Fraternity before he was a Phi. During his two years at Butler, he worked in a limited capacity with the Indiana Gamma chapter. Upon his return to Kearney, the Nebraska Beta chapter asked him to serve as Faculty Adviser. Because of his excellent work in this position, arrangements were made to have Dr. Barlow initiated at installation ceremonies for the Kansas Epsilon chapter at the Kansas State Teachers College at Emporia. Since that time he has been an important asset to our Fraternity.

Dr. "B", as he is known to the brothers of Nebraska Beta, has

played a variety of roles and duties within the chapter, his latest being the instigator in the acquisition of a second chapter house across the street from the original. This gives the chapter twice the occupancy that they had before.

According to James S. Sajevis, Nebraska Beta alumni secretary, "It's difficult to capture with paper and pen all that Dr. Barlow has done to encourage the growth and continued excellence of Nebraska Beta of Phi Delta Theta. It's the summer he and three undergraduates spent rewiring the chapter house. It's his steady attendance at chapter meetings, social and alumni gatherings. It's knowing his door and his mind are always open should you feel the need to share the good times or the bad."

The position of chapter adviser is the most important volunteer position in the hierarchy of Phi Delta Theta. It is unfortunate we only recognize one of the many outstanding advisers with the Stone Award. However, several other advisers were named as runners-up to Barlow. These men, in addition to their duties as adviser, have participated in Chapter Officer and Adviser Conferences, served on house corporations, and helped with IFCs and alumni clubs.

Special commendation goes to these five excellent advisers: Billy T. Edwards, Kentucky Eta at Western Kentucky, 3 Years; Dwight Nelson, Indiana Epsilon at Hanover College, 12 years; Richard Owens, Montana Alpha at the University of Montana, 6 years; Michael Twigg, Maryland Alpha at the University of Maryland, 5 years; and M. Cheak Yee, Illinois Beta at the University of Chicago, 10 years.

Barlow will be the guest of the Fraternity at the next General Convention, this June in New Orleans. ■



ALS Adopted As Philanthropy

At the February meeting of the General Officers of Phi Delta Theta the General Council approved the National ALS Foundation as its primary philanthropy.

ALS stands for Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis but it is more commonly known as the Lou Gehrig's Disease. According to Brian Dunn (Cornell '77), the Community Service Day chairman for the fraternity, "the designation of the National ALS Foundation as a primary philanthropy comes as a result of our decision to try and focus the collective efforts of the fraternity in an area where we can have a true and lasting impact."

"At the same time we will continue to encourage and promote the individual efforts of the chapters to assist their local community. Many chapters have events that are rich in tradition and in no way should this new program detract from those traditions."

Henry Louis Gehrig was not only one of the all time greats of baseball history, he was a brother in the Bond of Phi Delta Theta. The "pride of the Yankees" signed the Bond at New York Delta (Columbia University) on April 18, 1922; near the end of his junior year. Despite the fact that Lou was a modest and shy young man he was, even then, somewhat of a celebrity having starred on the football and baseball teams.

One of the fraternity brothers who helped to initiate Gehrig was classmate Joseph A. Lillard (Columbia '23), now living in Hastings-on-Hudson, New York.

"Usually when Lou was through with his activities on campus he went home, but I do remember him coming by the fraternity house for dinner from time to time," he says. "He was an awfully nice fellow; but I think his main interests were his mother, classes and the ball game—perhaps in that order!"

Graham Gardner (Columbia '23) who now lives in Southbury, Conn., recalls: "Above all, he had a reputation for being an excellent ballplayer. In fact, that's how he was presented to us for initiation, that such a good sportsman would enhance the image of the fraternity."

Their memories of Lou Gehrig,

student and fraternity brother, evolve easily into the public memory of Lou Gehrig, the "Iron Horse" and Yankee first baseman. And from his tenure as a Phi Delt Lou Gehrig will always be considered one of the chapter's most illustrious brothers.

