

The Book on Bob

CBS Evening News interim anchor Bob Schieffer is a Phi. The journalism school at his alma mater was named after him.

The fedora, actually. Bob Schieffer donned it in 1961 at the behest of his city editor at the **Star-Telegram**, Phil Record.

Schieffer had been hired for the night police beat when he was still a pup. A cub reporter. One who still looked new grassgreen at age 25.

"The first thing Phil said to me was be sure and get a hat because you want to look like a detective as much as you can," Schieffer said. "I don't know if I got it because I wanted to look like a detective, or because I wanted to look like Phil, but I did."

Yes, maybe it was the hat.

THE STAR-TELEGRAM job wasn't Schieffer's first foray into journalism. And it wasn't where he met Record. The two had often crossed paths at the scene of accidents or at the police station, where Record spent evenings on the night police beat for the Star-Telegram and Schieffer, a spot news reporter for KXOL radio, hung out looking for stories.

Schieffer landed the radio job while he was still a TCU student. A fellow student, Bruce Neal '59, worked there and tipped him off about an opening.

"The news director took me outside and asked me to describe Farrington Field, so I fumbled my way through something," Schieffer said. "And then he said, 'You can type, right?'

"Well, I couldn't but said I could, and was hired. By the end of the first day I could type. I typed nearly as fast then as I do today."

KXOL pioneered on-the-scene news coverage in Fort Worth and marketed itself as the "veteran radio news team." That veteran team consisted of three TCU students: Bruce Neal '59, Roy Eaton '59 and Schieffer '59. Record jokingly threatened to expose them in the paper, which unnerved Neal but made Schieffer laugh.

"We were all kids, this was our first job, and we just loved it," he said. "It was just this thrilling adventure. We made a dollar an hour, which wasn't much in those days, either."

Driving around in a red panel truck and sporting bright red jumpsuits with KXOL on the back, the reporters would learn of accidents on a police scanner and dash to the scene. Record was headed to a fatal car/train collision when Schieffer came on the radio, reporting live.

"I heard this person say, 'This is Bob Shafer' (the station manager insisted he go by Shafer) and then announce dramatically what had happened, "Record said. "He said with great emotion, 'Ladies and gentlemen, this is the worst catastrophe this reporter has ever witnessed.'

"He'd been on the job two weeks. That was when I met Bob Schieffer."

Schieffer and his fellow reporters came to think of themselves more as detectives than reporters, investigating crimes alongside the police.

"I love to tell young people going to journalism school that it's a lot of fun," he said. "If you're a curious person, if you won-

der about things, have an interest in what makes things work or why people do what they do, I just can't think of a better way to spend your life than to be a reporter."

SCHIEFFER MADE a name for himself at KXOL, and when Record moved to the city desk in '61, he hired Schieffer to replace him on the police beat.

Schieffer got the hat -- and total access to crime scenes, fires and the detectives he was trying to imitate.

"The cops saw you as a part of a team," Schieffer said. "The truth is we were probably too close to them, but we looked after them, and they took care of us."

Schieffer once ran a brief story on a late-night robbery, noting that detectives said they planned to investigate the next day.

"The next night I came to work, and these guys started reaming me out. The police chief had seen the story and wanted to know why they'd gone home without investigating.

"I had written it in all innocence, and I told them so. Then the detectives said, 'Yeah, but we didn't know you were going to tell some newspaperman about it!"

During that time, Fort Worth's unofficial press club was The Cellar, a beatnik coffeehouse at 1111 Houston St. that featured live music and waitresses in their underwear. A hangout of the wealthy, city councilmen, police officers and degenerates, Schieffer and Record would often unwind there after work, occasionally sipping the Everclear and grapefruit juice that owner Pat Kirkwood shared only with friends since he didn't have a liquor license.

"I think journalism is a great way to do public service, to have an impact on your community. It's also just a lot of fun."

The night before President Kennedy was assassinated, the chief of the Secret Service asked the two to get "press passes" to The Cellar for some off-duty agents in town for Kennedy's speech. Record and Schieffer later appeared in the Warren Commission Report for doing so.

In 1964 Schieffer talked **Star-Telegram** management into sending him to Vietnam, where he tracked down local soldiers and wrote about them. He called it the turning point in his life.

While overseas, he and Record would communicate on the Teletype machines at 2 a.m. One day Schieffer's mother called Record: "Philip, I know Bobby is not brushing his teeth. You be sure and tell him tonight to brush his teeth." Record did as he

was told.

"A couple of days later Bob wrote back, 'Don't you ever send me a message like that again!' "Record said, laughing. "A bunch of guys had been standing around reading the messages and had given him hell ever since."

Schieffer would later credit Record as his most important professional mentor. The second was Bill Small, who hired him at CBS, followed by James A. Byron, the Channel 5 (now WBAP-TV) news director who drew him to broadcasting.

Interestingly, all three served as national president of Sigma Delta Chi, now known as the Society of Professional Journalists, a coincidence that landed Schieffer the job at CBS.

While Schieffer was reporting from Vietnam, Sheriff Lon Evans '33 checked in on the newsman's mother several times a week. Schieffer calls Evans "just a wonderful man" and one of the greatest influences in his life.

"Lon was one of those public officials who knew what a news story was. He helped me get more stories and could sum up a situation better than anybody I've even known.

"I'll never forget the time a very wealthy man killed his father. I asked Lon what the motive was, and he said, 'I'll tell you, he killed the old son-of-a-bitch because he thought he oughta be dead.'

THE WAY TO learn to be a reporter is to be a

reporter. Write stories over and over. The most important skill a reporter can develop, Schieffer added, is to find the lead. Bill Hix at KXOL drove that home by insisting that the reporter write the lead to his story. In those days the police reporter would generally just phone in facts and quotes to the rewrite desk. But Hix understood that once you get a good lead on a news story, the rest is just filling in and elaborating. "What Hix was really doing was training us to think like reporters," Schieffer said. "To this day, when I walk into a news conference or I come

That skill was useful when Schieffer began covering the White House. He would prioritize every answer the president gave so when Walter Cronkite would ask what viewers should draw from this, Schieffer would turn to the camera and say, "Walter, what's important here ... "

upon a story, the first thing I think

is what's the lead here, and I start prioritizing."

The second most important skill is to have a good ear for quotes. In those days, news format dictated a fact-filled lead, followed by a quote.

Bob Schieffer, TCU '59, has been in the news lately as the interim anchor of the CBS Evening News. Brother Bob was recently featured in the TCU Magazine., as the school dedicated its journalism school to him. The Scroll thanks TCU for providing this article and some of the photos you see here.



The most memorable quote Schieffer reported in those days was for a story about a kid who killed his brother. The lead described the incident. The next paragraph read: "I killed him because he tore up my Bible."

That story exemplifies another lesson Schieffer learned early on: "I have always believed, and I think it comes from those days, that the more you let the characters in the story tell the story, the better the story is. That's how you write it in a way people can remember it."

> Beyond skills, every great reporter is curious, Schieffer

believes. "I saw that watching Phil work, and after I came to CBS, watching Walter Cronkite. Walter Cronkite had more curiosity than anybody I ever have known.

"I think curiosity is the No.

I trait reporters should have." THE INTERNET is a sort of a national water cooler, and it's changed the face of journalism, Schieffer said.

"The Internet is the first vehicle for distributing news on a national scale that's not edited. It's the place people trade gossip, jokes and information. But it's not something that you can take at

face value.

"We found that on 9-11. We spent most of our time correcting reports that were spreading on the Internet. And they spread in a matter of seconds. If we had not done that, we ran the risk of setting off mass hysteria."

Publishing or broadcasting truth in a way people understand will always be the core work of a journalist. Dealing with the burgeoning challenges of the global information age will be the task of the students in school today.


"The good news is we have access to more information than any people who have ever lived on Earth," Schieffer said. "The bad news is there's so much of it that you have to sort through it."

OKAY, so maybe it wasn't just the hat. Sure, it boosted the confidence of a young man with a dream. And it did look cool. But early guidance from mentors like Record, now a professional-in-residence at the Schieffer School and a nationally recognized expert in media ethics, surely helped propel the talented young man toward greatness.

Now Schieffer will occasionally stand with his old friend in a TCU classroom and talk about ethics. Or help a young reporter sort through the facts of a story. Or just laugh about the old days.


Once just an ambulance-chasing reporter, Schieffer is now a seasoned international journalist on conversational terms with presidents and kings.

He no longer needs the hat to get in the door.



"My parents came of age during the Great Depression. My dad wanted to go to college but he couldn't because he had to go to work to save the family farm. My mother and her family lived on what her 13-year-old brother brought home from his job in a drugstore. When my parents later married, they were determined that their children would have what they never had -- a college education. It became the whole point of their lives. My dad didn't see it happen. He died when I was a student here. My mother was widowed when my brother was just 10, my sister 15. But her determination never wavered -- her children were going to get a college education. And we did. I cannot ever recall seeing her happier than the day I became the first person on either side of our family to receive a degree -- even though she really wanted me to be a doctor. No day passes that I do not think of her. And when I think of her today, and the honor you've given me. I remember that is my parents' name too that will be associated with this school. For me, it is named for them and their values, which shaped my life."

William Allen White home restored

"Red Rocks" returns to its former glory

Looking for a chapter road trip with educational value? Want to learn more about a famous Phi from the past? The William Allen White home in Emporia, Kansas is

filled with belongings of the White family and provides a glimpse of the life and times of William Allen White, *Kansas 1890*, distinguished newspaper editor who was known as the "Sage of Emporia" during his career.

White, winner of two Pulitzer Prizes, gained national attention for many of his editorials, including "What's the Matter With Kansas, which addressed the Populist movement, and "Mary White," a touching ode to his daughter who had died in a horseback riding accident. He also ran for governor of Kansas in 1924 to fight the Ku Klux Klan, a campaign that received international attention

from European newspapers.

The prolific writer and editorialist was a confidant and friend of three presidents, with Teddy Roosevelt visit-

ing Red Rocks three times.

The home is the only 20th century site administered by the Kansas Historical Society. Various state and federal grants provided nearly \$700,000 for restoration of the home, known as Red Rocks, and his mother's home, which is adjacent to the house.

First built in the late 1880s, Brother White rented the large stone, brick Tudor-style home until 1901, when the family purchased the property and lived there for 45 years. In 2000, White's granddaughter, Barbara White Walker, gave the historic home to the citizens of Kanasas. It's known as "Red Rocks" for the Colorado red sandstone on its exterior.

The KU School of Journalism and Phi Delta Theta's alumni newsletter award are both named in honor of Brother White. Even 60 years after his death, Brother White is considered one of the most influential people in Kansas history.





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Basketball

The **Ohio Wesleyan** squad featured nine players, led by All-North Coast Athletic Conference first team post **Ben Chojnacki**. He led the team in scoring (454 points, 17.5 per game); rebounding (156, 6.0 per game); steals (30); and blocked shots (16). Forward **Andy Warnock**, who was named to the

ESPN Academic All-District IV second team, contributed 228 points (8.8 per game), 89 rebounds (3.4) and 30 assists. Forward Ross Rybarczyk led OWU with 87 assists and scored 100 points (5.9). Others seeing a lot of action were center Elliott Kaple, forward Ryan Rozak, forward Raymond Strain and post Dan Dyer.

Earning All-Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference first team selection was forward **Robert Cates** of **Southwestern University**. He led the team in rebounding (154, 5.7 per game), field goal shooting (65.5%) and blocked shots (31) while ranking second in scoring (370 points, 13.7). Guard **Danny Fitzgerald** shot 84.4% from the free throw line and scored 122 points (4.5). Helping lead 25-6 **Hanover** to the NCAA Division III playoffs were center **Tommy Dennis**, who led in rebounds (182, 5.9) and field goals (60.7%) while scoring 265 points (8.5), and forward **Ryan Lanning**, who scored 173 points (7.2) and won the team's Mental Attitude Award.

Seven Phis were members of the 16-11 **Gettysburg** team. Guard **Mike Spadafora** earned All-Centennial Conference honorable mention and led with 37 steals while ranking second in points (267, 9.9 per game), rebounds (104, 4.0) and assists (53). His top game was 26 points, eight rebounds versus Navy. Center-forward **Erik Fromm** led in free throw shooting (80.6%), scored 162 points (7.0) and grabbed 91 rebounds (4.0). Guard **Tom Brady** scored 101 points (3.9) and had 35 assists. Others seeing a lot of action were forward **Kyle McGlensey**, forward **Julius Redd**, guard **Mike Beck** and guard **Graham Shaffer-Rais**.

Making a big contribution to the 22-4 **Puget Sound** Division III playoff club was guard **Josh Walker**, who scored 192 points (7.4), had 99 rebounds (3.8) and handed out 40 assists. Teammate **Jeff Walker** got into 10 games at guard for the Loggers. Guard **Marc Holmquist** of 15-10 **LaVerne** ranked second with 50 assists, shot 83.3% from the free throw line and scored 165 points (6.9). Forward **Lance Hrncir** started every game for **Schreiner**, scored 144 points (6.0) and had 20 steals. Teammate Aaron **Hamilton** played 13 games at center and scored 72 points (5.5).

Four Phis saw a lot of action for **Wabash**. Guard **Kyle Medeiros** led in 3-point goals (39) and steals (31); scored 267 points (9.9) and had 33 assists. Also seeing starting duty were guard **Doug Ross** (16 starts) and guard **Matt Shook**, who had nine starts, 85 points (7.7) and 76 rebounds (4.3). Forward **Alex Rinks** played in 10 games for Wabash. Playing in 12 contests for 17-12 **Union** was forward **Alex Plasted**. Other Phi players this past season included **Whitman** post man **Jordan Nelson**, University of the South forward **Stuart Mackintosh**, Dickinson guard **Nick Leonardelli** and the **Westminster** guard duo of **Kevin Colston** and **Joey Falkoff**.

In his first full season as head coach at **Akron**, **Keith Damrot**, Akron '82, posted a 19-10 record, the best record

ever for a first year head coach at the school. He was second in the voting for Mid-American Conference Coach of the Year. Longtime **Maryland** head coach **Gary Williams**, *Maryland* '68, took the Terrapins to a 19-13 record and the NIT tournament. **Hugh Durham**, *Florida State* '59, retired at Jacksonville after 45 years as a head coach at several schools. He finished with 633 wins and is one of 11 coaches to take two schools to The Final Four: Florida State in 1972 and Georgia in 1983. **Greg Mason**, *Centre* '94, led his alma mater to a 20-7 record in his sixth season, running his career record to 100-55.

Swimming

Winning All-American honors in two events at the NCAA Division III championship was **Matt Wilson** of **Allegheny**. He placed fifth in the 100 breaststroke and 11th in the 100 breaststroke after winning both events at the North Coast Athletic Conference meet. **Shannon Beis** of **Ohio Wesleyan** had the team's top times in the 100-200 backstroke events, 100 butterfly and 100 freestyle. **Austin Diaz** of **DePauw** competed at the SCAC meet and placed sixth in the 1650 freestyle, 11th in the 500 freestyle and 12th in the 400 IM. His teammates included **Todd Karpinski** and **Landon Boehm**.

Four **Dickinson** Phis competed at the Centennial Conference meet. **Everett Kimball** set a school record with a third place finish in the 200 freestyle and also was third in the 100 freestyle, 200 freestyle relay and 400 freestyle relay. He also placed seventh in the 500 freestyle. Teammate **Ben Cooper** placed third with two relays (200 freestyle and 400 freestyle); was fourth in the 50 freestyle and fifth with the 200 medley relay and 800 freestyle relay. **Phil Mercatili** was on the

fourth place 400 medley relay; fifth with the 200 medley relay; sixth in the 200 butterfly; seventh in the 200 IM; and eighth in the 100 butterfly. Also swimming for Dickinson was **Jason Keeley**.

Kei Otawa was the top competitor among five Phi Delt swimmers on the Willamette squad. At the Northwest Conference meet, he placed second in the 100 breaststroke; fourth in the 200 breaststroke; fourth on the 200 medley relay; and seventh in the 50 freestyle. David Sluss was on the fourth place 200 medley relay and finished 11th in the 100 butterfly. Teammate Graham Smith was on the Willamette sixth place 800






Teammate **Dan Maguire** had a fifth place 1650 freestyle finish at the UAA meet and had the team's top time of the season in the 1000 freestyle event. **Will Liggett** of **University of the South** competed in seven individual events during the season. A member of the **LaVerne** squad was **Justin Haas**.

Wrestling

Named All-American for the second time was **Chris Healey** of **Wabash**, who had a 45-2 record for the season. He placed second at 174 pounds during the NCAA Division III meet and was also named to the Scholar All-American team. He won the Division III Midwest Regional and was named Most Outstanding Wrestler after winning the Midstates Wrestling League championship. Teammate **Adam Miller**, a regular at 157 pounds, posted a second place finish at the Midstates meet and was fifth at the Division III Midwest Regional. **Ryan Wiles** of **Washington & Jefferson** had a 9-5 record with 16 take downs in the 197 pound class. He won the Presidents Athletic Conference and W&L Invitational titles and placed second at the Messiah Invitational.

The Lawrence squad featured 10 Phi Delt wrestlers. John Budi (165 pounds) had a 29-12 record and was named to the Scholar All-American team chosen by the Division III Wrestling Coaches Association. Posting a 27-10 record with four pins at 174 pounds was Ben Dictus. Other Lawrence wrestlers were Joe Austin, Daniel Shay, Jimmy Lima, Scott Polewach, Jim Williamson, Chandler Bellanca, Brett Suhayda and Nick Muench.

Other Sports

Playing major league baseball this season are Boston Red Sox relief pitcher **Mike Timlin**, *Southwestern University* '88, and Houston Astros third baseman **Morgan Ensberg**, *Southern California* '98. Following the National Football League draft, several Phis signed as free agents with NFL clubs: offensive guard **Cody Campbell**, *Texas Tech* '05, with the Indianapolis Colts; kicker **Jonathan Nichols**, *Mississippi* '05, with the Minnesota Vikings; and kicker **Nick Novak**, *Maryland* '05, with the Chicago Bears.

The Phi Delt chapter at M.I.T. claimed good athletes in several sports. **Trevor Chang** went to the NCAA fencing championships and placed 20th in epee. **Adam Shabshelowitz** was the hockey team's second-leading goal scorer with eight and tied for second with 16 points. **David Kirkland** was a member of the M.I.T. gymnastics squad.

In March, **Roger "Shorty" Hicks**, *West Virginia '42*, was named for induction into the **University of West Virginia** Sports Hall of Fame. He was a member of the school's 1942 NIT championship team and held the team's single season free throw shooting record of 88% for 60 years. Student body president and Phi Delt chapter president, he was killed in combat in France during 1944. The actual induction ceremonies will take place during a fall football weekend on campus.



Wenderoth Honored as Poultry Pioneer

a pioneer businessman
and philanthropist was
praised for his outstanding
contribution to modern
poultry production.

Born in Fort Smith, Ark., Wenderoth took his father's small feed company

and through innovative ideas and sound leadership, turned it into one of the national leaders in poultry production.

A graduate of Washington and Lee University, Wenderoth is an alumnus of Virginia Gamma. Since college, Phi Delta Theta has been much more than a fraternity to Collier Wenderoth and his family.

Wenderoth recognized early the important leadership skills and values that Phi Delta Theta taught him and has encouraged fraternity involvement by his family. Collier Wenderoth's son-in-law and two of his grandsons are Phis. Wenderoth's son-in-law, Randall W. Goins, *Arkansas '75*, is vice chairman of the board and CEO of O.K. Industries (Wenderoth's company). He is an alumnus of Arkansas Alpha and remains active in Phi Delt and serves on the Arkansas Alpha Housing Corporation. Wenderoth also has two grandsons that are Arkansas Alpha alumni: Collier Smith, *Arkansas '98* and Trent Goins, *Arkansas '01*. Both are also active alumni. Trent Goins served as president of the chapter and is now a member of the housing corporation.

Wenderoth's rise in the poultry industry began with his father's small feed mill. O.K. Industries, the parent company of O.K. Foods, Inc., began in 1933 under the reins of Wenderoth's father, Collier Wenderoth, Sr. It started out as O.K. Feed Mills serving the Western Arkansas and Eastern Oklahoma area. In 1936 the mill was enlarged, and sales were expanded into east Texas and Louisiana.

By the early 1950s O.K. began to contract with local growers for the production of young chickens, or broilers.

During this time a subsidiary known as O.K. Processors was formed with the objective of processing the broilers. The first processing plant opened in 1959, processing 60,000 birds per week.

A new hatchery was built in the '60s and a new feed mill was opened to accommodate the increasing number of birds. This was Wenderoth's first move in expanding into the fully integrated poultry processing business.

Collier Wenderoth's poultry vision only continued to become more apparent in the 1970s with further processing innovations including removing bones from chicken breasts and pre-cooking to customer specifications.

By 1970, O.K. emerged as an industry leader among producers of white meat chicken for the rapidly increasing fast food industry. It is in this area where Wenderoth's pioneering ideas lead the industry.

By pioneering the development of further processed, partially cooked and fully cooked white meat poultry products, Collier Wenderoth contributed to the innovations of modern poultry productions.

The National Chicken Council, an organization of all poultry producers across the nation, recognized Wenderoth for his pioneering spirit and contributions to the industry.

Today, O.K. Foods is a subsidiary of O.K. Industries, which is the parent company of O.K. Farms, O.K. Feed Mills, O.K. Transportation, and Ecology Management. Wenderoth is still the head of the company and unlike some executives at his age, he still is actively involved in running his company.

O.K. is a fully integrated poultry producer, including hatcheries, breeder operations, and processing facilities. O.K. Foods currently processes 3 million birds per week, providing premium poultry products for retail, quick service restaurants, and food service and commodity sales.

The O.K. poultry conglomerate continues to be family owned and operated by Wenderoth and his family. O.K. Industries is the largest privately held company in the massive Northwest Arkansas Corridor, which is a feat in itself.

Wenderoth and his family continue to be actively involved with Phi Delta Theta, especially Arkansas Alpha. Wenderoth strongly believes in giving back to the organizations such as Phi Delta Theta that have meant so much to him. He has contributed to his alma mater, Washington and Lee, and the University of Arkansas.

Breaking our Pledges

Part 2

In the last issue of The Scroll, we took a look at a fictional chapter's hazing activities and the consequences of mixing alcohol with any Phikeia programming. We wrap up the story in this issue, once again reminding undergraduate chapter leaders to find positive activities for new members that do not involve alcohol. Last fall, several prominent Phi Delta Theta chapters were closed or put on probation for these kinds of activities.

"C'mon Phikeia, DRINK!!!" an upperclassman roars. The Phikeia Educator, Brent, is concerned. He knows this Phikeia, named Drew, is from a conservative family and never drank before coming to college. The young brother seems to be enjoying himself, and his new big brother is happy to keep the shots coming. Yet, Brent knows he'll have to keep an eye on things.

Brent is smart to monitor the situation, but he needs to put a stop to things. Most hazing injuries and deaths are alcohol related. And, a big brother night is the first time many pledges feel they are "equal" with the actives, so they drink to impress.

An hour later, things are winding down. Brothers stagger back to the chapter house (this event was held at an off-campus house rented by some brothers). Brent checks again on Drew and he seems to be slowly drifting off on the couch. Feeling things are fine, Brent heads back to the chapter house to watch TV and forget about what happened.

Brent's repose is short lived, however. As he blankly watched Sports Center in his room, his cell phone buzzed. It was the guys from the "annex" house.

"Hello?"

"Dude. I think something's wrong with Drew," said one of the members. He's cold and doesn't look well. Smitty's going to throw him in the shower and try to revive him."

From the moment Brent became Phikeia Educator, he dreaded this kind of phone call. He felt his mouth become dry and his body grow cold as panic set in.

Brent's situation is similar to a "real life" experience by members of

another fraternity last fall in Colorado. They woke up to find one of their pledges had literally drank to the point of death. Brent knows he has a serious decision to make.

"I'll be right over" Brent says and snaps the phone shut. Minutes later, he and chapter president Will White are racing towards the annex, the raspy exhaust of his ancient Honda echoing across the Greek Row.

"Shit, I knew he shouldn't have drank that much" Brent says while hammering the gears of his car.

Will is worried. He, too, dreads having a situation like this. He knew that the upperclassmen might take control of the pledge class, and they did, while the chapter leadership avoided the issue.

When they get to the off-campus house, they see Drew, and the brothers trying to "sober him up" are in bad shape. Will and Brent both know that Drew has had too much alcohol and it's too risky to hope he'll "sleep it off." He needs medical attention. Yet, taking him to the hospital means university and Fraternity officials will find out about what happened. Will knows he's worked too hard to see the chapter potentially closed, but he also knows a brother's life, potentially, is at stake.

"We've got to get him to a hospital." Will says.

"Naww...he'll be fine," slurred one of the brothers who lives in the off-campus house.

Will doesn't listen and asks Brent to help him carry the Phikeia to his car.

What happens from here? Many chapters might avoid the issue, or take the Phikeia to the hospital and hope "nobody finds out." Yet, the reality is university Greek systems and college communities are generally small, and the word gets out. Honesty is the best policy in these cases. General Headquarters is here to help and always just a phone call away.



Phi legislator introduces anti-hazing bill

Measure criminalizes dangerous rites of initiation

With a campus beauty queen telling tales of friends who suffered in silence from fraternity hazing, a legislative panel voted unanimously Monday to make mistreatment of new club members a serious criminal offense.

Rep. Adam Hasner, R-Delray Beach, Maryland, ¹⁹², said hazing usually is treated as an administrative problem on campus. He said the consent of victims - usually pledges eager to join fraternities or sororities and students wanting to belong to clubs in high school - hinders prosecution for what might otherwise be considered assault and battery.

"This is very important to me," said Kristen Murphy of Longwood, the new Miss Florida Gator. She said her platform in the coming Miss Florida Pageant is "Breaking vows of silence, eliminating hazing everywhere."

She said a friend was "forced to go out in freezing weather, dropped off in his underwear and told to find a house, while members drove by and threw raw eggs and fish" at him and other fraternity pledges. Murphy said

victims of physical and mental abuse are afraid to speak out and usually pass along the unspoken tradition by harassing future pledges.

"They were physically harmed, they were psychologically harmed," she said. "One of my friends wakes up with nightmares in the middle of the night all because of instances that happened to him at the beginning of last semester."

Murphy did not name campuses but made a point of saying she was not referring to Gainesville or Tallahassee.

"May I note that all of these boys were intoxicated," she said. "The problem with this is that these boys, who were also beaten and sleep-deprived, have no way of reporting this because they'll just be tattletales and the university will take care of it, no big deal."

Hasner said hazing "is a nationwide epidemic" in high schools and on college campuses. His bill is named the Chad Meredith Act, for a University of Miami student

who drowned Nov. 5, 2001, in a hazing incident.

In a civil case, a Miami jury last year awarded \$12.6 million in damages against two fraternity members for Meredith's death.

A Tallahassee jury last November gave a \$1.8 million judgment to a Florida A&M

University Marching 100 member who said he suffered kidney damage because of paddling by five band members.

The FAMU board of trustees agreed to pay \$50,000 to another former Marching 100 member in February. In the same month, five wrestlers at Deltona High School were accused of hogtying a teammate and zapping him with sparks from a grill ignitor.

Hasner's bill (HB 193) outlaws hazing in high schools and colleges. It defines the practice as "pressuring or coercing the student into violating state or federal law, any brutality of a physical nature such as whipping, beating, branding, exposure to elements, forced consumption of any food, liquor, drug or other substance" or other activities likely to cause injury.