From the time he joined the

Yankees in 1923, to the day he gave his farewell speech in 1939, Gehrig's talent and reputation as a ballplayer were outshone only by his humility and courage. His untimely death at the age of 39 was mourned by the entire nation, and it is a tragic tribute that the disease that took his life, Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), has come to be known as "Lou Gehrig's disease"!

It was particularly unfitting that such a strong and physically powerful man should be afflicted by a disease that gradually destroys all muscle function, ending eventually in total paralysis while leaving the mind unaffected. After all, this was a ball player who did not miss one game in 14 consecutive years; who was named four times the Most Valuable Player in the American League; whose incredible streak of 2,130 games remains a record unbroken to this day.

The admirable qualities of humility and courage that were so evident in Lou Gehrig were perhaps never displayed more clearly than in his farewell speech to a crowd of thousands, packed into Yankee Stadium on July 4, 1939. Gehrig had less than two years to live when he said:

"Fans, for the past two weeks you have been reading about what a bad break I got. Yet today, I consider myself the luckiest man on earth. I have been in ballparks for 17 years, have never received anything but kindness and encouragement from you fans. . .

"When you have a wife who has been a tower of strength, and shown more courage than you dreamed existed—that's the finest I know. So I close in saying that I might have had a tough break, but I have an awful lot to live for."

Even after his official farewell, Gehrig stayed connected to baseball by becoming a member of the Parole Commission. Said Pete Sheehy, a Yankee clubhouse man who arrived at Yankee Stadium in 1927 and who became one of Lou's closest friends:

"Lou always had to be in a position where he could do something for somebody."

That spirit could be said to form the basis for Phi Delta Theta's new commitment to not only honor its brother, Lou Gehrig, but to "do something for somebody" by adopting the National ALS Foundation as the fraternity's primary charity. Through our efforts in concert with the Foundation's activities, we will strive to help put an end to "Lou's" disease.

This is not the first time that Phi Delta Theta has honored the baseball great. A special Lou Gehrig award was created in 1955, to be awarded annually to a young major leaguer who best exemplified the sportsmanship qualities of the great Yankee first baseman. A permanent plaque, inscribed with the names of the winners, is located in the international offices of the fraternity.

In a different vein, two Phi Deltas indirectly honored Gehrig in developing a special communications device that enables nonverbal patients, such as those in the latter stages of ALS, to communicate with their eyes. The ETRAN Communicator (see Scroll, Fall 1982) was invented by Jack Eichler, (Case '41), and further developed and produced by Warren Rupp, (Case '42) through the Fran and Warren Rupp Foundation. The device has now been donated by Rupp for distribution by the National ALS Foundation.

Established in 1971, the National ALS Foundation was formed to organize efforts in the fight against ALS. Among its goals is the increasing of public awareness of the disease, which most people think of as rare. Actually, the incidence of ALS is about four times as great as Muscular Dystrophy, and equal to that of Multiple Sclerosis. In other terms, it afflicts about 2 out of every 125,000 people, with no regard to geographies, race or ethnic background.

ALS most frequently strikes between the ages of 40 and 60,

although older and younger victims (such as Lou Gehrig) are reported. It is a progressive disease, characterized by degeneration of nerve cells and pathways in the brain and spinal cord which leads to eventual total paralysis of the muscles, including those that control vital functions such as speech, swallowing and respiration. At the same time, the mind is not affected, which led one patient to describe the disease as "having a ringside seat at one's own demise."

The cause and cure for ALS are currently unknown; yet through the efforts of organizations like the National ALS Foundation, funds for research have grown from under \$1 million annually before 1971, to about \$20 million annually today. This area of stimulating and supporting research is the primary goal of the Foundation, which has also established a registry and brain-bank for scientists active in the study of ALS.

In order to generate more funds to that end, the Foundation also has a broad-range program to increase awareness of the disease on all fronts. Former Yankee and now California Angel Reggie Jackson is at the forefront of the campaign as the Foundation's National Chairman. His endorsement of the organization's activities, as well as his appearance in a series of public service announcements keep the baseball connection to the disease strong, while generating public awareness through his own renown.

Another important aspect of the National ALS Foundation's work, and one which Phi Delta Theta has already entered with its Community Service Day last spring, is in patient services. The Foundation maintains a corps of volunteers to offer assistance to ALS patients and their families, whether by merely keeping a house-ridden patient company, or by performing household chores, such as mowing the lawn or shoveling snow. This "outreach program" is especially important in helping morale since ALS patients tend to feel an extreme sense of isolation, and was

one of the activities chosen by some Phi Deltis for their community service last May.

The Patient Services program of the Foundation is carried to the professional level in the way of three ALS Clinics, all established under the organization's sponsorship. Currently located in New York, Chicago and Miami, the growing roster of Clinics are the first of their kind devoted specifically to the care and counseling of ALS patients and families. They offer an interdisciplinary team approach to the disease, with staff that includes a wide range of specialists from neurologists to occupational therapists, psychologists, speech pathologists and social workers.

On a local level, and here again is a potential opportunity for tie-in by Phi Delta chapters, the National ALS Foundation has developed a network of ALS Chapters for various cities and regions. This network is still growing, staffed primarily by volunteers who have experienced or who are experiencing ALS in their lives. They support the national group in all its various programs of fundraising, public awareness and patient services.

The fight against Mayotrophic Lateral Sclerosis is currently supported through two national foundations: The National ALS Foundation (NALS) and the ALS Society of America (ALSSOA). Those organizations seek to increase public awareness of the disease,

support research, and aid those afflicted with this disease. While the fraternity has adopted NALS as a primary philanthropy, this action does not prevent support of ALSSOA and its activities by chapters of the fraternity.

There is a lot of work that can and needs to be done to fight this disease that has taken too many lives, including that of Lou Gehrig. Just as he was never satisfied that he was doing enough—his former teammate and now California Angels coach Jimmy Reese said:

"He always did a little more than he was supposed to do"—here is the chance for Phi Delta Theta to do a little more, so that someday perhaps no one else will have to die as Lou Gehrig did. ■

Kansas City Phi Spearheads ALS Drive

Sue Worthington arises shortly after 7:30 a.m. each day at her home in Prairie Village, Kansas, a quality sub-division that adjoins Kansas City, Mo. A leisurely hour to be sure, and in keeping with the leisurely appearance of the neighborhood in which she lives with her husband, Keith (Missouri '53), a former executive of an exclusive men's clothing store.

So you would no doubt expect Sue Worthington to follow a day deserving of her surroundings—household chores, take the kids someplace, volunteer work, maybe tennis and lunch with friends at the club, a nice dinner at the home or out with her husband.

But Sue Worthington's day is much different—different from anyone else you know. First you should know that she didn't go to bed til after midnight. And when she did, she didn't sleep soundly—keeping one ear open for any trouble happening to the man in the next room. That's because her husband has Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) or more commonly known as Lou Gehrig's disease. And she personally must care

for him like few have to care—for all but those few hours she might catch a little sleep. The disease affects both the nerves leading from the brain to the spinal cord and those to the muscles. And requires constant care—like you can't imagine. In up to 20 per cent of all cases, irrespective of treatment, ALS plateaus for extended periods of time and often arrests permanently. But fifty per cent of the patients with ALS die in approximately three years—with 20 per cent surviving beyond 10 years. Patients, when they do die from ALS do not die from the disease directly but from treatable symptoms.

Keith's had it for nearly 11 years. The last 42 months he's spent connected to a respirator. Without it, he would deteriorate within a short time. With it, he lives—lives to tell the story of ALS. But even more important, to wage a valiant effort—one that has been helped by a group from Rotary Club 13 in Kansas City—one of Rotary's largest and most active clubs. The club, as well as others in the district, have joined together to help raise money, sponsor projects. They have become a catalyst for the work of fellow

Rotarian Keith.