Hazing would be a felony if someone is injured. If no one gets hurt, making someone perform risky stunts would be a misdemeanor.

Hasner, an attorney who serves as a chapter adviser and province president for the Phi Delta Theta fraternity, said he was never hazed at the University of Maryland "but I saw some things that could have gotten out of hand." He said his bill would apply only to dangerous forced acts, not harmless pranks or shouting commands at pledges.

"The reason it's important to get this kind of a criminal act on the books is because in so many instances, students and members in social organizations actually use consent as a defense to an act of battery," Hasner said. "This legislation would provide state attorneys with another tool to go after the perpetrators of these acts."

Hasner said prospects for passage of his bill look favorable. The House Justice Council, a panel of representatives from several House committees approved the bill.

Chapter Reports


Colorado Gamma Colorado State University

says. "We have a responsibility to represent the interests of the entire student body and ensure their needs are met by the entire university community."

Serving as trustees is only one facet of their positions. They are also responsible for lobbying the Florida legislature on behalf of their student bodies. "I think lobbying is one of the most

important roles of this position," says Goldberg. "The legislature is responsible for setting our tuition, as well as making policies that affect the dayto-day lives of students, and I plan to spend a lot of time in Tallahassee making sure the UF student body is heard."

State Rep. Adam Hasner, Maryland '92 feels the

"The students have entrusted me with an enormous financial responsibility, and I intend to ensure that each and every dime of their money is spent in a manner that benefits the student body," said Schoonover, who was the presidential candidate chosen by the Insight Party. This was the Insight Party's fourth consecutive presidential victory. Schoonover had previously served as secretary for the Florida Gamma chapter, and had served as student government vice president.

While both of these young men are extremely talented leaders, they both understand the challenges that lie ahead of them.

"On our campuses, student government can at times be political and divided, and it's my responsibility to unify our student body to work toward bettering the University of Florida and the entire state university system." Said Goldberg. "I couldn't think of a better way to better the entire system then serving with an outstanding leader and brother like Schoonie."

Schoonover concurred with Goldberg's sentiments, adding: "Joe is one of the finest people I have ever met, I am proud to call him my brother, and it makes my life easier knowing that he's working toward many of the same goals as I am."



Howard E. Young Southwestern, 1947

Former General Council President Howard Ennis Young, 80, of Houston died Friday, May 27th, 2005. Born in Olney, Texas on May 28, 1924 to George and Nora Young, Howard graduated from Olney High School in 1941 and went on to receive his B.A. in speech and grammar at Southwestern University

in 1947 after serving in the Navy during World War II. After marrying Mildred Ashton Ellett on February 24, 1950, Howard attended Texas Christian University, earning his master's degree in speech and drama in 1953.

Howard was a proud and active member of the Phi Delta Theta fraternity and served it in many capacities: president of the Houston Alumni Club, chairman of the house corporation at Southwestern University, and General Council from 1968-1970. He also served as Rho South province president and chair of the Samuel V. Stone Adviser of the Year Committee. He was named Phi of the Year in 1967, and in 1992, his sons, (both of whom are Phi Delts), were involved in presenting him the Legion of Merit Award on behalf of the Fraternity.

He became a loyal member of Bethany Christian Church in 1954, where he taught Sunday School for forty years. He was a charter member of both the Houston Racquet Club and Houston City Club.

Mr. Young became involved in the insurance business in 1954 and was the owner, with his sons, of Insco Insurance Agency. He contributed to the industry by serving on the Board and as President of the Independent Insurance Agents of Houston.

So many gifts and accomplishments, but he let it be known that his greatest joy of all was in his family. He delighted in his grandchildren especially, and each of them brought him happiness beyond words. His capacity for love was boundless and his family holds this legacy of love forever.

Richard H. Creps, Ohio University '44

Dick Creps entered the Chapter Grand on March 29, 2005, at the age of 82. Born and raised in Pittsburgh, Pa, Dick graduated from Ohio University and served in the US Navy during World War II. During college, Dick met his wife, Dottie, and the two were married for 56 years before her passing in January. Dick and Dottie are survived by their two children, David Creps and Nancy Meyer, and five grandchildren. Dick worked for Bell Telephone for nearly 40 years before retiring to Florida in 1984. He was a longtime member of both the Pittsburgh and Sarasota Alumni Clubs of Phi Delta Theta, serving each as an officer. Dick was also active in the Sarasota Habitat For Humanity.

For two decades, Dick and Dottie were always the first to greet you at a Phi Delt luncheon or Founders Day. His son, David, notes: "The Phi Delts were very important to him, and he thoroughly enjoyed the many times together with his Fraternity brothers. I would like to thank you for the many happinesses that your organization gave him."

Three weeks before his passing, the Sarasota Alumni Club unveiled the Richard H. Creps Leadership Fund, which will provide grants to student leaders to attend a leadership or educational conference. Joel Ungrodt was a hero to those living with ALS. 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
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Back to campus


Fifty-two years ago this past March, I was initiated into Missouri Beta. Being an active member of the chapter was certainly a step up, but being a pledge was fun and a challenge and left no scars. In September of 1954, my Dad constructed, presented and hung over the front door of our chapter house the pin, which today, fifty-one

years later is in the same place. He also constructed the crest which upon graduation I took with me. This past September my wife, Sally, and I returned the crest to the chapter. We had not been on campus for forty-one years. What a thrill it was for us to return.

Thanks to EWU Phis for remembering fallen brother

We are the parents of Thomas B. Morris, whose obituary appeared in your Fall/Winter 2004 issue. Thomas was a member of the Eastern Washington University chapter. Having no Greek affiliations ourselves, his choice was a new experience for all of us. With each phone call and visit, we were happy to see that Thomas "fit in" and, moreover, loved being a Phi Delt Brother.

On July 6, 2004, Thomas left home to study in Luebeck Germany. He died there of a rare form of bacterial meningitis just one month later, at age twenty. There were more than seven hundred people at his funeral, including a large contingent of E.W.U. Phi Delta Thetas and their adviser. They had driven over six hours to be with Thomas one last time.

That fall the Phi Delts returned to school and set to work. By June 2005 they had raised enough money to purchase and install a granite marker bearing Thomas' name, his Bond number and the dates of his birth and death. The marker is placed in front of their house.

We were honored to be invited to the unveiling. The house shone – as did Thomas' Brothers. This was THEIR service for him; the compassion for us and love for him were evident in every detail that day. Music, speeches, and spontaneous remembrances brought us to tears. Lastly, they shared a video clip of the Greek Week lip synch contest, which culminated in a tribute to Thomas. The Phi Delts shouldered a photograph of him. Everyone stood, raised lighters, cheered and then sang, "With every breath we take, we'll be missing you."

We cannot adequately express our gratitude to the Phi Delt Thetas of East Washington University. We felt – however fleetingly – like the proud parents of a houseful of boys grown into fine young men. The young men stepped forward and faced our suffering; they did not turn away from it or from their own loss. They are good

men who represent the finest your Fraternity has to offer.

Thomas' grave is unmarked due to egregious complications and delays. Knowing he has this marker – so simply and earnestly worked for, so generously shared – gives us cause to rejoice. He is remembered. We are proud of our son. We are proud of his Phi Delt Brothers, too.

Express your thoughts through email or at the chapter meeting. Tell the Phikeia they don't need to stay. Join with other members to stop hazing in your chapter.

There is power in numbers, and never forget that you have the General Headquarters and your college backing your side of the fight against hazing.



Now that the five-year mark has passed, it's a good time to examine the policy and how it has changed Phi Delta Theta and the fraternity world. Is Phi Delta Theta better off today than it was in 1997?

Core values

The General Council cited many reasons for implementing alcohol-free housing, but the central theme was to return the Fraternity to its core principles

of friendship, sound learning and rectitude. Dr. Robert Deloian, Arizona '66, was president of the Council when the decision was made. He recalls the discussion.

"We asked ourselves if the Founders were here today, would they recognize us as the Fraternity they had created in 1848? The answer was NO. And we felt that we would break faith with them if we ignored what ought to be done," Deloian says.

The General Council had other goals in mind:

- · Improve acedemic standing
- Increase recruitment numbers
- Reinvolve alumni
- Stabilize insurance costs
- Meet the needs of today's college students.

"We realized that our principles and rituals should not just be seen and heard, but practiced and lived," Deloian says. "I give credit to the General Council, general officers, members and alums who had the courage to move forward with this decision."

It wasn't an easy decision to make. Naysayers predicted Phi Delta Theta would lose 50 percent of its chapters and be unable to recruit members in its existing chapters. But, after five years it's clear they were wrong.

Crunching the numbers

To examine the results of alcohol-free housing, the Fraternity turned to Dr. Edward Whipple, PhD, vice president for student affairs at Bowling Green State University (and a former General Council president). Dr. Whipple had a team of researchers examine the statistics compiled in the five years since alcohol-free housing came into effect. They published a white paper with the results of their research. To summarize, they found the policy:

- Helped return Phi Delta Theta to its founding principles of friendship, sound learning and rectitude;
- Improved the organization's overall academic performance;
- Helped fight the alcohol-dominated culture prevalent on campus;
- Better responded to the needs of today's college man;
- · Stopped the deterioration of facilities;
- Kept insurance rates low;
- Helped recruit more members than peer organizations;
- · Re-involved alumni members.

These were the Fraternity's goals going into this, and when you take a look at the data, it's obvious that we've been successful on many levels," said Michael Scarlatelli, current president of the General Council. "We knew the day would come when all our hard work would pay off. That day has come."

Undergraduates point out that, while it was a challenge for the organization to redefine its image, Phi Delta Theta stands out on their campuses.

"Phi Delta Theta has made great strides to achieve our true purpose as an organization and is excelling in nearly every area of chapter and campus life as a direct result," says Donald Bowers, chapter president, Univers

Founding values and better scholarship

Although difficult to measure statistically, alcohol-free housing has helped Phi Delta Theta return to its core values. From an external perspective, being a member of the organization is beginning to mean more than being part of a drinking club. Internally, brothers who joined under the new program are men more focused on academic achievement, and healthier social interaction.

"Each year at our leadership conferences, I'm finding more serious, focused students. We also are seeing more focus on community service and philanthropy. I think our founders would be proud," Scarlatelli said.

Phi Delta Theta's overall grade point average for reporting chapters has increased since the implementation of alcohol-free housing to almost a 3.0 average compared to 2.77 in 2000, when the policy began.


"More and more each day, I realize that alcohol-free housing is not an alternative but rather a necessity for chapters that want to experience 'fraternity' in the true sense of the word," said Stephen Glass, chapter president of the University of Virginia chapter. "I see this in our active, engaged brothers and our recruitment of high quality men who look for more than what a 'frat' can offer."

Beating the binge culture

Studies have shown that college campuses, particularly our houses, are places where students often engage in binge drinking activities remained close to \$150 (consuming more than a member while other five drinks in one sitting). The policy helped take that culture and mindset out of Phi Delta Theta's facilities. Our facilities are in better shape today as well, since large-scale social gatherings involving alcohol no longer occur there.

"We now have many chapter homes where the guys can walk in and not have to smell stale beer and see garbage all over the floor," Scarlatelli said. "Our members can invite their moms in without being embarrassed."

These facilities—and the groups that live in them—are more attractive to the "Millennial" generation on college campuses now. These young men and women are more academically optimistic, service-oriented and politically engaged. They also have less experience with alcohol than their recent counterparts, according to research cited in the white paper.

Insurance decrease

Alcohol-free housing provides a safer environment for members and has reduced incidents of injury, fire, property damage and other insurance claims. As a result, Phi Delta Theta's rates have remained steady while other organizations' have increased.

"From an insurance perspective, underwriters support alcohol-free housing because it limits

the accessibility to alcoholic beverages," said James R. Favor, owner, James R. Favor & Company, Phi Delta Theta's insurance broker. "This has resulted in fewer claims and lawsuits, and helps to reduce the cost of liability insurance."

Insurance claims have dropped steadily since alcohol-free housing was implemented. During the most recent academic year, one insurance claim was filed, compared to 12 during 1997, the year alcohol-free housing was announced.




Alcohol-free housing helped re-engage fraternity alumni who had been disappointed in the direction the organization was going. Those alumni not only return to rekindle friendships and memories, they stay to help chapters prosper and guide the young men in their efforts.

In addition, membership numbers have grown since alcohol-free housing was implemented. While Phi Delta Theta Phi Delta Theta's has consistently average member enjoyed a higher GPA was 2.72 in average number of new members each year, the

the other men's fraternities has widened since 2000. Phi Delta Theta had 3,102 new members in 2004 while other groups averaged 2,415.

The margin between the average chapter size of all other fraternities has grown substantially. In 1990, Phi Delta Theta chapters were 18 percent larger than the average fraternity chapter, and in 2004 they were 30 percent larger.

In 2004, Phi Delta Theta was one of only 13 national and international fraternities to show an increase in total undergraduates from the previous year with a 4.2 percent increase. From a competitive standpoint, Phi Delta Theta's stance within the top ten of all fraternities in new members has held steadfast, as it ranked ninth in 1990, eighth in 2000, and ninth in 2004.

Alcohol-free future

It's clear that alcohol-free housing has been beneficial to Phi Delta Theta and its members. Improvement with respect to academic performance, membership recruitment, alumni volunteer involvement, and facility maintenance all point to a positive future.

"We hope we've been able to show the benefits of this policy and encourage other men's fraternities to consider joining the alcohol-free housing movement," said Scarlatelli.

Already, several campuses – including Oklahoma, New Mexico, Western Kentucky, Berkeley and Cal. State - Chico - have implemented similar policies. And the fraternity world continues to watch Phi Delta Theta's results. Many will soon consider joining Theta Chi, Alpha Kappa Lambda, Delta Sigma Phi, Farmhouse and Phi Kappa Sigma in moving toward alcohol-free housing.

Scarlatelli acknowledges Phi Delta Theta must remain vigilant to continue to be successful and promises the General Headquarters staff and General Officers of the Fraternity will be focused on supporting alcohol-free housing in the coming years.

> "After the results we've seen so far, we'll continue to build on our success," Scarlatelli says.

Track and Field

Teammate Hunter Bendall averaged 75.1 over 25 rounds with a low of 70. He tied for eighth at the William & Mary meet and tied for 14th at the LSU Spring Invitational. Derek Rogers of **Pennsylvania** was the team's top finisher at the Princeton Invitational (218) and tied for 10th at the Ivy League meet and Navy Fall Invitational.



Phis aid in Hurricane Katrina relief

Province President (and Catholic priest) Gary Belsome lives in Gonzales, Louisiana, which was spared most of the devastation that hit New Orleans and other Gulf Coast states during Hurricane Katrina. Meanwhile, brothers at California Xi (Cal State Chico) report they are joining in campus-wide fundraising efforts for Hurricane relief and have a goal of raising \$20,000 (if this happens the university president promises to shave his head!)



Give a definition of a chapter leader. How about these two words: Charles Kahlandt?



Two Graduate Students Garner Francis D. Lyon Scholarships

The judges for the Francis D. Lyon Scholarships for students of film-making selected two graduate students for this year's awards. The first place winner, Virginia Todd Burton, received a grant of \$3,000, and the second place winner, Saqib F. Siddik, received \$1,000.



Virginia Todd Burton received a B.A. from Brown University in 1999. She is working toward an M.F.A. with a major in filmmaking at The University of Texas at Austin. Her cumulative GPA is 3.89.

In her application Toddy wrote, "I received my first video camera as a Christmas present when I was eleven

years old and henceforth, no neighborhood child was safe from participating in some elaborate film project I concocted ... While attending Brown University, I studied filmmaking vigorously. During a year away from college between my sophomore and junior years, the professional possibilities for my future began to take shape. Leaving for Los Angeles with the promise of an internship at Roger Corman's production company and absolutely no idea what working in professional filmmaking would bring, I embarked on an adventure in a completely foreign city. Working without pay for four weeks, my time consisted of 18-hour workdays, monsoon like rains, spoiled actors, grumbling crew, and a demanding director. I loved every minute of it."

After graduating from Brown, she returned to Los Angeles where she worked on independent feature films as a line-producer and assistant director, then at a studio as an acquisitions representative. "I learned essential professional skills working in extremely fast-paced and highly competitive environments." She decided to apply to graduate school to "hone my skills as a director and generate a body of work to reemerge on the professional scene with a more focused and determined resume."

She is doing just that at The University of Texas at Austin with a little help from the Phi Delta Theta Educational Foundation's Francis D. Lyon Scholarship.



Saqib F. Siddik received his B.A. in Kinesiology from Rice University in 2004. He is now working toward an M.F.A. in Film Production at the Graduate Film Conservatory at Chapman University in Orange, California. His graduate school cumulative GPA is 3.76.

"When I entered college, I had the absurd idea to make my own Star Wars movie. It seemed like a fun thing to do, so I scoured the internet, read books and magazines, and watched countless DVD documentaries to learn the process of filmmaking. The end result was a 45-minute 'epic' that included space battles, lightsaber duels, and one very nasty villain. I premiered my movie on campus in front of 250 screaming, enthusiastic students, and from that day I was hooked on filmmaking."

Sagib has completed the first of a three-year graduate school program. He is paying for all his education and living expenses himself. "At Chapman, I've quickly established myself as one of the top students in my class. I focus my efforts on making films that have strong stories with compelling characters. Many people enter the industry with lofty aspirations to become famous, make lots of money, or change the world. I, on the other hand, simply want to entertain my audience. I have the ambition and talent to succeed in this industry, and winning a Lyon scholarship would go a long way towards helping me achieve my ultimate goal of directing feature films."

We hope his winning a Lyon Scholarship will do just that!











Joint Venture

Indiana Beta Partners with Wabash College to Build a New Chapter House

In an era when university-fraternity relations on most campuses can be regarded as adversarial at best, one of Phi Delta Theta's oldest continuous chapters enjoys unparalleled support from its College—so much so that the two worked together to help Indiana Beta build a new \$4 million chapter house.

A Fraternity Partnership

Traveling Chapter Consultants often tire of hearing our Phi Delt outposts voice the cliché "We're really unique and unlike any other chapter." When they visit Wabash College, however, they may very well discover that Indiana Beta embraces that spirit of being truly extraordinary.

Yes, for the past 25 years, the chapter has kept a pure-bred Saint Bernard as its official mascot. ("General Phi IV" and the three before him were donated by retired Air Force General Earl "Punk" Johnson '38.) Yes, each year their Phikeias proudly elect to carry on the defunct College tradition of wearing green beanies (called "pots") and tipping them to women and professors on campus. And yes, one might think that this small liberal arts college for men might have trouble attracting students to west central Indiana from a dwindling national pool of your men who seek higher education. Nonetheless, Wabash boasts a current average of five applications for every one matriculated student.

But beyond all that, the rare cooperation that the Wabash College administration exhibits with Indiana Beta stands as its most unique characteristic. A well-respected former Dean of Students once proclaimed that "Fraternities are the lifeblood of Wabash College." It's a sentiment that hasn't lost its power in this contentious age.

Everything Old is New Again

In 1903 (before he was "Hollywood Czar"), Will Hays, Sr. '00 led an effort to purchase the original chapter house and property for \$5,500. Brothers renovated the house in the early 1940s, built an addition in the early 1960s, and banded together for a major renovation in 1980. After hosting a successful sesquicentennial celebration in the fall of 2000, a cadre of alumni from disparate eras came together to begin orchestrating yet another major renovation.

Just two years before, Wabash had embarked on an unprecedented five-year \$100 million capital campaign with renovation of all nine College-owned fraternity houses included among the capital improvements to campus facilities, programs, and scholarships. (The College later upped its "Campaign for Leadership" goals to \$132.5 million in six years, which it eclipsed as the fundraising effort concluded in 2004.) By enlisting the help of fraternity volunteers, Wabash was able to help identify new donors. In return, each of the fraternities would enjoy much-needed makeovers.

"Wabash continues to support fraternity membership as it



fulfills its mission to educate men to lead effectively and live humanely," declares Wabash Dean of Students Tom Bambrey.

"The new house is made possible by the generosity of Phi Delt alumni and funding from Wabash College as we work together to enhance the relationship between the College and the Fraternity."

The timing of this current campaign was perfect, as the "White Elephant" began to exhibit signs of wear and tear from everyday use by some 50 brothers and from structural fatigue, most notably basement-level flooding. While the other two Miami Triad chapters on campus had beat the Phis to the punch—the Betas completed their chapter renovation in 2000 and the Sigma Chis built a new house in 2003—the brothers observed these projects' progress and learned from their successes and miscues.

Through the process of fundraising, planning, and strategizing, the steering committee met with architects, college staff and administrators, contractors, and even (gulp) an interior designer. "Throughout this project, we had to reconsider everything about the old house and its 100-year tradition that we took for granted," comments Facilities Co-Chairman Bill Leppert '94 "Whether to build new, whether to change location, whether to move the location of rooms: we took a hard look at every aspect of that house. Five years later we like what we see!"

During the course of this project, the brothers discovered that maybe the cramped quarters of the old house might have fostered such a tight brotherhood. "In designing the new house, we hope we've retained that communal atmosphere while giving our guys more room to live and study," says Brother Leppert. "At the same time, we seized the opportunity to correct some design issues in the old chapter. Before, attention of brothers studying in our library competed with the traffic through the adjacent front door."

At each step, the committee engaged their active brothers to solicit valuable input and opinions. Just like the old house, each sleep-study room in the new facility is unique. The active

brothers rejected early layouts that sketched out grouped suites or cookie-cutter rooms. The brothers also bucked the current wisdom of providing incoming freshmen more privacy. "We take great pride in the unity and loyalty present within our chapter," said Dustin DeNeal '04. "A big part of this close Bond can be attributed to the daily interaction that results from sharing bathrooms, living areas, meals, and much more. Both the design of the new house and the refusal to adopt the national trend of building more self-contained, hotel-like rooms mirror our chapter's commitment to maintaining our unique sense of unity."

Renewing the Bond

The theme of "Renew the Bond" slowly emerged as a means of galvanizing brothers to the project. Its logo has adorned all mailings as the committee began quarterly update letters to all alumni.

The Fundraising Committee went to work setting up a means to renew that Bond from the pool of potential donors among the alumni. "We thought the best model for soliciting alumni for gifts was to use the guys that went to Wabash when they did: their pledge brothers," says Fundraising Co-Chairman Mark Dill '75. "So we went about identifying a guy from each class, from '37 all the way to the current senior class."

The College's Advancement Office helped train the volunteers in conference call sessions. Each volunteer then received a packet containing names and contact information for every member of his pledge class along with a sample letter geared toward the decade in which that class graduated. The results have been impressive. Currently, more than 350 alumni, parents, and friends have made gifts and pledges in excess of \$1.8 million toward the construction of a new chapter house. That's roughly half of Indiana Beta's alumni. "From my perspective, the biggest reason the Phi Delt campaign has been so successful is the dedication of its

broad network of volunteers," observes Dean for Advancement Joe Emmick. "It is a clear illustration of how the bonds of Phi Delta Theta's brotherhood last a lifetime, and it is clear the priority Phi Delt alumni place on supporting their undergraduate brothers. The way in which they have executed this campaign is an example we hold up for other fraternities to follow." "It's certainly rare to see this kind of working relationship on a project," remarks Hugh Vandivier '91, who serves as Communications Chairman. "We really didn't worry about egos or org charts; we just set out to raise the money and build the thing! I thought we all complemented each other's talents and availability extremely well."

The brothers also were lucky to receive the guidance

of some fellow brothers in high places, namely eight Wabash Trustees who received regular updates and provided much appreciated leadership gifts, support, and counsel.

Trust

This fall, actives and phikeias will take up residence in a brand new threestory, 20,300 square foot chapter house anchored on the exact same corner as the previous building. Supported by a newly formed Alumni Advisory Council, the active chapter will face new challenges as it adjusts to living in a new facility.

"Our house gets the unique opportunity to 'break in' an amazing new house," comments Chapter President Joe Seger '06. "After relinquishing our cherished residence at 114 West College







for a year, we know that we will succeed in establishing this house in the steeped tradition of Indiana Beta."

"It's certainly a harrowing thought to realize that you're at the helm of a multimillion building project that relies so much on the demeanor and behavior of 18- to 22-year-olds!" admits Brother Vandivier. "But in the end, you have to trust these guys, just like someone trusted us once.

"People look at the completed house or learn about our fundraising success, and inevitably ask, 'How did you pull that off?" he observes, 'Initially, I am inclined to answer that the College and its alumni still believe that this chapter is still an essential part of our students' education. In the end, I just end up telling them, 'We have a strong brotherhood fostered by determination, loyalty, and pride."





CELEBRATING 100 YEARS OF ONTARIO ALPHA



Phis in Southern Ontario are anticipating a special Founders Day on February 4, 2006, when Ontario Alpha at the University of Toronto celebrates its 100th anniversary.

Ontario Alpha's history dates back to its installation on May 28, 1906 at the University of Toronto, Canada's leading teaching and research university. The chapter was the second Canadian chapter, following Quebec Alpha's 1902 installation at McGill University. Over 900 men have been initiated into the chapter and the current active chapter is the strongest it has been in several years.

Fittingly, the 100th Anniversary celebration will be held in the Great Hall at Hart House, on the university campus. The Great Hall is considered one of Toronto's architectural masterpieces, complete with stained glass windows, marble floor and oak timbered ceilings. It is the centerpiece of the almost one-hundred year-old Hart House, an impressive student centre built with a sizeable donation from the Masseys, a wealthy Canadian family.

A special Centennial Committee chaired by former Province President Grant Loree, Toronto '70, has been hard at work planning the event for months. The festivities promise to be fun and memorable and will provide a chance for Brothers to reconnect with others whom they have not seen in some time. The night will also include the induction of a large group of Golden and Silver Legionnaires from classes that were among Ontario Alpha's strongest over the past century. In addition to Brothers from the University of Toronto, the committee is encouraging all Phis who live in southern Ontario or who will be in the area to attend this special occasion, including our American Brothers. George Banta III Lawrence '45

George Banta III died May 12, 2005. He was 81. Banta is the grandson of Phi Delta Theta "second founder" David D Banta. Brother Banta continued to lead the Banta publishing business, serving as CEO during the early 1970s. In addition to longtime and legendary support of Phi Delta Theta, the Banta family has extensive ties with Lawrence University.

Robert Frank Heflin Franklin, '48

Longtime West Texas A&M faculty adviser Robert F. Heflin died July 28, 2005. Brother Heflin taught history at the school from 1957 until his retirement. He helped organize the West Texas A&M chapter and was a loyal supporter of the group throughout his career.

G. Paul Jones Georgia Tech '52

Former lota province president and Educational Foundation trustee G. Paul Joines died February 9, 2005. Jones was part of an enormous Phi family: his father, grandfather, and six uncles were Phis. He is survived by two Phi brothers, Dr. Robert H. Jones, Davidson '55 and Samuel P. Jones, Davidson '66 as well as a phi brother in law, a Phi nephew and several cousins.

Clarence Carson Parks II University of Miami '57

Musician songwriter Carson Parks II died June 22, 2005. Brother Parks is credited with Frank Sinatra's first gold single ("Somethin' Stupid) and "Cab Driver" by the Mills Brothers.

He is survived by his wife and five children, including Carson Parks III. a Phi at the U. of Miami.

Gerard J. Shields

Jerry Shields, long time house corporation president and adviser for the Cornell chapter died June 19, 2005. Brother Shields was a well-known Ithaca, NY painting and wallpaper contractor who dedicated many hours to his chapter.