There is a national president—Eames Bishop of Los Angeles. He got active in the ALS campaign after his wife came down with the disease. He criss-crosses the country trying to alert the public and raise funds. But he points to Keith as no doubt the one person who has given the most.

"He's truly a one-man gang," Eames says. And he's right. Through Keith's efforts a major research center for ALS opened this year only a few miles from his home—as a part of the University of Kansas Medical Center. The research facility can use the many support services of the many departments at the famed medical center.

Officials there admit that one man, Keith Worthington, inspired it all. Those that meet him come away in disbelief. They can't believe that someone who has trouble breathing, can hardly move a muscle and can't speak, can do so much.

The truth is he can do it because of his courage and because Sue is willing and somehow able to give the enormous amount of care and the time it takes to get an ALS

patient through the day and the night. A torturous routine that most people would find difficult to follow for one day—or even one hour. But the Worthingtons go through it seven days a week—in an amazing display of courage and tenacity.

For instance, every two hours or so, Keith needs to be turned and suctioned. They must take a “catheter” and go into his lungs. But it takes much more. Countless tasks to keep him alive on a respirator.

Many ALS patients choose not to do it. The device, while a possible lifesaver in some ways, places an enormous burden on the patient and those who care for him. It becomes necessary to hook him up and unhook him, monitor the unit, plus other continual care that almost isn’t physically possible in a hospital, much less in a home setting.

But Keith and Sue decided to try it. For two reasons:

1. Keith earlier had met a man named Robert Dicus, an ALS patient in California who had enormous mental and physical determination. Dicus was on a respirator and was obviously leading a productive life.

2. By prolonging his life, Keith felt he would be able to help other patients—and the time to raise funds to help find a cure for the disease.

And that he has done. He has established an office in Prairie Village. And each afternoon from 2 to 5 p.m., he and Sue are driven to the ALS local headquarters he has established there. The afternoon then is spent sending out mailings, writing letters of advice and encouragement and talking on the phone to other patients (even though it is not only difficult for him to talk, but to be heard). And recently planning a fund-raising drive to provide money for an ALS research center that opened at K.U. Medical Center.

It sounds simple—going to the office to work, making phone calls, etc. Yet each step becomes a laborious project that would strain and

perhaps eventually break even the strongest.

But Keith—and Sue—do it, and a lot of other things to survive and serve.

She’s very grateful for those that help. But she worries about other patients that don’t have friends and volunteers. Without them, survival for very long could be impossible.

When Keith’s illness was diagnosed, he was a member of the downtown Dallas Rotary Club. About one year later, he returned to Kansas City and became active in Rotary Club 13. Since his illness, Rotary Club 13 has held two special “Keith Worthington Days” in his honor, with the speaker, H. Eames Bishop, president of ALSSOA. In 1979, Keith was named Rotarian of the year.

In 1981 Keith opened a branch office of the ALS Society in Kansas City. His major project was to establish an ALS Research Center at the University of Kansas Medical Center. With the total support of Eames Bishop and ALSSOA the Research Center became a reality in February of 1982. Thus far,

\$600,000 in ALS research has been approved. Rotary Club 13 has a goal of raising \$200,000. Two long time members, Joe Gilbert and John Thornberry, are co-chairmen of this effort. Thus far, more than 60 Rotarians have volunteered to raise \$1,000 a piece. In addition, five other Rotary Clubs in the area have appointed fund drive chairmen to help achieve the goal.

Sue is hoping for a cure for the disease, of course. But in the meantime, she’s hoping that somehow a network of helpers will be found to help the others with ALS.

“Many patients have to stay in bed all day because no one is there to lift them out,” she said. “And no one can take the hours needed to feed them. Often they die from something resulting from poor nutrition.”

She paused and looked at Keith—and he smiled that infectious smile.