"I don't think we'll find anyone to replace him, to be the person to get things done. But even more than that, we've lost a brother and a friend," says Eric Neuberger '05.



Robert Milne Cornell '68

Dr. Robert Milne died of a sudden heart attack while attempting to climb Mt. Everest June 5, 2005. An experienced climber, Milne had reached the summits of the highest peaks on Australia, Antarctica, Europe, Africa, North America, South America and Oceania and was attempting to summit Everest to complete his personal mountain challenge.

Milne was an internationally-known expert in artificial intelligence, having spent time in the Pentagon as the chief Al scientist before returning to Scotland. He was a fellow of the Royal Society of Edinburgh (Scotland's National Academy) and a leader of several scientific organizations.

A Profile in Giving - A Charitable Gift Annuity



"Phi Delta Theta is the best fraternity. It was when I was in school and it still is today," says Jerry Novario, Ohio University '43. To hear him talk about Phi Delta Theta, you'd think he was talking about a dear old friend, and actually, he is.

Jerry joined Phi Delta Theta in the fall of 1941, and he can still recall exactly where he was in the chapter house when Pearl Harbor happened. He

was called to active duty two weeks after graduating. Jerry was abroad for three years and during that time, he and his Phi Delt brothers communicated by writing letters to each other. "We had a common bond," he says, "that was nurtured by our membership in Phi Delta Theta."

When Jerry was finally discharged in 1946, he proposed to his now late wife Nancy, and they married on September 20, 1947. Jerry and Nancy met in college on a blind date, and Jerry recalls how Phi Delta Theta grew to be an important part of their lives and their relationship with each other. It all began when he offered Nancy his Phi Delt pin in 1941. He got a lot of kidding from his chapter brothers because he was the first of his friends to do such a thing. She initially refused what she perceived as a pre-cursor to marriage but accepted his Phi Delt ring instead. It was the summer of 1942, when she finally accepted his pin. In the midst of this relationship and throughout Jerry's life—the constant was always his Fraternity and those friendships that stood the test of time and distance.

"After the war a group of us returned regularly for a while, and then we all went our separate ways. When we started coming back in the 70s, it became an annual event," says Jerry. He remembers that decade being a difficult time for his chapter, but the alumni, Jerry included, helped pull things back together again. At a subsequent homecoming Jerry recalls a group of young Phi Delts making a special trip to visit him in his hotel room. "There were a dozen of them," he recalls, and

they were there to thank him for what he'd done for the chapter.

A further example of this commitment is the Charitable Gift Annuity Jerry established through the Phi Delta Theta Educational Foundation. He has designated it to benefit student leaders of the O.U. chapter. In addition to his annual gifts, he supports the Foundation and his chapter in this way because "Phi Delt gave me so much in college and helped me along the way." Jerry's charitable gift annuity also provides him with lifetime income.

Jerry believes in the young men who are a part of our Fraternity today, and he applauds what the Foundation is doing. "The Phi Delta Theta Foundation really helps young people, and I'm most proud of my membership when I have the opportunity to be around these wonderful young men participating in the Fraternity."

He became more impressed with Phi Delta Theta after getting a glimpse of the inner workings of the organization at his first Convention in 1994, where he was a delegate for the St. Pete Beach Alumni Club. Today he maintains a close personal relationship with Rusty and Conrad at the Headquarters, and they connect in person whenever possible. "The whole Fraternity has meant a lot to me, in college and especially in later years," says Jerry. "I'm proud of them and my association with them."

At 80-something years old Jerry says his hobby is "fiddling with anything related to technology." He's an avid e-mailer and swears that it would have been a lot easier in his younger days to get guys together for alumni club events if they'd had a communication tool like e-mail.

Whether by e-mail or in person, Jerry maintains relationships with many of the people he's met throughout his life because of Phi Delta Theta. He emphasizes the role the Fraternity played in his life and his relationship with his late wife. Retired now for 23 years, he says, "My Phi Delt brothers have been my closest friends for 60 years. Many of them are gone now. But you can't take those memories away." Nor would anyone want to.

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

Ralph Clark, Charlie Reamer, Coach Wren, Ken Kerr II and other local alumni weathered the storm of the 1970s and helped rebuild the chapter after some turbulent years. Following them Bruce Dew, Steve Hunter, Chris Duckworth and the other members of the housing corporation continued to invest into the chapter much longer than any business would ever consider. In 1992 Dick MacKinnon took on the cause and salvaged the chapter from complete extinction. No brass plaques signify the work that these men put into the organization. Rather, the 137 year existence of Ohio Gamma reflects their efforts.

New Acquisitions for Banta Library by Carmalieta Dellinger Jenkins



We are pleased to tell you about two recent David D. Banta Memorial Library acquisitions. David D. Banta's son, George Banta, Franklin 1876, was the first

President of Phi Delta Theta's General Council. He served as president from 1880 to 1882. On May 3, 1881 Banta married Lillie Vawter, a member of Delta Gamma. (Banta is Delta Gamma's only male member, and he personally initiated Miss Vawter.)

The Scroll, Volume V. No. 8, May, 1881, reported on the wedding and the Fraternity's wedding present. "The happy couple were the recipients of many valuable and useful presents, but none surpassed that of the fraternity - the dinner china set. It threatened to rival even the charms of the happy couple themselves, and divide the attention of those assembled. The grace and elegance of design and finish has become the town talk."



The Banta family recently shipped the dinner china to the Fraternity for display in the archives. During the 104 years since the wedding, several generations of the family have used the china. (The Banta family has given us five generations of Phis.) We hasten to add that the china is still very beautiful and still worthy of being the talk of the town.

Another recent Banta Library archives acquisition is the Oscar from the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences presented in 1948 to Francis D. Lyon, *UCLA '28*. Brother Lyon was named best film editor for the movie, Body and Soul. Lyon's widow, Ann, presented the Oscar to Phi Delta Theta at a reception held by the Green Valley (AZ) Alumni Club.

Shortly before he died in 1996, Brother Lyon established the Francis D. Lyon Scholarship Fund. Pete established the scholarships to assist students who share his passion for making films. To date the Foundation has awarded \$44,000 in Francis D. Lyon Scholarships to 16 students of film making.

Steve Carr joins Educational Foundation staff

Stephen F. Carr recently joined the Educational Foundation as director of major gifts. He will be responsible for cultivating and securing large gifts for the Educational Foundation.

Carr is a twenty-year veteran in trust banking, and brings this background to provide gift planning expertise to Phi Delta Theta. He has assisted numerous not-for-profits with their advanced development efforts, which became a professional passion after serving on the board of Ronald McDonald House. An attorney and a graduate of Ohio State, he admires the strong heritage of the fraternity and hopes to advance the goals of the Foundation to benefit its membership past, present and future.


Carr is married and a resident of Kettering, Ohio, Steve has two daughters; Abbey, a sophomore at Villanova, and Claire, a high school sophomore.

babies and was one of the founders of the drive to build the Rush Memorial Hospital. He has traveled all over the world and attended each Olympics from 1952-1976.





MSU Phi TC Rollins injured in Iraq, begins classes

While American troops are still fighting in Iraq, one injured marine reservist, T.C. Rollins, is back at MSU taking classes. After five months in Iraq, Rollins came back to the United States in the middle of February. He enrolled this semester for 12 hours.

Rollins, a 21-year-old banking and finance major, said he did not suffer wounds from battle. "It was an auto accident,"

he said. "We didn't know the driver, but he drove recklessly and sped the whole time. He swerved the Humvee right to take a left, and we started fishtailing around," he said.

Rollins, who once slept outside in Jordan in 15-degree temperature, sat in the sunshine at the State Fountain Bakery. After the accident, a hole was cut in the left side of his gym shorts so that an external fixator could adhere to both ends of his femur, he said. Girlfriend Jocelyn Gong sat with him as he explained how a shell punctured his leg on Feb. 9.

"The vehicle hit the gravel and flipped one to two times; I can't remember exactly how many," he said. He was thrown 15 feet from the Humvee.

A partner's M-16 assault rifle trampolined, went off and fired into his leg. His pelvic bone broke in three places. "My artery was severed," he said.

Doctors told him they were surprised he lived. They also saved his leg.

"I stayed conscious for two hours after the injury," he said. "I was sitting on the operating table during some of the surgery."

Friend and Phi Delta fraternity brother Jon David Cole said that since the accident, Rollins' personality has positively changed.

"T.C. has always been extremely ambitious and patriotic," Cole said. "But his experience in Iraq has shown him the ability of someone alone in such a hard place."

"His injuries have given him a show of God's grace. He definitely has greater appreciation for his country, the people in it and his loved ones," Cole added.

While Rollins was away, he frequently kept in contact with the fraternity, updating them on his situation.
Rollins said even though he was badly hurt, he would go back to Iraq if asked.

He fully supports military action in Iraq, he said. "I do

believe that Saddam Hussein was a bad leader and that we needed to relieve the Iraqi people of his command," he said.

"There are things we could of done different," he said. "We weren't ready for battle. We needed more supplies."

"But we can't tolerate terrorism," he said. "We're showing other

countries that we won't be bullied."

He said that Iraq is a concentrated place where terrorists go to in order to fight. "It's the easiest place to get them to attack."

According to Rollins, the United States has the upper hand in the war in Iraq. "The country has troubles,





but there are more Iraqi soldiers and policemen trained and ready to stand on their own feet," he said.

Rollins plans to finish his degree, but his battalion could be deployed to any country where intelligence finds a terror alert.

Despite the chance that her boyfriend could depart for another country again, Gong said, "I'll always support him 100 percent."

Rollins said that he would rather go back and fight terrorists than let her go unprotected.



Thome Wins Lou Gehrig Award Phillies' star collects award before joining ChiSox

Editor's note: Just as we went to press, the Phillies announced Jim Thome will be traded to the World Series Champion Chicago White Sox.

This June, "Jim Thome Bobble Head Night" will be enjoyed by thousands of fans. Curious as it may seem at first glance, the fans that receive this miniature slugger replica will be in Peoria, Illinois. It says a lot about a ball player when a minor league team of another ball club will sponsor a night in his honor, However, the team is the Peoria Chiefs, a Chicago Cubs affiliate, and they play in Jim Thome's hometown. Thome isn't just a legend from local Limestone High School and Illinois Central College; he is still very much a part of the fabric of this community. He is also this year's Lou Gehrig Memorial Award recipient.

Phi Delta Theta presents the award annually to the Major League Baseball player who best exemplifies the giving character of Hall of Famer Lou Gehrig, Columbia '25. The award was first presented in 1955 and is permanently maintained at the Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum in Cooperstown, New York.

In January, Thome hosted the 10th annual "Night with Jim Thome" dinner which raised over \$176,000 for The Children's Hospital of Illinois. Over the past decade, Thome has raised over \$1 million for the hospital, located in his hometown of Peoria. He also hosts a local golf tournament in Peoria each year to benefit the hospital.

Thome is involved with the Make-A-Wish Foundation, having granted wishes for children with life-threatening illnesses. On several occasions in December, Thome has dressed as Santa Claus and visited hospitals and non-profit agencies, purchasing and distributing toys for child patients.

"Jim Thome is an outstanding representative of the Phillies organization both on and off the field. We're proud to see him recognized once again for his giving," says Gene Dias, Phillies Director of Community Relations.

Thome and his wife, Andrea, have made significant contributions to the Maternity Care Coalition and Easter Seals. Thome has been affiliated with the United Way charities and is a past Honorary Chair of the Home Run Derby, which raised over \$175,000 for the United Way's youth programs. The Thomes have donated their suite at Citizens Bank Park to charitable organizations in the

Philadelphia region on many occasions since the ballpark's inauguration. During the 2005 season, Thome kicked-off a new program with the Philadelphia Food Bank called "Home Runs For Hunger" in which donations are




made to the Food Bank based on his home runs hit during the season. At the April 18th kick-off press conference, Thome presented the Food Bank with a check for \$25,000. This past November, Thome helped the Food Bank load frozen turkeys that were to be delivered to needy families in the Philadelphia area on Thanksgiving.

Jim Thome is more than just the All-Star first baseman for the Philadelphia Phillies, and previously for the Cleveland Indians. He is a throwback player to the days of the award's namesake. With his baggy uniform and game-scarred helmet, Thome looks and plays the game as if he's in an old highlight reel.

A 14-year veteran, Thome is a four-time All-Star and he received the Silver Slugger Award in 1996. He has had 30 or more homers in nine of the past ten seasons, and averaged more than 37 from 1994-2004. In eight of the last ten seasons, he has also had 100+ walks and RBI, and has seven 100+ run seasons during that time. From 2001-2004, Thome had four straight 40+ homerun seasons. He has a lifetime .408 on-base-percentage and a career average of .281 with 430 homers.

Thome is the third member of the Phillies to receive the Lou Gehrig Memorial Award, joining Mike Schmidt (1983) and Curt Schilling (1995).

This past year, Thome was judged in a survey by the Tribune Co. to be the best teammate in the game, garnering nearly three-times the votes of the players who finished second. Talking about the honor with Baseball Digest, Thome said "That's a pretty neat honor. Maybe you understand what another guy is going through and try to support him. It's similar to having a brother. You care about him. You want him to do well."

Educational Foundation awards 18 fellowships for 2005-2006

Adding two David S. and Julia N. Jenkins Fellowships and a Robert J. Miller Fellowship, the Foundation was able to award eighteen graduate fellowships for 2005-2006. It is the largest number of fellowships ever given by the Foundation in a single year. We have been awarding fellowships to Phi Delta Theta graduate and professional students since 1998. Let me tell you about this year's recipients.

Arkansas Phi Is Alumnus of the Year

Skip Rutherford Responsible for Presidential Center in Little Rock

The Arkansas Alpha Chapter at University of Arkansas-Fayetteville celebrates the achievement of one of its own alumni. On Tuesday, October 4th, undergraduate students, alumni and guests all congregated to congratulate James L. "Skip" Rutherford, *Arkansas '72*, for receiving the 2005 Raymond L. Gardner Alumnus of the Year Award. The award is given annually to the alumnus who best exemplifies individual commitment to his community, to higher education and to the Fraternity.

The presentation of the award took place at the Arkansas Alpha chapter house. A dinner was served; the award presentation followed. Conrad Foster Thiede, Colaate '90, Vice President of Development for the Phi Delta Theta Educational Foundation, University of Arkansas Greek officials and associate deans joined the members in attendance. Chapter President Christopher Shenep, '06 and Alumni Chairman Chip Bartlett, '07 planned the event for the Fraternity. "At Skip's request we had tonight's special presentation at the chapter house," Shenep said. "Skip emphasized how much he wanted this honor to revolve around our entire Arkansas Alpha chapter."

A native of Batesville, Arkansas, Rutherford is a 1972 graduate of the University of Arkansas. While in Fayetteville, he joined Phi Delta Theta and served the undergraduate chapter as president. Rutherford, majoring in journalism, was editor of the student newspaper, The Arkansas Traveler. Upon graduation, he served as chapter adviser and house corporation officer. Rutherford has always passed along leadership, communication and networking skills he learned through his undergraduate experience and involvement. In recent years, Rutherford has been intimately involved with the chapter's fall recruitment process."To hear him speak on the final night of recruitment is extremely powerful and very persuasive," chapter secretary Aaron Strobel, '08 said. Currently, Rutherford is a part of a committee involved in efforts that will result in a major renovation for the Arkansas Alpha chapter house.

Rutherford is an active, involved and recognizable resident of Little Rock, where he is the Chairman of the Board of the William J. Clinton Foundation. Last fall, Rutherford presided in the planning, preparing and opening of the William J. Clinton Presidential Center, America's 12th Presidential Library. Rutherford is Executive Vice President of Cranford Johnson Robinson Woods, one of the region's largest communications firms.

"He is a great example of what it means to be a civil servant," says Jordan Johnson, a Kappa Sigma and communications firm colleague. "He invests in young people and thrives on giving them opportunities he didn't have, and all he expects in return is that those young people do the same for others in the future."

As an educator, Rutherford has taught as a visiting professor at the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville, Lyon College in Batesville and the University of Ozarks in Clarksville. Among other positions, Rutherford has served as the first president of the advisory board for the Arkansas School for Math and Science.

He coordinated the 40th anniversary of the 1957 crisis at Little Rock Central High School and is past president of the Little Rock School Board.

Rutherford's list of accomplishments allowed his application to stand out from other applicants. His involvement has sparked immense interest in individuals desiring to remain active following their collegiate career. "Skip's continuing assistance and guidance in our chapter inspires us to become active Phis throughout our lifetime, especially once we leave campus," chapter risk manager Grayson Hinojosa, '08 said.

Rutherford's award presentation was led by Shenep. Following opening remarks, Conrad Foster Thiede educated the chapter on the historical importance of the Gardner Award, as well as sharing anecdotal accounts of past recipients.

Woody Bassett, '74 reflected on his long friendship with Rutherford. "Skip has gotten just about everyone who has run for an office, in the state of Arkansas, elected," he said. "He also has put a man in the White House." After accepting the award from Shenep, Rutherford spoke on how honored he was to receive the award. "This is your award," he told the chapter. "It belongs to all those associated with Arkansas Alpha. It is important that I receive this award here, because this is where it all began."

Rutherford is a tremendous advocate of the Greek System and he has wonderful friendships with alumni leaders from other campus fraternities.

"We realized that to be a viable Greek System at the University of Arkansas, we needed more than just one or two strong chapters," says Charlie Whiteside, president of the Arkansas Kappa Sigma house corporation and alumni association. "Skip and I are joined at the hip championing the Greek System and helping create responsible campus citizens." Rutherford and Whiteside also serve together on the Lyon College and Children's Hospital boards.

Rutherford received the University of Arkansas Greek Hall of Fame Award last April. He has also been recognized with the Humanitarian Award from the Arkansas Chapter of the National Conference of Community and Justice; the Martin Luther King Award from the Black Community Developers; the Community Service Award from the University of Arkansas Alumni Association; the 2004 Arkansan of the Year by the Arkansas Times newspaper; the 2005 Arkansas Press Association Headliner of the Year; and the 2005 William F. Rector Memorial Award for distinguished civic achievement in Little Rock.

"Skip has had an incredible year; I'm thankful this honor has brought together so many of his Arkansas Alpha friendships. I know this award will be among the favorite awards of all those he has received," Shenep said. "He is a vital part in the past, present and future of Arkansas Alpha's commitment to the standard of brotherhood."



Robert Wise Franklin '33

Phi Robert Wise, Franklin, '33, who was called by Martin Scorsese "the Spielberg of his time" died in September at age 91.

The 1996 Distinguished Alumnus Award winner Wise, was director of such classics as "West Side Story" and "The Sound of Music."

Brother Wise studied journalism at Franklin College until the Depression economy demanded that he opt for employment. He left Indiana for Hollywood in 1933 and served as a messenger for RKO's editing department. He progressed quickly becoming an assistant sound and music editor. In 1941, Mr. Wise edited the motion picture "Citizen Kane" for his mentor, Orson Welles, and received an Academy Award nomination.

Mr. Wise also studied under the tutelage of Val Lewton on the set of "Curse of the Cat People" (1941). In 1949, Mr. Wise earned the critics prize at Cannes for his direction of "The Set Up." Mr. Wise continued to shine during the 1950s directing such entertaining hits as "The Day the Earth Stood Still" and "Run Silent, Run Deep." He also directed "Star Trek, The Motion Picture" in 1979, launching that popular franchise.

Brother Wise accomplished the rare feat of winning double Oscars for Best Director and Best Producer twice, in 1961 for "West Side Story" and in 1965 for "The Sound of Music".

James Fausto Sierra Cal. State, Northridge '68

Former province president and chapter adviser Jim Sierra died in October after a long fight with cancer. He was 60.

"When you were talking to Jim, you had his undivided attention," says Chuck Ward, a chapter brother of Sierra. "He tried to make you special in his response and in his big manly hugs."

"Anyone who met Jim loved him," says General Council member Chris Lapple, who spoke at Sierra's memorial service. "Irascible, opinionated and full of gut barrel laughter. And we laughed a lot."

In 2004, a scholarship in Brother Sierra's name was established and presented to him at the Convention.

Hundreds of his family, friends and Brothers gathered to celebrate his life on Oct. 22. He is survived by his wife, Jane, a daughter Adrienne and Phi Delt son Ryan.







Phi Delta Theta General Council President, Michael Scarlatelli, presented the Anti-Hazing Hero Award during the Fraternity's General Officers Conference to David Westol in recognition of his anti-hazing efforts.

Westol has long been a proponent of hazing abolishment in the Greek system. He is a nationally known speaker on the topic of hazing and spoke at numerous Phi Delta Theta events in support of his stance. He is the CEO of Theta Chi Fraternity, but is known throughout the Greek World for his "Hazing on Trial" presentation.

In 1980, Westol was an assistant prosecutor and discussed hazing from a legal point of view at a Pi Kappa Alpha event. In 1981, he scripted his talk and began excerpting it for Greek leadership presentations. He estimates that, since

1981, he has given his "Hazing on Trial" presentation at least 1,700 times on various campuses and events (including several Phi Delta Theta events).

Westol is not the first individual to receive the Anti-Hazing Hero Award. Phi Delta Theta's own, Thomas "Sparky" Reardon was the recipient of the award at the Fraternity's Presidents Leadership Conference in early January.





PRESIDENT'S LETTER

THE FACES OF PHILANTHROPY

By: William R. Richardson

Have you ever wondered what a philanthropist looks like?

One of the most popular books within the fund raising world in the past ten years is titled *The Seven Faces of Philanthropy*. The book did not show actual faces but described seven characteristics or motivations of philanthropically inclined individuals. Those characteristics and motivations are clearly evident in the thousands of Phi Delta Theta alumni who contributed to the Foundation's 2005 campaign.

To help truly put a face on some of these philanthropists who helped make 2005 such a successful year for us, we are pleased to share some of their photographs throughout this report.

Ironically, if asked, many of these individuals would not consider themselves philanthropists. Like most people, they tend to think of a philanthropist as someone with a name like Rockefeller, Getty or Gates. But they are philanthropists in the truest sense. They voluntarily donate their support to a charitable cause in which they believe, and that support improves the lives of others. That cause also has a face... and it includes the faces of more than 6,000 current undergraduates.

The 2005 Campaign

Because of our Phi philanthropists, 2005 was another very successful year for the Educational Foundation. Alumni, undergraduates, friends and parents contributed more than 6,300 gifts totaling almost \$1,300,000. This represents a healthy increase in the number of gifts (+5%) and total dollars (+34%) compared to 2004.

The report that follows recognizes all donors who made gifts between January 1 and December 31, 2005. We are truly grateful to each of these donors for their support that enables the Foundation to provide the crucial scholarships, fellowships and leadership programs for today's young Phis.

Highlights from some of the Foundation's activities over the past year include:

 Scholarships and Fellowships – The Foundation now has more than 45 named scholarship and fellowship funds. These funds, when combined with the Foundation's general funds, provided more than \$190,000 for scholarships and fellowships in 2005.
 Since its creation the Foundation has given almost \$2.5 million in scholarships and fellowships.

- The Trustees' Roundtable Membership in The Trustees' Roundtable topped the 150 mark for the first time. The Trustees' Roundtable recognizes alumni who make annual gifts of \$1,000 or more.
- Leadership Consultant Grant \$120,000 was provided to support the Leadership Consultant program. This program provides critical on-site visits, evaluations and resources to every chapter.
- The Living Bond Society The number of Phis who have included the Foundation in their wills or other estate plans has continued to increase and now stands at 82. Based on past giving records, a conservative estimate on the value of the known planned gifts is in excess of \$4.5 million dollars.
- The Presidents Leadership Conference A \$64,000 grant was provided to underwrite the educational cost of this conference attended by more than 150 chapter presidents.
- Electronic Solicitations and Communications The Foundation continued to benefit from the electronic solicitations conducted in 2004. Many of the alumni who responded to this form of solicitation in the last half of 2004 made monthly pledges that continued well into 2005.

The Foundation also received many favorable comments from *The Inner Shield* – a quarterly electronic newsletter and our first electronic holiday greeting card.

- Investment Performance The Foundation's investment portfolio achieved a 9.1% annual rate of return for calendar year 2005.
- The Knights of Pallas This program introduces undergraduate members to the Foundation and to the idea of charitable giving. A gift of \$18.48 or more entitles the undergraduate to become a member of the Knights of Pallas. Hundreds of undergraduates have answered the call and participation rates during the Presidents Leadership Conference and the Emerging Leaders Institute are typically in the 65-75% range.

There are numerous other highlights that will be covered throughout the report, and I hope you will enjoy reading about them.

On behalf of all the members who benefited from the programs made possible through the generosity of our philanthropists, I offer my most sincere thanks.





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
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TRUSTEES' ROUNDTABLE

Now in its third year, The Trustees' Roundtable recognizes those distinguished Phis who support the Educational Foundation with annual gifts totaling \$1000 or more. Annual contributors of \$2,500 to \$4,999 are acknowledged as Silver Medallion members and those who support the Foundation with annual gifts of \$5,000 or more are recognized as Golden Medallion members. In 2005, a record 159 individuals joined The Trustees' Roundtable. This is a 30% increase from 2004.



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537 generous and loyal individuals gave more than one gift to the Foundation during the year. 399 gave two gifts, 56 gave three, 33 gave four, and 49 gave five or more gifts.

The Foundation received 6 gifts of stock. Those gifts totaled \$179,295.91. The smallest of the stock gifts was valued at \$664.60 while the largest was valued at \$150,018.93.

WAYS YOU CAN HELP

Thousands of Phi Delta Theta members contribute each year to the Educational Foundation. It is their support that makes all of the programs provided by the Foundation possible.

Listed below are a few of the ways members choose to support the Foundation:

ANNUAL SUPPORT

These gifts typically arrive in the form of checks, credit card gifts or gifts of stock. Most Educational Foundation donors do not restrict the use of their annual gifts. This allows them to be allocated to the areas of most critical need during the year.

ENDOWMENTS

Permanently endowed funds may be established and named in accordance with a donor's wishes through gifts of \$50,000 or more. These endowments typically create named scholarships or fellowships but other purposes are also available.

Endowments may also be created with smaller gifts that the donor pledges to increase, over a period to time, to the \$50,000 level. Endowment funds provide a constant source of income for the Educational Foundation and are spent with careful consideration of the donor's intentions.

MATCHING GIFTS

Your employer may have a matching gift program that can multiply your support. Please ask your personnel office for the necessary forms to send with your gift.

PLANNED GIFTS

Long-range estate and financial planning can enable you to make a substantial contribution to a program or project of your choice in a manner consistent with your overall charitable and personal commitments. Some examples of planned gifts include bequests, appreciated securities, real estate, insurance policies, charitable remainder trusts and charitable gift annuities. The Foundation staff can provide additional information on each of these types of gifts. The Foundation also recognizes alumni who have made such gifts as members of the Living Bond Society.

MEMORIAL & HONORARY GIFTS

A memorial or honorary gift is an appropriate way to recognize someone's life and accomplishments. The Educational Foundation offers opportunities for those who wish to associate the name of a family or an individual with a project or program of enduring worth. Memorial gifts are acknowledged to the family while honorary gifts are acknowledged to the individual. Gifts of this type to the Sesquicentennial Courtyard have been very popular.

SESQUICENTENNIAL COURTYARD

Alumni and undergraduates alike continue to support the Sesquicentennial Courtyard with bricks engraved with their names or the names of other members and friends of Phi Delta Theta. More than 2,000 engraved bricks have already been placed in the Courtyard, and that number continues to increase on a regular basis. (It is not too late to buy your brick if you have not already done so.)

RESTRICTED GIFTS

Some alumni choose to restrict their gifts for specific programs or funds. For example, one alumnus may ask that his gift be used solely for scholarships while another alumnus may direct his gift to the Leadership College Fund. Both of these gifts are acceptable and welcome. The Foundation does retain the right, however, to decline any gift that does not meet the approved purposes of the Foundation or would be overly restrictive.

Members of classes celebrating special reunions are invited to establish a class gift to the Educational Foundation as part of their reunion activities.

Leading NCAA Division I-A with 29.42 completions per game was quarterback Cody Hodges of the 9-3 Texas Tech Cotton Bowl squad. He ranked second in total offense with 369.1 vards per game; second in passing yardage with 4,238; and third with 31 touchdown passes. Tech's Offensive MVP and a Hula Bowl performer, he had the sixth-best passing game in NCAA history with 44 of 65 for 602 yards and five TDs against Kansas State. Other big games for Cody were 29 of 37 for 454 vards, four TDs versus Florida International and 29 of 44 for 408 yards, two TDs versus Texas A&M. Also seeing action for Texas Tech were wide receiver Slade Hodges, linebacker Ty Linder and quarterback Ray Rowland.

Handling punting duties for Mississippi was Rob Park, who had 43

boots for a 38.2 average and a best of 62 yards. Playing in five contests for **North Carolina** was linebacker Mark Paschal, who was joined on the team by punter John Choate and end Bowen Chapman. Seeing action for the Kansas Fort Worth Bowl team was defensive end Jack Larson. Also on the Jayhawks' squad was wide receiver Jack Swab. Wide receiver William Cage was a member of the 11-1 TCU Houston Bowl team. Members of the SMU team were wide receiver Rob Pritchard and defensive backs James Klein and Benson Sloan.

Thirty-one Phi Delts were members of the **Davidson** squad, led by Division I-AA Mid-Maior All-American first team linebacker Alex Arinsmier, His 108 tackles led the Pioneer Football League and ranked 14th in Division I-AA. Alex was PFL South Division Defensive Player of the Year and recovered three fumbles. Named to the Mid-Major All-American second team was defensive back Pat Fitzgerald, who had five interceptions (three against Greensboro) and ranked third with 71 tackles. Also on the Mid-Major A-A second team was safety Zach Long, who was second with 79 stops; picked off four passes; and deflected eiaht.

Davidson defensive end Kyle Kinsell was on the Academic All-American first team and gained Mid-Major All-American honorable mention after posting 55 tackles, a team high 10 for losses and four sacks. Back Yeatts Anderson won Academic All-PFI first team honors, posted 30 tackles and had a co-high eight deflections. Named to the Academic All-PFL second team was linebacker Bud Crawford (50 tackles). Other good defenders were linebackers Niel Andrews (34 tackles), Preston Moore (25 tackles), Chris Castillo and Chris Hampton. Cody Elder had 42 kickoffs for a 46.3 average.

He spent the 2005 season as an offensive assistant with the NFL **Tampa Bay Buccaneers** and had previous coaching stints at five colleges, including **Notre Dame** and **Purdue**.

Named to the Football Gazette All-American first team was tri-captain/wide receiver Brad Duesing, who led 31 Phis

on the 6-4 **Washington-St. Louis** team. He became the second player in NCAA history to exceed 1,000 receiving yards in four straight seasons and was University Athletic Association Offensive Player of the Year after setting school records with 75 receptions for 1,136 yards and 10 TDs. Brad now ranks in the top 12 in four NCAA DIII career categories: third in receptions (287); sixth in receiving yardage (4,249); 11th in yards per game (113.6); and 12th in receptions per game (7.5).

The top Phi player in the NFL was **Miami Dolphins** wide receiver Wes Welker, *Texas Tech '04*, who caught 29 passes for 434 yards. As a return specialist, he returned 61 kickoffs for a 22.6 average and ran back 43 punts for a 9.1 average.

Nick Novak, Maryland '05 was the Arizona Cardinals' kicker over the last 10 games of the season. He connected on eight of 10 field goals attempts and was perfect on 15 extra point attempts. Nick also averaged 57.2 yards on 49 kickoffs. Offensive guard Jacob Bell, Miami '04, played nine contests for the Tennessee Titans and J.T. O'Sullivan, Cal-Davis '02, was the Minnesota Vikings number three quarterback the last two months of the season.

After being cut by the **Vikings** in training camp, kicker Jonathan Nichols, *Mississippi '05*, was re-signed by the team for the 2006 season. Quarterback Brett Dietz, *Hanover '04*, spent the early part of the 2006 Arena Football League season on the practice squad of the **Tampa Bay Storm**. In 2005, he played for the **Cincinnati Marshals** of the National Indoor Football League, completing 198 of 345 for 2,226 yards and 41 touchdowns.

Cross Country

Justin Jernigan was a leading runner for **Mississippi** again and had a season-best 8K time of 25:27.42 at the Southeastern Conference meet. He also placed 55th at the 10K NCAA South Regional with a time of 32:40.08. He had eighth place finishes in two 8K events: the Arkansas State and Saluki Invitationals and was 13th at the Memphis Twilight Classic 4K event (20:53.54). Dylan Rose-Coss of New Mexico had a best 8K time of 27:49 at the Lobo Invitational.

Earning All-American status at the NCAA Division III meet was Chad Bennett of **DePauw**, who placed 24th with a time of 26:15.1. He placed second at the SCAC meet and was 10th at the DIII Great Lakes regional meet. Chad's best 8K time was 25:56 at the Wisconsin-Parkside Invitational. Teammate Grant Smith had a best 8K time of 28:17.38 at the Great Lakes Pre-Regional meet. Doug Simpson of **Ohio Wesleyan** ran a best 8K time of 27:32 at the DIII Great Lakes Regional; placed 22nd (27:56) at the GLAC meet; and was 34th (28:16) at the North Coast Athletic Conference meet.

Among top finishers at the Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference 8K meet were **Southwestern College's** Andrae Harper, who placed second (26:54.54) and Brandon Smith, who was 11th (28:17.02). Matt Cordova of **LaVerne** clocked a best 8K time of 27:10 at the UC-Irvine meet. Co-captain Jimmy McNamara of **Gettysburg** ran an 8K time of 29:12 at the Centennial Conference meet and was joined on the squad by Chris DePaul and Mark Ulbrich.

Chris Henry was a key runner for **Embry-Riddle**, posting the squad's second-best time (26:20.50) at the NAIA meet and placing third (27:07) at the FSC/NAIA Region IV meet. Other runners last fall were Heath Thompson of **Southwestern University** and the **M.I.T.** duo of Sam Berberian and Brian Jacokes.

Soccer

Leading **LaVerne** to an 11-5-3 season (best record in 18 years) were seven Phi Delts. Four year starting defenseman Eddy Geenen was named to the All-Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference first team, as was forward Daniel Aguirre, the coleader with 13 points (six goals, one assist). Other teammates were midfielders Brandon Emilio, Ben DeAyora, Joseph Valencia and defensemen Guillermo Garcia and Jesse Rodriguez, Starting 11 contests for Northwood was defenseman Pat Nelson while defenseman Samuel Morris-Rosenfeld played in eight games for Whitman.

The 9-6-2 Washington & Lee squad featured defenseman J.D. McDermott, who started 10 games, and midfielder Anderson Fariss. Tying for third in scoring (10 points) for 10-7-2 Schreiner was forward Scott Huckaby, who started 17 contests. Teammate Nick Johnson played 19 games as a midfielder and contributed four points. Starting every game for 9-7-3 Southwestern University was midfielder John Martinez, who scored four points. Midfielder Sean Breitzman had seven starts for the 9-7-1 Lawrence team. 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ehind everything that makes you proud of Phi Delta Theta is strong leadership—leadership based upon our Cardinal Principles. The Fraternity and the Phi Delta Theta Educational Foundation are committed to developing strong leadership skills from the beginning of your membership. The Emerging Leaders Institute was created to meet that goal. By bringing together the up and coming freshman and sophomore leaders from our chapters across the United States and Canada, a Phi Delt learning laboratory will be created where you will be able to learn leadership skills from your peers and distinguished alumni.

The Emerging Leaders Institute is the equivalent of seminars costing in excess of \$1,000. Like all worthwhile colleges, we have admission requirements. To attend the Institute you must be:

- eager to learn and grow;
- committed to transferring the Fraternity not only, not less, but greater than it was transmitted to you;
- willing to model leadership in your activities as a Phi Delt. Modeling leadership includes refraining from the use of alcohol and drugs during the Institute.

We want to deliver value to your chapter through the individuals who attend the Emerging Leaders Institute. The Planning Committee is asking your chapter to send two young emerging leaders. An emerging leader is a freshman or sophomore brother or recent initiate with the future potential to hold a leadership position in the chapter or on campus.

Remember back to your Phikeia Manual and the section on famous Phis? Remember the gray-haired man with the flat, wide-brimmed hat, nattily dressed in a three-piece suit? That would be Frank Lloyd Wright, probably the most notable famous Phi in the field of architecture. And, if you were to look on the opposite page, you would see C.J. Silas, another famous Phi who was CEO and chairman of Phillips Petroleum and served on the Educational Foundation board of trustees. These two Phis' lives intersect on the corner of South Dewey Ave. and Sixth Street in Bartlesville, Oklahoma, where you'll find a copper-clad, angular building towering over the rolling hills of the area. We'll explain how this building connects these Phis Older Phis will remember Wright, who attended Wisconsin and was an engineering student there, as a flamboyant and daring architect, whose designs have inspired generations of buildings. He was even known to visit a Founders Day or two in his time. And, although this may be an "urban legend," the Arizona Beta chapter house was designed by his students or others associated with his firm. When the General Headquarters was built in 1948, some in the Fraternity wanted to approach Wright for a design, but eventually decided to build a structure that would complement the Georgian architecture of the Miami campus. Wright's architecture embodies his concept of "the total work of art" and used a rich organic geometric language that results in a cohesive, unified design that looks contemporary to this day. "I don't think it's unfair to say there is no American architect who has done as much to touch the world, who has done as much to realize his vision of what a perfect architecture might be than Frank Lloyd Wright," says William Čronon, a historian quoted in a recent PBS documentary on Wright's life. One building form that Wright generally isn't known for is the skyscraper. Although fascinated by this uniquely American building type, it conflicted with his belief that architecture must be close to nature. He solved this dilemma by using a tall form found in nature: the tree. "A tree is a vertical beam cantilevered out of the ground and to Wright, the cantilever is "the most romantic, most free, of all the principles of construction," writes Peter Blake in his book about Wright. The architect stewed on this concept for years, initially applying it to a design in 1929 for an apartment tówer for lower Manhattan. Plans called for a vertical service core (elevators and utilities) in the "trunk" of the building with floors cantilevered out from it. With the building's strength coming from the "trunk," exterior

walls could be open with expansive glass and metal. The tower was never built, but Wright went back to the design when Harold C. Price and his two sons, Joe and Harold C., Jr., owners of an oil pipeline company, visited him at Taliesin (his headquarters in Wisconsin) to explore designing a corporate headquarters.

The H.C. Price Company originally wanted a smaller building, with three or four floors of office space, according Prairie Skyscraper, a book about the tower. Wright convinced them to build a taller building that would incorporate the Price headquarters, offices for the Public Service Company of Oklahoma and luxury apartments

– a radical concept for the
area at the time. Wright told the Prices the building could be completed for nearly the same cost of the smaller headquarters (less than \$1 million). The building construction would eventually total more than \$2 million, very steep in 1953 dollars.

Wright's design for the tower was dazzling and revolutionary. Originally 16-stories, the architect told the Prices it "really needs to be higher" and eventually it grew to 19 stories, with a "television" spire tapering into the sky (the structure was never used for TV broadcasting, but a radio antenna was later added). From the outside, the building was a dazzling array of geometric shapes, windows and copper. On the inside, Wright's touch extended to every square foot. He designed light fixtures, furniture, picked colors, even specified triangular posts in the parking area.

Another perspective

Executive Vice President Emeritus Robert J. Miller's son, Robert Miller, Clemson, '76, is an architect, professor and director of the Clemson Architecture Center in Charleston. We asked him for his thoughts on the Price Tower from the perspective of a Phi and architect.

When I was in junior high and first fired by the prospects of architecture, my father checked out for me (from the Banta Library!) several books on Frank Lloyd Wright. To this day I remember unfolding an oversize drawing of Wright's design for a Mile-High (528-storey) skyscraper, a romantic and radical vision of 1956 that is linked chronologically to the Price Tower in Bartlesville, completed that same year.


The culmination of twenty five years of rumination (starting with proposals for the St. Mark's Tower in New York), the Price Tower brought Wright's organic philosophy of design to the vertical building: a deep central foundation (analogous to a taproot) anchored a central structural and service core (the trunk) from which floors were cantilevered (the branches). A light-weight and multifarious skin, different on every side yet synthetic as a whole, recalled the macroscopic harmony yet microscopic diversity of foliage.

Some time later my parents took me to visit Wright's only realized skyscraper on the flat plains of Oklahoma and, I confess, the building-in-person was much less arousing than had been the Mile-High fold-out! It was Wright's genius for composition, perhaps, that compels us still to refer to this mere nineteen-storey mirage on the sweltering plains a "skyscraper"! Like many great works of architecture, the Price Tower was better as an idea than a building.

Although the building never won Wright more influential commissions, the Price Tower was important. You didn't have to subscribe Wright's organic philosophy to appreciate the logic and merit of treating the various sides of a tall building as distinct design opportunities. The first two generations of tall buildings from the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries had featured (when they did) unique elevations for purely formal reasons; the third generation, cast in the International Style, were mostly uniform; but the Price Tower showed that environmental sensitivity, customary in low-rise buildings up to that point, could be applied with grace to their high-rise counterparts. Confronting differing solar conditions and wind loads as a function of orientation, Price Tower taught us that the four (or more) sides of a tall building should all be different!

Kevin Roche would adopt Wright's environmental sensitivity ten years later in his Knights of Columbus building (1965), though in a different stylistic tradition (and with far less elegance). It was Roche's precedent that inspired me, during my junior-year mandatory high-rise project (1974), to think critically for the first time about the design of tall buildings and that returned me to my earlier pilgrimage to Oklahoma. Only after having tried (without much success) to balance the complexity of an environmentally responsive tall building did I realize that the Price Tower was a masterpiece of artifice: it made a squatty building look tall, wrapped four very different facades into a single cohesive needle, and transformed a small office building on the plain that was Bartlesville into a manifesto of organic architecture.

Chairs, desks, even wastepaper cans also were specially designed to fit the angular shape of the office spaces in the building. At the center point of each floor was placed a medallion with a special Price Tower logo on it. Wright sought to "mediate" the interior and exterior with open walls and windows that allowed plenty of natural light and views of the Bartlesville countryside.

The H.C. Price Company and other tenants moved into the building with much fanfare in 1956. *BusinessWeek* called the building a bad investment and accused the Prices of victimizing their employees with an impractical building. Wright threatened to sue the publication. But, to the magazine's point, the building's elevators were slow, offices tended to be noisy, heating and cooling were challenging and windows leaked. But Joe Price and other executives later said the building provided a significant psychological boost to company employees, who felt a sense of pride walking into such a novel building each morning.

As for the apartments, while providing unique twofloor living quarters, relatively few were

rented. Potential tenants balked at the high price (\$285 a month for rent in 1956), small closets and unusual shape. And, when they did move in, they found furniture wouldn't fit on the hexagonally-shaped elevators (the first automatic elevators in Bartlesville) and had to be hauled up the exterior of the building. The kitchens, while well-appointed with modern appliances, were very small. Architect Bruce Goff (who introduced Wright to the Prices) lived and ran his studio in an apartment on floors 9 and 10. Another couple used an apartment as a radio studio for several years.

On April 9, 1959, just three years after the building opened, Wright died. The architect never lived to see his dream in use for many years, as the Price Company continued to use the building until the company was dissolved and the tower sold to the Phillips Petroleum Company in 1981. The Price Tower went on to win the American Institute of Architects Twenty-Five Year Award in 1983.

This is where C.J. "Pete" Silas, and his wife, Theo come in. As CEO of Phillips, he helped direct the company to give the Price Tower to the Price Tower Arts Center, which was formed In 1998 after the Bartlesville

Museum & Sculpture Garden was reorganized as the Price Tower Arts Center. The Center's first exhibition, appropriately enough, was called "The Tree that Escaped the Crowded Forest" and focused on Wright's work. Phillips paid to refurbish the exterior of the building in 2000. Price Tower Arts Center has restored the interiors and expanded the building's use to include the Inn at Price Tower and Copper Restaurant + Bar, designed by Wendy Evans Joseph.

"Without Pete and his wife, the Arts Center could not have developed as it has," wrote Richard P. Townsend, executive director and CEO, in the forward of *Prairie Skyscraper*.

Incidentally, Silas's philanthropy has extended to Phi Delta Theta. He has served on the Educational Foundation board of trustees and has long supported the organization's efforts. He was chairman of the Foundation's \$5 million "Living Bond" campaign and also was chairman of Georgia Tech's \$700 million capital campaign.

In recent years, the Price Tower has found a new use as a luxury hotel and bar. New-York-based architect Wendy Evans Joseph updated Wright's work to make apartments into hotel rooms. The building continues to be a destination for students of architecture and those interested in Wright's work. The presence of the Tower helped Bartlesville be named a "Distinctive Destination" for 2006 by the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

As the building celebrates its 50th year this year, its patrons are looking to expand. Awardwinning and internationally-renowned architect Zaha Hadid has been selected to expand the Price Tower Arts Center's museum space. Undoubtedly, new generations will be attracted to the Tower, which still looks contemporary at 50. For this, we can thank two famous Phis.

Virginia is a community
defined by tradition.
Since its founding
in 1819, U.Va. has
developed a complex
of traditions ranging
from formal attire
at football games
to a unique style of
language which labels
freshmen "first years"

and refers to the campus as "Grounds." Directly across from the historical Lawn, built by Thomas Jefferson, lies Rugby Road, a center of such traditions. Here, the vibrancy of Virginia's longstanding Greek community springs to life, mixing the traditional Jeffersonian architecture of the redbrick houses with the ceaseless activity of the student body. The Greek community, however, is far from perfect. In 2000,

the revocation of the charter of Phi Delta Theta's Virginia Beta chapter amply demonstrated the problems inherent in Greek life. The revocation also demonstrated that the University community was ready for an example of what a fraternity could aspire to become. General Headquarters, in conjunction with University administrators, conducted an extensive recruitment campaign, culminating in 2001 with the initiation of thirty-one men into The Bond of Phi Delta Theta with the explicit purpose of creating a perfect fraternity.

Over the past four years, the Virginia Beta Phis have come a long way towards that goal. The first problems of the rechartered chapter were naturally logistical, as Brothers worked to find some sort of housing and to reestablish the Fraternity's prominence on Grounds. This problem was complicated by the absence of a supportive alumni network. It was very shortly after the re-chartering, though, that Virginia Beta began to gain a

reputation as a new kind of fraternity at U.Va. This was in part due to the successes of individual Phis, some of whom have become leaders at every level of University life over the past five years. From traditional forms of involvement such as Student Council and the Class Councils to less institutional avenues of leadership like working for the enormous Pancakes for Parkinson's annual fundraiser or leading Alternative Spring Break trips to Ecuador, Phis have dedicated themselves to the U.Va. community and the larger world, demonstrating enormous abilities to lead, organize and execute.

Virginia Beta is focused now on its future. The first aspect of that future, of course, is membership, as the chapter remains determined to maintain the standards it applies during recruitment and to find men who are searching for the unique experience that Phi Delta Theta offers. Equally important is the chapter's continuing commitment to the brotherhood and the power of the bond that drew its constituent members together in the first place. This commitment is amply demonstrated by the continued involvement of the Virginia Beta alumni in chapter life, such as the recent establishment by the alumni of a House Corporation. Perhaps the most pressing goal of the chapter is housing. Though still renting a house in the aftermath of its re-chartering, Virginia Beta hopes to be able to purchase a chapter house in the near future, believing that owning its house would allow the chapter greater freedom to do simple things like house maintenance, while at the same time powerfully communicating that the chapter has truly reestablished itself. Most importantly, though, each brother of Virginia Beta is intent on holding fast to the principles of

JORDAN HAINES Kansas '49

Jordan Haines, a great Phi and longtime supporter of the Fraternity, died January 20.

Haines was a member of the Phi Delta Theta Educational Foundation board of trustees from 1998-2000. He also remained a loyal supporter of the chapter at KU and of the Fraternity's efforts in the region.

He was also devoted to his alma mater, University of Kansas, serving as chair and member of the board of regents, a member of the executive committee of the KU Endowment Association and as an interested Kansan. He served as director of the Campaign for Kansas fund drive for KU, which far surpassed its goal of \$120 million by raising \$285 million.

In business, Haines was a successful banker in the region as leader of the former Bank IV. Local newspaper articles heralded his ability to take the bank to the next level in deposits, loans and earnings.

Dolph C. Simons, Jr., a writer for the *Lawrence Journal-World* newspaper said Haines was a colorful figure, often letting university officials, politicians and newspaper writers know his opinions "in rather colorful language," Simmons wrote in an obituary. "He was unique in many ways and will be missed by many. Wichita, the state of Kansas, and Kansas University all are better today because of the interest, devotion and commitment of Haines." Phi Delta Theta is, as well.

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ROBERT MANLEY CINCINNATI '70

For many years, when universities tried to shut down chapters illegally or when chapters were in legal trouble, it was Bob Manley, the fraternity's lawyer, who came to their aid. Brother Manley died March 24 of a heart attack. He was 70.

Despite building a significant portion of his practice on defending Greek letter organizations, Manley was not a member of a fraternity until fairly recently, when he was initiated at University of Cincinnati (Ohio Theta) chapter during a Leadership College in Oxford. Brother Manley's firm represented a number of fraternities and sororities, and he was frequently called in as special counsel to advise and represent clients on the many issues that face fraternal organizations. He advised organizations on issues of policy, risk management, rights and, when necessary, litigation. Chapter officers and general officers of Phi Delta Theta are familiar with Fraternal Law, a publication that provided guidance on legal matters for Greeks.

Outside of the courtroom and office, Manley was a world traveler, hiking the Amazon rain forest, climbing mountains, exploring ruins or traveling to tiny islands near Africa. His downtown Cincinnati townhouse was filled with

artifacts from his journeys. But, no matter how far he went, he continued to be an advocate for his hometown. He considered himself a "Cincinnati nationalist" and promoted the area at every opportunity.

Known for his satirical wit and charm, he often commented on local issues in letters and newspaper columns. He was a defender of local property rights, crusading against eminent domain private property seizures.

"He was a giant," Cincinnati City Councilman Jim Tarbell said in the *Cincinnati Enquirer*. "He was in a class by himself."

"Brother Manley's contributions in defending Greek organizations are innumerable. His loss will be felt in Phi Delta Theta and throughout the Greek world," said Robert A. Biggs, Phi Delta Theta executive vice president. Biggs' comments were echoed in a statement from Chi Omega sorority. "Bob was a loyal friend and advisor. He cared deeply about Chi Omega. His wisdom and guidance will continue to resonate with our leaders. He will be missed by all," said Jean Mermoud Mrasek, national president.

Undergraduate Phis from across North America descended upon St. Louis in early January for two leadership events. The 7th annual Presidents Leadership Conference welcomed over 150 chapter presidents for an intensive three-day training period built around the theme "The Courage to Change." In a nearby hotel, Phi Delta Theta's first "Recruitment Boot Camp" with nearly 100 chapter recruitment chairmen was held.

Chapter presidents discussed and debated the importance of building relationships with their stakeholders such as the campus administration, the local community leaders, their alumni, and the General Headquarters. Large group sessions were also held on important issues such as risk management and how to run an effective chapter meeting. Several fellow undergraduate "peer mentors" provided brief talks about their own leadership experiences.

Brothers were assigned to small groups according to their chapter's demographics, and topics included: ritual, leadership, the chapter success model, minimum standards, hazing, goal setting and action plans.

Brother Sparky Reardon ensured the Brothers understood their role as chapter presidents when he spoke about having the courage to step-up and address their chapter's challenges head-on in his talk entitled, "Leadership – Presidents Can't Punt." The closing session came from the dynamic speaker, Will Keim. His topic was "Promoting the Development of Leadership through the Education of Character." Keim has spoken to more students on more campuses about actualizing peak performance and leadership than anyone in our nation. His wit, humor, and engaging stories about leadership received a standing ovation and closed out the Presidents Leadership Conference.

The undergraduate Brothers left St. Louis armed with new ideas and a renewed spirit to tackle the challenges they face on their individual campuses and within their own chapters. When asked what the most rewarding aspect of the Presidents Leadership Conference was, the undergraduate delegates provided these comments in the conference evaluations:

- "Revisiting the core values that make us who we are was extremely rewarding."
- "Meeting other Brothers from different schools and having the opportunity to speak to every General Council member in person."
- "Meeting presidents from chapters all over North America and knowing that we're all in the same boat

- ultimately; also being able to exchange ideas and learn from each other's mistakes and triumphs."
- "Getting feedback from all of the other presidents and seeing this organization as a whole. It is a lot different to see it than read about it or hear about it."
- "Interacting with other presidents, and networking with men to continue discussing matters away from PLC.
 The fact that I can continue growing, and gain skills to help my chapter, is the most meaningful part of the PLC experience."
- "Our chapter operates on quite a bit of tradition, and I was never taught that some of these traditions violate the order of the way things are to be done at this Fraternity. PLC was invaluable to me because it showed me where we were erring in our ways as a chapter and where I can improve the chapter itself to bring it back to the standards of Phi Delta Theta."

During Recruitment Boot Camp (RBC), chapter recruitment chairmen were asked to complete a self-evaluation on their recruitment program including their chapter's organizational abilities, recruitment skills, and motivation. The program provided discussions on how to align the Fraternity's values during recruitment activities and how to appropriately brand their home chapter during recruitment, both visually and thematically.

After three intense days, each attendee left RBC with a full-scale action plan on how to improve recruitment back at their home chapter. The action plans contained goals for the chapter to accomplish with the help of Chapter Advisory Boards, Province Presidents, Greek Officials, and the General Headquarters staff.

In order to assist the recruitment chairmen in taking these ideas home, they met with their respective chapter president on the last day of both conferences to share the plans and ideas that they gathered from the various speakers and breakout sessions. David Stollman, co-founder of CAMPUSPEAK and creator of the RBC program, presided over this joint session after heading up Recruitment Boot Camp.



A Profile in Giving ~ A Lifetime Commitment

Today, Jerry Felmley, Illinois '54, serves as chairman for a committee of Air Force Reservists that meets annually to select scholarship recipients from among the ranks of young men in the Air Force Reserves. He attributes his lifetime interest in scholarship to his involvement with this group and as a donor to the Phi Delta Theta Educational Foundation.

Jerry explains that his undergraduate fraternity experience had a "very positive influence in his life," and he emphasizes the long-term benefits of being a member of Phi Delta Theta. He clarifies, "it's not just a 4-year experience; it is an opportunity to be involved for life."



What makes him most proud to be a Phi? For Jerry it's the relationships that remain even today with about two dozen of the 88 men who were in the chapter with him. He recalls the close relationships they built while in the chapter and they still get together for football weekends. Members from Jerry's pledge class keep in close contact and every winter there are about 14 of them who get together for a mini-reunion in Tucson where Jerry resides.