“We really have a lot to be thankful for,” she said confidently. “We have super kids, so many friends—and 30 years of a perfect marriage.” ■

- Virginia Beta—Mixed Doubles Tennis Tournament (\$200 for Madison House)

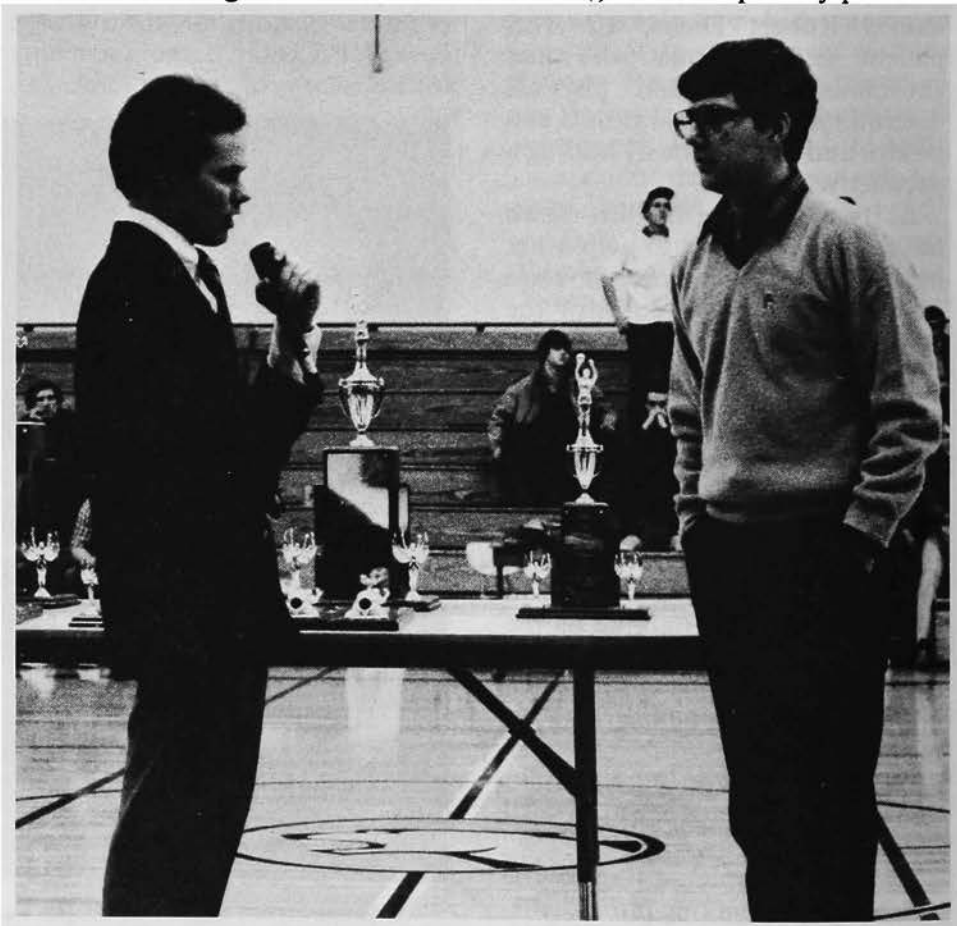
- Wisconsin Alpha—Madison Cross Country Ski Classic (\$400 for Epilepsy Center)

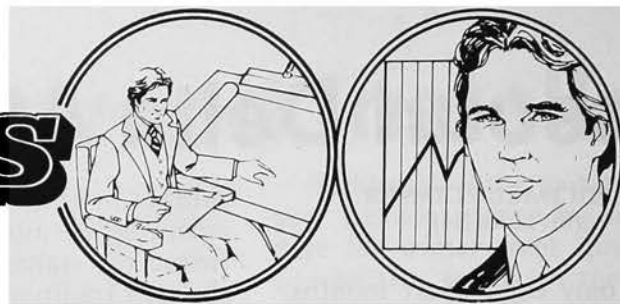

It is that time of year again. Classes have or are about to resume very soon, football season is in full swing, and fraternity rush is beginning to occupy our chapters across the country. It is also that time of year when the chapter consultant staff from the General Headquarters begins to make their appointed rounds.