Jerry credits the fraternity experience as being a place where young men can build relationships and learn discipline as they progress through their undergraduate years. He explains, "I attribute my success with interpersonal relationships to both my membership in Phi Delta Theta and my active duty in the Air Force. I was able to use the skills I learned in a very competitive business environment. You learn to easily recognize differences in others, how to approach negotiation, interview new employees, build cohesive and effective teams and still maintain good friendships."



Now that he has the financial means to comfortably give to the Foundation, Jerry does so by shifting his equity shares, which allows him to meet the giving level he desires to reach each year. He sees his financial gifts as an extension of his commitment to the organization—a demonstration of his love for the Fraternity. He explains that, "offering a helping hand to younger Phis through my donations to our Educational Foundation is the essence of the Phikeia Oath: 'I will strive in all ways to transmit to those who may follow after, not only not less, but greater than it was transmitted to me." And that, declares Jerry, "is my commitment—to continue to make the fraternity better than it was in 1950, 1995 and 2005, for those who will follow my path."

Jerry says his greatest satisfaction from contributing to the Educational Foundation comes in meeting undergraduates and alumni who have received Educational Foundation grants towards their academic goals. "I feel a direct relation to their success."

He's now "99% retired." After 27 years on active duty with the Air Force and then working in acquisition management and business consulting, Jerry now spends his time with the University of Arizona Phi Delta Theta chapter, the Tucson Alumni Club, and with his three daughters that reside across the U.S.

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

He is now back in the States working on his master's degree in public health, and he uses his experiences in Iraq to establish a rapport with patients. He now realizes what a valuable experience it has been.

Anyone who has been to a Phi Delt event recently knows Rudy as the witty and wry former Marine who has been a province president and General Council member for the past 10 years. Brother Porchivina is passionate about Phi Delta Theta's future, but he cautions there is much that needs to be done to make the Fraternity grow and prosper. The Scroll sat down with him to get a sense of what his plans for his two-year term are.





Scroll: You've seen Phi Delta Theta through a time of some significant changes, including alcohol-free housing and a renewed effort to combat hazing. What's next?

Porchivina: I'm not going to roll out a huge new initiative. Rather, I'm going to take what we've done and make sure it's working, whether it's alcohol-free housing, the insurance program or fighting hazing. I will tell you that I want to grow the Fraternity. We'll have 12 new chapters by the time I hand over the gavel in Scottsdale. There will be 540 new brothers in our midst. We'll increase our overall numbers by at least 10 percent, giving us more than 6500 undergraduate members.

Scroll: How do you plan to do that?

Porchivina: First, we're adding resources to the GHQ staff. We'll have more people who will be able to come to campus and help our undergraduates learn how to recruit new men to join us. Then, we'll continue to improve the marketing support offered to our members. The greatest service that the General Fraternity can provide to our undergraduates is powerful, compelling marketing support for our chapters' recruitment efforts. The headquarters can't show-up for rush and do the recruiting, but we can make sure that our members have the best tools available.

The young men that we are recruiting today don't make a move without Googling it first, but the vast majority of our chapter websites are out of date, poorly designed and generally neglected. It's the digital equivalent of throwing your trash on the front lawn...

The last General Council made marketing communications support for our chapters a priority by hiring a staff person to focus exclusively on how we present ourselves to the outside world. The next step in that effort will be to provide web design and hosting services that will enable our chapters to maintain their websites without having to recruit a computer science major in each pledge class.

Phi Delta Theta is the greatest college fraternity in the world, and we ARE going to look like it on the Web.

Scroll: What about our alumni?

Porchivina: Our alumni are clearly our greatest resource. We need to get them reconnected to each other and the undergraduate chapter. I want to see more robust Chapter Advisory Boards made up of alumni and friends. Chapters who have these kinds of boards already in place are, without exception, our finest groups. We've hired a full-time staff member to help cultivate alumni support from the Headquarters. I have a goal of establishing a dozen or more new alumni clubs this biennium. We're going to honor

the Founder demand that Phi Delta Theta is more than a mere campus interlude. In two years we WILL be a stronger Fraternity for life.

Scroll: How can our members help you accomplish your objectives?

Porchivina: The work of the General Council, the GHQ staff and the General Officers is meaningless without the real power of Phi Delta Theta – the Brothers themselves. And so I charge each Brother reading this: Over the next two years, find your own way to honor those who came before us. That means:

If you are an undergraduate, honor the Founders by tackling the things that have kept your chapter from being the best it can be – hazing, substance abuse, apathy – go and remake your chapter into a place the Founders would be proud of...

If you are an alumnus, honor the founders by returning starting or revitalizing a local alumni club - you don't have to start with monthly luncheons - how about getting two friends to help you plan a Founders Day or a golf

Scroll: You often refer to the Immortal Six. What do you say to the member who asks if their messages are relevant today?

Porchivina: Make no mistake, the founders lived in different times. They were on a tiny campus with 100 male undergraduates. They learned by lecture and recitation. They had no TV. No electricity. No X-Box or i-pod. No toilet paper, even. Yet this is the very reason, I believe, that The Bond was so perfectly written. And, remember, that's all they left us. No GHQ building, no scholarship fund, no chapter house. They left us more questions than answers. And. I believe they are asking us:

What impact will we have on the young men in our chapters?

Will we cave-in to the pressures of popular culture and allow our Fraternity to be just another drinking club?

Or will we demand that all of us live-up to the principles outlined in The Bond?

We will answer those questions in the next two years, and beyond.

In my mind, Phi Delta Theta is exactly what it was 158 years ago: We are the spirit of six men - young, homesick, mischievous men, who understood the nature of men better than college administrators, better than Freud, better than they knew themselves individually.







FRANCIS D. LYON SCHOLARSHIPS GO TO TWO GRADUATE SCHOOL FILM STUDENTS

The judges for the Francis D. Lyon Scholarships for students of film making have again this year selected two graduate students to receive the awards. Chishan Lin is a graduate student seeking an M.F.A. in Film Directing at the UCLA School of Film and Television. Miss Lin has earned a 3,94 GPA, She received the first place award of \$3,000. Gregg F. Helvey received the \$1,500 second place award. He has earned a 3.82 GPA working toward an M.F.A. in Film Production at The University of Southern California.

We are pleased to report that we had more applicants this year – 50 – than we have had in any single year since 1997, the year we presented the first Lyon Scholarship. For the first time this year, we gave applicants the opportunity to include a sample of their work in their application packet. Many of the 50 sent videos, DVDs, still photographs and writing samples. The samples were copied and distributed to each judge.

Chishan Lin graduated with Honors in 1998 from the University of California Berkeley with a degree in American Studies. She writes about studying the arts at Berkeley. "Although I was immersed in the world of art, I did not know if it was something that I could commit to. It seemed both impractical and idealistic, a terrible combination for making a living." After a personal transformation in her way of thinking about the arts and then doing graduate work in film making, her views have changed. "I find filmmaking motivational and inspirational. It makes me feel like a greater human being... Ultimately, my goal in filmmaking is simple – to create something greater than myself, something closer to the truth."

Gregg Helvey graduated from the University of Virginia in 2001 with a double major - English language and literature and French language and literature. Now in his third year of graduate school. he states, "I want to make films that matter... I am passionate about telling stories that are pertinent... Whether it is documentary or fiction, the power of story, music and photography synergistically unite to do amazing things in film. I chose USC's graduate program so I could become the strongest writer and director possible." Speaking of his financial situation, he wrote, "For me, like many students, going to school means going into debt. Six figures are a huge incentive to get the most out of my education and quickly repay my debts through quality work." This year's Lyon Scholarships were judged by a panel of four. The four were David S. Hartstein, Emory '00. William R. "Rusty" Richardson, Tampa '80, Dr. Scott D. Goldsleger, Emory '98, and Carmalieta Dellinger Jenkins who served as chairman. Many thanks for their service to the Educational Foundation.

Francis D. "Pete" Lyon, UCLA '28, was a distinguished director, producer and editor of motion pictures and television. He won 1947's Academy Award for Best Film Editing for Body and Soul. Just weeks before his death in 1996, Brother Lyon endowed the scholarships in his name for students of film. At his direction, they are available to Phis and to non Phis, to men and to women, to undergraduates and to graduate students. The recipients must be talented, and they must share Pete's passion for making films.

Basketball

Starting 21 contests for **Pennsylvania** was guard David Whitehurst, who played 765 minutes for the Quakers. He had 35 steals, made 63 assists and scored 167 points, a 5.8 per game average. Earning All-American Southwest Conference honorable mention for **Schreiner** was forward Lance Hrncir, who led the team with 39 three-point goals; ranked second with 733 minutes played; and was third in scoring with 244 points (10.2 average). He also pulled down 105 rebounds (4.4) and had 25 steals.

Leading 18-9 **Ohio Wesleyan** were six Phis. Named to the College Division Academic All-American second team was forward Andy Warnock, who was an All-North Coast Athletic Conference second teamer. He scored 303 points (11.2) and led in three-pointers (50) and free throw shooting (82.5%). Andy was NCAC Player of the Week after scoring 27 points versus Wooster. All-NCAC first team center Ben Chojnacki led in scoring (344 points, 12.7); rebounding (155, 5.7); minutes (677); and blocks (46) while ranking second in assists (51) and steals (33). Guard Ross Rybarczyk led with 106 assists and 35 steals. Also playing for OWU were Ryan Rozak, Elliot Kaple and Dan Dyer.

Three Phis were regulars for the 16-10 **Gettysburg** squad. Guard Mike Spadafora was on the All-Centennial Conference second team and the NABC Honors Court for excellence in academics. He led in minutes played (868), scoring (350 points, 13.4), steals (54) and three point goals (44). Mike was also second in rebounding (108, 4.2). Forward Eric Fromm gained All-Centennial honorable mention and was top rebounder (120, 4.8) and field goal shooter (57.0%). He also was second with 315 points (12.6). Forward Todd Brady scored 193 points (7.4); grabbed 89 rebounds (3.4) and had 52 assists.

Top scorer for **Southwestern** University was All-Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference second team forward Robert Cates, who had 384 points (14.8). He also led in rebounds (166, 6.4); field goal shooting (67.4%) and blocks (15). Among his best games were 25 points, six rebounds against Austin College and 23 points, nine rebounds versus University of the South. Guard Kyle Medeiros led 16-10 Wabash in scoring with 299 points (11.5). He also led with 49 assists and was second in steals with 36. Hanover guard Clint Parker led in free throw shooting (85.7%) and three-pointers (50), while scoring 268 points (10.3). He added 49 assists and 26 steals. His top game was 25 points versus Maryville.

Guard Josh Walker of 23-5 **Puget Sound** was second in field goal shooting (50.4%). He scored 218 points (7.8); grabbed 105 rebounds (3.8); had 50 assists; and made 48 steals. Teammate Jeff Walker played 27 games at guard.





Baseball

Eight Phis were key players for **Davidson**. Also on the SoCon All-Academic team was pitcher Michael Kaufman, who won two games and struck out 27 batters. Third baseman Alden Crissey, second with a .332 average (67 of 202), scored 31 runs and had 16 doubles, seven homers and 44 RBI. Outfielder Hugh Eden hit .307 (42 of 137) with 22 runs scored. Other contributors were catcher Dan Obermeier (.289 average, two homers); outfielder Chase Fitzpatrick, pitcher Brian Packey and infielder Graham Chapman.

Infielder Tommy Cable earned All-ASC honorable

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mention for **Schreiner** after batting .279 (29 of 104) with 21 runs scored, eight doubles, three homers and 17 RBI. Teammate Cody Sobolak pitched in eight games with a 1-0 record and 4.30 ERA. Pitcher A.J. Eppler led **Northwood** with 45.1 innings pitched and teammate Roy Reynolds also saw mound duty. Outfielder Justin Benson was a solid hitter for **Washington & Jefferson**, batting .347 (34 of 98) with 24 runs and 21 RBI. Anthony Martinez of **Oregon Tech** had a 2-0 record and 1.66 ERA in 13 games. Outfielder Jimmy McNamara was a .250 hitter in 22 games for **Gettysburg**.

Ranked 21st in NCAA Division III batting was **Chicago** catcher Scott Hofer, who hit .448 (47 of 105). He drove in 23 runs and scored 20 runs. Teammate Payton Leonhardt pitched in eight games. Three Phis played for **Wabash**. Outfielder David Culp led with 28 runs scored and batted .264 (33 of 125). First sacker Shaun Rico batted .256 (22 of 86) with three homers and pitcher Nick Rico was 1-0 in seven games. Playing for **McDaniel** were catcher-outfielder Steve Jordan, pitcher Jarrett Smith and catcher Adam Pelta. Helping 34-7 **Washington-St. Louis** were outfielder Bobby Hoernschmeyer and catcher Mike Hereld.

Six Phis saw action for the 19-19 **Hanover** squad. Pitcheroutfielder Joe Cravens was on the All-Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference first team after hitting .345 (33 of 110) with 21 RBI. On the mound, he had a 7-4 record (including a one hitter versus Blufton) and 3.58 ERA. Also earning All-HCAC first team selection was pitcher-outfielder Dan Gillin, who hit .338 with team highs in doubles (13), homers (five) and RBI (31). As a hurler, he had a team-best 2.56 ERA and 5-3 record. Batting .292 (21 of 72) was first baseman Lewis Johnson while catcher-outfielder Mike Fox played in 14 games. Track & Field

David Whitehurst of **Pennsylvania** earned All-East second team honors with a second place finish in the 110 meter hurdles (14.12) at the IC4A meet. He won the event at the Ivy League Heptagonals and also ran on the sprint medley relay at the Penn Relays. Three Phis were key athletes for **Wichita** State. At the Missouri Valley Conference indoor meet, Luther Wilson placed third in the 60 meter hurdles (8.17) and also ran the 200 meter dash in 23.15. Outdoors, he had a best 110 meter hurdles time of 15.05 and a best of 55.24 at 400 meters. Jordan Kitchen's best times were 10.17 for 100 meters and 22.34 at 200 meters. He also ran on the school's 400 meter relay. At the Emporia Relays, Brandon Chapman won the triple jump (50'1.25") and placed second in the long jump (23'2"). Winning his first PGA Tour victory on July 2nd was J.J. Henry, TCU '98. In winning the Buick Championship in Cromwell, Conn. by three strokes, he took home \$792,000, his biggest paycheck since joining the PGA Tour in 2000. A native of Fairfield, Conn., he became the first Connecticut native to win the 55-year old tournament. The victory also clinched a spot for him in the British Open and moved him from 26th to sixth place in Ryder Cup points.





Past presidents of the General Council were introduced and current GC President Michael Scarlatelli presented his "farewell address" to the Convention. Delegates and guests heard from University of Nebraska President (and Phi) J.B. Milliken who discussed higher education in the new "flat" world described by author and columnist Thomas L. Friedman.

The Convention also heard a very encouraging report from the Educational Foundation, which reported that its new campaign is off to an impressive start, having raised \$3.5 million.

For those coming to Kansas City with a taste for the city's famous barbeque, famous Phi Dr. Richard E. Davis, Washburn '47, was on hand to be honored as the Nance-Millett Free Enterprise Award winner. Davis was a child psychologist in the late '70s when he tinkered with and introduced his sauce, originally called "K.C. Soul Style Barbeque Sauce." The sauce, which originally started with only five ingredients, sold more than 3,000 cases. Davis renamed it to KC Masterpiece (at the same time he also test marketed Muschup (a combination of ketchup and mustard). He sold the company in 1986, but retained the right to use the sauce at KC-Area restaurants he owned. Currently, it's the No. 1 selling premium barbeque sauce in the country.

Legislative matters

The Convention voted on several Code changes, including a provision to change the province president duties to include more cultivation of alumni volunteers, allow for a voice vote for General Council president if there is only one candidate and voted to raise active member dues from \$75 to \$90. This increase was offset by a recent drop in insurance dues.

The General Council election was unusual this year in that there were four candidates for four open seats. So, the election results did not contain the excitement of the multiple ballots cast in California. Elected to the Council were Mark Oschenbein, Scott Mietchen, Chris Lapple and, new member Rich Fabritius, Kent State '94.















Award winners

Throughout Convention, many chapters, alumni and individuals were recognized for awards. At the close of the weekend, two brothers were specifically recognized for their lifelong commitment to Phi Delta Theta by receiving the Legion of Honor award. The first honoree was former General Council President Dr. Robert B. Deloian. During Deloian's tenure, the Fraternity decided to move toward alcohol-free housing. Although a controversial move to some at the time, Deloian's tireless efforts speaking to Phi Delts and other fraternities and sororities helped pave the way for Phi Delta Theta to be a leader among the Greek community. Deloian, who emceed

the closing banquet, was completely surprised by the honor. Earlier in the evening, he entertained the crowd by showing slides of baby photos of former GC presidents.

Also honored was Executive Vice President Robert A. Biggs. Brother Biggs has worked for Phi Delta Theta since graduation and has served as a traveling consultant and director of chapter services. During his tenure as EVP, he has organized countless conventions, conferences and meetings. He's worked with scores of staff members and volunteers and continues to shepherd the Fraternity and its volunteers. To quote one of the honorees, "at-a-boy" to both Bob Deloian and Bob Biggs.

Indiana Alpha

After a two year absence, Phi Delta Theta makes its return to Indiana Alpha this fall. Alumni-Driven Recruitment Efforts

Our alumni-driven recruitment protocol will be "test-driven" this fall at the University of Texas - Arlington. The prerequisites for this model include: 1) Phi Delta Theta has been on campus before, 2) A group of at least 20 alumni are willing to form a "Phi Development Team" (which transitions into a House Corporation and Chapter Advisory Board, 3) The chapter has been closed for four or more years (unless the University has agreed upon an earlier return), 4) The University supports our return, and 5) The General Council and Survey Commission approves the campus. The Phi Development team is trained by the expansion team to perform similar actions taken on a staff-driven "cold start" project. This protocol allows those closed chapters with outstanding alumni support to work hand in hand to bring their chapter back sooner.

THOMAS BARNUM

Former president of Sara Lee Corporation's food business and chairman of the board of Citicorp Services Tom Barnum died April 27 in Chicago. He was 66.

ROBERT LOUIS ELORTEGUI IACKSONVILLE, 2001

On the night of Saturday, September 25, 2005 at 2250hrs the brothers of Phi Delta Theta Florida Zeta Chapter, a family, friends and a nation lost a brother, son, friend and fiancé. Lt. Robert Luis Elortegui was a pilot for HSL-44, the "Swamp Foxes", a helicopter squadron tasked with Anti-Submarine Warfare. He was based at NS Mayport in Jacksonville Florida.

He was conducting deck landing qualifications off the coast of North Carolina as part of the Nassau Expeditionary Strike Group when all communication was lost with his SH-60 Seahawk helicopter. Rob was a high intensity, motivated, charismatic man with a big heart. He loved his country, his fraternity, his family and his job as a naval aviator.

Rob lived by a quote that has inspired others including brothers that never met him. "Adversity causes some men to break....others to break records." Rob, like his best friend Nate Hemphill, wanted to be a SEAL. When he wasn't accepted into the program he didn't get down on himself, he knew he was a part of a bigger plan. Following the quote he lived by, he decided if he wasn't going to be a SEAL, he was going to be the best damn pilot in the Navy. That is how he lived.

When he died, we celebrated his life as well as mourned his death, but the way he lived every second of his life has inspired many of us to live our lives better. At Founder's Day this year, the brothers of Phi Delta Theta, FL Zeta created a new award. The Robert Luis Elortegui Adversity Award is an annual award that goes to the brother who slapped adversity and hardship in the face, refused to go down, and has strived in all ways, to be better.

H. WILLIAM KIRSCHNER WASHINGTON, '39

The founder of K2 Skis, one of the largest ski manufacturers in the country, died April 22nd in Seattle, Washington. He was 87.


He started the business in a metal shed and grew it into a national icon. K2 skis, the first commercially viable fiberglass skis, were ridden to victory by ski champions and Olympic athletes, He began work with fiberglass in his grandfather's garage making animal cages out of plastic. This gave him the idea to develop a fiberglass ski, although early models "peeled like bananas" as soon as they hit the cold. He developed a way to form the fiberglass to allow it to run in the cold. The company was sold in 1970, but Kirschner and a group of investors bought it back in 1976. He served as chairman until retirement in 1982.

He was a man who did business with a smile and a handshake, yet known for his honesty and warmth, reported the Seattle Times in his obituary. Barbara, his wife of 66 years (they met at the chapter house) said the secret to their long marriage was that she "bossed him a lot and he turned a deaf ear, and we got along fine."

He was inducted into the U.S. National Ski Hall of Fame.

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PHIL WALDEN MERCER '62

If you've ever enjoyed listening to the Allman Brothers or Otis Redding, you have famous Phi Phil Walden to thank. The Mercer graduate and founder of Capricorn Records died of cancer April 23.

Walden was a visionary in the music industry, and known as the father of "Southern rock." During the 1970s, he helped boost the campaign of upstart Democrat presidential candidate Jimmy Carter with financial backing and benefit shows by Capricorn artists. His music career started at Mercer, booking bands for high school and Fraternity events.

"He was one of the cats. Loose and fun, not stiff like the few other record company people I had met." Chuck Leavell, a keyboardist with the Rolling Stones, wrote about Walden in the Atlanta Journal-Constitution.

He addressed the Atlanta Alumni Club on several occasions, often giving a compelling talk about battling alcohol and other personal demons. He was a big supporter of Phi Delta Theta's move to alcohol-free housing in 2000.

"I will remember a true and loyal friend I will miss beyond words. He was an inspirer, a motivator, a leader, a man of imagination and a man with an ear for music," wrote Leavell. "He was a resilient man who never gave up, he was a fighter to the end."



Foundation Establishes Scholarship/Fellowship Fund in Memory of Jordan L. Haines

Jordan Haines was surely one of Phi Delta Theta's most loyal – and some say most colorful – members. He was truly a giant, in every sense of the word. Brother Haines was a pioneering banker in the State of Kansas and was the longtime chairman of the Fourth National Bank and Bank IV. Jordan was a member of the Phi Delta Theta Educational Foundation Board of Trustees from 1998-2000. He was devoted to his a'ma mater, the University of Kansas. He served as chair and a member of its Board of Regents and a member of the Executive Committee of the KU Endowment Association.

Shortly after he died in January of 2006, his friends and members of his family stepped forward saying they'd like to establish a fund within the Phi Delta Theta Educational Foundation to award scholarships and fellowships in Jordan's name. In just a few months they had raised more than \$100,000 to establish the fund. The first grants will be awarded for the 2007-2008 academic year.

Haines graduated from the University of Kansas in 1949. He was both a rabid Jayhawk fan and a loyal member of Kansas Alpha chapter throughout his life. The scholarships and fellowships generated by the Jordan L. Haines Fund are meant to encourage and recognize undergraduate and alumni leaders and scholars from his Kansas Alpha chapter.





Three Phi Delts have been active in the National Football League this season. Wide receiver Wes Welker, Texas Tech '04, is with the Miami Dolphins again as a leading pass catcher and punt


Baseball

In 68 contests, he had a 6–6 record, nine saves and 4,36 earned run average. After a good first half, Houston Astros third baseman Morgan Ensberg, Southern California '98, finished with a .235 average, 23 home runs and 58 RBI in 127 games. Jim Bowden, Rollins '83, completed his third season as general manager of the Washington Nationals.

After serving the New York Mets as a special assistant to the general manager in 2006, Scott Nethery, Texas Tech '82, was named assistant general manager and director of pro scouting for the Cincinnati Reds in late October. Catcher Olin Wick, Puget Sound '04, reached Double-A with the West Tennessee Diamond Jaxx of the Southern League and also played for two Class A Cubs farm teams. Infielder Greg Isaacson, Washington '05, batted .274 in 94 games for the Gateway Grizzlies of the Frontier League.

Golf

Completing his best season on the PGA Tour was J.J. Henry, TCU '98, who ranked 29th among money winners with earnings of \$2,301,480.00. He now has a career total of \$6,403,584.00 over 188 tournaments played. Dan Forsman, Arizona '81 played in 15 events in 2006 and finished with earnings of \$117,126.00. He has now won \$8,333,355.00 over his career. Matt Gogel, Kansas '93 ended the year with \$106,230.00 over 14 tournaments, running his career earnings to \$4,596,216.00. His best 2006 finish was a sixth place tie at the British Columbia Open. Charles Goody, TCU '60 played just two events on the Champions Tour but ran his career earnings to \$4,026,901.00.



Braves' Smoltz Wins Lou Gehrig Award

Winner of the Lou Gehrig Award is John Smoltz, All-Star pitcher for the Atlanta Braves. "John Smoltz is the perfect recipient for this year's Lou Gehrig Award," says Sean Wagner, spokesman for the Lou Gehrig Memorial Award Committee. "He and his wife, Dyan, are an integral part of their community. Their commitment to giving is extraordinary, both in personal time and financial resources.'

The award is presented annually by Phi Delta Theta to the Major League Baseball player who best exemplifies the giving character of Hall of Famer Lou Gehrig, who was a member of the Fraternity's Columbia University chapter. The award was first presented in 1955 and is permanently maintained at the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum in Cooperstown, New York.

Representatives of Phi Delta Theta and the Lou Gehrig Memorial Award Committee presented the award during pre-game ceremonies at Turner Field on Friday, September 15, 2006.

John Smoltz was an All-State baseball and basketball player at Waverly High School in Lansing, Mich. before the Detroit Tigers drafted him in the 1985 amateur draft. He developed in the Detroit farm system until August 1987 when he was traded to the Atlanta Braves. He made his Major League debut on July 23, 1988 and made twelve starts that season. He hurled a complete game shutout against the Pittsburgh Pirates in the seventh game of the 1991

National League Championship Series, propelling the Atlanta braves to their first World Series ever.

On the field, Smoltz has developed to be dominant as both a starter and a closer. In three full-seasons as a closer (2003-2004), he had 55, 45 and 44 saves, and in 2004 he posted a 1.12 ERA. As a starter he has had 11 seasons with 10 or more victories, including going 24-8 in 1996 and 17-3 in 1998. During 13 post-

seasons, he has accumulated a 15-4 record with 4 saves and a 2.65 ERA. He has also appeared in 6 All-Star contests. Smoltz won the Cy Young Award in 1996 and the Silver Slugger Award in 1997.

Smoltz and his wife, Dyan, have created The John and Dyan Smoltz Foundation, with the primary pursuit being quality education. During his recovery from surgery in 2000, Smoltz dedicated himself to the development of a new Christian school in the metropolitan Atlanta region. The foundation has donated over one million dollars to Kings Ridge Christian School in Alpharetta, GA. Smoltz has also personally raised more than \$4 million for the school. He began a relationship with the Atlanta Community Food Bank in 1992 and the "John Smoltz Golf Tourney" benefits Atlanta's Table, a Food Bank project that rescues prepared perishable foods from the local hospitality industry and distributes it to local nonprofit hunger-relief agencies. Another Food Bank project was initially called "Strike Out Hunger," then renamed "Close Out Hunger," and then renamed back to its original name. The campaign annually raises thousands of dollars and thousands of pounds of food. Since 2001, Smoltz has supported Thanksgiving Dish, an annual event where local reporters, Food

Bank staff and professional athletes join forces to cook prepared dishes that benefit local nonprofit hunger-relief agencies. Additionally, Smoltz has helped cook more than 6,000 meals to feed the area's hungry.

Smoltz hosts his annual "John Smoltz Celebrity Pro-AM Golf Tournament" and its proceeds benefit Children's Healthcare of Atlanta. Each year, he purchases 25 season tickets as part of a program that donates passes to fans that might not otherwise be able to attend a baseball game. He also supports The Alpharetta Police Athletic League (PAL). Not forgetting his hometown, Smoltz has lent his name to the Capital Area Youth Sports Association (CAYSA) of Lansing, Michigan for their primary tournament. In 2004, CAYSA honored him with their Distinguished Alumni Award. The Braves have honored Smoltz by presenting him with the Roberto Clemente Award for community service and the Braves Chairman's Award, which is presented to the Braves player who has exhibited exemplary community service.

Smoltz is the fifth member of the Braves franchise to receive the Lou Gehrig Memorial Award, joining Warren Spahn (1961), Hank Aaron (1970), Phil Niekro (1979), and **Dale Murphy** (1985).

Expansion

Colonizations

Indiana Delta (Franklin College): Phi Delta Theta returned to Franklin's campus on October 14 amidst the College's Homecoming celebrations. Close to 75 students, alumni, administrators, family, and friends were in attendance to see the colonization take place at the chapter house. Indiana Delta

is home to many famous Phi Delts: George Banta (Second Founding Father), Terry Hoeppner (Head Football Coach-Indiana University), and Roger Branigin (Former Governor of the State of Indiana).



Indiana Alpha (Indiana University): The Indiana Alpha chapter of Phi Delta Theta became the Fraternity's second chapter in 1849. After a brief absence from campus, Phi Delta Theta re-colonized on October 15 following a staff-driven recruitment effort. The colonization ceremony took place at

Indiana University's famous Memorial Union. The colony will be working to achieve three main goals: To once again become a chapter of Phi Delta Theta, to reoccupy its castle-like



chapter house, and to bring back the Phi Delt Bike Team that participates in Indiana University's annual Little 500 race.

Ohio Alpha (Miami University): Phi Delta Theta returned to its birthplace on Saturday, October 28. After a staff-driven recruitment effort, Phi Delta Theta hosted the colonization ceremony at the General Headquarters in Oxford. The colony members, who are all upperclassmen, will continue to recruit



throughout the fall while working to recruit a freshman class this Spring. Big plans have been made to renovate the chapter house as the colony works towards becoming a chapter. The Ohio Alpha chapter boasts

such famous alumni as: Benjamin Harrison (23rd U.S. President), Weeb Ewbank (NFL Hall of Fame Coach), and John Smale (Former Chairman of Proctor & Gamble and General Motors).

Installations

Texas Tau (The University of Texas at El Paso): The initiation and installation ceremonies of the Texas Tau chapter at UTEP took place on November 10–11 respectively. The chapter at UTEP became Phi Delta Theta's 14th active chapter in the state of Texas, and became the Fraternity's second Tau chapter

(California). General Council Member-at-Large, Chris Lapple, presided over the weekend's activities alongside Province President, John Jones, GHQ staff members,



local alumni volunteers, and undergraduates from the Arizona Gamma chapter at Northern Arizona University. Dr. Diana Natalicio, President of UTEP, Dr. Richard Padilla, VP of Student Affairs, and Amy Maczko, Greek Advisor all attended the installation luncheon and addressed those in attendance.

Pennsylvania Iota (The University of Pittsburgh): The Pennsylvania Iota chapter at Pitt was first installed on January 2, 1918. After being absent from campus for nearly a decade, an interest group emerged on campus and quickly led Phi Delta Theta to success. General Council Reporter, Scott Mietchen, presided over the weekend's ceremonies alongside Province President, Chris Brussalis, Pittsburgh Alumni Club President, Dan DiMarco, GHQ staff members, local alumni volunteers, and undergraduates from Clarion University (Pa. Xi), Robert Morris University (Pa. Pi), and West Virginia University (W.Va. Alpha). Greg Dell'Omo, President of Robert Morris University and father of chapter President Nick Dell'Omo, was initiated with

the rest of the brothers. The initiation of the Phi Delta Theta's newest members took place at the world-renowned Cathedral of Learning on Pittsburgh's campus.



How Phi Delta Theta expands

- Have you ever wondered how new colonies of Phi Delta Theta develop?
- Do you constantly wonder when your chapter is going be back on campus?
- If so, the following information will help explain the protocols Phi Delta Theta's expansion program uses to establish new colonies.

Cold Start Expansion Projects

Phi Delta Theta's expansion program schedules three to five "cold start" expansion projects each year. "Cold start" projects are scheduled at campuses where we have previously been or at new campuses that our Survey Commission deems ideal. For those projects that involve a return to campus, the expansion team collaborates with that chapter's alumni to create a Chapter Advisory Board, House Corporation Board (if applicable), and a recruitment strategy. A month-long period of the school year is then allocated for the Fraternity's expansion consultants to begin recruiting on campus. During the month, the expansion consultants execute a marketing/advertising campaign, make presentations to student organizations and sororities, meet and begin forming relationships with key leaders and personnel on campus, host large group recruitment events, conduct oneon-one meetings and interviews with potential members, plan a colonization ceremony, and facilitate the colony's first goalsetting retreat, executive meeting, and colony meeting. The goal is for the expansion "cold start" calendar to be planned and kept full for three years into the future.

Many times, a group of college men will contact the Fraternity about their desire to start a chapter of Phi Delta Theta. Interest groups form at both campuses where we have previously been and new campuses. In most cases, an interest group is led by a legacy of Phi Delta Theta or a friend of a Phi Delt. These campuses are generally not on the expansion calendar, but the formation of an interest group expedites the process of waiting in line on the "cold start" calendar. An effort is being made to seek referrals of student-leaders on campuses where Phi Delta Theta is not present, who may have the desire and initiative to start a chapter. Once an interest group forms, the expansion team makes a visit to that campus to meet the interested group of students. If the character of the group is one that our General Council and Survey Commission finds attractive, the expansion teams moves forward in the development of a new colony.

Alumni-driven recruitment efforts

The prerequisites for this model include:

- 1. Phi Delta Theta has been on campus before,
- A group of at least 20 alumni are willing to form a "Phi Development Team" (which transitions into a House Corporation and Chapter Advisory Board,
- 3. The chapter has been closed for four or more years (unless the University has agreed upon an earlier return),
- 4. The University supports our return, and
- 5. The General Council and Survey Commission approve the campus. The Phi Development team is trained by GHQ staff members to perform similar actions taken on a staff-driven "cold start" project. This protocol allows those closed chapters with outstanding alumni support to work hand in hand to bring their chapter back sooner.

Merging local fraternities into colonies of Phi Delta Theta

Throughout Phi Delta Theta's history, the Fraternity has periodically transitioned local fraternities into colonies of Phi Delta Theta. Generally, local fraternities come to us desiring the benefits of being associated with an International Fraternity. In these cases, an in-depth evaluation of the local fraternity is made by the GHQ staff. With the support of the General Council and Survey Commission, a decision is made whether or not the group would be a positive asset to Phi Delta Theta. If so, an extensive educational plan is carried out by the expansion team to create a smooth operational transition.

Scholarship-driven recruitment efforts

The presence of scholarships on a local level or the allocation of funds to go towards a scholarship creates a useful resource for the recruitment efforts on a specific campus. If this situation presents itself, scholarship applications are sent to targeted students on that campus. The completed applications create a pool of students to recruit. Once this pool of students is created, the expansion team and local alumni work to present both the scholarship(s) and the Fraternity to these students. Those students who are interested in starting a chapter begin working towards colonization.

Oklahoma Chapter

OU Alpha House Refurbishment Project

The Oklahoma Alpha chapter of Phi Delta Theta Fraternity has a long and distinguished history on the University of Oklahoma campus, dating back to 1918. This includes many outstanding awards including the Harvard Trophy

in 1957. The chapter was off campus during a brief period in the 1990s and returned to campus in 2000. In six short years, the chapter ranks have grown to



over 75 members and 48 phikeias. The chapter was recognized as a Harvard Trophy Honorable Mention chapter at the 2006 Biennial Convention held in Kansas City. The chapter was also the recipient of the coveted President's Trophy presented by OU President David Boren to the most outstanding organization on the OU campus in 2005.

The Oklahoma Alpha house was designed by architect Frank Lubbock Davies, Jr., Oklahoma Alpha '46, in the late 1950s. The chapter house has always had the reputation of being one of the most attractive houses on campus. Since returning to campus, the Oklahoma Alpha chapter has worked to restore the



house to its past glory without incurring needless debt. The house had been leased to another Greek organization that destroyed key elements of the house. Furniture was brought in from garage sales and other random sources strictly for utilitarian purposes. Slowly the chapter has attempted to repair damage as funds allowed. This has been accomplished through a partnership with the chapter, led by President Eric Walker, and the

University of Oklahoma Phi Delta Theta Parents Association that has provided manpower and money to make needed repairs. This past spring, parent volunteers offered to spearhead an effort to redecorate the main rooms of the house. ASID Designer Sally Heard Davies, an alumna of the University of Oklahoma and wife of Oklahoma Alpha alumnus Buck Davies, was selected to formulate an interior design concept for the house. Her ties to the origins of the chapter house are even deeper than imagined as Buck's father is Frank L. Davies, the original architect. Mrs. Davies had experience with the redecoration of other Greek houses in Oklahoma. Thus, the chapter and Parents Association embarked on a project to refurbish the Oklahoma Alpha chapter house.

A fund raising event held during the chapter's Moms' Weekend in March of 2006 netted the majority of funds raised. Parents of chapter members enthusiastically endorsed the project and contributed generously at this event. Several alumni of the Oklahoma Alpha pledge class of 1970, Bruce Holmboe, Keith Hopkins, Dan McAdams, Bill Pruitt and Tom Pruitt, sponsored key items for the design.

The parents of one of the chapter's members donated a four by five foot carved mahogany replica of the Phi Delta Theta crest to serve as the focal piece of the main reception room. Kurt Moessner, "The Sign Carver", of Palmyra, Pennsylvania, was retained to carve the crest. This truly became an artistic challenge as Mr. Moessner painstakingly carved the intricate details of the Phi Delt crest including the foliate scroll and banner. He used gold and palladium leaf for certain elements of the crest and even located a blue topaz for the sword. The results were spectacular and Mr. Moessner freely admits that this was the project of a

lifetime. The combination of artistic and technical talents needed to produce the end result demanded years of expertise in



the field. The crest arrived in July of 2006 and has been hung over the fireplace in the main reception room, a tribute to an outstanding chapter, the national Fraternity and a dedicated artisan.

Mrs. Davies and parent volunteers participated in the purchase and installation of the entrance hall and main reception room décor. The results truly highlight the original beauty of the architect's design. Artifacts from the chapter's history and pictures of the Fraternity's founders



fill the walls. The furniture reflects the history of the University of Oklahoma with elements dating back to the Mission style period, popular when the Uni-

versity was founded in the late 1800s but with a decidedly modern approach. Mrs. Davies' placement of furniture allows for comfortable seating areas throughout the room, all the while allowing the original masterful architectural elements to shine through.

The dedication of a plaque honoring those who participated in the fundraising efforts that brought about this incredible transformation was held during the annual Parents' Weekend in November. Enthusiasm is also building for further refurbishment projects throughout the house. The room settings now more accurately reflect a chapter with a distinguished past and an even brighter future. The chapter welcomes Phi Delta Theta alumni to stop by the house when on campus to see the results. Chapter president, Eric Walker, also welcomes any further questions or comments at ewalk@ou.edu.



Marvin J. Perry Maryland '53

When Marvin J. Perry walked into the General Headquarters in the winter of 1953 to begin his 26-month service as a Field Secretary, Phi Delta Theta became a better Fraternity. Indeed, it was a sad day when he left, but Brothers in this position were expected to remain on the job for only two years and Marv had already exceeded

the requirement by two months. There was never any question about the sincerity of his devotion to Phi Delta Theta, especially his involvement with the chapter of his initiation. He was soon named president of Delta Province which included the states of Maryland and Virginia, a position he held for over nine years. He was elected to the Board of Trustees of the Fraternity's Educational Foundation in 1985 where he greatly assisted the growth of that fund over the following twelve years. All the time, he retained a day-to-day interest in Maryland Alpha and the institution it represents.

Brother Perry was born in Burlington, Iowa and served in the U.S. Army in Germany in the late 1940s before entering the University of Maryland. In 1955, he founded Marvin J. Perry & Associates in Kensington, Md. as a wholesale furniture business working with the interior design trade, the hotel industry and federal agencies. In the 1960s he had an exclusive contract to provide furnishings for the homes of State Department employees and other federal workers around the world.

For his untiring efforts on behalf of his Fraternity, he was presented the organization's highest award, the Legion of Merit, in 2000. The University of Maryland Alumni Association granted to him the Tyser Gottwals Award for his service to the University, and Drexel Heritage Furniture Industries, Inc., with whom he was associated for many years, named him "Salesman of the Century" in 2003.

He is survived by his wife, Carol Ann, three daughters, a sister, a brother and 11 grandchildren.


Theodore G. Maragos University of North Dakota '55


Former General Council member Ted Maragos died October 25, 2006 after a battle with cancer. Brother Maragos served on the General Council from 1966-1970, and also worked as a chapter consultant for the General Headquarters from 1956-1958.

Professionally, Maragos was an attorney and served as the youngest legislator ever elected to the North Dakota House of Representatives and was voted the most outstanding legislator during the 1960-1962 session.

Ralph O. Taylor Missouri '40

Ralph O. Taylor, the 2000 Raymond L. Gardner Alumnus of the Year, passed away on September 6, 2006 at the age of 87.





Born in Kansas City, Missouri in 1919, Brother Taylor spent most of his life in and around this Midwestern city. He attended the University of Missouri, where he was initiated into the Fraternity and graduated in 1940 with a bachelor's degree in Business and Public Administration.

In 1942, Brother Taylor joined the United States Navy, and was active in amphibious landings in the South Pacific, Guadalcanal area and Mediterranean Sea. He received an honorable discharge from the Service in 1946, but not before being decorated with the Bronze Star for extreme bravery.

Upon returning to civilian life, he began a career as a home builder in the Kansas City area and was an active member of the Kansas City Alumni Club of Phi Delta Theta. 



Dickenson Phis help local family

The following letter was sent to the Dickinsonian, the student newspaper at Dickinson College where our PA Epsilon chapter is.

I write this letter to state how blessed we feel as a family to have Phi Delta Theta help in our journey to getting our daughter well again. These young men, usually three per visit each week, always enter our home with a smile on their faces to brighten my children's day. Not only do we have a severely injured daughter from a car wreck but also a young son now ten that desires attention. I am constantly saying, "Wait John I have to get Stephy's medicine ready," "wait John I have to stock supplies," etc. When the guys from Dickinson College come, the wait doesn't exist. They say, "OK John, what are we doing tonight?" It might be throwing footballs in the backyard where they gladly teach him some cool moves. It could be Play Station, to battle out who is the best at whatever game he chooses. Their volunteer efforts have made a huge difference in our family lives.

In October of 1990 Trevor Douglas was struck by an automobile has an associate's degree. He shares the following sentiment.

Stephanie was 11 years old when she was in a car wreck. She still doesn't have any self help skills which means she can do nothing on her own. Yet when the guys enter her room to read, her face lights up with a smile; she makes loud sigh sounds as if she is saying "Hello." My heart is filled with joy that someone else cares and hasn't forgotten her. Stephy now moves her mouth to songs even though she cannot talk. I know that Phi Delta Theta was part of helping to put words in her mind again. They have been a part of our family for over five years. They read to Stephy when she was in a coma and the doctors gave her little hope of ever waking up. After a year and a half, she woke up, and God graced her with a smile.

As far as my son, these guys have made an amazing positive role model for him. He watches these big burly guys care about his sister who he loves, He sees their compassion for a cause that they have dedicated many hours of their time. Most recently at the Homecoming game, they sent out e-mails to the football Mom's and their Fraternity parents to help gather supplies for our daughter. They came with a truck load. No one really knows how hard and expensive this journey is but me; yet here these young men, on their own, took the extra step in helping to show they care. I cried, for their action told me to hang in there and keep going.

I almost lost Stephy this summer through a metabolic disorder that has made her bones paper thin. She is now in constant pain with kidney stones, gall stones and breaks that have taken all year to partially heal. She has rods in her back to help her sit, she is fed through a tube in her stomach and has a shunt in her head to handle the extra spinal fluid. Yet not once did this group ever say she is too sick or they were too afraid to visit. They come in, wash their hands of any germs and start to read to Stephy or play games with John.

I write this letter to say thank you to them, but also to remind the Dickinson students that volunteering in any way or via any avenue helps folks more than you will ever know.

Support the Collegiate Housing Act

The Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act would allow tax-deductible charitable contributions given to educational foundations (such as the inter/national educational foundations for fraternities and sororities) to be used to make improvements to housing owned and operated for the benefit of college students. This bill would make it substantially easier for Greeks nationwide to raise the money needed to install critical life-safety improvements in our chapter housing, expand housing capacity, and otherwise modernize the housing we provide to our student members.

An earlier version of the Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act passed the House of Representatives in 2003 as part of a larger bill, but it failed to pass the Senate for political reasons beyond our control. When Congress ended its work in 2006, we had 151 House sponsors and 28 Senate sponsors, but we have to start all over again in 2007.

So, if you have not already acted to support the *Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act of 2007* (HR643/S.638), we are once again reminding you of the importance your letters play in the passage of this legislation. Passage of the act would be a major benefit for all fraternity housing. The more sponsors in Congress we have for this legislation, the more likely we are to pass the act. Here's all you have to do to participate:

- Log on to http://www.fraternalcaucus.org/, locate the Get Involved Tab at the Top and click on the Register with the CFC.
- 2. After registering, go to the Tab marked Legislation and click on the Write Your Legislators.
- 3. Simply complete all the boxes and steps from there to automatically send an e-mail communication to both your Senators and member of Congress.







Values-Driven Leadership

Ontario's lieutenant governor Bartleman's Phi values help guide him

Assemented who has read about him extensively through books and in the news, I knew about the respect he had for his home province, his country, and perhaps more importantly, proud of the personal convictions in his heart and values in his mind.

Brother Bartleman grew up in the community of Port Carling, Ontario, Canada facing discrimination and doubt at all levels: from his own internal persona (the identity struggle as a product of being the son of a white father and Native Canadian mother), to the community kids and teachers, right to the national level, where Canadian law dictated that Native Canadians could not vote at the time Bartleman first started attending university. But, membership in Phi Delta Theta helped give him the values and leadership skills needed to succeed.

As he approached his final year of a four-year history degree at the University of Western Ontario, a friend and Phi brother of Bartleman's pushed him to join the brotherhood. Bartleman will admit that he initially had reservations: "They were not your typical image of guys who just joke around all day and have fun—they were serious about their university careers." Brother Bartleman implied that the more pressing issue on his mind at the time was the fact that the Brothers saw him for what his character really was, and what he was capable of becoming.

As I sat before this distinguished man, I took pride in the fact that men of Phi Delta Theta had stood firmly by the cardinal principles.

Bartleman's Phi Delt experience served him well on a larger scale, as he discussed in his Canadian bestselling book: Rollercoaster. He asserts that as globalization becomes more prominent, shared values between countries result. Since he has served as an ambassador to foreign nations, which do not always share identical values to our own, I asked him how important it is to actively promote the values which form a part of his identity, rather than trying to preserve or amalgamate values. He gave an answer many Phis can relate to.

"It is important to always live a good life, a generous life, regardless of the circumstances," he said. As he had argued in the book, it is countries that do not look at situations as contextual guagmires riddled with interests who are the most admired politically. In other words, if you build a good man with good values, a good context or an admirable interest will always result. And good men built on good values will always outlast. or rise above ideologies, formal institutional structures, national interests, or tangible barriers, which can cause conflict.

In the twilight of his career in the public service, Brother Bartleman has backed up this passionate view with

action by doing precisely that—appealing to, and building good men and women who form the communities in Ontario. He has acknowledged that he has surpassed the expectations of his job to engage with the citizens of Ontario, by cutting through red tape to form his own summer literacy camp organizations, cutting through provincial jurisdictional lines to help marginalized Cree communities in Quebec, and bridging the divide in cultural



barriers of communities by twinning schools of Nunavut (a Federal Territory in the arctic) with schools in urban or suburban areas of Ontario. He estimates that he has raised approximately \$10-15 million for his community pursuits, and he is far from finished. At the time that this article went to press, he was in the process of launching his second national book drive. The first one raised



1.2 million books for schools in Native Canadian communities who could not otherwise afford them.

Bartleman leaves behind many valuable lessons for Brothers who are pledging Phi Delta Theta, active Brothers, and alumni.

First, he acknowledges that pursuits such as his astounding community service record must be focused. In order to maintain ties to his core identity and values, Bartlesman has stuck to three issues which move him to action (mental illness, fighting racism, and education), and has developed pointed plans to achieve tangible progress on these issues.


Second, he believes that keeping an open mind has helped him throughout his career. "Learning is a life long process for me," said Bartleman, recalling his Fraternity which stresses sound learning and bonds for life.

When discussing the concept of risk, Bartleman says there are times when change is necessary to align an organization to its intangible, timeless values. Brothers from all chapters who initially struggled with the common problem of transition management when implementing the no-alcohol policy, now see the relative insignificance of those tangibles when compared with preserving the traditions and type of moral rectitude which has brought Phi Delta Theta to its current leadership position on campuses and in communities across North America.

Brother Jordan Greenwood, York, 2006, recently had the opportunity to speak to James K. Bartleman, the 27th lieutenant governor of Ontario, and former chief diplomatic aide to Canadian Prime Minister Jean Chretien from 1994–1998.

Western Wisdom

Wise words from a cowboy Phi



The Scroll talked with Kleberg about ranch life, family and his love of Phi Delta Theta. Here is some advice from a real-life cowboy.

Scroll: In recent years, you've made some changes in your life, What is a priority for you now?

Kleberg: It's pretty simple to me. About eight years ago, my priorities were work, family, friends and my faith, in that order. And, after a change in my day-to-day responsibilities [at the ranch]. I've made my faith my number one priority. I realize that when the chips are up or down, there are people you can count on. And I put work last... There are number of things I've chosen to do and I've selected those that I feel I can make a difference in.

Scroll: You serve on the board of trustees of the Phi Delta Theta Educational Foundation. Has that been worthwhile for you?

Kleberg: The thing about the
Foundation [board] is, everyone there
has had the same experience. And
that's The Bond of Phi Delta Theta.
We were all blessed to go through
that experience, and we're setting the
Foundation up so that other young
men will have a really unique college
experience and will get them out in the
community and enable them to look
back on their days in Phi Delt and say
"that taught me something."

TEPHEN JUSTUS "TIO" KLEBERG, Texas Tech '69, has lived the life of a cowboy, spending most of his career literally in the saddle at the world-famous King Ranch in Texas. He'd rope cartle, mend fences, work leather and dodge rattlesnake bites in the blazing South Texas sun.

Bur, in recent years, with life on the ranch changing, this man who is known as "the last of the great South Texas patrons" has had to examine his life and find new priorities. A struggle many Plus face as they get older. Scroll: For those who've never done it, being a cowboy seems like a great life, spending time on horseback in the prairies of the West. What was it really like?

Kleberg: It's not a 9 to 5 joh, that's for sure. It's seven days a week. And, in the ranching business, there's two things you have no control of—the markets and the weather. It's one of those things that you have to deal with. But I loved it. I loved being outside working the land. In South Texas, you'd end the day with a campfire and accordion music. That's what my grandfather did, and I'd like to learn how to play someday.

Scroll: How has ranch life changed?

Kleberg: It requires less people now, thanks to rechnology. But, some things are the same. When I was our in the fields, I'd write notes in a little notebook. Now, you take that notebook to the office where it's ensered in a computer. We've got cell phones now, so if you need something out in the fields, you can just call rather than have to ride back in.

Scroll: Running a ranch is, in many ways, similar to running a business. You were very successful at helping the King Ranch grow and prosper. What advice do you have for people who want to succeed in business?

Kleberg: I would say that to anyone who is engaged in business to find something you love to do and find people you like working with. I told my sons, I don't care what you do, find something you love to do and then find a group of people you really enjoy working with and then give it everything you have. Be the first guy there, making the coffee in the morning, and the last guy to leave. And you'll learn something from that. Do the ordinary extraordinarily well. Regardless of the outcome, you'll be satisfied.

Scroll: There are other Phis who, as they get close to the end of their careers, need to reprioritize their lives similarly to the way you did. What advice do you have for them?

Kleberg: You have to sit down and give it a lot of thought.

You have to think about where you've been and what you have done, and what you really enjoy doing. You can't do it casually. You put together a list of priorities and ask how it's changed or needs to change. For me, I looked at how I've been blessed, and how do I give something back. I looked at all the things I wanted to do in life but didn't make time to do it.



Things like golf or spending more time with my family. I have grandchildren, and I want to show them the things I enjoy, like being outdoors.



Scroll: Speaking of the outdoors, talk to us about what you've done in the area of wildlife research and conservation.

Kleberg: A lot of people stand up, and look down. I choose to look at the ground and look up. My objective is to try and improve what Mother Nature gave us through science and technology. We humans have to realize that you don't know when you've done enough until you've done too much. What you do today may affect it for the next 20 years.



President's Letter



Leadership for a Lifetime

The Campaign for Phi Delta Theta

The big news in 2006 from the Educational Foundation was the announcement of the 87 million dollar Leadership for a Lifetime Campaign. The public announcement was made during the Fraternity's Convention. The Campaign will conclude during the 2008 Convention as we celebrate the 50th anniversary of the creation of the Educational Foundation.

The purpose of the Campaign is to provide additional endowment support for the leadership and educational programs as well as additional scholarships and fellowships provided by the Educational Foundation.

The Leadership for a Lifetime Campaign is a comprehensive campaign. This means that all gifts and pledges received by the Foundation are counted toward the campaign goal.

At the time the Campaign was publicly announced, the Foundation had already received gifts and pledges totaling just over half (51%) of the goal. By the end of the year, that total had risen to 74% of the goal or \$5.2 million.

The report that follows recognizes all donors who made gifts between January 1 and December 31, 2006. We are truly grateful to each of these donors for his support and help in moving toward the goal of the Campaign.

2006 was another very successful year for the Educational Foundation. Alumni, undergraduates, friends and parents contributed more than \$400 gifts totaling \$1,143,388.

Highlights from some of the Foundation's activities over the past year include:

- Scholarships and Fellowships—The
 Foundation now has more than 45 named
 scholarship and fellowship funds. These
 funds, when combined with the Foundation's
 general funds, provided almost \$180,000 for
 scholarships and fellowships in 2006. Since its
 creation the Foundation has given more than
 \$2.6 million in scholarships and fellowships.
- The Trustees' Roundtable—Membership in The Trustees' Roundtable topped the 200 mark for the first time. The Trustees' Roundtable recognizes alumni who make annual gifts of \$1,000 or more.

- Leadership Consultant Grant—\$114,000 was provided to support the Leadership Consultant program. This program provides critical on-site visits, evaluations and resources to every chapter.
- The Living Bond Society—The number of Phis who have included the Foundation in their wills or other estate plans has continued to increase and now stands at 99. Based on past giving records, a conservative estimate of the value of the known planned gifts is in excess of \$4.5 million.
- The Presidents Leadership Conference—A \$64,500 grant was provided to underwrite the educational cost of this conference attended by more than 150 chapter presidents.
- Investment Performance—The Foundation's investment portfolio achieved a 14.8% annual rate of return for calendar year 2006.
- The Knights of Pallas—This program introduces undergraduate members to the Foundation and to the idea of charitable giving, A gift of \$18.48 or more entitles the undergraduate to become a member of the Knights of Pallas. Hundreds of undergraduates have answered the call and participation rates during the Presidents Leadership Conference and the Emerging Leaders Institute are typically in the 65-75% range.