The consultants are a part of a consistently strong program, partially funded by alumni contributions, initiation fees, and pledge fees. The four travelers for the 1983-84 term are continuing a program that began over 60 years ago, when Arthur R. Priest visited the first chapter as a Traveling Secretary in 1922. Since then, over 70 young men have served in the position formerly called Field Secretary, including Past President of the General Council, Lothar Vasholz; Executive Vice President, Robert J. Miller; and several Province Presidents and Chapter Advisers. Though the title has changed to Chapter Consultant, the basic purpose remains the same—to work with the undergraduate chapter officers and members to more fully achieve the goals of the chapter and the Phi Delta Theta Fraternity.

For approximately nine months, these former chapter leaders are traveling from chapter to chapter, finding solutions to specific problems. They are salesmen of ideas; public relations specialists between the headquarters, alumni, and chapter; organizers of conferences

and workshops; and men for all seasons ready to deal with any situation. Over the course of the year, the Consultants answer questions from how to form financial and rush programs to "You actually get paid for this job?"

How should a chapter prepare for a visit from one of these dedicated Phis? First of all, be honest. He is there to aid and assist, not to distract and spy. By being open and candid, more ideas and programs will be accomplished. Secondly, make him feel welcome. Remember he is a brother and a guest in your home. Just these two simple preparations can make the difference between an uncomfortable and a productive visit.

Through it all, these recent graduates receive many benefits from their two years of service. With chapters in 43 states and 6 Canadian Provinces, the travel opportunities are obvious. Each Consul-

tant visits approximately 60 chapters each year in different parts of the United States and Canada, logging over 50,000 miles by car and air travel. If each of these chapters has an average of 50 members, he has been in contact with over 3,000 undergraduates, not to mention the number of chapter advisers, alumni clubs, and house corporation officers he meets. Through various speaking engagements, he learns to further develop personal confidence and an ability to deal with people in different situations, skills that become invaluable in the future.

These recent graduates are dedicated to the challenge and experience of working with other Phis to strengthen the Bond of Brotherhood throughout the Fraternity. With their help, along with the many volunteers and other staff members, Phi Delta Theta remains one of the strongest international fraternities. ■

Taylor, Tom (Southern California '53), *Get Rich On The Obvious*. New York: Harcourt Brace Jovanovich, Publishers, 1982. 218 pp. Given by author.

Not since the best selling *Confessions Of A Stock Broker* has there been a book like *Get Rich On The Obvious*. This book tells you not only how to spot winners and losers on the stock index, but also how brokers really work and how you as a client can work better with your broker. Tom Taylor, a broker himself for many years, explains how to evaluate your broker and how to determine if you are on your broker's first, second, or third team. He tells you how to spot if a broker is "churning your account" or just giving you good advice. Above all, he explores how you can help your broker work better for you and how you can

use your broker to turn your everyday observations into stock market profits.

This is not a "get rich quick" or fantasy-riches book. The approach that Taylor has developed and used with hundreds of clients is based on sound economic and business principles and a thorough understanding of how the stock market operates. The vital point is that it is not necessary for a client to understand the fine points of the market; that's what a good broker is for. Instead, the client should focus on "insider" information that is constantly floating through the environment. This information can vary from knowledge of a new product discovered in a supermarket to awareness of a new technical device used in a surgical procedure. Political news can also provide profitable investment ideas.

Taylor uses a character named 100% Schwartz, a nonprofessional but clever average investor who always has his eye on trends that can dictate which stocks will go up and which will go down. Conversations with this mythical investor illustrate the open-air method of stock market analysis, conversations as humorous as they are informative. This is a book that will keep you laughing—all the way to the bank.

Tom Taylor, a stockbroker for over twenty years, is currently a senior vice-president for investments of Shearson/American Express. He has owned and trained race horses, has co-authored *Kids and Cash: Raising Your Kids To Appreciate The Value Of Money*, and has co-founded a financial services firm. He lives in Southern California.