There are numerous other highlights that will be covered throughout the report, and I hope you will enjoy reading about them.

On behalf of all the members who benefited from the programs made possible through the generosity of our members and friends, I offer my most sincere thanks.

Ways You Can Help

housands of Phi Delta Theta members contribute each year to the Educational Foundation. It is their support that makes all of the programs provided by the Foundation possible.

Listed below are a few of the ways members choose to support the Foundation:

Annual Support

These gifts typically arrive in the form of checks, credit card gifts or gifts of stock. Most Educational Foundation donors do not restrict the use of their annual gifts. This allows them to be allocated to the areas of most critical need during the year.

Endowments

Permanently endowed funds may be established and named in accordance with a donor's wishes through gifts of \$50,000 or more. These endowments typically create named scholarships or fellowships but other purposes are also available.

Endowments may also be created with smaller gifts that the donor pledges to increase, over a period of time, to the \$50,000 level. Endowment funds provide a constant source of income for the Educational Foundation and are spent with careful consideration of the donor's intentions.

Matching Gifts

Your employer may have a matching gift program that can multiply your support. Please ask your personnel office for the necessary forms to send with your gift.

Planned Gifts

Long-range estate and financial planning can enable you to make a substantial contribution to a program or project of your choice in a manner consistent with your overall charitable and personal commitments. Some examples of planned gifts include bequests, appreciated securities, real estate, insurance policies, charitable remainder trusts and charitable gift annuities. The Foundation staff can provide additional information on each of these types of gifts. The Foundation also recognizes alumni who have made such gifts as members of the Living Bond Society.

Memorial & Honorary Gifts

A memorial or honorary gift is an appropriate way to recognize someone's life and accomplishments. The Educational Foundation offers opportunities for those who wish to associate the name of a family or an individual with a project or program of enduring worth. Memorial gifts are acknowledged to the family while honorary gifts are acknowledged to the individual. Gifts of this type to the Sesquicentennial Courtyard have been very popular.

Sesquicentennial Courtyard

Alumni and undergraduates alike continue to support the Sesquicentennial Courtyard with bricks engraved with their names or the names of other members and friends of Phi Delta Theta. More than 2,000 engraved bricks have already been placed in the Courtyard, and that number continues to increase on a regular basis. (It is not too late to buy your brick if you have not already done so.)

Restricted Gifts

Some alumni choose to restrict their gifts for specific programs or funds. For example, one alumnus may ask that his gift be used solely for scholarships while another alumnus may direct his gift to the Leadership College Fund. Both of these gifts are acceptable and welcome. The Foundation does retain the right, however, to decline any gift that does not meet the approved purposes of the Foundation or would be overly restrictive.

Anniversary Class Gifts

Members of classes celebrating special reunions are invited to establish a class gift to the Educational Foundation as part of their reunion activities.

More than 300 Phi Delt undergraduates were on college rosters during the 2006 season. Members of bowl teams included punter Alex Harrell of the 13-1 Florida BCS National Champions; wide receiver William Cage and defensive lineman Bo Hailey of the 11-2 TCU Poinsettia Bowl

squad; quarterback Ryan Rowland and linebacker Ty Linder of the 8-5 Texas Tech Insight Bowl club; offensive lineman Phillip Browning of the 7-6 Florida State Emerald Bowl team; and defensive





linebacker Brian Brugger; and backs Tim Clinton and Mark Mariski.

Dickinson's offense featured All-American honorable mention wide receiver Chris McInerney, who had 1,280 all purpose yards (125.5 per game). He caught 48 passes for 593 yards, eight TDs; returned 16 kickoffs for a 31.0 average (including a 98-yarder); and ran back 23 punts for a 9.4 average. He was on the All-Centennial and All-South Region first teams. Also gaining All-American mention was tackle Kevin Mentrikowski. Running back Ryne Cantwell won All-South Region mention after rushing for 555 yards; catching 17 passes; and scoring six TDs. Other receivers were Justin Piotti (13 catches for 104 yards) and Michael D'Amico (12 for 108 yards). Erik Frain started at offensive tackle.

Seventeen Phis led **Washington & Lee** to a 7-4 record and a first-ever Division III playoff berth. Cornerback Mark Snoddy was on the All-ODAC and Virginia College Division All-State first teams while being named College Division Player of the Year. He picked off nine passes (third in Division III) and made 32 tackles.

Named to the All-ODAC and All-State second teams were linebacker Kyle Harvey (70 tackles) and back Jimmy Gift (67 tackles, three interceptions). Seeing starting duty were backs Chris Prugar (38 stops) and Aaron Fulk (20 tackles).

W&L kicker Ben Long won All-ODAC and All-State first team honors. He kicked eight field goals (three against Randolph-Macon) and now holds the career record with 32. Offensive tackle Bobby Hetherington was on the All-ODAC second team and Jack Martin caught 32 passes for 583 yards and nine TDs. 




alumni, Fraternity and Foundation staff members, undergraduate Phi Delts from Ohio University and Tennessee Tech University, and other local alumni.



Trio of Leadership Events Held in St. Louis

Several successful conferences were held in St. Louis this past January. Phis from all over the country gathered for the eighth annual Presidents Leadership Conference, the second annual Recruitment Boot Camp, and a new Alumni Summit for Chapter Advisory Board (CAB) members.

Presidents from 153 chapters and new colonies assembled at the Presidents Leadership Conference (PLC) for a weekend of



leadership, education, and fun. General Council Reporter Scott Mietchen kicked off the long weekend with a reading of The Bond. General Council President Rudy Porchivina provided a positive report on the state of the Fraternity, and Brother Gary Belsome gave an inspiring speech about the principles of Phi Delta Theta using video clips from *Lord of the Rings* and *A Beautiful Mind* to illustrate his points.

Speakers such as Dr. Sparky Reardon, Jim Favor, Brad Karsh, Marc Mores, and Dr. Will Keim offered the presidents and CAB members practical ways to make positive change in their home chapters through effective leadership. One undergraduate PLC attendee stated, "I met Brothers from all over the country who gave me a different perspective on how to creatively solve some

of my chapter's problems." In addition to the speakers, both presidents

and CAB members attended small group sessions facilitated by dedicated Phi Delt volunteers from all over North America.

While the presidents did work hard, they also had some down time with their brother Phis. Included in the entertainment for PLC was a Phi Jeopardy competition where Brother Tony Cappaert from MIT was the Final Jeopardy Champion. Other events included watching *Talladega Nights* with 150 brothers, and Tom DeLuca closed out the weekend by hypnotizing 20 brothers on stage for all to enjoy.

The inaugural Chapter Advisory Board Summit had over forty advisers make their way to St. Louis to discuss best practices,

advising styles, alumni recruitment, goal setting, and risk management while participating in the PLC large general sessions including a special solo session featuring a discussion on the Millennial Generation. The CAB Summit provided a tremendous training for those on the *front lines*, serving the Fraternity's undergraduate chapters while giving them an opportunity to network and share ideas amongst their peers.

The participants of the conference seemed to enjoy the CAB Summit quite a bit. One adviser stated: "I was totally blown away by the caliber of the meeting. Topics were relevant and enjoyable." Another adviser stated: "I took a lot from discussing the challenges that other chapters face. Some the same, but more times than not, I learned from their successes."

The Fraternity has already approved this program to be held yet again next year. "This year we felt like we held a terrific inaugural event, however next year we plan on taking the next step with the CAB Summit, by bringing back the majority of the program, adding a few components that were suggested by attendees, and by tweaking a few things. This should provide the ultimate Chapter Advisory Board educational experience" said Director of Alumni Services Sean Wagner.

The second annual Recruitment Boot Camp (RBC) was attended by 106 recruitment chairmen. Lead facilitator David Stollman led sessions on branding and alignment, system recruitment, recruitment by the numbers, and formal recruitment. Aided by the guidance of the small group facilitators, the RBC attendees created recruitment action plans to take back to their chapter to improve recruitment performance. The boot camp concluded with the recruitment chairmen reviewing their action plans with their presidents and chapter advisory board members.

"If the 13 percent increase in last spring's recruitment numbers are any indication, the members that attended RBC are set up for success!" said Director of Chapter Services Jesse Moyer.

The General Council and General Headquarters staff would like to thank all of the participants, both undergraduate and alumni, for their efforts in St. Louis. We are looking forward to the Emerging Leaders Institute, our next leadership conference slated for July 28-31 at Miami University this summer.

Alumni Clubs

Phi Delta Theta's best, and oldest running, program for keeping in touch with your brothers

THE FRATERNITY'S continuing rededication of itself as the "Fraternity for Life," has led to a number of new initiatives and programs. While many of these new programs like Phi Delta Theta Circle have changed the way we as alumni connect and communicate, the best alumni program going is our oldest, Alumni Clubs. In order to maintain and further develop this tradition, a number of dedicated alumni and volunteers devoted themselves to creating nine new clubs in the last year. With the help of these alumni and Director of Alumni Services Sean Wagner, these new clubs will continue to maintain that famous mantra and to ensure that Phi Delta Theta continues to have an active, alumni presence in communities all over the world. These new clubs are: Athens (Ohio), Green Mountain (Vermont), Philadelphia, Southwest Indiana (Evansville) Southwest Missouri (Springfield), Southernmost (Florida Keys), Twin Cities (Minn.), Upper Cumberland (Tenn.), and Western Michigan.

The first new club started in the biennium was the **Southwest Missouri Alumni Club**. Since its inception shortly after the 2006 Kansas City Convention, the Southwest Missouri Alumni Club, based out of Springfield, Mo., has been quite busy. Last fall the club hosted its first event—an alumni barbecue—as part of the Missouri State University Homecoming Celebration. This past spring, the club sponsored an alumni night with the Springfield Cardinals—the local minor league baseball team.

Later that month, the club presented pins to two 60-year Palladian Legionnaires at the Missouri Epsilon Founders Day

Celebration. Brother John Mahaffey, *Missouri Beta '44*, and Brother Samuel C. Oliver, *Missouri Gamma '47*, were both recognized for their dedication to the Fraternity. As part of the Founders Weekend, the club partnered with the Missouri Epsilon chapter to put on the annual Jeffrey R. Nieman Golf Tournament, an event that brings in over 50 Phi Delt alumni and their families for a day at Rivercut Golf Course. This was a record-setting year with nearly 80 golfers on the course.

Similar to the Southwest Missouri Alumni Club, the Athens, Green Mountain and Southwest Indiana Alumni Clubs were created to provide a social outlet for local alums while maintaining a very close connection with the local chapter. Ohio Gamma, Vermont Alpha and Indiana Lambda have all greatly benefited from this relationship, bolstering their alumni relations due to the clubs.

Although it's the fifth largest market in the United States, it has been quite some time since there was any kind of alumni presence in Philadelphia. In order to change that, the **Philadelphia Alumni Club** was chartered in April.

Since its inception, the **Philadelphia Alumni Club** has done its best to live up to its mission by utilizing the Phi Delta Theta Circle to bolster its roster. After an email and post card mailing promoting the new club, their group page on the "Circle," and an initial event, the club's over sixty alumni joined their "Circle" group and over twenty alumni and their families attended their inaugural event. The Philadelphia Alumni Club plans on building off of their recent momentum for a series of events this fall.

Another large market that has not seen much alumni activity in recent years is that of the **Twin Cities, Minnesota** Area. After getting started this summer, the club has already had an event at a Minnesota Twins game, an organizational event, golf outing, and dinner meeting. Led by former West Palm Beach Alumni Club President, Adam Johnson, *Portland State '04*, the **Twin Cities Alumni Club** is well on its way to building an organization of which the 1,100 alumni in the area can be proud.

The Western Michigan Alumni Club was born out of one of the longest running alumni traditions within Phi Delta Theta, the Holiday Luncheon, in Grand Rapids, Michigan. The leadership of the annual event decided to "spin-off" the luncheon into a full fledged alumni club.

General Officers of the Fraternity have been hard at work in the last year helping extend the Phi Delt alumni experience into their own communities. General Council Treasurer Mark Ochsenbein helped a number of local brothers form the Upper Cumberland Alumni Club based out of Cookeville, Tennessee. Further south, Educational Foundation Trustee Mike Fimiani has established the Southernmost Alumni Club in the Florida Keys. This club will focus on relaxed Brotherhood encounters and environmental/wildlife concerns.

In addition to a number of new clubs being started in the last year, a number of the Fraternity's oldest and most treasured alumni clubs have seen a resurgence in activity due to new alumni involvement and General Headquarters support. Alumni clubs in Houston, Austin, and Nashville have also seen a great deal of activity. After a Founders Day event this spring, the **Dallas Alumni Club** will be working with Director of Alumni Services Sean Wagner this fall to bring the club back to prominence.





Code Red

It's a scenario reserved for movies or a game of Risk. A rogue terrorist organization gets enough nuclear material to produce a weapon and a "dirty" bomb goes off in a major metropolitan area. Immediately the nation would wonder if there are more bombs set to go off? And, where did these terrorists get this material?

Those nightmare questions are what keep retired Senator (and Phi) Sam Nunn, *Georgia '60*, busy these days. Nunn is co-chairman of the Nuclear Threat Initiative, an


The Nuclear Threat Initiative (NTI) was formed in 2001, months before the 9-11 terrorist attacks, after billionaire philanthropist Ted Turner and Nunn agreed on the scope of the NTI—respond to the threat of uncontrolled nuclear weaponry around the globe. Turner donated \$250 million in Time Warner stock to allow the NTI to begin its work

"Ted had the goal of ridding the nuclear weapons and I had the goal of a step-by step approach of reducing of risk," Nunn said. "We concluded that we had 20 years of work before we'd be able to [achieve Turner's goal], and that's how we bridged that gap."

The 9-11 attacks did not change the NTI's scope, but did make it easier to convince the country there were serious threats that needed to be addressed.

"We thought we were going to have to spend enormous amounts of time and money and energy convincing people that terrorism and the threat of catastrophic terrorism was the No. 1 security challenge we faced, and 9-11 changed that dramatically" Nunn said. "After 9-11, the public understood it was not just the World Trade Center but it could be much, much worse. That made our job of convincing people there was a danger much easier."

Nunn and the NTI found one of those dangers in an industrial town in Kazakhstan, near Iran, where enough nuclear material to make two dozen bombs had fallen through the cracks at a nuclear reactor slated to be shut down. The NTI teamed with the Kazakhstan

government to "blend down" this material to convert it to safer, non-weapons form. It was a major accomplishment for the NTI, but there's more work to do.

The former Soviet Union had more nuclear materials than anywhere in the globe, according to Nunn, and there are 40 other countries with enough material to make a nuclear weapon.

"We've made significant progress since we started our organization; now, the other dimension is, you've got to quit spewing the stuff out—making nuclear materials.

In my view, we've got to take a real lead and tell the world that we're not going to make any more fissile material for bomb purposes. That requires a treaty, that requires verification, and that requires a major leadership initiative. It's not yet happening in a serious way, in my view."

And if that weren't enough, international treaties that do not call for verification to prevent the production of biological weapons are leaving the world open to a proliferation of these risks.

"We're not keeping with the tradition of Ronald Reagan who said 'trust by verify,' "Nunn said. "In my view, in the future the biological problem will be just as serious as the nuclear. The two will become parallel within my lifetime."

Nunn doesn't give estimates on the likelihood of a nuclear attack on the U.S., but hopes cooperation between the NTI and various governments will keep weapons out of the wrong hands.

"We're in a race between cooperation and catastrophe," Nunn says. "Our job is to make it as hard as possible" for a nuclear explosion to occur. "We've got to have multilateral cooperation."

In addition to working with governments, the NTI has worked to communicate the threats posed by weapons of mass destruction. Nunn has traveled the country making speeches on the topic, the organization has penned opinion pieces and has even produced a docudrama on a fictional nuclear crisis, starring none other than Fred Thompson, Republican presidential candidate, playing the role of President.

As the 2008 election cycle heats up, the NTI has advised candidates from both parties, but will remain a bi-partisan organization and stay out of the individual races. The NTI is an "open book" to the candidates, providing them information and advice.

Whoever wins the elections will have to work with Russia, China, Japan and Europe to help reduce the security threats facing the U.S. The country, in Nunn's opinion, has moved too far down a unilateral path and needs to listen to other world leaders in order to lead. "That's a lesson I learned in the Fraternity," Nunn said. "I don't think there's a leader in the Fraternity who has not listened to their brothers in *The Bond*."

Nunn also said friendships and experiences in Phi Delt have helped him in a career as a politician, policy maker and business leader.

"I think there's no question those bonds and friendships are part of the learning experiences that build a foundation on which you go forth and deal with the challenges of life," Nunn said. "You also learn a few things at the poker table," he added with a chuckle.

In the coming years, the NTI hopes to establish a fuel bank program to help countries who want to use nuclear fuel for peaceful purposes; increase its efforts to deter biological weapon use in the Middle East and Asia; and develop a private-sector organization to help secure nuclear materials worldwide.

It's Nunn's hope that the NTI's efforts will help make the world a safer place and, someday, a world free of a nuclear threat.

"The goal of a world without nuclear weapons is what I view the top of the mountain," Nunn said. "It's my hope that my children and grandchildren will be able to see the top of the mountain. I think our job is start to move the world up the mountain."

Foundation Breaks All Records With 2007-2008 Scholarships

The Foundation has broken all of its own records this year by granting 62 undergraduate scholarships to men from 44 chapters in the amount of \$136,600. To put those numbers in perspective for you, this is 19 more scholarships than we granted last year. The total amount of this year's scholarships is over \$36,000 more than we awarded in 2006-2007.

Among this year's recipients are men from four chapters which have never before claimed a scholarship winner. Joseph P. Hanks, a member of Virginia Gamma chapter at Randolph-Macon College, received the \$1,800 Fesler Family Scholarship. Mark C. Snoddy, a member of Virginia Zeta chapter at Washington and Lee University, received one of four \$3,000 James D. Oatts Scholarships. Lee M. London of Florida Mu chapter at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University and Andrew T. McGuire of Indiana Lambda chapter at the University of Southern Indiana were both recipients of \$1,000 Knights of Pallas Scholarships.

The Knights of Pallas Scholarships are \$1,000 scholarships funded by gifts to the Educational Foundation from undergraduate Phis. The first Knights of Pallas Scholarships were presented in 2002. We have never had the funds to award more than four Knights of Pallas Scholarships in a single year. This year we were able to give ten. Quite obviously, our undergraduates have been wonderfully generous with the Foundation this year, and ten undergraduate Phis are benefiting directly from their largess.

This year we have awarded for the first time a Jordan L. Haines Scholarship to Todd C. Crawford of Jordan's beloved Kansas Alpha chapter. This year's Haines Scholarship is for \$2,500. The Jordan L. Haines Fund was established with gifts from family and friends in Brother Haines' memory. (We will also award this year for the first time a graduate fellowship funded by the Jordan L. Haines Fund.)

The scholarships were judged again this year by our stellar Undergraduate Scholarship Committee. T. William Estes, Vanderbilt '55, once again served as chairman. John J. Budack, Minnesota '58, and S. George Notaras, Lawrence '53, also continued to faithfully serve on the committee. We give all three our heartfelt thanks!

We also thank most enthusiastically all of our Foundation donors—alumni and undergraduate members, parents and friends of Phi Delta Theta. Without your gifts our scholarship program as well as our other educational initiatives would not flourish, could not exist. You, too, have our sincere thanks.






Saves for Kids

Padre Hoffman is the Gehrig Award winner

REVOR HOFFMAN, ALL-STAR pitcher for the San Diego Padres, received the Lou Gehrig Memorial Award, sponsored by Phi Delta Theta, on Wednesday, April 18 at Petco Park in San Diego. He was presented the award by General Council Member-at-large, Chris Lapple, San Diego Alumni Club President, Stephen Mendiola, Gehrig Committee Member, Don Thompson, and Director of Alumni Services Sean Wagner. Also on hand was a large constituency from the San Diego Alumni Club and their families.

The award is presented annually by Phi Delta Theta to the Major League Baseball player who best exemplifies the giving character of Hall of Famer Lou Gehrig, a member of the Fraternity's Columbia University chapter. The award was first presented in 1955 and is permanently maintained at the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum in Cooperstown, New York.

Trevor Hoffman, born in Bellflower, California, had to have one of his kidneys removed because of an arterial blockage when he was only six weeks old. But Hoffman went on to develop into a fine athlete at Savanna High School in Anaheim, California and The University of Arizona. His time spent as a Wildcat was notable for his performance hitting the ball, not throwing it, as he led the team in hitting in 1988 with a .371 batting average. He was drafted as a shortstop by the Cincinnati Reds and converted to a pitcher two years later after struggling at the plate in the minor leagues.

However, the move to the mound paid off as he was later acquired by the Florida Marlins in the expansion draft in 1993, then traded to the San Diego Padres where he would have what is expected to be viewed as a hall of fame career as Major League Baseball's premier closer. From 1994-2002, Hoffman averaged 38 saves per season, including five 40+ save seasons. He again saved 41 games in 2004 and added 43 more in 2005. In 2006, Hoffman led the National League in saves for the second time in his career converting 46 saves in 51 opportunities; the 2006 season increased his 40+ save seasons to eight. He is a six-time All-Star and received the 1998 and 2006 Relief Man Award, Most notably, Hoffman became Major League Baseball's all-time saves leader in 2006 and became the first pitcher to have 500 saves on June 6, 2007, just six weeks after receiving the Gehrig Award on the very same field.

While the impact Hoffman has made within the confines of Petco Park and Jack Murphy/Qualcomm Stadium have been impressive, what he and his wife Tracy have accomplished outside of the stadiums and within the San Diego community has been just as notable.

Due to Hoffman's kidney history, he has a great deal of empathy towards children suffering from kidney ailments and was inspired to create the Trevor Hoffman Kidney Kids Program. The Hoffmans donate \$200 for every one of Trevor's saves to the National Kidney Foundation of Southern California, and during each Padres home stand he invites kids undergoing kidney treatment at Children's Hospital to be his special guests in his personal dugout seats at Petco Park.

"One of the things I have put together in San Diego is Kidney Kids. Through it,

> kids from Children's Hospital that are going through issues with their kidneys get a chance to come to the ballpark every homestand. These are often kids that don't completely understand what they are going through. They just know that their body isn't healthy. I think it is important to allow them to forget about their troubles, at least for a while," Hoffman said.



These same seats are also offered to injured military service men and women and their families, teachers (Trevor's mother was a substitute teacher), as well as other special guests and charities. Trevor also visits Children's Hospitals in other cities when the team is on the road, often bringing along some of his teammates. "We were very proud to present the award to Trevor Hoffman," said Sean Wagner, director of alumni services and spokesman for the Lou Gehrig Memorial Award Committee. "He is truly as accomplished off the field as he is on it- and that says quite a bit considering he is the all-time saves leader!

Hoffman is the third member of the Padres franchise to receive the Lou Gehrig Memorial Award, joining Tony Gynn (1998) and Steve Garvey (1984)

Baseball

Tri-Captain/first baseman Alden Crissey led nine Phi Delts on the **Davidson** squad. He hit .331 with a team-high 78 hits, 41 RBI, 41 runs scored, 15 doubles and six homers. Teammate Thomas Middour won five games, pitched 21 games and threw 79

Fifteen Phis led 16-3 Gettysburg to the





Georgia Tech Cook Wins Phis' Hearts

Tech fraternity learns how to be keeper's brother


RICHARD JOHNSON and Matt Samuelson arrived at the Phi Delta Theta fraternity house around the same time in 1990.

Their worlds couldn't have been more different, but somehow it never seemed to matter. Johnson was there to wash dishes and assist the resident chef; Samuelson was around to get an education. He just hadn't figured on Johnson doing some of the teaching.

Johnson wasn't an educated man. High school and two years in the Army was it, but he knew something students wouldn't likely learn in a Georgia Tech classroom: We're put on this earth to serve others.

Before coming to Tech, Johnson worked for the Knights of Columbus Post 600 next to Green's Liquor Store on Buford Highway. He started there in 1967, the year he retired from the Army.

"I got off a Greyhound bus at 3 p.m., and at 5 p.m. I was carving roast at the lodge," he said, his voice swelling into a crescendo of laughter.



"I went from groundskeeper to Grand Knight," he said, still laughing.

He left the lodge and, within five years of coming to the Phi Delt house, had worked the rest of the staff out of their jobs.

Johnson could do everything. Indeed, his greatest joy was meeting the needs of the residents at the Phi Delt house. Why not let him?

In 1995, the year Samuelson graduated, Johnson took over, manning the kitchen, shopping for groceries, cleaning up after wild parties.

Over time, he built a relationship with the Phi Delta Theta brothers that went way beyond the fraternity house. Johnson wasn't just a cook. He was family. Not only did he know each by name, he knew something about them and their families.

They tried to get him interested in computers and invited him to their parties but no, no, he couldn't. He did, however, join them for bowling, baseball and football games.

"They kept me young," he said.

But they couldn't keep him well.

In 2005, Johnson started losing weight. He still felt like "big old fat Richard," but he had no appetite. He was living off 16-ounce cups of black coffee and a pack of Winston 100's.

By Thanksgiving that year, he was barely eating at all. When he finally went to see a doctor, he'd lost 50 pounds.

It was April 27, 2006. Doctors told Johnson he had stomach cancer. They needed to operate.



Eight days later, they removed the cancer, and Johnson began radiation and chemotherapy treatments.

Word spread quickly among the Phi Delta Theta men. Johnson was sick, and it didn't look good.

It was hard to believe. To them, Johnson was like the Energizer Bunny.

"He could go and go and go," Samuelson remembered.

Life, though, had slowed Johnson almost to a halt.

It was time for Phi Delta to go in his stead. They wanted him to know he wasn't alone, that they loved him. They decided to cook for him for a change. They grilled hamburgers and, thank God, bought some side dishes—baked beans, green beans and mac and cheese—from the OK Cafe.

For 15 years, Johnson had taken care of them, an estimated 250 Phi Delta men who'd come through the old red brick antebellum house. In all that time, Samuelson figured he must have poured 5,900 gallons of ranch dressing and prepared some 250,000 meals.

They talked about those meals last week as if time had stood still. And it had in the photos they thumbed through while visiting last week on Johnson's front porch.

Samuelson said he spoke for all Phi Delta men. He said Johnson taught them what you don't learn in school. He showed them what it meant to be a servant leader, to do unto others as you'd have them do unto you.

At 63, Johnson, who never married or had children, can't work but hopefully has a lot of years ahead of him.

And so when they learned his veterans benefits hadn't been enough to keep up with his medical and living expenses, there was only one thing to do: Give to the chef who'd given so much to them.

Phi Delt set up the Richard Johnson Fund, and to date has donated \$15,000 to help defray his medical and living expenses. They're hoping now that others will want to help, too. Checks can be made payable to the fund and mailed to Decatur First Bank, Attn: Ann Berg, 1120 Commerce Drive, Decatur, GA 30030.

In all the years he worked at the Phi Delt house, Johnson always showed up. The only times he didn't, he was attending funerals— one for his sister Barbara and the other for her late husband, Johnson's brother-in-law.

"I fell in love with the guys," he said the other day. "I'd crawl to work to feed them."

Samuelson said the Phi Delt House will never be the same, but come fall, the kitchen will at least hold their former chef's memory.

It will be named the Richard Johnson Kitchen.

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
1969: Man makes his first sp On the moon after perfect touchdown

Armstrong sculpture, lunar footprints, unveiled at Purdue

Editor's note: Neil Armstrong, Purdue, '55, was recently honored by his alma mater. A badge Brother Armstrong took with him to the moon remains on display at Phi Delta Theta Headquarters.

URDUE UNIVERSITY unveiled a bronze sculpture of alumnus Neil Armstrong on Friday, October 26 as a prelude to that weekend's dedication ceremony for a new engineering research and education building named for the first astronaut to walk on the moon.

The statue, accompanied by a trail of sculpted moon boot impressions and other symbolic features, is situated in front of the new Neil Armstrong Hall of Engineering, located at Stadium and Northwestern Avenues on Purdue's West Lafayette campus.



Artist Chas Fagan, from Charlotte, N.C., created the work. The sculpture of Armstrong, depicted as an undergraduate student in the 1950s, sits on a stone plinth in front of the building. Armstrong gazes over his left shoulder in the general direction of the lunar moon boot impressions.

"When our students see this sculpture, I hope they'll believe that they, like Mr. Armstrong, can achieve the unimaginable," said Purdue President France A. Córdova. "I hope it will inspire them to reach for the stars." The bronze statue, an eight-foot-tall, 125 percent scale likeness of Armstrong, recreates the image of a clean-cut college student wearing a windbreaker,



button-down Oxford shirt, cuffed khaki pants and penny loafers. His right hand rests on a small stack of books, and his slide rule is removed from its case as though ready for action.

Mary Jo Kirk and her husband, Purdue alumnus Bob Kirk of Washington, D.C., donated the money for the sculpture. In recognition, the area in which it is located has been named Kirk Plaza.

An elliptical stone arc resembling a spacecraft trajectory is embedded flush with the ground in Kirk Plaza next to the statue. An inscription in the arc reads: "One small step for a man, one giant leap for mankind."

The arc leads toward the lunar footprints, which were molded from an impression made using a moon boot provided by the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum. The 20 boot impressions trail away from the sculpture, running parallel to a walkway and spaced far apart to replicate the bounding gait of an Apollo astronaut. A few of the lunar prints are farther apart than others, as though created by a leaping moon walker.

Fagan said the sculpture presented several challenges.

"The moon boot prints are definitely an interesting feature," Fagan said. "Now students are really able to walk in the footsteps of Neil Armstrong."

Fagan consulted with Armstrong to ensure that he was on the right track before creating the sculpture's final design.

"I met with him privately so that I could ask him for input and get his perspective of what he was like as an engineering student at Purdue," Fagan said. "He reviewed details and made suggestions, and the design was approved by committee."

Fagan also had to meet with his subject to solve a key missing ingredient: He needed to know what Armstrong's profile looked like.

"I took photos that clearly showed his profile because none existed," Fagan said. "The age difference did not really matter because bone structure and basic features don't change. Without knowing someone's profile, you are just guessing, based on shadows you see in non-profile photographs, as to how the person looks in real life."

Armstrong also provided materials for the sculptor to work with, including photographs from family albums, his slide




rule and original Purdue notebooks, said Fagan, an internationally known artist whose work adorns the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. Fagan currently is working on a statue of Ronald Reagan for the U.S. Capitol building. He also created the official White House portrait of Barbara Bush, an oil painting.

Armstrong earned a bachelor's degree from Purdue's School of Aeronautics and Astronautics in 1955 and was selected for astronaut training in 1962. As spacecraft commander for NASA's Apollo 11, he and astronauts Michael Collins and Buzz Aldrin completed the first landing mission to the moon in 1969, with Armstrong as the first human to walk on the lunar surface. He also had been commander of the Gemini 8 flight in 1966 when he performed the first successful docking of two vehicles in space, flew 78 combat missions from an aircraft carrier during the Korean War and was a test pilot for pioneering high-speed aircraft.

Armstrong is a retired chairman of the EDO Corporation, an electronics and aerospace manufacturer.





Former White House economic advisor is a Phi

President's economic adviser Allan Hubbard

Allan Hubbard, *Vanderbilt '69* recently concluded his term as the assistant to president for economic policy and director of the National Economic Council. Over the past three years, Hubbard helped shape economic policies for the Bush administration. When announcing Hubbard's resignation, the president honored Hubbard's career.

"While many of the policies Al worked to develop are in place today, other policy initiatives, including Social Security reform and health care reform, have laid the foundation for policies I believe will be adopted in the future," Bush said. "Al has been a valuable leader among my economic advisors for nearly three years, and for many more years he and his family have been friends to Laura and me."

The Scroll sat down with him before he left the White House to talk about the economy, the election, and his plans after politics.

What has this experience been like for you?

It's been fascinating. Dealing with everything from agriculture policy from trade to health care, it's been like going to college all over again. It's an incredibly collegial White House. I have enormous respect for the president; I think he's a remarkable guy who stays focused on the important issues.

What's it like working in the White House? How does it compare to your business experience?

"It's a 24–7 job, basically. You work extremely long hours and never can get everything done. There are so many moving parts to the process. To get an idea through, it has to come from the Executive branch to the 535 members of Congress and the Senate. It's an incredibly arduous process and the framers made it that way. I guess my frustration is, it's so hard to get anything accomplished. It's easier to measure what you've accomplished in business. But, at the same time, it's been an incredible experience.

The economy has had some troubles of late. What's your take?

Outside of the financial area and housing, the economy is really quite strong. (stats 550) It's going to take awhile for the housing sector to come back. We've overbuilt. Until the excess inventory of houses drops, you're not going to see the housing market turn around. And the credit market, there is a lot of uncertainty about the value of security. So, that's got to work itself out and that doesn't happen overnight. It's going to take awhile.

The president has FHA reform legislation on Capital Hill, and we have legislation to deal with writedowns of mortgages to make it not a taxable event (it is now). The IRS says you have to pay taxes on that reduction of mortgages.

What would you say to young Phis looking to succeed in business?

My number one piece of advice would be, if you want to be successful in business or politics, those things only happen if you're trying to make them happen. You can't just sit there and hope for them to happen. You have to be swingin'. You have to be at the plate. And, you have to have a lot of luck. Most businesspeople will admit that.



How did Phi Delt help you?

"I made some very lasting friends. Phi Delt made the college experience more enjoyable."

We have a pretty interesting presidential election underway. What would be your advice to whoever moves into the White House next January?

I think the economy is going to be a big issue. I am just a huge believer in the free market. We have to let people keep more of their hard-earned money. The best way to stimulate the economy is to let more people have more of their own money. Our corporate taxes are higher than other countries' and that is causing some of our companies to look overseas for investment. We have to accept this is a global economy.

We have to encourage entrepreneurship and business investment. I would hope that whoever comes in would not put in new regulations that increase the costs for businesses. Anytime you add to labor costs or regulations, particularly labor regulations, you add to business costs.

What's next for you?

I'm going to go skiing for a month, and then go back to Indianapolis and go back into business.

Gardner Award goes to Gary Wade



ARY R. Wade, (Tennessee '70) of Sevierville, Tennessee is the 2007 Raymond L. Gardner Alumnus of the Year. The prestigious alumni award is given annually to the Phi Delta Theta alumnus who has made the greatest contribution within the Fraternity, his community, and the world of higher education. The award was originated by the Seattle Alumni Club in memory of Raymond L. Gardner (Washington '18).

Brother Wade was nominated for the award by the Knoxville Alumni Club and received over twenty letters of recommendation from his peers and colleagues. The letters of support on behalf of Brother Wade can be summed up in one comment that came from an associate, "Being equipped with outstanding legal knowledge, an excellent personal reputation, an enviable history of civic accomplishments, and especially an extraordinarily warm and friendly personality, I suggest Gary would be a most worthy recipient of the Gardner Award."

He was presented the award by lifelong friend and former Executive Vice President and Educational Foundation President, Emeritus, Robert J. Miller, General Council Treasurer Mark Ochsenbein, and General Council Member-at-large Rich Fabritius at a club event honoring him in front of friends and family on October 5, 2007.

During Brother Wade's thirty years of membership, he has served the Fraternity and his community in a number of capacities. His first post was as president of his chapter in 1969-1970, and he still views that as a landmark occasion in his life. "I count being elected president of the Tennessee Gamma Chapter in 1969 as among my greatest honors in life. Thank God for the Brothers in the chapter at that time! They kept me from falling flat on my face."

Ironically only seven years after being elected president of Tennessee Gamma, Brother Wade decided to run for mayor of Sevierville, Tennessee, and was honored to serve in that capacity until 1987. "That was a great time for me and my family. My son, Zach, claims that he had to defend my political honor at least once a week at school. Sure enough, he did come home with some scrapes from time to time. I think my wife, Sandy, did a better job on my daughters, Katie and Gigi. They were too young to be bothered by local politics," says Brother Wade.

While Mayor, Wade also began a general law practice which would be the beginning of an illustrious legal career. In 1987 he began serving on the Tennessee Court of Criminal Appeals, and was the Presiding Judge from 1998 to 2006 when he was appointed to the Supreme Court of the State of Tennessee. Special honors for his service in the judiciary include the American Board of Trial Advocates' Appellate Judge of the Year for 2004 and the Judicial Excellence Award for the Knoxville Bar Association in 2005. Brother Wade was also a founding member of the Friends of the Great Smoky Mountain National Park.

While Brother Wade has dedicated much of his life to the Great State of Tennessee, he has also shared his time with the organization that gave him his first official political office, Phi Delta Theta. In 1989, shortly after helping his chapter raise enough funds to purchase a new chapter house in Knoxville and serving as House Corporation Vice President, he was appointed Eta South Province

President and would serve the chapters in Tennessee until 1997.

"Because I sat as a judge throughout the state, it was not out of my way during court travel to visit our chapters at Vanderbilt, the University of the South, Tennessee Tech University, and the University of Tennessee. Later, of course, the province added the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga and Belmont University; watching their growth from interest groups to chapters were particularly rewarding experiences."

In addition to the rewards, there also came times of difficulties and challenges as Province President. "Keeping up with the issues facing young people was both enlightening and, on occasion, disappointing. Alcohol was by far the biggest issue at each of those chapters and, of course, throughout the fraternity system. Adopting an alcohol-free policy in those years was simply the right thing to do for Phi Delta Theta. I am proud of the leadership the General Council demonstrated during that period of time."

Brother Wade was previously recognized by the Fraternity in 2004 when he joined the Legion of Honor. However, he resumed his service to Phi Delta Theta in 2006, when he was appointed a Trustee to the Educational Foundation. Wade believes this role is extremely important, as the success of the Fraternity depends on the Educational Foundation and its fundraising efforts. "Fortunately, there are a number of our alumni who have enjoyed success in their careers and who are generous with their time, talents, and treasure."

Brother Gary R. Wade is truly a worthwhile winner of the Gardner award for his lifetime of service to the Fraternity, and for being such a tremendous ambassador of Phi Delta Theta in his community. While Wade has already accomplished what for most would be a lifetime of service, based on his comments one would believe the best has yet to come. "For me, Phi Delta Theta has indeed been a Fraternity for Life. The basic principles of friendship, sound learning, and rectitude are as important to me today as they were on the day I signed the Bond."



Two graduate students garner 2007–2008 Francis D. Lyon Scholarships

NCE AGAIN this year's Francis D. Lyon Scholarships for students of filmmaking went to two M.F.A. students. The first place award of \$3,000 went to Jennava Laska who is studying Broadcast Cinema and Film Production at the Art Center College of Design located in Pasadena, California. Miss Laska has earned a cumulative GPA of 3.7. The second place award of \$2,000 went to Stephanie Willis. Miss Willis is studying Film and Television Production at the University of Southern California. She has earned a perfect 4.0 GPA.

The competition for these two awards was rigorous. There were not so many applicants as last year, but the quality was extraordinary. For the second year, the applicants were urged to provide a sample of their work, and most provided DVDs and videos for the judges to study. The DVDs provided by Miss Laska and Miss Willis were critically important to their success.



Jennava Laska graduated with a BFA from the Art Center College of Design in 2006 as a film major. Her DVD work sample featured commercials she has directed. She has worked as a commercial director for the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, the United Nations, and the American Red Cross. She has also done commercials for BMW. Visa.

Chanel, Disney, Johnson and Johnson and United Airlines. Upon graduation she hopes to pursue a career as a commercial director. She seems well on her way to success in that field.

Miss Laska is the director, founder and creator of the Student Filmmakers Guild, the largest community of student filmmakers. The Guild works to facilitate the art and production of filmmaking. "I want to work to find a way to build community and possibilities for all filmmakers, especially women."

"I want to contribute to the film community and a national audience with portrayals of positive women in media...My grandmother always says, 'together we can overcome anything.' I believe that unity through community and awareness can change the world."



Before entering graduate school, Stephanie Willis graduated summa cum laude from Dartmouth College in Film and Television Studies in 2006. She is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and received numerous other academic honors. "My talent to navigate the motivating factors and mind sets of characters coupled with my knack of crystallizing emotional

moments lend themselves to the creation of heartfelt, deeply engaging films that expound a message and touch viewers."

Miss Willis states she wants to have a hand in transforming the film medium. "It appears that now, more than ever, the film industry has become preoccupied with box office returns more than narrative quality and innovation. The artistic quality and creativity of film, in my opinion, has increasingly declined. While technological advancements have had a resounding effect on film aesthetics, narrative innovation appears to have ceased. The majority of films have become trite, pre-packaged molds that consist of nothing more than clichés, special effects and strident violence: films completely devoid of a message." She feels film should be a site "where viewers encounter unexpected advice and subtle guidance." We believe the films she will make will do just that.

This year's Lyon Scholarships were judged by David S. Hartstein, *Emory '00*, William R. Richardson, *Tampa '80*, Dr. Scott D. Goldsleger, *Emory '98*, and Carmalieta Dellinger Jenkins who served as chairman. Many thanks to them for their hard work.

Francis D. "Pete" Lyon, *UCLA* '28, was a distinguished director, producer and editor of motion pictures and television. He won 1947's Academy Award for Best Film Editing for *Body and Soul*. Just weeks before his death in 1996, Brother Lyon endowed the scholarships in his name for students of filmmaking. At Pete's direction, they are available to Phis and to non Phis, to men and to women, to undergraduates and to graduate students. The recipients must be talented, and they must share Pete's passion for making films.





Handling punting duties for Mississippi was Justin Sparks, who averaged 39.7 on 51 punts. His longest was 55 yards and 15 punts were downed inside the 20 yard line. Teammate Rob Park held for placements and also had three punts. Seeing action for SMU was wide receiver Jim Beckner and lineman Hughes Tipton was a member of the Pennsylvania squad.

Phi Delt players on bowl teams include defensive back Erik Rudin of the 11-2



Thirty Phi players led **Davidson** to a 6-4 season. Fullback Kirk Benedict, who caught 19 passes for 175 yards, earned All-Pioneer League second team honors and offensive lineman Will Nolte gained All-Pioneer honorable mention. Named to the Academic All-District III first team was wide receiver Myles Potter, who caught 28 passes for 394 yards. Kicker Cody Elder scored 60 points on eight field goals and 36 extra points. Quarterback Matt McGreevy completed 52 of 98 for 684 yards and five scores.

Leading Davidson's defense were All-Pioneer second team linebacker Bud Crawford (42 tackles, team-high five sacks) and All-Pioneer honorable mention nose guard Will Funderburg (34 stops, four sacks). Back Patrick FitzGerald won Academic All-District III first team honors after making 56 tackles, breaking up a co-high nine passes and returning 15 punts for a 6.8 average. Back Zach Long led with three interceptions, tied for first with nine breakups and was third with 58 tackles. Other key defenders were back Matt Easton, who tied for the lead with 71 tackles; back Tyler Lemons (44 tackles); back Matt Mikrut (42 tackles); and linebacker Chris Hampton (30 stops). Kicker Cody Elder scored 60 points on eight field goals (three versus Wingate) and 36 extra points for Davidson. He also kicked off 57 times for a 52.9 average and booted 24 punts for a 38.1 average.


Leading II–2 **Wabash** to the NCAA

Thirty five Phis led 10–1 **Washington & Jefferson** to the DIII playoffs. The defense featured All-PAC second team backs Chris Kessler (49 tackles, three interceptions, 19 punt returns for a 5.8 average) and Ryan McMullen (team-high six breakups, three interceptions, 24 stops). All-PAC honorable





mention linebacker John Fahey was second with 79 tackles and forced three fumbles. Key defenders were back Doug Melton (34 tackles), back James Weatherspoon (33 tackles), lineman Mitch Tenney (28 stops), back Mitch Erdely (20 tackles), lineman Russ Chase (18 stops), lineman Julian Muganda (17 tackles) and linebackers Thad Sollick (12 stops) and Chad Boskat (11 tackles). Playing on offense for W&J were running back Josh Linton and linemen Mike Ashbaugh, Jason Pierce, Jordan Thompson and Tyler Wilson.

The 9-2 **Dickinson** squad (with 33 Phi Delts) was led by co-captain/linebacker Eric Dube, two-time finalist for the Gagliardi Trophy as outstanding Division III player. The Centennial Conference Defensive Player of the Year for the second time, he set new school marks with 142 tackles in 2007 and 389 in his career. Eric also played for the DIII All-Stars in the Aztec Bowl in Mexico. Named to the All-Centennial second team were co-captain/linebacker Mike O'Donnell (65 tackles, 10 breakups) and back Ryan Heinig (46 tackles, 13 breakups, 11 punt returns for a 9.2 average). Back Michael Maxwell led with seven interceptions, made 67 stops and was MVP of the ECAC Southeast Bowl. Other standouts were linebacker Ben Hargrave (90 tackles), lineman Paul Tichenell (34 stops), end Steve Bokron (28 tackles), lineman Matt Stone (16 tackles) and linebacker Zach Abel (16 tackles).



All-Centennial second team quarterback Ian Mitchell led in rushing (823 yards, seven TDs) and hit 124 of 201 for 1,390 yards and 10 TDs. Tight end Aren Johnson gained All-Centennial mention as a punter, averaging 37.2 on 53 punts. Fullback Tim Wells ran for 265 yards, 10 TDs and back Michael D'Amico gained 238 yards (including 127 versus Ursinus). Starting at center for Dickinson was Andy Ciukurescu.

Fifteen Phis played for 6–3 Washington & Lee. All-ODAC first teamer Stuart Sitterson had 1,735 all-purpose yards (seventh in DIII), including 573 rushing yards, 30 catches for 299 yards, 22 kickoff returns for a 27.8 average, 22 punt returns for a 9.0 mark and 10 touchdowns. Co-captain/wide receiver Jack Martin was on the All-ODAC second team and an Aztec Bowl pick after catching 53 passes for 893 yards and seven scores. Lineman Bobby Hetherington started six games and Billy Murray caught 13 passes for 126 yards. Seeing action were lineman John Thackston and receivers Jason Bacos, Ryan Welsh and John Mumper (who also kicked off).

Defensive back Mark Snoddy earned All-ODAC first team honors for Washington & Lee once again. He broke up nine passes, picked off two, had 19 tackles and scored 25 points as a kicker. Linebacker Kyle Harvey was second with 69 stops and made the All-ODAC second team. Back Jimmy Gift won All-ODAC mention after making 31 stops and breaking up seven passes. Seeing action in the W&L defensive backfield were Aaron Fulk (21 tackles), Chris Prugar (11 stops) and Frank Dale.

The 8-2 Randolph Macon team had its best season since 1997 as four Phi Delts played key roles. Offensive tackle Eric Crawford was named to the All-ODAC first team and was joined on the line by Joseph Hanks (10 starts) and Matt Ceto. Linebacker Chris Stahl started every contest and was fourth with 70 tackles. Two Phis served as co-captains for the 6-5 **Gettysburg** squad. Offensive tackle James Russell was on the All-Centennial Conference first team. Linebacker Harold Barton led in tackles for the third straight year (with 86) and gained All-Centennial honorable mention. Defensive lineman Grant Wright of the 8-2 DePauw squad posted 20 tackles, including four sacks.

Twenty Phis led **Washington-St. Louis** to a 7–3 season. Leading the defense was All-UAA first team linebacker Tyler



McSparin, who was second with 68 tackles and picked off two passes, returning one for a TD. Gaining All-UAA mention was back Tommy Bawden who was third with 56 stops and had four interceptions for 123 yards and a TD. He also had 52 punts for a 34.5 average, including 13 inside the 20. Back Evan Mayer had 32 stops and broke up six passes. Other defenders were linebacker Adam Hartler (17 tackles), lineman Bob Pine (12 stops), linebacker Jeff Mitchell (10 tackles) and back Bryce Buchanan.

Quarterback Buck Smith ran the Washington-St. Louis offense and won All-UAA second team honors. He hit 183 of 321 for 1,891 yards and 13 TDs. Also on the All-UAA second team were Joe Lubelski, the top receiver (34 for 291 yards); and linemen Dan Elliott and Scott Reigle. Also playing were receivers Kyle Gray (13 catches for 184 yards), Miles Chan and back Ian English. Corey Fogle was






an All-HCAC first teamer for **Hanover**, catching 76 passes for 559 yards (11th in DIII) and rushing for 471 yards and five scores. Clarke Hall gained All-HCAC mention and was joined on the offensive line by Alex Hunter. Receiver Adam Miller caught 30 passes for 365 yards. Linebacker Eric Cook was fourth with 68 stops and linebacker Griffin Liford had 46 tackles. Back Steven Moyer had two interceptions and 12 tackles before being injured.

The 6-4 Centre squad featured 35 Phi Delt players. All-SCAC first team back Tyler Moody, who played for the US All-Stars in the Aztec Bowl, had 78 tackles, broke up six passes, forced four fumbles and had three interceptions. All-SCAC first team linebacker Adam Hay ranked fifth in Division III tackles with 138, including 14.5 for losses. All-SCAC first team punter Chris Zimmerman had 61 boots for a 39.9 average (best of 69 yards) and also caught 25 passes for 264 yards. Safety Zack Sloan was an All-SCAC second team pick and Defensive Player of the Week versus Colorado College. He had 59 tackles, eight interceptions (second in DIII), eight breakups, 11 kickoff returns for a 25.2 average (including a 90 yard TD) and 17 punt returns for a 5.7 average.

The Centre defense had additional Phi Delt standouts. All-SCAC second team linebacker Matt Johnson was second with 81 stops and All-SCAC second team back John Perin led with 11 breakups and ranked sixth with 37 tackles. All-SCAC second team linebacker Tyler Boron led with three fumble recoveries and was fourth with 73 stops. Receiving All-SCAC honorable mention were safety Alex Ubelhart (63 tackles) and lineman Clark Norris (37 stops). Also seeing action were linebacker Tim Groh (23 tackles), linebacker Matt Mazzanti (22 stops), lineman Charles Mercy (19 tackles) and back Sean Swallen (15 stops).

Earning All-SCAC second team selection on offense for Centre were linemen Brian Coxon and Thomas Gregory. Wide receiver Tyler Hinkel led with 34 receptions for 459 yards, three TDs and won All-SCAC honorable mention, as did lineman Chad Riney. Second in receptions was Justin Moore, who caught 27 for 406 yards and three scores. Quarterback Grant Conliffe completed 64 of 131 for 839 yards and five TDs while running back Chase Porter ran for 317 yards, three TDs and caught 13 passes. Also catching passes for Centre were Travis Stephens and Paul Boccieri.

Another school with 35 Phis on the team was **Puget Sound**. Earning All-NWC second team honors were back Silas Paul (734 rushing yards; 11 catches; 13 touchdowns) and receiver Eddie Behringer (31 receptions for 367 yards). Back James Olcott gained All-NWC mention after rushing for 398 yards and four scores. Throwing for 1,261 yards (99 of 180) was quarterback Spencer Crace while back Morgan Anthony caught 17 passes for 163 yards. Starting on the Puget Sound offensive line were Cody Dean, Kyle Ruzich, Greg Bailey and Ben Schau. Back Isaac Blum returned 17 kickoffs for an 18.7 average



while Tim Fogerty saw action at tight end. Frank Speetjans kicked nine extra points.

Phis dominated the Puget Sound defense with lineman Jake Parks (36 tackles, team high four sacks) gaining All-NWC second team honors. Four year punter Brian Ames gained All-NWC honorable mention Academic All-District honors after 38 punts for a 38.1 average. Other stellar defensive players were lineman Brian Walker (29 tackles), lineman David Mensonides (29 stops), back Cory Dunn (27 tackles), linebacker Eric Borton (26 tackles), linebacker Kainoa Higgins (25 stops), linebacker Phillip Thomas (25 tackles), lineman Cole Hawes (18 tackles) lineman Curtis MacDuff, back Foster Hill and linebacker Peter New.



Seventeen Phis saw action for the 7-2 Ripon squad, led by All-MWC first team back Joshua Kraemer. He had six interceptions for 113 yards; 29 kickoff returns for a 23.9 average (including an 84 yard TD); 24 punt returns for a 10.6 average; and 45 tackles. Offensive tackle Mike Strelow was on the All-MWC first team and back Vince Spratte (50 tackles) gained All-MWC mention. Wide receiver Brian Felix caught 15 passes for 284 yards while Matt Birschbaum, Ryan Newman and Tyler Ruppert ran the ball behind lineman Mitch Winn, Lineman Ray Anderson, (27 tackles), lineman Paul Braun and linebacker Adam Firgens were part of the Ripon defensive unit.





Doak Walker, **SMU** '50, was fourth on the list and Tom Harmon, **Michigan** '41, ranked 16th.

Cross Country

He placed third (26:43) at the HCAC meet and was fourth (26:10.45) at the Greater Louisville Classic. Also on the





Franklin team were Nathan Hampton and Tyler Roell. John Shelton of **LaVerne** set a personal 10K best (30:56) at the Division III West Region meet.

Two runners excelled for **Gettysburg**. Co-captain Frank Hoban ran an 8K time of 27:27 at the Division III Mideast Regional and a 28:41 time at the Centennial Conference meet. Teammate Chris McCullough was 24th (27:21) at the Centennial 8K meet and 46th (26:21) at the DIII Mideast Regional. Mark Ulrich and Greg Williams were also on the Gettysburg team. The top runner for **M.I.T.** was Brian Jacokes, who placed second (26:36) at the All-Division New England meet; tied for seventh (26:37) at the NEWMAC meet and 18th (26:07) at the Connecticut College Invitational.

Jordy Train earned All-KCAC honors for **Southwestern College**, placing 13th. At the NAIA region IV meet, he was 15th (27:35). Teammate Tanner McNinch ran at the KCAC meet and placed 48th (29:11) at the NAIA regional. Also on their school squads were Cameron Fullerton of **Colorado State**; Nick Cowing of **St. Louis**; Travis Bui, who

competed at the PAC meet for **Washington** & **Jefferson**; Farley Stephenson of **Centre**, who ran in the SCAC meet; Joel Meredith of **Dickinson**; Brandon Feller of **Hanover**; Michael Hobson of **Southern Indiana**; and the **Central Methodist** duo of Geoff Karhoff and Casey Kensinger.



Ontario Alpha, in particular, owes him a debt of gratitude for his wisdom and his hard work.

Phi Delta Theta Foundation Celebrates Fifty-Year Anniversary In June


96% and Counting


